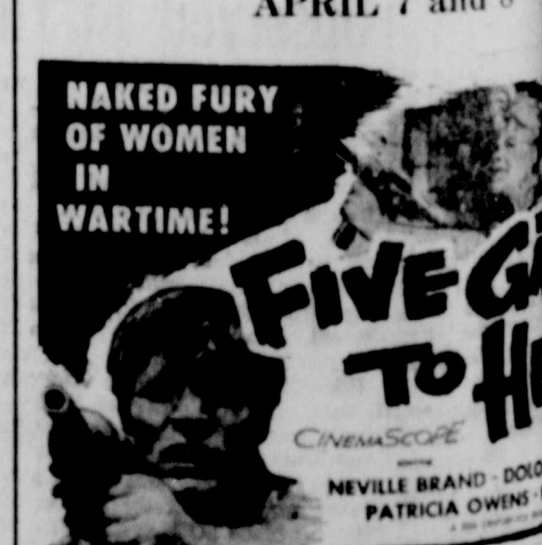

**EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENTARY**

**The Census Begins.** The eighteenth census begins tonight with the enumeration of transients and gets underway under full steam in the morning. Census takers, who begin their tasks with high hopes of doing a good job and determination to make the census a complete one are likely to find the going pretty tough in the last go-round. Call backs and misses get worrisome. That is past experience. Considerable determination will be needed to keep the various communities happy. Everybody always knows someone who has been overlooked. In a community like Floydada where the residents are anxious to "make a good showing," census takers will find residents particularly anxious that none be overlooked, somewhat captious, in fact.

**College President's Homes.** Much ado was made last week over the new college homes the board of regents has been building for the presidents of the state colleges. Considerable heat was generated over the plans of the regents to build a new residence for the president of the college at Huntsville. A committee of the House side of the legislature said the plan was out of line, that a hundred thousand dollar residence was not needed, and so forth. The regents probably will have to bend to the way the wind blows currently, but their reasons for the palatial new residences are sound. Texas is spending more than two billion dollars every biennium for a many-sided operation. A hundred thousand dollar item that does not come out of the general fund seems like a tiny thing to jump on out of a two billion dollar budget.

**Note To Gardeners.** Have fun. Dig around in the gardens and flower beds all you want to. But watch the mesquite, the crepe myrtles and poke. None of them have heralded spring yet. And Good Friday, time for bean and radish planting, is days away.

**The Farm Subsidies.** Dirt farmers are catching it from all sides about their subsidy farming. USDA is quoting in the billions and telling city people all the money they are paying in taxes to support the farm program. A person can let his blood pressure go down somewhat if he'd realize that the industries allied to agriculture were taken care of first in the various subsidy arrangements, and that most of the billions for farm supports have been going to people who never dug in the soil and do not know a rotary hoe from a planter.

**Violence In South Africa.** The United States has stuck its nose into South Africa's racial violence for the sake of saving face probably, a part of its new

outlook on global affairs. Trying to be all things to all people of the world, official America is doing its people a grave injustice. The Suez debacle was one of the first instances, a most glaring mistake as shall be seen as time rolls on.

**Protest In Advance.** When the new paving is complete, the first fellow who nonchalantly puts a crew to digging a ditch across it is going to get a flogging from those who live nearby. Presumably the city is going to protect the community from such doings, by requiring bond or cash in advance that the street will be put back into condition. This means permits will have to be issued, we assume. We protest in advance against practices which have been common in Floydada for several years. Many a ribbon of paving has been damaged and left damaged for weeks, sometimes months. Such nonchalance, we hope, is going to go out of fashion quickly.

**Four-Year Terms.** The approach of the time for primary elections, with only a hand full of candidates to vote for and against, and one to the hill at that, reminds a good many people they wish the state had not adopted the four-year term for so many of its public servants. There were good arguments for the move, as we recall it, but at the moment we can't think what they were.

**Other changes which many can't reconcile themselves to in the realm of public affairs include the court terms. Many wish we had "court week" back again. They wonder why the lawyers could not have made the procedures easier and speeded up disposal of litigation without discarding the old flavor. Nowadays matters quite momentous are disposed of in the courts without the general public so much as knowing the proceedings are under way. Whatever other arguments favor the changes, including the convenience of attorneys and their clients, one fact is that the new way gets another arm of their government further away from the people. It tends to cease to be a part of them and they of it.**

**Watch The Instructions.** Makers of the poisons that are used in the fields and in various other ways in modern farming, rodents control and the like, know the dangers in their products. They print definite rules on the containers, which, if followed, will assure safety for all who make use of them. But familiarity breeds contempt as the old saying has it. The inclination to carelessness is apparent on all sides. Read the directions on the barrel and the sack and follow them.

