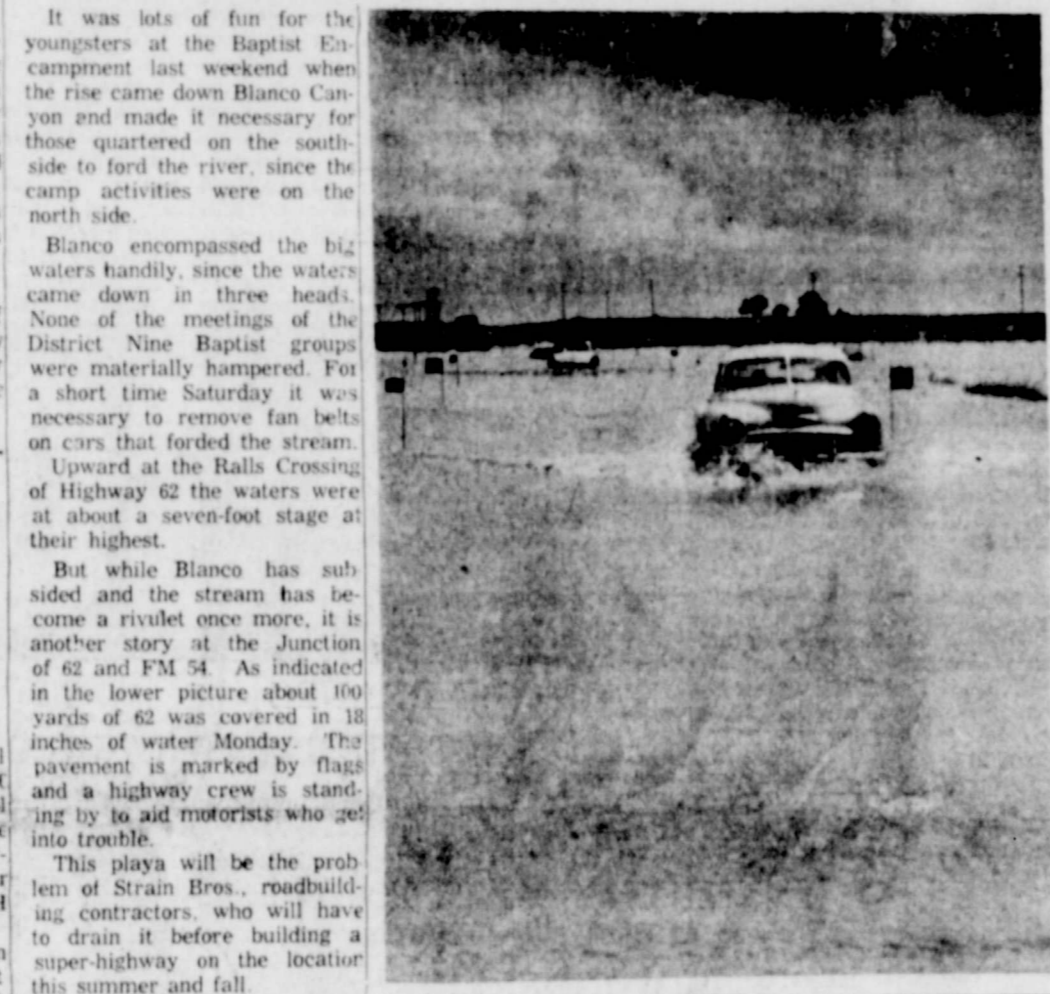

Bob Dempsey Taking Basic AF Training

To blanch or not to blanch? This question need no longer puzzle homemakers who want to freeze their own vegetables. Besides providing a number of advantages in the keeping and eating qualities, blanching has been shown in recent nutritional research to retain more of the actual food value — vitamin C in particular — of several popular vegetables.

The blanching idea isn't new. Methods for scalding or steaming fresh produce in preparation for freezing were introduced years ago. Since then, however, food specialists have been discovering more about the effects of using this process.

They have found for example, that blanching makes certain enzymes inactive which would otherwise cause unnatural colors and disagreeable flavors and odors to develop while the foods remain frozen.

