Rites for O. G. Noyes, 78, of Vernon, father of Dee Noyes of Floydada, were held Friday at the Sullivan Funeral Home Chapel at Vernon. Dr. J. E. Shewbert, pastor of the First Methodist Church in that city, officiated. Interment was in Wilbarger Memorial Park.

Mr. Noyes, a retired farmer, died on Wednesday, Nov. 25, the day after his birthday, in a Vernon Rest Home. He had been ill for several years.

Mystery Fruit Cake:
1 package spice cake mix
4 cups candied fruit
One-half cup whole red candied cherries

One-half cup whole green cherries
One and one-half cup seedless raisins
1 cup dates, cut
Four and one-half cups pecan halves

1 package fluffy white frosting mix
Mix cake as directed on the package. Let cool.
Crumble into a large bowl and add fruit and nuts.

Make fluffy white frosting mix, according to the package directions and add to bowl with crumbs and fruits.

Toss together until mixture is damp and blended together.
Pack tightly into two-foil lined loaf pans.

Pack down with buttered hands until firm and smooth.
Cover cake with foil or wrap

in cellophane and chill in the refrigerator at least 24 hours.

Cake improves if stored longer. Cake must be kept refrigerated. Slice with a sharp knife when cake is very cold.

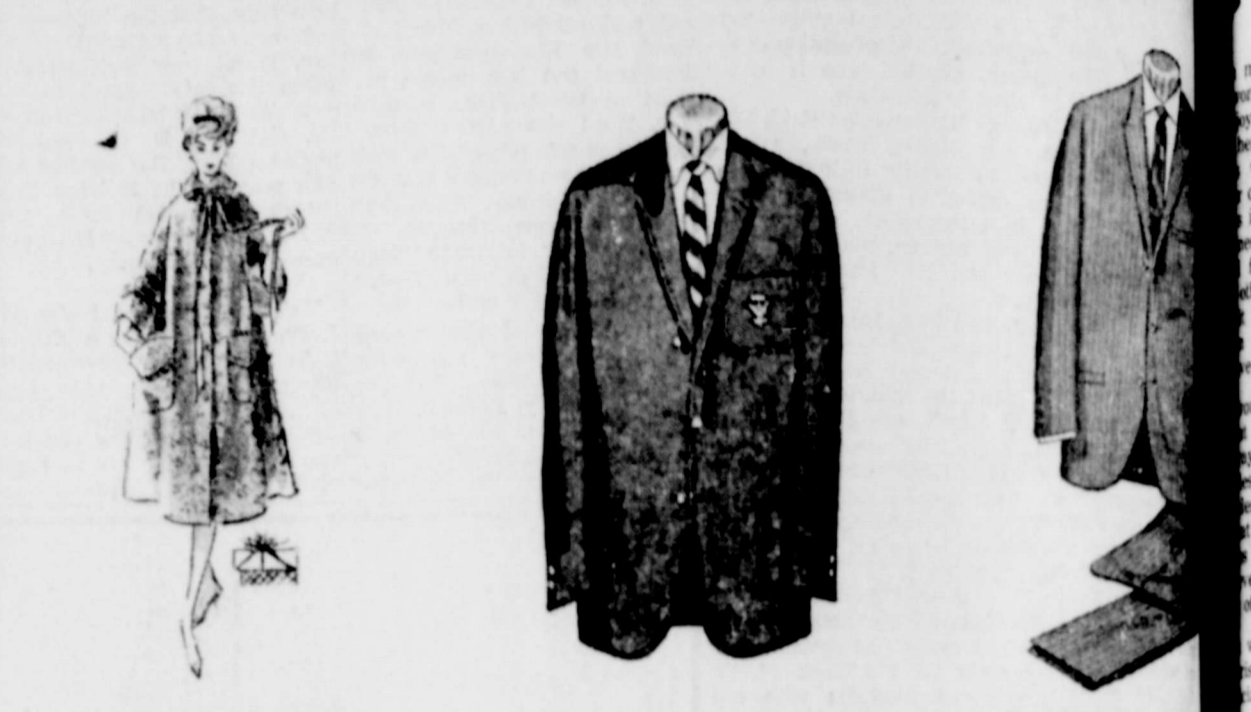

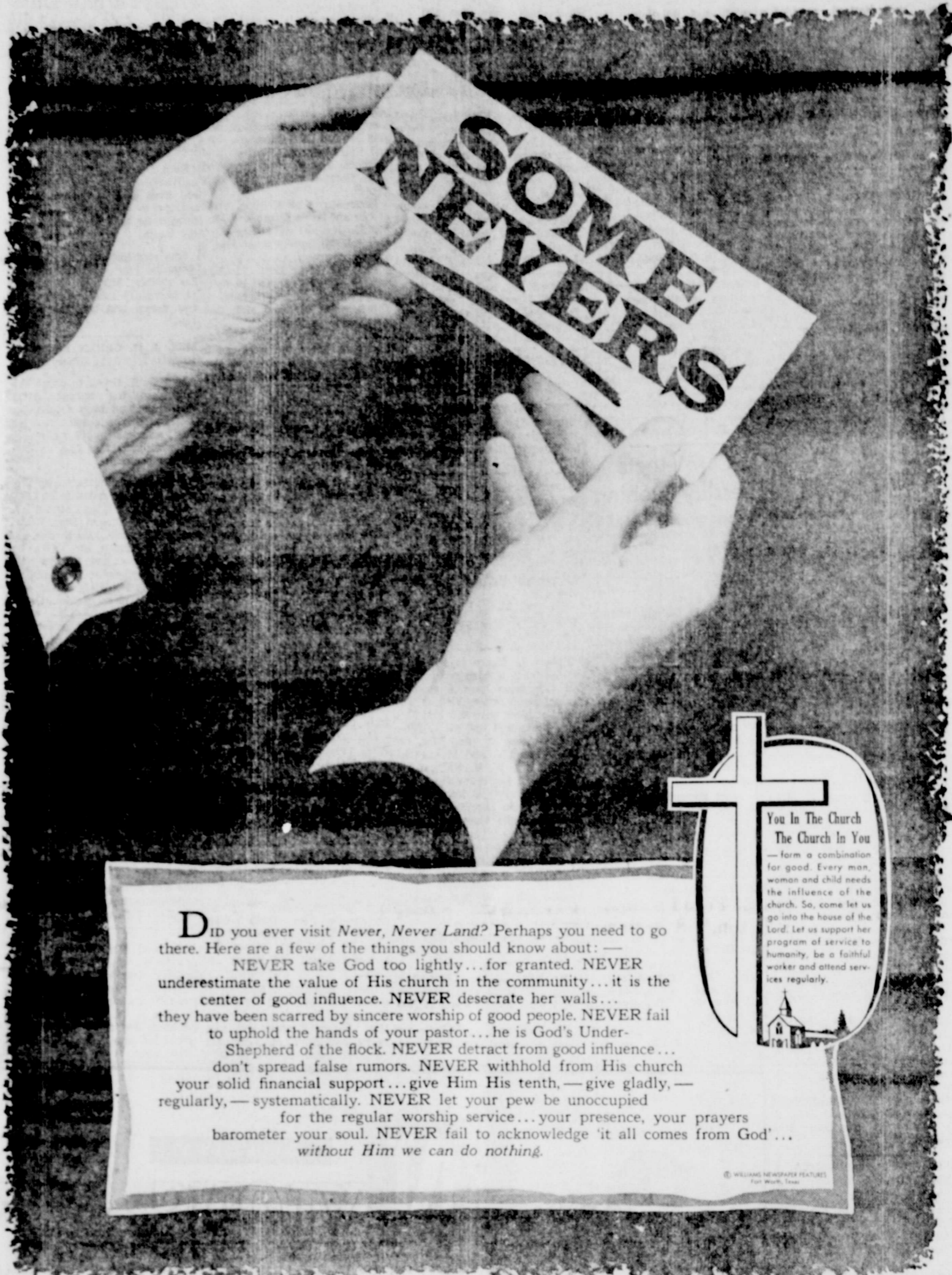

EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENT

Food Prices Are Low. Despite outrageous costs of distribution, prices for farm foods are not high, particularly not high on account of "farm programs." The exact opposite is, in fact, the truth. Food prices, in terms of man hours required to earn the family food budget, are lower today than ever in history. And agriculture is more important than ever in industry, not less important, as city people have come to think. Forty per cent of the nation's population is supported by agriculture in production, processing, transportation and services.

