Put This One in your book. We have not found an old-timer who can recall a December and early January like the one we have been experiencing. Plenty of bad winters when snow and deep cold prevailed and when there was ample moisture for all needs. But a December and January with mild temperatures, rains without freezes "and such like," never before, maybe never again?

Undershot the Snow. Everybody says The Hesperian undershot the snow of the first week of the New Year. It was nearer five or six inches than it was three or three and a half like the paper said. Leastwise, it lingered a long time. And did that little wheat snuggle under the soft cover!

Nice, Clean Streets. We haven't checked, and it might be difficult to do so, poor as we are at reading the meaning of figures—we have not checked the cost of street cleaning as practiced by our municipality. The Game and Fish Commission checked out 9,222 deer in Llano County alone, probably the heaviest from any one county. 
