## Fair Board Need Helpers August Third

Board members of the Floyd County Fair Association are sending out an "SOS" this week for helpers to prepare the grounds at Lockney for the coming Fair. The fair is scheduled for September 10-12.

Sam Puckett, secretary-treasurer of the association, residing at the Colonial House at Lockney, said the board is planning to have the grounds cleaned up and the grounds covered with weeds. A new fence is to be built therefore the board needs men to string fence wire, diggers are needed, tractors and other machinery are a necessity.

Puckett said the electric wiring in the building used for the fair has been torn down, partitions have been ripped down by vandals, and the grounds are covered with weeds. ## Lockney Co-op Acquires Big Storage Plant

Mondell Mills, manager of the Lockney Co-op Gin announced recently the cooperative's purchase of the Baxter and Smith Elevator, south Main near the outskirts of Lockney. Purchase price for the 405,000 bushel grain storage plant was not announced.

Co-op directors who signed the purchase agreement with Charles Baxter, elevator owner, include Leroy Durham, president of the board; V. H. Kellison, vice president; J. B. Bellington, secretary; Lloyd Widener and J. R. Belt. The co-op will take over operations of the business on Aug. 15.

Baxter, who has lived in Lockney for eight years, operated the elevator in partnership with Charles Smith until last year when he became sole owner.

The elevator is the largest in Lockney. Storage facilities include both concrete storage bins and Quonset type sheetiron granaries.

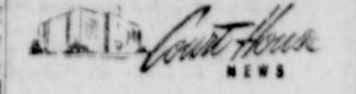

# U. S. HAS MANY COLORFUL FLAGS

The word flag is derived from the Anglo-Saxon "flegan," meaning "to float in the wind." Few flags that float in the wind these days are more colorful than the personal standards authorized for top military and government officials.

Some of the most colorful—and least known—of these flags are shown here. If you have been in service, you are probably familiar with a few of them. See how many you can identify without looking at the answers below. Shown in the corners are the seals of four major services.

A flag is also called a color or jack. The term standard usually applies to flags carried by mounted, mechanized and motorized troops, the word colors to the flags carried at the head of dismounted or foot troops. A jack is a small flag flown from the jack staff at the bow of a vessel.

Warships with a fleet commander aboard fly the commander's flag, and are known as flagship.

Long before flags, there were other kinds of national symbols, such as figures carved in wood, stone, or metal, mounted at the top of a pole or spear. Such standards were carried into battle by Egyptians, Hebrews, Persians, Assyrians and Romans. Flags of woven material flying free from a vertical staff are believed to have been used first by the Saracens, during the Middle Ages.

In the early months of the Revolutionary War, when our country was not yet well organized, various groups in the Continental Army displayed their own flags. One of these, unfurled in Taunton, Mass., in 1774, bore the British