People Getting Bigger. One result of better diet in this country is that the people are getting bigger, new bed sizes are having to be provided, architects are having to give more study and attention to doorways and halls. Also note that the second generation of Latin American immigrants wears bigger shoe sizes, larger belts, longer trousers. The human animal, like those of the range, responds to vitamins, minerals and balanced diet. And plenty abounds.

Distributing The Surplus. The undernourished millions on the globe all would be responding to this growth in size if all the food in the world could be somehow distributed so that all could share it. Laws and customs, rules and regulations, racial fear and prejudice, probably other things of which we are not aware all enter into the cost of distribution, which is the Number One bugaboo of the age.

Practicing Criminal Law. Lawyer Geisler's series in the Saturday Evening Post is creating considerable interest and some heat in the discussions of the practice of criminal law. A viewpoint, which is novel but has a touch of logic in it, comes in a New Mexico columnist's declaration that no attorney should be allowed to defend or prosecute a criminal case in court until he has served at least six months in a penitentiary.

Showed His Garters. We'd been hearing about Jack Paar and his late night show. Also the general buzz about rigged shows; and thousand dollar plays. So when Jack pulled up his trousers and showed his new socks and—just incidentally—his garters as well, it went through our mind that even the righteous and tempestuous Mr. Paar might find it profitable to bring in an amount of something that would do somebody good—perhaps a thousand or a few thousand dollars worth. We hadn't thought of men's garters in many a day until Jack did his little trick. We don't see anything bad about it, except that it should be marked "advertisement."

We're On the Wet Side. That statement ought to create a sensation in dry Floyd County until we explain the wetness we have in mind is snow. We would like to see the weather man cloud up and put out a real snow that would stay on a long, long time, make it rough on man and beast. Would January be a suitable time for such a phenomenon? Or early February?

Newspaperman is Tricky. In matters of truth and veracity it is quite difficult to get The Hesperian cornered. To illustrate the devious workings of a news writer's mind note how we are going to handle the story we carried last week about the cotton crop. In that story we made an estimate of 120,933 bales. By the time we got to writing the heading we'd taken the big eye and upped the figure to 123,000. Now if the actual ginnings run 123,000 or better we'll pass it off by saying the printer made an error in the little print. If it runs under we'll say the printer made a mistake in the big print. If the total doesn't even reach 120,000 we'll say the ginner got their figures all balled up. Rack up a score for solid ingenuity.

Unlike the former days the cotton stripper makes the ginner all the business he can handle right up to the last bale. And when it is over the ginning season is over. Less than a decade ago a ginner rarely expected his season to be over until weeks after Christmas. The new idea is a Johnny come lately but it suits everybody better. It is remarkable how good a job the strippers do on an average and what a good sample the gins turn out from stripped cotton.

Speaking of cotton it is noted that the big "jugs" which consume in flames the burrs, motes and trash the gins take from the cotton, glow 24 hours a day. The residue is high in potash and phosphorus content. Before transportation got prohibitively high refiners used to "clean out" the ashes for gins at no cost, haul the ashes to a refinery. A good many farms we note are hauling the burrs and motes back to the land and scattering it for its value as fertilizer and organic matter.

Quail Season Here. Conflicting reports on the quail crop come from quail hunters who took to the fields and pastures early Tuesday. A big crop that defoliant and insecticides dissipated some. Plenty of quail if you look at the right place is the contrary report.

Don't Tell us the country has a domestic problem that is more important than water. The dry areas need more water, the wet sections could well divide up and be better off for it. Some of these days the dream of tapping the mighty Missouri and throwing that stream's mighty flood waters across the plains from South Dakota or somewhere thereabout—some of these days such a dream could well be realized. It could happen before 2,000 A.D. When Uncle Sam finally gives up trying to nurse and diaper the universe, the money saved in one year would pay the bill. Only, of course, they'd issue bonds for it.

Speaking Of Bonds, we have yet to see a man who is smart about money on a big scale but scoffs at the idea that the public debt ever will be liquidated. Politics and political ambitions, combined with the inborn cupidity of us all, will never permit it, they say. It could get worse but is not likely to get better, so far as the federal debt is concerned.