**Rotary Hears So. Baptist Seminary Head Floyd County 14 Years Ago**

Among the outstanding speakers who have addressed Floydada Rotary Club recently was Dr. Duke K. McCall, president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, who was here for the club's meeting last week. Dr. McCall is the Willson lecturer at Wayland Baptist College. He visited the club in company with Dr. A. Hope Owen, president of the plains school, who introduced him. Another address which impressed the club was that of Dr. Dorothy Long, a Plainview pediatrician. Dr. Long related the happy results accorded efforts in that city to provide a day nursery for children of Negro working mothers. Care and play and proper diet are being provided for numerous otherwise more or less neglected tots of preschool age in the nursery, she said. Bill Brown presented the program. Yesterday Marvin Shurbet, a member of the State Water Board, presented three Peterburg high school boys in a program on water conservation.

### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

The world's first water conservation postage stamp, to be issued April 18 in Washington, D. C., honors rural and urban organizations engaged in water conservation activities, according to Gilbert L. Fawver, chairman of the Floyd County Soil Conservation District.

The new 4-cent stamp will go on sale at the post office here April 19, the day following its issuance at the Seventh National Watershed Congress in the nation's capital.

The Floyd County Soil Conservation District, and the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District are among the local groups honored by issuance of the stamp, Fawver said.

"These local groups are attacking water problems where they begin — on the farm land where the water first falls, and along the small creeks and brooks that join to form our major rivers," Fawver said.

Mr. Fawver pointed out that virtually every community in the country has a water problem of some sort — too much (periodic floods), too little (droughts) or too poor (polluted). In Floyd County SCD our main water problem is lack of sufficient rainfall.

"Our irrigated land needs more water conserving practices installed," Fawver said. Too many open ditches allow excessive evaporation to take place where underground pipelines could prevent this; many fields need land levelling to permit uniform distribution of irrigation water without erosion.

Another important practice is Proper Irrigation Water Use which is the use and management of irrigation water according to a planned farm irrigation system where the quantity of water used

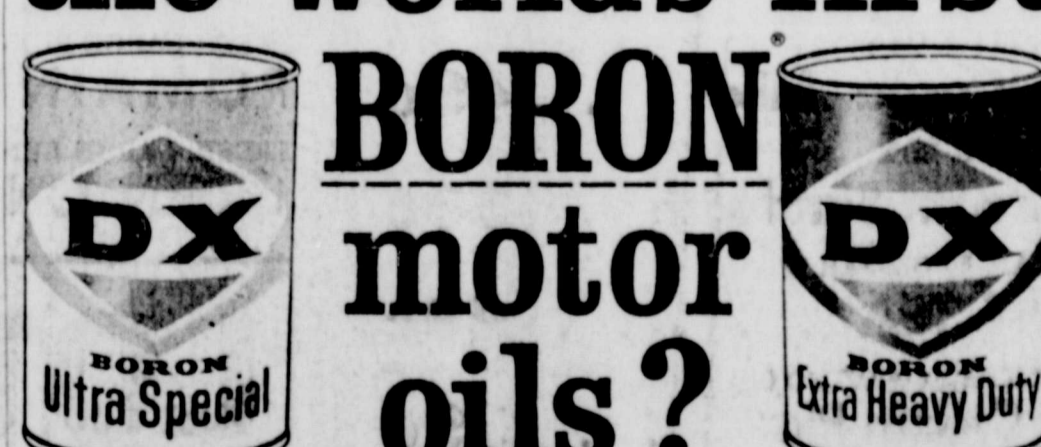

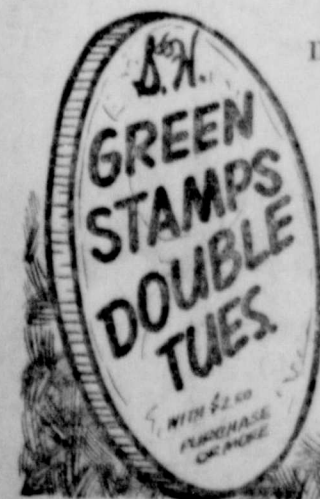
