**Peak Bloom Water Irrigations Pay More Money**  
 The return from the preplant cotton peak bloom method of irrigation ranged from \$161.00 to \$181.00 per acre. Pumping costs were figured at \$6.00 per acre foot at Halfway. Some authorities, however, report this cost as high as \$9.00 per acre foot.

These results indicate that the time of application, not the total amount of irrigation water applied, controls dollar returns from irrigated cotton.

Cotton irrigated at a total of 17.2 and 21.5 inches returned less income in 1959 than the 8.6 inches applied in the preplant, peak bloom method.

From these results it is evident that a more profitable cotton crop can be grown with less water, less labor, and less pumping costs in a year like 1959. Time of irrigation and fertility level are two of the major controlling factors in irrigated cotton profits.

"This experiment will be conducted over a period of several years before definite conclusions can be made regarding the recommended irrigation methods and fertility levels needed for most efficient cotton production," Mr. Valiant said.

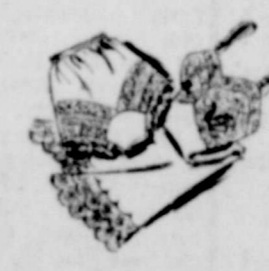

# School Board Sets Tax Rate at \$1.60

## Growing Pains At No. Ward School Noted

BY KENNETH RIMMER

The Board of Education of Floydada Independent School District in their regular first Tuesday night session voted to set the school district's tax rate at \$1.60 per one hundred dollar valuation, setting retirement of bonded indebtedness at 25 cents and local maintenance and operation at \$1.35 in reaching the above named figure.

This drops the retirement of bonds rate from 30 cents where it was last year and raises the maintenance figure from \$1.20 to the new \$1.35. Reason for the change was due to a surplus in

the bond retirement fund, great need for the maintenance fund monies because of rising costs. This amounts to a 10 cent raise from the rate last year.

Included in the business transacted for the evening were the reading of the minutes from previous sessions, the approval for payment of current bills and an agenda of work for the night was presented to the board by Superintendent I. T. Graves and Board President Ralph Johnston.

**Equalization Coming Up**

The board presented Supt. Graves with a panel of names from which he is to secure a three man board of equalization to sit in early hearings on tax valuations for the district. Graves will recommend the three men from the list for the board's final approval.

The school has just received two new 48 passenger school buses which were purchased through the state procurement program and on recommendation of Mr. Graves voted to advertise for bids on four old school buses which will be sold. The four were in use as spares to serve regular buses being repaired. Bid will be opened on June 7.

The board voted to set the opening day of school for next year as Monday, August 29.

Set for further study was the matter of repairing the floor of Graves Gymnasium which is buckling and not smooth. The builder is to be consulted as to causes and cures for the situation. The job may call for repair, sanding and refinishing. To be taken up at June 7 meeting.

The growing pains at North Ward School were discussed with prospects for building a room for industrial arts. The addition would also include rest rooms, utility rooms and hall. The project was ear marked for further study by board members. The thought was brought out that integration of the races might make further spending at the North Ward site undesirable. There was no elaboration on the integration question and plans for enlarging the school at North Ward were marked for further study.

The North Ward School is now taking care of eight Petersburg high school students and four from Lockney. This year the board had voted to take care of as many as six high school students from Silverton starting next fall. These extra students bring money to the local school and help to maintain a higher standard at the school is the belief of the school board.