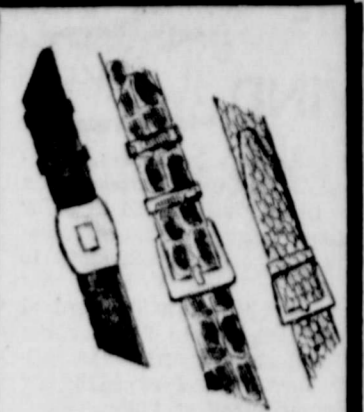

Christmas, political gifts they'll get in January. Gov. Price Daniel has called special elections to fill the legislative vacancies for Jan. 9. For the several candidates already actively running for these offices, election would be a highly acceptable post-season "present."

Governor Daniel also has written members of the Legislature asking how they feel about having a special session early next year to raise money for higher

teachers' salaries. Some already have stated, bluntly and publicly, that this is a "gift" they could pass up. It would force them to choose, right before running for re-election, between disappointing the teachers and passing a new tax, which always makes somebody unhappy.

Several have said that they feel the matter of teacher raises either should have been settled during the sessions last spring and summer or should be postponed until the next regular session. After statewide elections, it's pointed out, legislators might have a clearer idea of what all the people want.

Other lawmakers, however, say they feel teachers should have an immediate raise.

Talk now is that, if the special session is called, it will be about Jan. 12, just after the special elections.

For state officials in general holiday dreams are focused, not on Dec. 25, but Feb. 1, the last day to file for a place on the primary ballot. For the candidates, no "visions of sugar plums" can compare with the hope of having Feb. 1 end with no tough opposition in sight.

WATER ENGINEER RESIGNS — McDonald D. Weiner has resigned his post as chief state water engineer effective Jan. 12.

Weiner said he was not leaving because of being "under fire by anyone" and that he did not have another position at the time. Weiner is a retired Army Engineer Corps colonel. He was hired in April, 1958, to head the Water Board's planning section. Legislature authorized the planning section to study all the state's surface and underground water resources and make a statewide report to the Legislature.

Water Board has been the target of critical statements in recent months by the Texas Water Conservation Association and the Texas Society of Professional Engineers. TWCA charged that friction between board members has caused the state's water program to lag.

WATER FIGHT CONTINUES
Whether the Trinity River or the San Jacinto is the best source for Houston's future water needs is the issue in a prolonged hearing before the State Water Board.

Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston are seeking permits to build two dams near Houston. San Jacinto River Authority is contesting the application. It contends Houston has an agreement to get its water from the San Jacinto and that Trinity water is insufficient and polluted.

Engineers for the Houston-Trinity group have presented mountains of statistics in support of their case that Trinity water will be adequate for industrial use and cheaper than San Jacinto water.

City of Denton has dropped its opposition to the proposed dams after coming to an agreement with TRA and Houston to protect water rights of the Garza-Little Elm and Grapevine reservoirs.

COMMISSION STUDIES GAS PRICES — Railroad Commission is now considering the record of nearly a year's heated discussion over whether Lone Star Gas Co. should be allowed to raise its rates.

More than 300 Texas cities are affected.

Lone Star is asking to increase rates from 30 to 40 cents per 1,000 cubic feet. It says that 9 cents of this is swallowed up by the higher prices it must pay for gas at the wellhead. It is asking also that some system be established to adjust prices to customers automatically when costs to the company go up significantly.

Attorneys for the affected cities charge that the gas company is trying to put an unfair share of the costs on householders rather than on the big industrial consumers.

LAWS CLARIFIED — In a series of opinions, mostly concerned with new laws passed this year, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has ruled:

1. That parts bought for repair of air conditioners are not subject to the new 3 per cent sales tax on air conditioners. All parts sold for the original installation are taxable.

2. That the law creating a Texas Coordinating Commission for Health and Welfare Services is unconstitutional. Commission "could have been made up of persons from both the legislative and executive branches of government, thus violating the "separation of powers" principle of the constitution.

3. That members of the State Board of Insurance can be paid their regular \$50 per day fee for work on Saturdays.

4. That a juvenile offender arrested during the night can be held in jail until taken before the judge the next morning.

5. That county funds can be used to pay all or part of the hospitalization insurance premiums for county officials and employees.

6. That a veteran who refuses to execute a contract under the veterans land program after purchase has been approved forfeits his 5 per cent down payment and portions of the closing fees.

RECORD SALES SEEN — Totals thus far indicate Texas should hit an all-time high in retail sales in 1959, says the Bureau of Business Research.

BBR's estimate of total 1959 sales, based on the good showing of the first 10 months, is \$13,633,000,000. This would be 8 per cent better than last year.