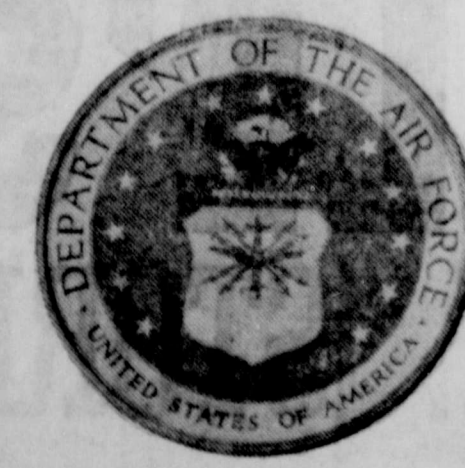
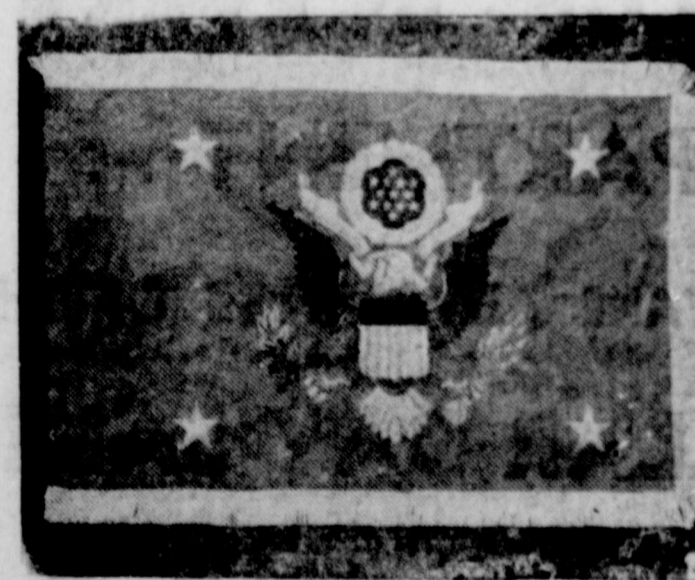
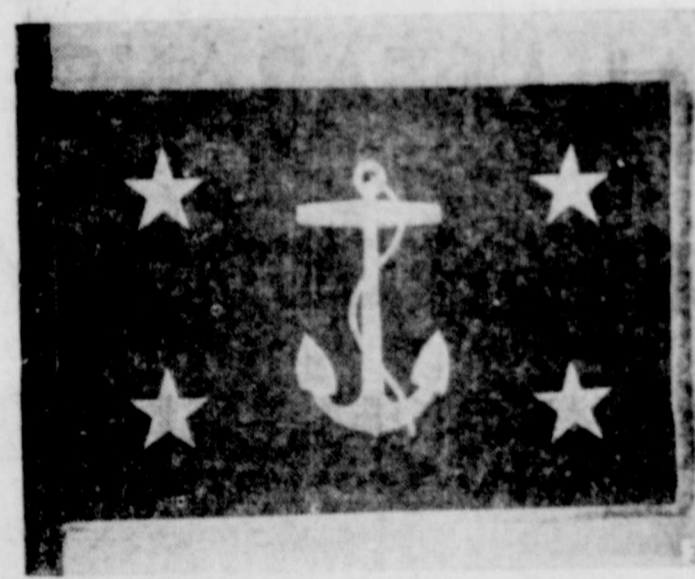
jack of the same design that had been flown from the mainmast of the Mayflower, and was inscribed "Liberty and Union."

Another showed a coiled rattlesnake above the warning, "Don't Tread On Me." It was carried by the famous Minutemen in 1775. At the Battle of Bunker Hill, American troops were inspired by the Pine Tree flag, symbol of the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

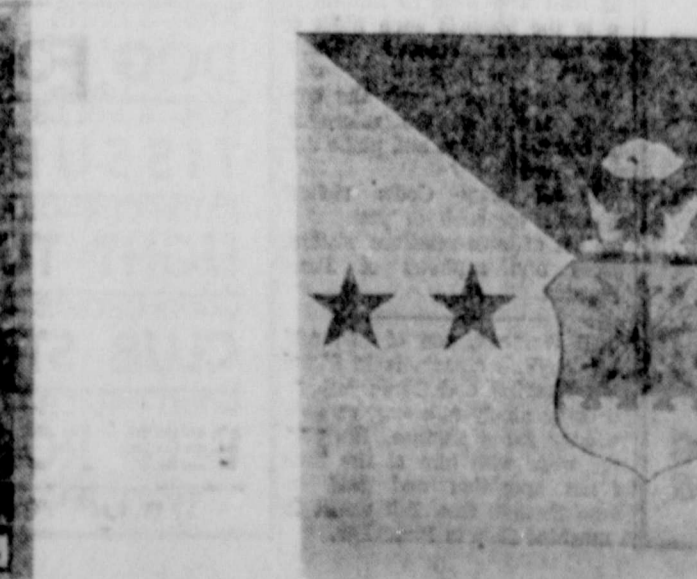
The first flag representing the united colonies in revolution, with thirteen alternate red and white stripes, was raised by John Paul Jones from the deck of the ship Alfred, December 3, 1775. George Washington liked this and named it the Grand Union flag. But on the blue field, in the upper left-hand corner, instead of stars, were the crosses of Saint Andrew and Saint George.

The colonists felt a need for a national flag to symbolize their unity and independence after July 4, 1776, and so Congress passed a resolution calling for a flag of thirteen stripes, and also thirteen stars, white on a blue field. A lady of Philadelphia is credited with having suggested that the stars be five-pointed, and with having made the first flag, with the stars arranged in a circle. Her name was Betsy Ross.

**Air Conditioning  
Moves To The Barn  
And Greenhouse**

(By John C. White)

What's new in the animal king-  
dom? Annual air conditioning  
that's what.

It has been a known fact for  
many years that the hot Texas  
summers slow growth and pro-  
duction rates of farm animals. But  
the difference in just a few de-  
grees of temperature will mean a  
more rapid growth rate which in-  
creases farm income.

