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EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENT

Almost Onion Time. The onion crops of the section, like the wheat and cotton crops, have been beset by hail, rain and insects. Running thus through a gauntlet of enemies, the crops have come through in varied conditions and widely varying states of maturity or near maturity. In some of the better fields, where poor sets, drip, hail and electric winds, have failed, the thirteenth blade was coming through last week-end, hailing the imminent arrival of the harvest. The harvest this year is due to spread over several more weeks than last year, due to widely varying stages of maturity in the fields. That's what we hear.

The Texas Legislature has to make up its collective mind, one way or the other, between now and September 1, or all the operations of the state's various agencies will come to a grinding halt—unless a way is found to finance the state's operations on credit. Determination of some of the giant industries not to be the victims of the new tax levies and their insistence on the sales tax is at the bottom of the disagreement among legislators is proving quite expensive.

At present rate of progress authorities will do well to get the Floyd County road building program under way and ready for a letting by next spring. Funds provided two years ago by the voters, who have paid taxes and already retired two years of interest charges, have failed to get any action of any kind, except on paper. Last report The Hesperian had, the something more than 40 tracts south of Floydada, touched by Highway 62, have been valued by the state and county. Of these three have been actually purchased and paid for, while approximately 40 owners have been contacted and agreement reached. It is definite the county will be unable to agree with two owners.

To The West, on Highway 70, so far as we have been able to learn, few of the property owners have been approached and no actual purchases of land for the new highways had been made last week. There seems to be no prospect of making any speed. It may be that somewhere in the state the highway acquisition plan, by which county and state are partners, is working out so that they get the land and get highways built, but so far in Floyd County the plan is not working whatsoever.

On of the bottlenecks is proving up titles to the land. The State Highway Department demands title insurance before a piece of ground is acquired. This calls for exhaustive title examinations. In this connection manpower is lacking. There are not enough lawyers to take care of the big load of added legal work. People are finding that passing half the cost of right of way to the highway department is not an un-mixed blessing. A good many of the greybeards may get to prove up on a title to mansions in the sky before the highway department gets around to proving up on its title to highway right-of-way.

The way the plan is working out on Highway 62 there are now nearly 40 pieces of ground on which agreement has been reached with the property owners. For everyone of these there must still be worked out the title insurance, even though the property owner and the county are ready to go. The property owner is ready to give up his land, the county is ready to pay. The other two owners, with whom the authorities are unable to agree could be dealt with under condemnation proceedings and let juries decide what the

payments should be. But the third party (the state) has injected a new note into the proceedings. And it appears local authorities are to learn what it means when "higher authority" takes over.

What's The Excuse Now! During World War II, under the pretense of discouraging unnecessary travel, the Congress passed and the executive approved a bill levying a temporary federal excise tax on passenger traffic on airlines, buses and railroads. It was publicized generally and much ado made of the need to make the public realize that their travels were impeding the war effort. What now is travel impeding? The act was passed 16 years ago. The war has long since come and gone. Is it impossible to get the congress or the president to unshackle anything or anybody?

Senator Andy Rogers gets credit in our book for the outstanding accomplishment of the regular session of the 1959 legislature, with the passage of what appears to be well thought out organization of the Red River Authority. He had some capable help, we should say, but he furnished the dedicated effort, to see that everybody affected was well aware of what was being done and to see, as well, that all interests were protected in the organization of it. Since the northeast part of Floyd County is affected, being in the Red River watershed, the matter comes well into actual meaning for Floyd County people.

A Militant NAACP is on the march. Aside from the several school districts they have the Supreme Court closing in on, they have more recently taken up the cudgel for colored baseball players in the ranks of professionals. A statement from the management of one of the major league clubs defending itself concerning a Negro youngster sent back to the minors for seasoning went into detail with an explanation.

Current news release reveals part of the reason why so many Floyd County farmers who once milked cows for a living no longer do so. The price of milk is only 20 per cent higher than it was 10 years ago, although it is better, cleaner and safer, tastes good, is homogenized, keeps longer and is usually marketed in a throw away carton. It really takes management to meet that kind of competition.

People who want a place in Floydada to live but do not have the money to buy or are unwilling to lay the money on the line, are becoming more and more numerous. The situation is aggravated by the fact that many of these would-be residents of Floydada are agents or representatives of companies which may require the family to move in order to hold the position the head of the household fills. This is becoming more general than a person settled in the small-town routine might think. How to solve the problem of getting more people without building them homes to live in is the \$64 question. The investor in good, modern rental property, it seems, simply must be found. Some of the places offered to would-be renters are not livable, according to present standards. A man with a good job does not have to stick his family in a tumble down shack. The family, as a matter of fact, is not going to let him.

WHEAT STUBBLE BENEFITS

Another good wheat harvest will soon be completed in the Floyd County Soil Conservation District. This year's crop was not as good as 1958 crop, but much better than was thought earlier in the spring. Yields of 60 bushels and higher have been reported. Irrigated wheat will average 35 to 40 bushels per acre while dryland will cut 10 to 12 bushels per acre.

Wise management of this wheat stubble can mean the difference between profit and loss on next year's crop. Tests have shown that wheat yields can be boosted as much as 15 percent when stubble mulching is practiced, as compared with use of the one-way plow.

With the massive amount of straw we will have, some thought should be given on how to handle the stubble most effectively to get best results. The most effective use is, of course, to leave most of the stubble on the soil surface. By handling stubble in this way you will be protecting the soil from blowing, channeling water into the soil, shading the soil from the direct rays of the sun, thus cutting down on evaporation of soil moisture and breaking the impact of rainfall.

According to A. W. Dalrymple, Work Unit Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service at Floydada, wheat stubble is considered to be of much benefit to the soil as is cotton burs, for which farmers pay around \$2.50 per ton to distribute on their land. Dalrymple states that tests conducted by local SCS technicians show that this year's wheat stubble will average out a little better than 3500 pounds per acre. If properly utilized this stubble will have a value of over \$4.25 per acre. Since Floyd County farmers have approximately a third million dollars if the stubble is properly utilized.

There are several types of implements available with which effective stubble mulching can be performed. Implements that feature a series of rather large sweeps which run beneath the wheat stubble, cutting weeds and loosening soil, yet leaving practically all stubble on the surface have proven effective. These sweeps should run flat in order to do the best job.

Farmers that do not have access to stubble mulching equipment must use a one-way plow can keep more residue on top if the plow is set at a shallow angle and pulled at a slow speed. Stubble should never be turned under as this leaves the land bare to erosive forces. Manage

your stubble in best manner possible to fit your particular operation, states Dalrymple, but Don't Burn It.
