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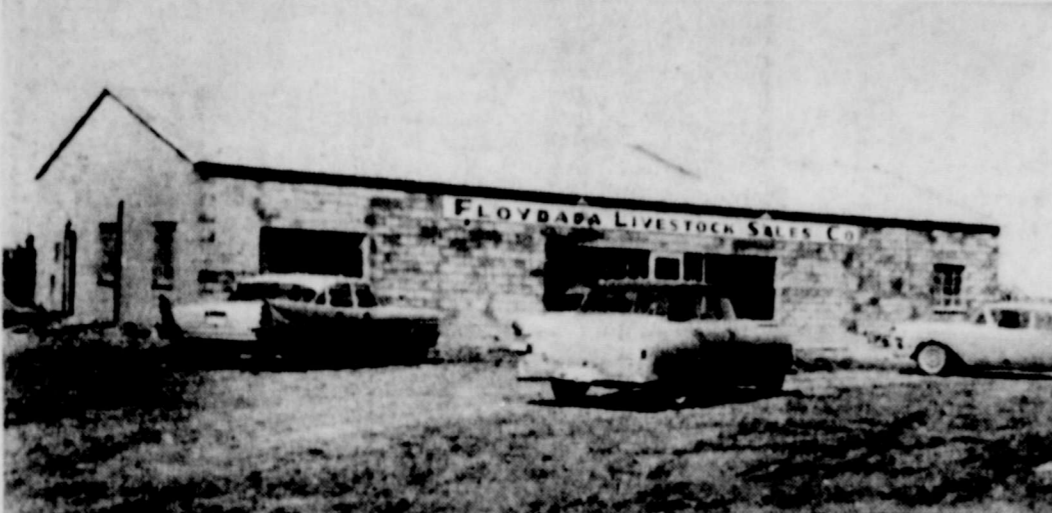

First Cattle Sale Slated Thursday By New Firm

Their first livestock auction sale will be held on Thursday of next week, October 29, it was announced this week by Brasher & Word, proprietors of the Floydada Live Stock Sales Co., one of the new business ventures in Floydada.

The new plant started in the spring will represent an investment of \$30,000 or so when it is finished. It is located just outside the city limits on Highway 207 North. The partners bought a 10-acre tract on which they have built their sales barn and holding pens. The sales barn is 40 by 80 feet in size. It is built of concrete blocks.

Tom Word this week said they still have quite a bit of work to do before the sale date but they have the heavy details behind them and can be sure they'll be ready when the date arrives.

"We have some cattle already assured for the first sale and expect to have more before the sale day," Word said.

Estimate Gin Runs 2,000 Bales Daily

Good old open October weather in Floyd County is bringing the busiest and most remunerative week of harvest to its rich farm lands enjoyed in many a year.

The magic of cotton is unfolding at the rate of 2,000 bales per day since Monday.

Plenty of moisture in the ground, a zip in the early-morning air, 75-degree weather at high noon and blue skies, combine to make every kind of farming ideal.

The cotton man is gathering cotton, the maize man combining his maize and the wheat man sowing his wheat.

Freight Carload Cotton Damaged

Foreman Print Rice and his maintenance crew of the Q A & P and members of Floydada Fire Department were practically all night Sunday and into the morning Monday getting a fire extinguished that broke out in a carload of long staple cotton enroute from California to South Carolina.

The 110 bales of compressed staple was in a train the Santa Fe turned over to the Quannah at 7:10 Sunday evening. The fire was discovered while the car was in the yard at 8 o'clock and kicked out of the train. Six bales of the cotton was consumed by the fire, several partially and there was smoke and water damage to practically all of the cotton. The cotton processed at Shalston, Calif., was shipped out of Bakersfield. Its destination was Greenville, S. C.

Texas New Marriage Law Alters Custom

Strict marriage laws in Texas went into effect Thursday, Oct. 15, according to Margaret Collier, Floyd County clerk. The new regulations affect young women under the age of 18, and young men under the age of 21.

The new law was passed by the 56th Legislature. Persons under those age limit, when applying for a marriage license, must have their parents or guardian appear with them, and the parents must give their written consent to the marriage in the presence of the county clerk.

Marriage license applications for those under the prescribed ages, must remain on file in the county clerk's office for three days before the license can be issued.

All persons, regardless of age must present a certified copy of their birth certificate, drivers license, poll tax receipt, passport or visa or any other document issued under a current law of the state which bears the applicants full name, correct birth date, and a description of the applicant by which he can be identified, Miss Collier said.

Applicants for marriage license must also swear before the county clerk that there are no existing conditions which would bar marriage between the persons applying for license.

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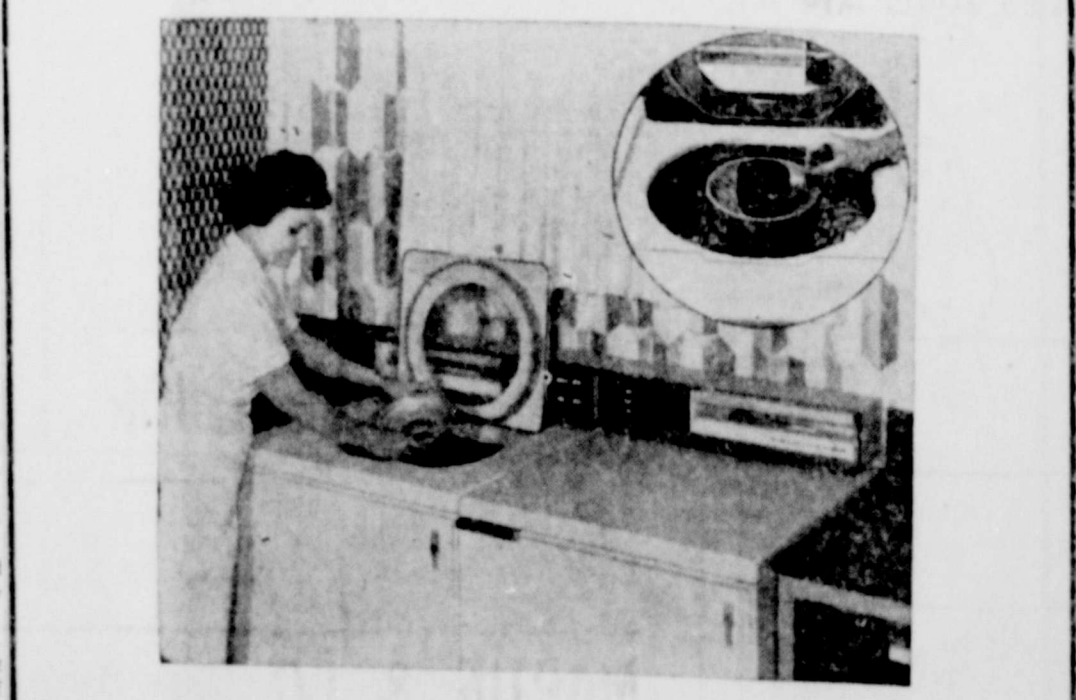



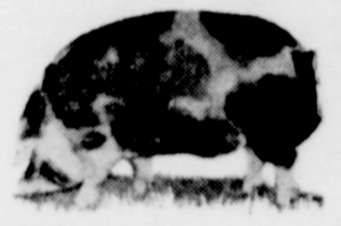