According to preliminary re-  
search studies, hens kept in cool  
chicken houses not only lay larger,  
tougher eggs but they also  
produce up to twice as many. In  
addition, a "heat struck" hen may  
consume up to 4 pounds of feed in  
her efforts to produce a dozen  
eggs. But when kept cool and com-  
fortable, the hen needs only about  
2.66 pounds of feed per dozen.

The air conditioned chicken  
house also increases flock produc-  
tion. Eight percent more of the  
setting hens' eggs hatch in a cool  
house. Chick mortality falls and  
the house itself can accommodate  
15 percent more chickens com-  
fortably, reports show.

Pigs and cattle respond equal-  
ly well to cooler quarters in the  
summertime. If pigs are kept at  
70 degrees, they reach a market-  
able weight in one-fourth the time  
needed at 90 degrees. And they  
consume a total of only one-third  
as much food.

When cattle are kept cool, they  
gain up to half-pound more per  
day and give more milk, accord-  
ing to research tests.

Air conditioning trials in green-  
houses reveal that plants respond  
equally well. Plants need light,  
air, water and heat for growth,  
but in correct proportion. The blaz-  
ing Texas heat often retards  
plants in the hottest months.  
Cooling green houses thus can  
double the growing rates of mar-  
ketable flowers and vegetables,  
researchers claim.

vestigate, with the result that  
oil was discovered. - The Lamp

**Important News Of Mars**  
The temperature of Mars is  
presumed to be one of great ex-  
tremes, due to the rarefied atmos-  
phere, although at the equator it  
is estimated the variation is not  
more than that of a cool spring  
day to frost in that. Polar caps  
extend midway to the Martian  
equator.

Surface gravity on Mars is  
only little more than a third of  
what it is on the Earth, and  
man weighing 150 pounds here  
would find his weight reduced to  
approximately 57 pounds on  
Mars.

The diameter of Mars is 4,215  
miles, not much more than half  
that of the Earth. Mars has a day  
only a little longer than that of  
our own. The Martian year is  
twenty-two and one-half months.  
The seasons are similar to ours,  
but nearly twice as long.

There is great scarcity of wa-  
ter on Mars, presenting a most  
serious problem in conservation of  
the management.

WHERE — with plenty for everyone to eat.

And mighty fine eatin' they are too.

Mr. Webster gives this definition of the onion — "An Asiatic plant of the lily family — an edible bulb of pungent taste and odor."

Nutrition charts say that a large onion contains between 4 and 50 calories. Also, that it contains, minerals and vitamins, both very necessary to our well being as far as health is concerned. It contains principally calcium, iron, vitamin A and vitamin C.

Here are some favorite recipes for using these nice fresh vegetables that are so plentiful at this time.

**French Fried Onion Rings**

Slice large onions crosswise (Approximately one-fourth inch thick).

Separate into rings.

Dip onion rings into fritter batter and fry in deep hot fat, 375 degrees until brown.

Drain, serve.

**Fritter Batter**

Beat 2 eggs

Stir in one-half cup milk

Sift together and beat in — 1 cup all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

Add — 1 teaspoon melted fat or cooking (salad) oil.

Note: If onions are strong they may be soaked in sweet milk before frying.

**Mrs. Appling's Onion Casserole**

Boil 6 to 8 medium sized onions until tender. Drain, and place in a greased casserole. Dot with butter. Salt and pepper to taste. Pour over them 1 can of cream of mushroom soup to which 1 cup of milk has been added.

Sprinkle over the top 1 cup finely crushed cracker crumbs.

Cover with grated cheese and place in oven until browned and cheese is melted.

**Stuffed Baked Onions:**

Cook large onions in boiling salted water until slightly tender (about 15 minutes).

Drain. Cut thin slice from root end of onion.

Hollow out centers, leaving a cup half inch shell.

Chop centers and combine with Cheese Sauce, or a creamed meat mixture.

Use to fill onion shells.

Top with buttered crumbs.

Bake 1 hour in moderately hot oven.

**Broiled Onions**

Pour cream over cooked onions. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Broil until it melts.

**O'Brien Potatoes:**

2 slices of onion

3 tablespoons green pepper, diced

3 tablespoons butter

1 one-half cups raw potatoes, diced

1 teaspoon salt (Salt to suit taste)

1 tablespoon parsley, chopped

Saute onion and green pepper in butter or margarine. Add potatoes and salt. Cover and cook slowly until done. Stir occasionally.

When served sprinkle with the parsley.

