

## Edgar Jones, Crash Victim, Buried Here

Edgar Jones, 80, of Stockton, Calif., a former pioneer grocery merchant of Floydada, was killed in a car accident Thursday morning while enroute to a hospital at Oakland. The body reached Floydada Monday night and rites were conducted in the First Baptist Church Tuesday afternoon.

Rev. Joe Wilson, retired Baptist minister, officiated. Burial was in the Floydada cemetery beside the remains of his wife the former Mary Emilie Brown and a son.

Pallbearers were Rex H. Brown, Billie Brown, Bob Collier, George Mize, Bob Covington, and Raymond Teeple. Mr. Jones was in Floydada in October of last year visiting relatives and old friends. In December after his return home, he fell and sustained a broken hip and since that time had made his home with a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Thelma Jones at Stockton. Mrs. Jones, her son, Don and the elderly Jones were enroute to a hospital when the accident occurred. Others in the car escaped injury.

Mr. Jones and his late wife moved to Floydada early in the century and reared a family of three sons. Fred, who is deceased, Ralph of Stockton, and Glen of Anaheim. Mrs. Jones was killed in a car accident near Plainview December 12, 1939.

While residing in Floydada Mr. Jones owned and operated several grocery stores at intervals prior to his moving to California. He was in business at the site of Lighthouse Electric, running the Red and White Grocery Store. He moved from Floydada to California 12 years ago, where he also has been in the grocery business.

Mr. Jones was a member of the First Baptist Church of Stockton. He was a veteran of the Spanish American War, serving in the Philippines during the insurrection there.

Survivors in addition to his two sons are seven grandchildren, two great grandchildren and several nieces and nephews. Among them are Mrs. Bob Collier, Mrs. Woodrow Badgett, Rex Brown and Billy Brown all of Floydada. The deceased was also a brother to the late Robert Jones, grocery merchant of Aiken and Lubbock. Two sisters also survive. They are Mrs. Martha Fisher, Lynwood, Calif., and Mrs. Dissie, Spillman, Okla.

The daughter-in-law, Mrs. Thelma Jones, her son, Don, and the deceased's son, Ralph were here for the funeral. The other son, Don, who lives in Colorado, in the home of Lubbock and Mrs. Barman. Mrs. Barman is in charge of the funeral home. She was spoken of by a few days ago. He went to a check-up by a physician noted in the annual Red Cross Drive according to figures this week issued by Dean Davis, county campaign chairman.

## Johnson Funeral Held Yesterday

A one-day trip to El Paso on March 27 by two Grants, N. Mex., business men and their wives, ended in tragedy for all four sometime after 10:30 o'clock the same night. But the facts of their fate were not revealed for a whole week of agony for their surviving families.

The bodies of the four and their wrecked plane were found after a six-day hunt in a mountainous area near Grants Saturday afternoon.

The plane, a single-engine Mooney Mark 20, left Grants early Sunday morning carrying its pilot, Kenneth D. Johnson, his wife, the former Nadine Powell, a business partner of Johnson, Jack Warren, and his wife, an expectant mother.

The two men, accompanied by their wives, spent the day in El Paso on business, and were enroute home when the plane ran into unsettled weather. An aviation authority said Johnson had radioed in at 10:30 p. m. to Albuquerque, asking of weather conditions.

The plane was due to land around mid-night. Search started March 28. Search began Monday morning after no word had been received from occupants of the plane. The wreckage was discovered Saturday afternoon, six days later, about 3 o'clock 55 miles south southeast from Grants, on course, officials said.

Parts of the plane and bodies were scattered 200 feet from the point of impact against a mountain side. There was no fire. The six children of Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, who will now live with members of the Powell family, and the three children of the Warrens were left in Grants.

