spring and early summer. As one scorching day followed another, crops were stunted and pasturage began to burn.

Though conditions were better elsewhere, the difficulties of the farmers in the areas around the Capital City lent emphasis to Gov. Price Daniel's plea for a "crash program" to develop a water plan. If Texans don't do it, said the governor, the federal government will take over.

Target is to have a complete master plan for development of Texas' water ready by May 1, 1961. To help meet this deadline, the governor asked representatives of the river authorities and districts to file updated master plans for their areas with the Water Board by Nov. 1. He also asked the river authorities to lend engineers and technical personnel to help prepare the state plan.

Meanwhile, farmers, watching their corn burn up in the fields, look what comfort they could from the often-repeated statement that Texas has plenty of water; it's just a matter of distribution.

STEEP GRADES AHEAD — Looking ahead 10 years at estimated costs of state government, the governor's State Finance Advisory Commission got a dizzying view of spiraling expenses.

Sub-committees of the commission will study the problem of future costs and how to meet them through the summer and make reports to the entire commission Sept. 10. Commission report and recommendations to the governor are due Oct. 10.

Estimates of their future needs made by major state agencies for the Commission indicated a need for spending \$29,000,000 more each year to meet growth needs.

Governor Daniel told the commission he hoped they could find ways to scale down the new money needs some and find revenue sources that would grow as population and demands for services increase.

commerce. Companies have paid the \$6,363,878 in severance taxes under protest. If the law is struck down in the courts, the money will be refunded to the companies.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, said all available patrolmen, including those from licensing and weights and inspection would be on the road.

SAUNDERS CASE ARGUED — Court of Criminal Appeals is to rule next fall in a case hinging on whether a witness can be convicted of perjury in connection with testimony before a legislative committee.

Defendant in the case is J. Byron Saunders, former chairman of the State Board of Insurance, who was convicted and sentenced to two years imprisonment for lying to a legislative committee about funds received from ICT Insurance Co. while he was in office. Saunders' attorney contended that perjury is possible only before a judicial body, not before a legislative committee.

EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENTARY

Most Important Occupation. Politicians are much maligned, but they are engaged in the country's most important profession! The politician is the man who makes the country's policy-making posts from precinct to national level. He is the man who makes the laws, sways the people to his way of thinking. He has the destiny of the country in his hand. Consider the politician. We mean consider!

National Political Scene. The Democratic nominating convention in Los Angeles is the next move in the political world. Senator Kennedy, the Massachusetts man, is far and away the leader in the pre-convention reports. But there will be strong pressures to keep the senator from getting the Democratic Party embroiled in a religious battle. The senator thinks the religious issue should not be involved. Neither do we, but human nature being what it has been since the beginning the leaders in the Democratic party will take a long, hard look before they yield to his persuasions, we think.

The Democratic Party could go further and do worse than to name Senator Johnson or Senator Symington of Missouri. Neither might win but the battle could be staged on issues other than religion. We are averse to the nomination of Gov. Adlai Stevenson. He is a brilliant man but his philosophic, somewhat mystic slant leaves many voters cold. Many of us do not know what he means by what he says, no reflection on the governor intended.

Lyndon Johnson's Victory over the militant Mrs. R. D. Randolph, leader of the Democrats of Texas Clubs, at the state presidential convention, is one to put in the books. The DOT's anticipated being able to stage a real rump convention and to carry their battle to Los Angeles. When the AFL-CIO deserted Mrs. Randolph's banner and revealed where her real strength lay, she only marched out of the convention hall to find herself sitting alone on a park bench. It was sweet revenge to Senator Johnson, no doubt, for the sniping she had been carrying on against him for some years. Doubtless a bitter pill for the woman who had an ambition to lead the state's forces at the national convention.

Places To Swim. The Hesperian is pleased to record that the city has at last found a person willing to undertake operation of the municipal swimming pool and that it is expected to be in operation by July 4th. The pool, normally, would have been in operation for weeks, but the council had not found an operator until last week end. Local organizations seeking ways to do helpful things for the young people—with an older overtone, too—could well lay plans to be sure the pool is manned and ready to go when swimming days get here again in 1961. The people have a pretty, convenient location for the pool, have something like \$35,000 invested in tax money out there at Northwest Park. Shame to let it go to waste.