## Rev. Johnny Allen Graduates at Golden Gate Seminary

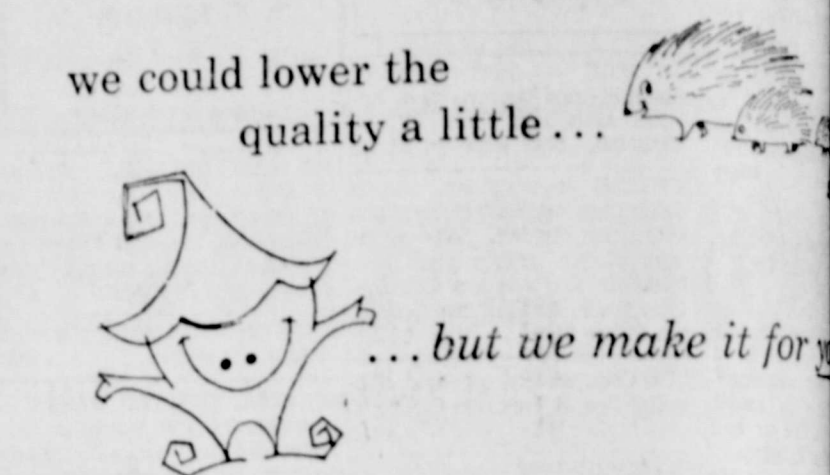

**EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENTARY**

Unfamiliar as we are with the facts in the Chessman case in California, we would hesitate to pass judgment on the verdict of 12 good men and true who sentenced the man to death more than a decade ago. Mr. Chessman was not the first nor will he be the last to pay with his life. He may or may not have been guilty as charged for some heinous outrage against society. What we and the others of us must learn to live with is the outburst of "indignation" which has swept the world as a result of his final demise in the gas chamber.

This great outburst of indignation grows out of our Uncle's meddling in global affairs, slapping wrists here and there, dishing out advice and money with which to carry out suggestions, generally attending to affairs of other peoples, other races than our own, assuming our way of life is the right way of life and that these others must be converted to it, including the kind of houses that should be lived in, proper shoes and proper method of brushing teeth.

Most likely most of the protests that have poured in from countries far and wide in re the Chessman case were planned for, and aided by some organization in our own country. Causes and crusades, it has been found, are major weaknesses in the United States. We are suckers for clever organization. Somebody somewhere is gleefully gloating over the prospect of more millions pouring in to combat capital punishment. When and if that "runs out" there'll be another cause for which to collect dues and donations from the suckers.

About Circumstantial Evidence. We do not know whether or not the evidence in the Chessman case was circumstantial, but its discussion brings us around to circumstantial evidence in capital cases. We could possibly, but not probably, send a man to the penitentiary on circumstantial evidence, but certainly we could not assess a death penalty on such evidence. Circumstances have a way of pointing in the right direction at the wrong man. There is a place for capital punishment in the affairs of society but we should not be chosen on a jury that must consider a circumstance on which to base life or death for a defendant. We could not be affirmative enough.

Almost daily indications point to the fact that Senator Lyndon B. Johnson is moving out front nationally, for consideration as a presidential nominee. Texas Democrats are widely divergent in their thinking but we are hopeful that a substantial majority of them will

support the senior Texas senator Saturday, ultimately to send him to the national convention as a contender for the nomination for president. Texas Democrats are liberals, moderates, conservatives, country, city. Wholesale agreement could hardly be expected. Even a modest majority of the precincts would be a handsome victory. An overwhelming endorsement and instructions to the county convention to support Johnson would be a demonstration at home of his wide "vote-pulling" appeal in the presidential race nationally.

Meeting The Growing Needs. The cities and towns that are trying to meet the growing needs of the people are the ones which are seeing most growth and local prosperity. Check the cities and towns you know. The ones which have grown and prospered most are those which have been doing things. The courage to grow on sound business principles is the key. The problem is people, how to attract them, how to keep them. And Floydada can do anything about that it wants to do—if all the people will work at it.

The company's Floydada office was built in the late twenties. Presumably the budget referred to is the 1960 budget.

Casual College Choice. Young people who are about high school graduation age speak casually of their choice of college to attend. The time is not far distant when their choice will be limited. Already for post graduate work many pupils have to have recommendations, aptitude tests, especially in the professions such as dentistry, medicine and law. Because colleges are becoming more expensive to operate, enrollments are swelling and faculties difficult to find, institutions of higher learning will be more and more inclined to eliminate the playboys and other students who go to school in lieu of something else they'd prefer not to do.