They have also found that blanched vegetables are somewhat softened and can be packed more easily and solidly into freezer containers.

But, first and foremost reason for blanching is to help the frozen produce keep better. Next to eating them from the garden it is the best known way to retain good taste, appealing color and texture.

What freezing and the right preparation for it does is literally to hold on to as much of the natural "freshness" as possible.

Now there is another benefit that is tremendously important to those who eat the frozen vegetables — recent experiments show ascorbic acid — or, as it's more commonly known, Vitamin C — is retained in much greater amounts in the foods that have been blanched before freezing. It was found some foods held two, three and even four times more Vitamin C through periods ranging up to nine months than the vegetables that were not blanched or treated in other ways.

Concentrated research on food freezing, blanching, and quality retention has been in progress at the University of Illinois College of Agriculture for several years.

The Foods and Nutrition Division of their Home Economics Department, under the direction of Dr. Frances O. Van Dyne has a continuing project in "Methods of Home Freezing". Their reports given in last summer's University Experiment Station Quarterly, Illinois Research, gave extensive reports on the blanching question.

Such information makes us know definitely that it is well worth our time to blanch the vegetables for our food freezers, because according to the information given us by our food specialists and experiment stations, everywhere blanching and careful preparation is the way to bring a wide selection of "garden-fresh" delightful tasting vegetables to our table to make our family healthy and keep them well-fed.

Our Silver Jubilee!

Have things really changed in rural America because of Rural Electrification's Silver Jubilee which is being celebrated this year?

For a mighty good reminder of things the way they were, here are some figures gathered in 1935 by the first Administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration, Morris L. Cooke, an engineer and scholar to whom every co-op consumer-member owes a debt of gratitude. Mr. Cooke died very recently, but these eye-opening facts show graphically how rural electricity has made the life of each rural citizen far richer, healthier and more productive.

In 1935, the year rural electrification began, Administrator Cooke reported that of thirty million persons in America who worked in agriculture:

- 73 percent had to carry water from wells or a like source of supply.
- 77 percent had outdoor toilets.
- 92 percent had neither bathtub or shower.
- 76 percent used kerosene or gas-oil lamps — and another 10 percent used candles in the evening hours.
- 48 percent did laundry work out of doors.
- 54 percent heated their homes entirely or almost entirely with wood stoves.

Things are different today. Rural people, with the help of the Federal Government through the Rural Electrification Administration making it possible for them to borrow the money to make rural electricity possible, have more than reversed these percentages.

Vastly more meaningful than any cold statistics, no matter how impressive, is the way rural electrification has added richness and the amenities of life to all who live in rural areas.

One doesn't have to be so very much of an "old-timer" to recall very well the back-breaking labor—the eye-ringing effort of trying to read by a kerosene lamp, the lack of conveniences — and even the necessities of life by today's standards.

Everywhere we turn, in today's farm or rural home, we see the benefits which have flowed from abundant availability of low-cost power — electric refrigeration, indoor plumbing, work-saving devices for the farmer — wife-savers, water heaters, washing machines, and many, many more almost too numerous to mention.

was in France. He was home and out of the service in the following June, in 1919. From that time until the Q & P bought out the Motley County Railway Co., in 1925 he was agent at Roaring Springs. He went to Matador as agent and was there until 1927 when he came to Floydada.

The Motley County Railway Company had been operating for several years. It was organized and operated by A. B. Echois, Harry H. Campbell, Van Martin and many other Motley County men who were determined the Matador should have a railroad. The company did all right. It took in a lot of money, but somehow or other the money got away from the veterans of the cow business.

Their railroad got into financial difficulties and they turned it over to the creditors with Judge G. E. Hamilton as receiver. "In about six months we had \$60,000 on hand and the judge paid off everybody," Medlen recalls.

In 1928 Chas. Sommer named Medlen as the first agent at their new Floydada station. He opened up for business on July 1, and has been on the job here ever since.

Four Lovely Daughters
The Medlen's have four daughters. The first of these, Mary Louise, was born at Roaring Springs. Roberta and Maurine were born at Matador. Bobbie Gene is Floydada.