People make themselves believe they must shop at towns where there also

are other interesting things to do or see. And they like to live in such towns. This might be the key to the successful promotion of a town. The idea of having an un-used swimming pool, ready for the using, is in conflict with this psychology. Town-builders who knit their brows trying to think of ways to attract more traffic might consider not only seeing to it that swimming pools are properly manned and decently operated but think in terms of playgrounds and cool retreats. A lot of people have a great deal of spare time on their hands. They are going to do something—go somewhere!

Fourth of July Deaths. The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated the death toll for the Texas Fourth of July Holiday period of 72 hours at 27. This means one person every two and a half hours. The economic loss will be in excess of a half a million dollars by the time they get the messes cleaned up, the dead buried, the cars hauled off to the junk yard.

The Period of time covered by the "official" holiday is from 12:01 a.m., Saturday, July 2, to 11:59 p.m., Monday, July 4. An all-out campaign, of which this can be considered a small part, will be made to hold the number of traffic deaths below the official prediction of 27. If this is accomplished it will be the third time in nine years. Only twice before in eight years has the record been less than the Department's prediction. The "senseless slaughter on streets and highways" is one of the amazing facts of modern life. We have not been able in all our wars to get as many killed and maimed as we have since 1900 with the modern weapon called the automobile.

People who do not travel a great deal but who venture out on such days as the Fourth to go "see the folks" or journey a distance to the mountains, should remember that their eyes and reflexes are not conditioned to the fast gait which most motorists hit. They in particular are liable to death or injury. People who make many miles a year in all kinds of driving conditions are more likely to escape because they are conditioned to the kind of traffic they will encounter. So, if you are a good solidly safe driver, but one not practiced in the art of highway alertness, beware. You are not as good as your good record at home and around leads you to think.

Somebody Take Over! We like the way Tom Suits over at Petersburg operates. He is a fisherman, who has graduated from the catfish and trotline classification, by way of trout and blackbass, to the game fish that inhabit the cold waters of Northern United States and Canada. The mid-summer is his time off. He makes a hard-working hand in the shop and with the pencil all the rest of the year. But when June comes some of the rest of the family better be ready to take over! Tom is off to the Minnesota and Canadian streams. That's where he is now.

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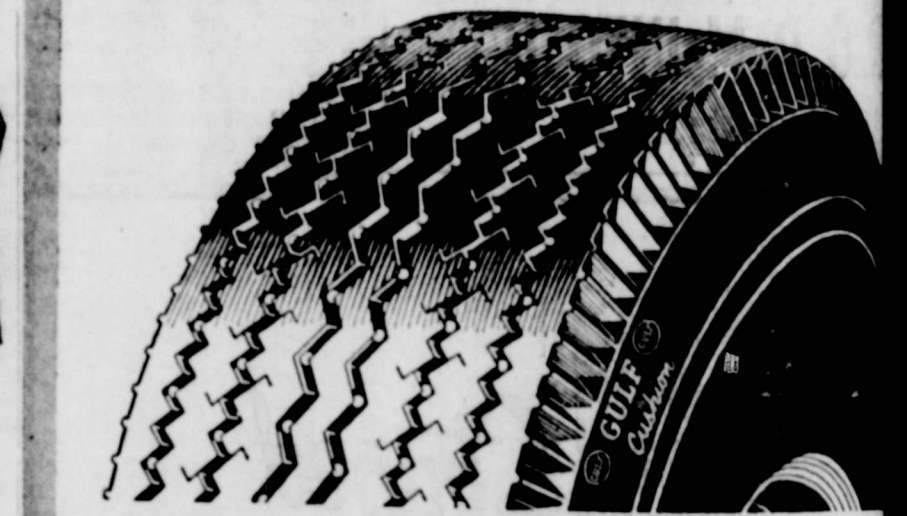