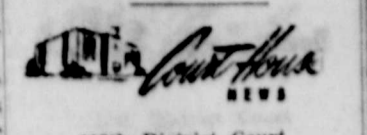

## Fertilization

Many farmers are wondering how is the best way to apply fertilizer. Research conducted throughout the State and at the Halfway Research Foundation have shown that best results are received when the fertilizer is banded at least on 20" centers. In most instances the type of fertilizer, whether liquid or solid, does not make much difference in yield. The cost, equipment, and personal preference mean more than does the type of fertilizer.

## Wheat

Many fields of small grain have a lot of weeds in them. The use of 2-4 D is real effective and in most cases will do a good job of control. The recommended dosage is 1/2 pound of actual 2-4 D per acre. 2-4 D can be used safely for the next two weeks, but extreme caution should be used later on to prevent 2-4 D damage to cotton.

I returned from Washington Sunday night. Now I am sorting through the pounds of notes and literature to prepare a resume of the conference. I heard the ills of the world and the experts' solution. After seeing the maneuvers and alterations of decisions reached by a majority, I'm taking the all-over conclusions with a grain of salt. There was just too much behind the-scenes shifting around for me to believe that all those social workers with their pet projects really represent the feelings of ordinary people.

I spoke up as I felt the majority of the people in this area felt on the subjects under discussion in my particular world group. These subjects included religion taught in public schools; classes in ethics; sex education; complete integration in the churches, etc.; a World-wide Children and Youth (as though we didn't have enough to do with our own, but now we must advise the whole world on how to raise their children).

Between classes I constantly asked questions of all people with whom I came in contact, in taxis, restaurants, on tours, at lunch counters, during the Americana Ball, in the hotel lobby and while riding the bus around town. At only two or three occasions did I meet people, who even the conference said the general public thought. These people ranged from the manager of all the Peck and Peck stores seated next to me at lunch to the colored maid for our old friend, C. W. Post's grand children's governess, whom I sat next to one noon at a five and dime lunch counter.

Well, policy has been outlined and thank goodness, we don't have to follow it all. The entire conclusion of the conference will be published in two weeks and then I'll be ready to talk to the sponsoring groups. In spite of my feeling about the way decisions were reached, I detected a strong spiritual atmosphere over the entire assembly. This was slightly jolted by the casual swearing and profane social workers reported by other Texas Delegates and also by hearing myself that certain leaders present did not believe in any religion.

Also it was quite a shock to hear leaders of a certain religious group tell me themselves that they planned to break up any meeting that did not talk along their way of thinking. They proceeded to tell me how they had already begun to do so.

Members of this same group met in the hotel room one of the Texas delegates was sharing and over two bottles of whiskey laid their plans for getting the conference swayed, by any means, to their way of thinking.

And so, I returned home, thankful for a job without pressures, strong in my convictions for States Rights and prayerful for a spiritual and moral strengthening among the people we put over our children.

### Homemaking Hints

BY Phyllis Roggendorff County Home Demonstration Agent

Stains on Wood Furniture Heat marks or alcohol stains on wooden furniture are not easy to remove. Often furniture so damaged can be restored only by refinishing. Here are a few suggestions for home treatment of such damage on woods.

When you spill any beverages, perfumes or medicines containing alcohol on furniture, wipe up the liquid immediately before it has time to penetrate into the finish. If the liquid goes completely through the finish, there is only one remedy - a spot refinishing job temporarily and a complete refinishing job later.

For temporary protection, polish with wax, using a colored wax for dark woods. If this is not effective, mix powdered pumice and oil into a cream paste and apply it to the stain rub- bing with the grain of the wood, then polish with a clean soft cloth.

Try treating burns the same way, first trying wax, then the pumice and oil mixture.

When penetration is not too deep, heat marks may be eliminated by light stroking with a clean cloth moistened in camphorated oil, followed by a buffing with a clean cloth. Water rinses may respond to waxing or to treatment with camphorated oil.

Some protection can be given your furniture with a coat of paste wax applied and buffed with a soft cloth. Do not use an oiled dust cloth on waxed furniture as it will soften the wax.
