Funeral rites for the pioneer resident of Floyd County, were held Tuesday morning in the First Baptist Church in Lockney, Texas, with interment in Lockney Cemetery. Carter Funeral home was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Randolph was a pioneer rancher and served as deputy sheriff at Earth from 1951 until 1955. He was Justice of the Peace there until his retirement in 1958. He and his wife moved to Earth in 1947.

Mr. Randolph accompanied by his wife and Mrs. Wilson, the local sister, were in San Angelo on a fishing trip when he was involved in a pick-up crash.

Members of the family said Mr. Randolph was returning to the cabin site last week when he suffered a heart attack while driving. He lost control of the vehicle and it swerved into a utility pole. He sustained serious internal injuries and underwent surgery the following day in San Angelo hospital.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Fred Randolph of San Antonio; one daughter, Mrs. Olive Armstrong, Earth; two sisters, Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. Mize; one brother, Albert of Lubbock; six grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

He is also survived by several nieces and nephews in Floyd County.

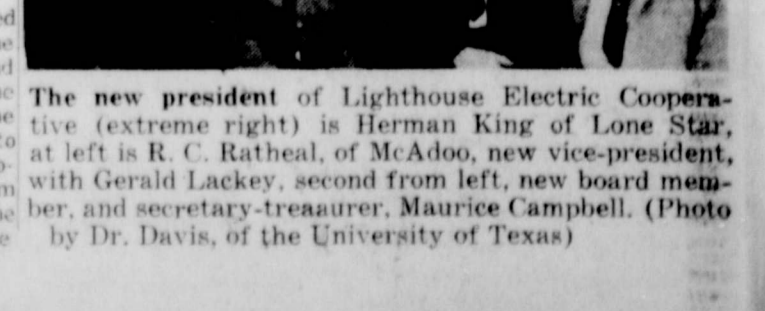

May is transfer month for public school students moving to another district, according to Superintendent Clarence Guffee.

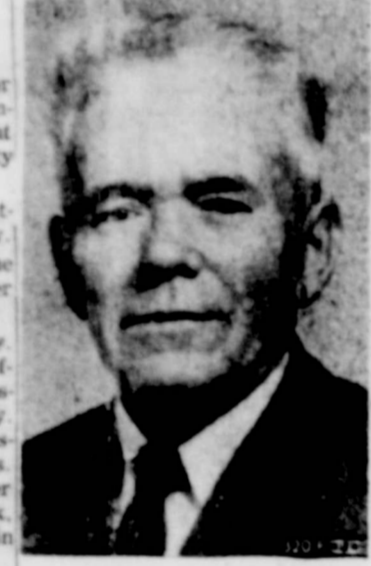
Students have until June 1 to complete transfers. But application must be made at the superintendent's office in order to attend school in another district.

Red Cross is the only organization charged specifically with federal charter with the responsibility of family care in time of natural disaster both in providing emergency care and the more costly assistance known as recovery which includes building and repairing homes, household furnishings, medical and nursing care, food, clothing, and maintenance.

The organization found the past decade one that recorded disaster in nearly every repulsive costume possible from tornado to shipwreck. There were 3,100 disasters in the United States in which nearly 300,000 families were assisted from July 1, 1949, to June 30, 1959. They cost Red Cross a total of \$110,816,883 plus \$6,192,900 expended for foreign disaster relief. All aid was given as outright gifts to disaster sufferers.

Local Red Cross chapters will receive a copy of the booklet which is called A Decade of Disasters.

Andy Rogers Announces Will Support Ben Ramsey

Andy Rogers of determine how many votes the rural areas will have and how many votes the big cities will have in the Legislature for year's primary Election, Saturday, May 14, is of major importance to this district and West Texas.

Ben Ramsey, coming from a rural area himself, will not be subjected to the big city pressure for more representation at the expense of rural areas as would his opponent who lives in Houston, the biggest city in the State," Senator Rogers said.

The Senator noted that the 15th county district he served in the Senate could be affected and that voting power of West Texas rural areas in the House of Representatives could be reduced by the out-come of redistricting at the next session of the Legislature. Rogers pointed out that at present the 30th District has what amounts to three representative places, whereas the Houston, Harris County, district alone has eight votes in the House of Representatives.

"We cannot afford," Senator Rogers said, "to turn the important office of Lieutenant Governor over to Houston and risk losing some of our votes in the House to the big cities."

In his announcement of support of Ramsey for Lieutenant Governor, Rogers said Ramsey is "a proven friend of West Texas and will give rural areas such as the 30th District fair treatment in redistricting." Rogers further cited Ramsey's record as "friend to a supporter of water and soil conservation. His mature judgment and experience are needed," Rogers said, "and I hope you will join me in supporting Ben Ramsey for Lieutenant Governor."

'Were You Counted?' Slogan As Census Nears Completion

With the 1960 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Supervisor Earle Kerr has announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

Persons who believe they have been missed by the census takers are urged to notify the census district office by means of "Were You Counted?" forms. Area newspapers are printing these forms in their current editions as a public service. Prompt mailing of the "Were You Counted?" forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures presenting the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the district supervisor is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued in Washington later this year after the returns have been tabulated on the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the district supervisor. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next Federal Census.

"Federal aid funds are allotted to States and State funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means a short allotment. Thus, it is imperative that we have complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed to reach this goal," he said.

Most of us know that but apparently only 50 or 60 people out of the 50,000 living here cared enough to hear the issue of "freedom versus slavery" even discussed.

When I went home that night I was in a pretty ugly mood and when the B. H. told me the amount of tax we would have to pay, I began foaming at the mouth.

"I just won't pay it," I said, thinking about the Air Academy with no airfield but two ballrooms. "I'll go to jail first."

"You've already paid most of it," said the B. H. "You paid it even before you owed it."

"You mean" I said, "I haven't even got the right to go to jail if I want to?"

"That's right," she said, "no jail for you this year, sonny boy."