In three days slightly exceeded six inches through Thursday. All parts of the county also had four inches or better, and those sections which caught the heavy downpour late Thursday night had an additional four inches, to bring their total to 10 or 12 inches in the week.

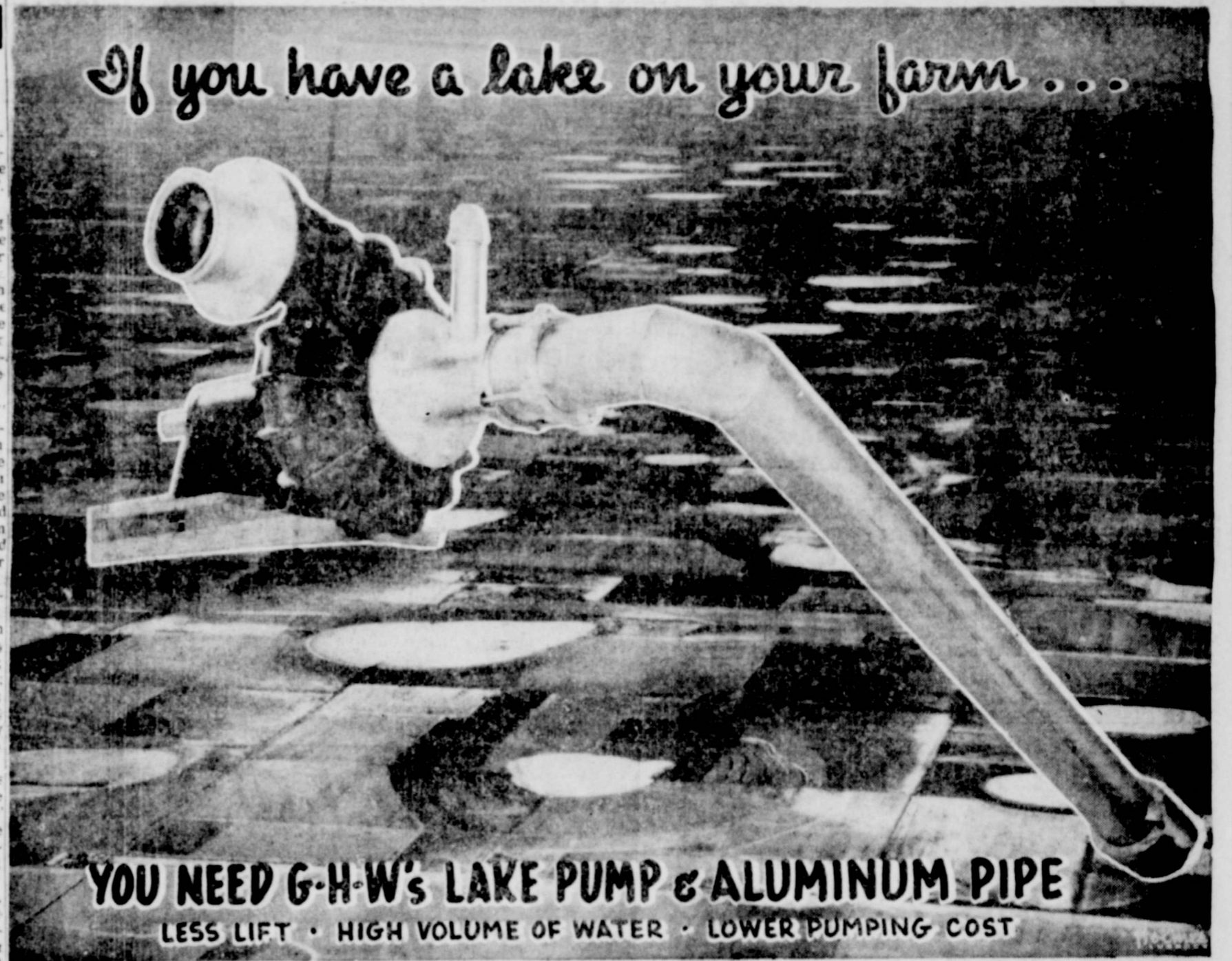