## Root Systems Of Row Crops Needing Rain

If it suits the Weather Man's finagony Floyd County people would just as soon have an inch and a half of rain this week.

So much water was peppered from the heavens during the 90-day period beginning in April and continuing through the first two of July that the root systems of growing crops have not gone through what it would be called "drenched and late-planted crops."

Farmers last week in irrigated sections began supplying the water deficiency. Cotton is in a heavy stage of fruiting and needs the moisture the deep roots can not supply in sufficient volumes for the sappy stalks. Feed also, a lot of it, is in the boot and needs moisture for heavy production in this low market year.

Not to mention hail and electric winds that kept farmers in some areas busy replanting, the rain period which began in April and continued right on through to mid-July, was an unusual weather occurrence, not duplicated by anything in the record books for many years.

It has rained as much, possibly even more in some year, but not over such a long period of time.

On April 7 the first rains broke loose, according to Floydada records kept by Pioneer Natural Gas Company. From that date to July 17, when the last rain recorded here, there were 101 days of wet weather, much of the time too wet for farmers even to enter their fields.

Here is the unofficial record kept at the gas company office: April 7-8, 2.15 inches total; April 8, 75-hundredths, May 7, 1.10, May 8, 20-hundredths, May 12, 1.30, total of 3.35 inches; June 1, 4.9 inches, June 3, 1.5

total rainfall in the 101-day period 17.30 inches. The fall was much greater in some parts of the county, somewhat less in others.

Q. D. Williams of the T M Bar Ranch Lakeview, said White River Blanco Canyon started running period beginning in April and continuing through the first two of July that the root systems of growing crops have not gone through what it would be called "drenched and late-planted crops."

Mac McCaskill at the Floydada Country Club said that the river which runs through the grounds was up three or four times due to the local rains and rains upstream. He said that the river had not overflowed this year. The big rains which fell in the vicinity of Plainview had the creek flowing swiftly for several days.

# THE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

Many of the senators and representatives have tried hard to formulate a tax program that would care for the needs of the state. Their efforts have been stymied. During the past six months there has been talk of a unicameral legislature, like Nebraska's. Also there has been talk of a special election to let the public decide on taxes — Especially sales taxes. Some officials feel that the public, if it had its say today, would vote for a sales tax — and thus take the monkey off the backs of the legislators. But so far no one has had the courage to introduce such a measure.

Soundings by the press indicate that a sales tax might very well be acceptable to the people — that the people fully realize the dilemma — that they at least would go along with a reasonable sales tax, although they might not be firmly opposed to an income tax.

Maybe a special election on the subject of a sales tax is the answer. At least the public would have a say in the matter and our senators and representatives would not have to face the criticism they now fear.

Wish somebody had thought of that earlier, don't you? An election could have been held on the subject at much less expense than that incurred in financing three additional special sessions, all of which actually centered around that very topic.

**NEW BUILDINGS** — While the Senate and House are busy trying to find a way to finance the state's future operations, governmental buildings are still being erected around the Capitol. In fact, they are beginning to dwarf the major edifice.

Occupancy of the first of these buildings to be completed has just been made by the Texas Employment Commission. Its six hundred employees now are housed in the \$2,400,000 structure.

A total of 11,000 pieces of office equipment were moved out of the eleven downtown Austin locations into the new six-story building through the state recently.

**TEC began some 24 years ago** with a staff of 25 employees in the state headquarters and 50 local offices. Now employed are 2,300 persons, with 93 local offices throughout the state.

**GOVERNOR SIGNS BILLS** — A bill by state Senator Bill Fly extending the time for removal of the offices of the State Board of Insurance from the International Life Building in Austin has been signed by Gov. Price Daniel.

The Commission rents some ten floors of the building. However, the rent is paid by the various insurance companies in Texas.

Earlier Senator Fly secured passage of a bill calling for the removal of the Insurance Commission from that building and the construction of its own office headquarters. Work has not yet begun on the new building.

Other bills signed by Governor Daniel include one by Sen. Hubert Hudson, authorizing certain water districts to waive immunity from liability for negligence of its agents; a bill by Sen. Charles Herring relating to monies appropriated to the State Board of Barber Examiners; and two bills dealing with hunting and fishing. One by Rep. Sam Parsons, would authorize the Game and Fish Commission to allow fishing and hunting of migratory waterfowl on lakes and rivers located upon a common boundary with other states.

The other, Rep. Zeke Zbrank, related to the catching of catfish in the Trinity River.

