

Pioneer Woman **Died Saturday**

By the death of Mrs. John Gischler, which occurred about six o'clock Saturday morning, June 24, at the hospital in Hereford. Friona loses another of it pioneer citizen, she having located here with her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mr. D. H. Meade, in February, 1910.

Two years later, 1912, she was married to the late John Gischler, another pioneer citizen of the town, and has ever since made her home in Friona.

Mrs. Gischler had been in poor health for many months, suffering from heart trouble, and became suddenly worse on Friday and was taken to the hospital at Hereford. Her husband passed away on May 12, 1932, and since that time she had resided much of the time with Mr. and Mrs. Meade, with whom she was living at the time of her

Fannie Ella Grayville Gischler was born in Botecourt County, Virginia, June 18, 1871, and was 73 years and 6 days old at the time of her death. She was converted and united with the Baptist Church in Virginia at the age of 15 years, and ever after lived a consecrated Christian life in accordance with the teachings of that church.

Mrs. Gischler is survived by four sisters: Mrs. D. H. Meade, Friona; Mrs. Clara Henderson, Mrs. Marshal Lucas and Miss Bessie Grayville, all of Virginia. She has one brother, John Grayville ,of Virginia; also five stepchildren: E. R. Gischler and Mrs. Lawrence Walker of California, Reuben Gischler of Oregon, and Mrs. Carl Maurer and Mrs. George Treider of Friona.