The financial stake that Floyd County residents have in the Social Security system? How much are they piling up in the way of old-age and disability insurance for themselves? The amount has grown impressively since 1937, when local workers began making payments of \$487.00 a year during the next to the fund at the rate of one percent of their earnings up to \$3,000 a year. They are now the

and to the liberalization of payments through acts of Congress. Twenty years ago a worker who retired at age 65 could receive a maximum of only \$41.20 a month. That figure has risen to nearly \$120. The maximum for a family is now \$254, several times what it was originally. The five-year projection of payments to insured workers and their families in Floyd County is based on the annual report of trustees of the OASI fund, presented to Congress recently. It states that benefit payments, nationally, will continue to increase during the period, going from \$9.84 billion in 1959 to \$12.55 billion in 1963. The total disbursements during the five years will be 14.9 percent more, on the average, than they were last year. In Floyd County, on the basis of the expected national rise, the volume of benefit payments in the five years will amount to \$2,435,000. The sum will have a significant effect on local business.

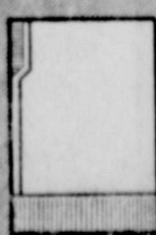

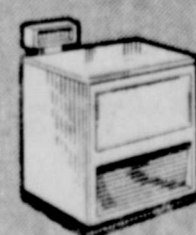

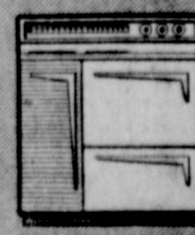

## NEW HIGHWAY SIGNS DUE

New highway signs, bigger and more colorful than any used before, will begin appearing soon on the interstate highways in Texas.  
Highway Commission has ordered the posting of route markers and guide signs on 707 miles of interstate highway now completed or under construction in the state.  
Conspicuously absent in this marking system will be stop signs. Completion of the 41,000-mile system of controlled access roads will make possible coast-to-coast and border-to-border driving without a stop sign or traffic light.

## SCHOOLS' SHARE DOWN

Texas is spending a smaller proportion of its tax revenue on education now than it did 10 years ago.  
This statement was issued by the Texas State Teachers Association in support of its drive for enactment of the Hale-Aikin program for school improvement.  
In 1950-51, says the report, Texas spent 29.67 cents of each tax dollar for public school education. In the last completed school year, the percentage was 27.68 cents of each dollar.

During that period public school spending more than doubled — to keep pace with a 51 percent increase in students and 49 percent increase in teachers. But spending for other purposes increased faster.  
Gov. Price Daniel again has said that he would like to call a special session after the elections to erase the deficit and raise teachers' pay. But he also said it would depend on getting agreement from legislators.

## PROFIT PREDICTED

When everything is finally cleared up, the state will come out with a profit of \$50,000—perhaps more — on land involved in the Veterans Land Board scandals.  
This prediction was made by Land Commissioner Bill Allcorn who called \$50,000 a "conservative figure."  
He said that \$1,725,000 has already been recovered from fraudulent land deals and that \$1,679,000 more is outstanding but fully secured.

When the entire \$3,404,000 is recovered, said Allcorn, the state will have a comfortable margin above what was involved in the original transactions.  
**COSTLY ERROR** — Texas Supreme Court has returned to district court for re-trial a case involving a \$100,000 mistake in arithmetic.

An employe of an Arlington contractor made the error in submitting a bid of \$534,175 instead of \$634,226 to the local school board for a school building job. After the bid was accepted by the board, the contractor discovered the error and refused to carry out the contract.  
Board then awarded the bid to the second low bidder and sued the first contractor for the \$38,278 difference between the second low bid and the bid they had first accepted.

Supreme Court members disagreed on the case, wrote three different opinions, but all agreed it should be re-tried.

## HOW BIG THE GROUNDS

State Building Commission is awaiting an attorney general's opinion before putting in sidewalks to the new state buildings.  
**Reason for the precaution** is that the Legislature passed a bill in 1957 stating that nothing absolutely nothing — could be built on the Capital grounds without specific permission from the Legislature. And the Legislature did not provide for sidewalks.

## WHO OWNS THE OIL?

Another question under consideration by the attorney general's department is "who owns rights to the minerals under county roads?"

Request for an opinion was submitted by Jack Cook, county attorney of Kleberg County.  
Ultimately to be decided is whether state and local government can claim the right to mineral development of the right of way of some 225,000 miles of streets and highways in Texas.