**LONG INVITE POCKETED** — In a second attempt to get legislative approval of an invitation to Gov. Earl Long of Louisiana to address the Texas legislature has failed. The latest effort, by Rep. Bill Jones of Dallas, drew little support.

Mr. Jones said that his invitation was a matter of "common courtesy" to the governor, who had expressed a willingness to address the Texas legislature when he came into the new six-story building through the state recently.

**Revival Meeting Announced by McCoy Baptists** — A revival meeting, which begins Friday night of this week and continues through Sunday, Aug. 9, is being announced by McCoy Baptist Church.

Chester Sassman, pastor of the Caprock Baptist Church, will preach for the series of meetings, and Harmon Bishop, musical director of Seth Ward Baptist Church, will lead the song services.

On the second Sunday, climaxing the revival, an all-day meeting will be held with a covered dish dinner at the church at noon.

Pastor Heywood Kube announces week-day services at 10 a. m. and 8 p. m. The evening service will be preceded by a prayer service at 7:30.

## EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENT

**Buying Choice A Cotton** will have a technique with which the plains is unfamiliar. Nothing like it ever before. How it may be sold, to whom, and at what price will be among requirements set up by USDA, presumably to comply with the option plan adopted by the Congress to govern the 1959 crop. We presume: (1) That Mr. Benson has added some rules and regulations; and (2) there will be eligible buyers in Floydada.

**Recurrence of Polio.** In view of the almost 100 per cent effectiveness of the Falk Polio inoculation against poliomyelitis, parents who do not give their little fellows the shots, and young people who neglect to have inoculations against the virus, can't be unhappy with anybody but themselves when polio hits in their families. Mounting toll of polio in a year of carelessness already has the list of people struck down increased by several percentage points.

**We Are Not Sure.** There seems to be optimism in all quarters regarding the passage of a tax law by the Third Special Session of the Texas Legislature. It seems to us that two groups of men who can't agree in one regular and two special sessions, covering 180 days of elapsed time, quite probably can't agree in a third special session.

**The Steel Situation.** Dealers in steel equipment are sending out notices to their customers that they expect to be able to take care of all requirements. All they ask is that the customers do not buy more than they need. This has reference to the situation that has arisen due to the steel strike. We are happy to note this optimism on the part of suppliers. It means they have or have in sight steel enough to continue on practically normal operational basis for most any given length of time.

**Many People, including ourselves,** are of the opinion that most of the strikes of recent years have been rigged against the public. They are rigged upstairs, the rank and file being unaware of what the strike is for, what the issues are. In this instance it may turn out that the steel companies and their employes have already priced themselves out of the market and the public will not have to get down on its knees. Steel is rolling into America from abroad. Houston is full of Belgian steel and more coming.

**The Forthcoming Census.** Ten years ago an inadequate count of the residents of Floydada resulted from a lack of zeal on the part of the census takers. A quick count too late to get the figures in the official census revealed 132 additional residents the counters should have included. Possibility that the same thing may happen again, come next spring, can be averted by an alert community. The Census Bureau is already getting the plans cut and dried. The Bureau needs to be reminded that we are not going to take any such lackadaisical count any more without a squawk. A census is supposed to be a count of the people.

**It is now evident** the community is going to need to count all the noses we can to make a respectable showing over the count in 1950. Thanks to the fact that the city has reached out and sold water and light service to residents in most of the adjacent territory that is fairly close there is no reasonable expectation of taking in more territory. The fortunates who are getting water and light service at the same price a city taxpayer is getting it will be satisfied with the way things are, to say the least. The city fathers are in no position to do any bargaining. Several scores of people on the fringes won't be counted in Floydada, as a result. What was once considered a good move is now backfiring, especially since it seems definite that both water and light are being sold to these outsiders at a figure at least 10 per cent too low, possibly even below cost.

**Shingle Roofs Cost.** Not anything to be done about it, so far as we know, except to bide our time. That is, about the insurance premium penalty that is being paid by Floydada residents for the wooden shingle roofs. It comes to a considerable amount. Similar to the penalty the community pays for the frame enough additional premium for these buildings that dot the fire zone, here and there. Floydada people have paid old frame buildings to have donated the owners thereof a good brick building apiece to take the place of the getchy old hulks. But a man's property is his own to do with as he chooses. As regards wooden shingle roofs, they are regarded by insurance people as a deadly hazard on a windy day. Once upon a time they were the only kind of roofs that could be had. Their passing is now a matter of time.

### August Plentiful Foods List Long

**COLLEGE STATION** — What's plentiful in Texas food stores this August?

Fresh fruits and summer vegetables dominate the list of more than a dozen plentiful foods, reports the Agricultural Marketing Service, Dallas, after making a survey of stocks immediately available to Texas and other Southwest homemarkers.

Pears and plums rate the feature spot because shipments will be rolling from the largest pear crop since 1949 and from a plum crop about 70 percent larger than last year.

Supplies of peaches, lemons and limes are expected to run especially heavy, too.

Only meat to make the U. S. Department of Agriculture's August plentiful foods is turkey. About 65,000,000 pounds are moving from national cold storage stocks.

Other items in good supply include eggs, peanut butter, onions, vegetable fats and oils.

### BIBLE BAPTIST CHURCH

#### THE TWO RESURRECTIONS

The Word of God teaches that all the dead (Bodies) will be raised. (John 5:28, 29) But all the dead will not be raised at one time nor hour, as some would teach it. In fact, a partial resurrection of the Saints has already taken place. (Matt. 27:52, 53).

There are definitely two resurrections yet future. There will be a resurrection of the just or saved called the "Resurrection of life" and there will be another resurrection of the unjust or lost which is called the "Resurrection of damnation." (John 5:28, 29).

Some have objected to this teaching because they teach the "hour" mentioned here in this scripture would indicate that all the saved and lost would be resurrected at the same time, but I would have you notice the "hour" mentioned in John 5:25 has already lasted nearly two-thousand (2000) years. It is the same as the word "Day" which is used many times, when much more than twenty four (24) hours is intended. (Read: 2 Pet. 3:8; 2 Cor. 6:2; John 8:56).

Notice in Luke 14:13, 14 that the Lord was speaking of the first resurrection, and he was speaking of the just or saved. Now read I Cor. 15:22, 23 it says, Every man will be resurrected in his own order (Not all together) Christ the first-fruits; (These were resurrected when Christ was resurrected—Matt. 27: 52, 53) afterward they that are Christ's (not the lost but Christ's when?) at His coming. (Read carefully: 1 Thes. 4:13, 18).

Now the two resurrections are mentioned together again in Revelation 20: 4, 6, but it also mentioned that there will be a thousand (1000) years separating the two resurrections, which is first of the saved, then of the lost.

Those of the first resurrection will be blessed and the second death will have no power over them (Rev. 20:6) What is the second death? It is the eternal punishment of the lost. (Rev. 20:14) The resurrection of the lost is found in the same chapter; (Rev. 20:12, 13).

There is not one atom of scripture that teaches or even indicates there will be one big general resurrection and one judgment.

We have been speaking of the resurrection of the bodies of the saved and the lost and not their souls or spirits, because their soul is already gone either to Heaven or to hell, either to eternal punishment or eternal bliss. (Phil. 1:23; 2 Cor. 5:8; Luke 16:22, 23).

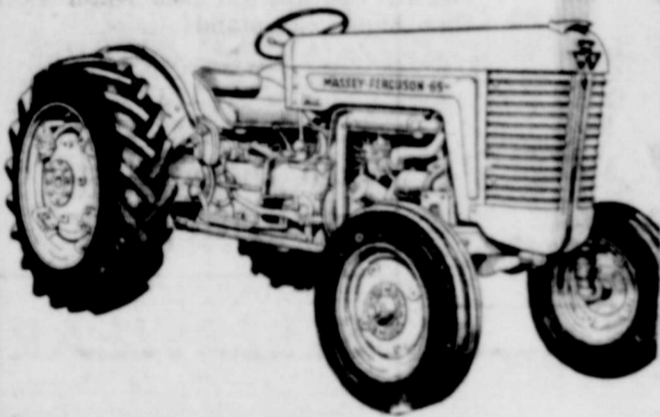

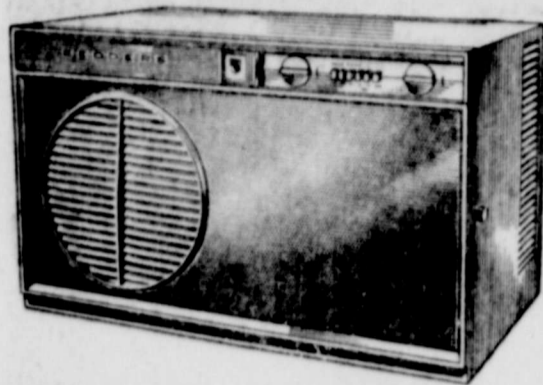