## SCHOOL FUND ADVISORS

A 19-member advisory committee of prominent business and professional men is helping the State Board of Education develop investment policies for the \$415,000,000 permanent school fund. Committee members are C. D. Aker, Jacksonville; Walter Lacy and H. M. Fentress, Waco; J. Ralph Wood and A. H. McCulloch, Dallas; Hines Baker, Houston; Joe B. McNeil, Wichita Falls; Frank D. Austin, Amarillo; H. H. DeWar, San Antonio.

Much entertainment has been planned for the fair which will take place in September. The entertainment committee met last week at Lighthouse Electric to plan for the three nights of the fair.

There is to be a Community Talent presentation if plans succeed. First, second and third prizes will be given. The contest will give the communities of the county a worth while chance of making extra money, says Mrs. Alma Holmes, one of the entertainment committee members.  
If things pan out this contest will be one night, the Gospel singing one night and fiddlers contest on the remaining night.

"Judge Calvert has served with great distinction as associate justice for almost ten years," Gaynor Kendall of Austin, state campaign manager, said.

### Quality Bales Power

The AMS reported that most frequently it is the ginners who get the blame for mixed bales because they often combine cotton from two different growers, but the study showed actually that it is the farmer who is most often responsible. It was found that 61 per cent of the mixed-quality bales was brought to the gins as mixed seed cotton, with only 39 percent being mixed by the gins.

The problem of mixed-quality cotton, of course, can never be entirely eliminated because it is impossible for farmers always to bring in loads with the same quality of cotton throughout. Weather causes certain differences, and cotton from two different fields may have to be combined to make up a load.

However, the AMS made two principal suggestions: First, farmers can be more careful to reduce mixing cotton of different qualities, and, second, ginners in starting a new bale should see to it that their presses are not turned before all of the cotton from one farmer's load has been baled.

During one recent season, it was estimated that nearly half a million bales of cotton were of mixed quality. About 70 per cent of these came from Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, where only 37 per cent of the year production was ginned. All other states showed considerable less than the national average of mixed-quality bales, which amounted to only 3.4 per cent of total ginnings.

**Lamp Shades:**

Lamp shades are important for both lighting and decoration. If colored shades are used for an accent in the room decoration, choose an opaque shade, with a white lining. A translucent shade, one that lets the light through, should be white or as neutral a color as possible. A colored translucent shade would distort the color of the light and its effect on the surroundings.

For a harmonious effect, every room should have something light, something dark, something bright, and something dull. The lamp shade may be a good choice of something light. You will get the most from translucent white lampshades.

### Herbicides

(By Cecil Lewis, County Agent)

The use of 2,4, D and other herbicides for weed control come under the Miller Bill. The use of them at the present time prevents some of the hazards, 2,4, D for weed control in wheat should not be used 30 days before harvest. This same law applies to barley and rye. It can not be used where the small grain is to be grazed after application. The way the law reads at the present time, 2,4, D for weed control in grain sorghum can be used only for preemergence weed-killer or applied 120-150 days before harvest which prohibits its use on grain sorghums. We are hoping that this situation can be worked out. Any residue on grain sorghum of 2,4, D will prevent it from going into normal channel. When using herbicides always check the label and follow the directions on the label. If any further developments appear we will try to keep you informed.

Many 4-H club members are busy working on 4-H demonstrations for district contest. The boys and girls are working up Safety, Tractor Maintenance, Electric, Field Crops, Co-Operative Demonstrations and an insect identification and control team. 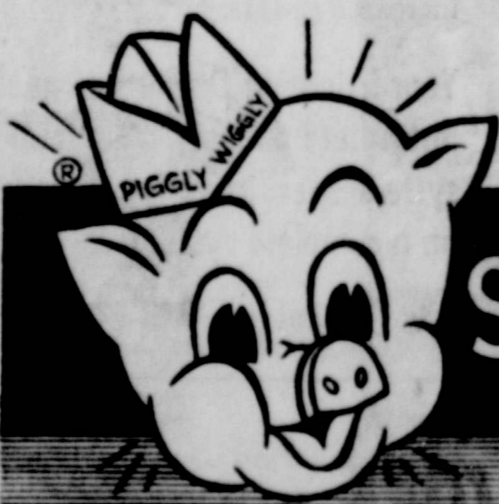
