Troop Leaves For Jamboree Site Monday

Jamboree Troop 71 consisting of 37 boy scouts from Floydada, Matador, Plainview, South Plains, Tulla, Hale Center and Idalou departed Monday morning on a chartered bus for the newest city in the United States, the tented city of Boy Scouts at the Reverse J Diamond Ranch at Colorado Springs, Colo., the site of the Fifth National Jamboree.

The boys ate lunch at Dalhart, stopped briefly at Raton, took supper and spent the night in Pueblo, breakfasted there before going on to Denver where they spent all day the 19th sight-seeing and spent the night in the Field House of the University of Denver. Yesterday morning they went on to the camp site of the Jamboree, set up camp and departed for the Pikes Peak trip and other sight-seeing in the Colorado Springs vicinity.

The Jamboree will be from July 22 to the 28. A magic city will arise on the site of a 2,000-acre ranch. The city of thousands of neat tents will be divided into the equivalent of 29 villages, each with its own health lodge, water supply shower baths and commissary. Jamboree-town will have its own bus lines, radio and television facilities, a daily newspaper, post office, telephone exchange, telegraph office, trading posts, and Mammoth arena theatre, that can hold 55,000 Jamboree participants.

It will take 630 men in general headquarters to administer the Jamboree, with more than 6,000 men, mostly volunteers, supervising the encampment.

More than 500 correspondents will tell the Jamboree story for major newspapers. Three thousand Scouts will cover it for their hometown papers. Darryl Lindsey will be the correspondent for The Hesperian.

The Fifth National Jamboree will give thousands of Scouts and leaders a wholesome good time filled with inspiration and good fun. As these boys gather from the mountains, plains, and seacoasts, their renewed commitment to the life and philosophy of scouting is expected to rekindle the spirit of true Americanism in their hearts.

DAUGHTER RECOVERING NICELY AFTER BONE SURGERY

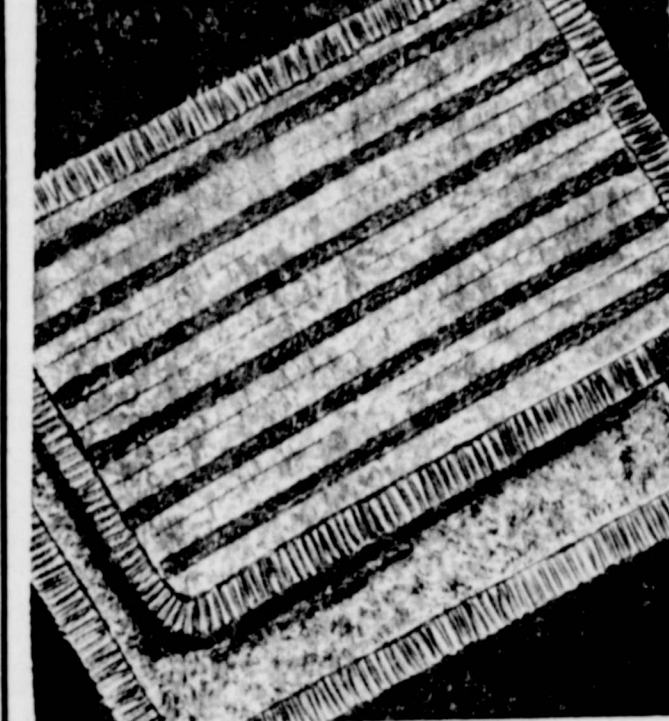

Homemaking Hints

HOME CANNING — You lose time, labor and money if you canned food spoils, and if the quality is poor, the food may lose appeal and nutrition value.

There are three main causes for food spoiling. They are: underprocessing, faulty and improper handling.

Here are some suggestions to help you get top quality in your canned foods.

Use young tender products. Gather and can vegetables in the morning while it is cool.

Can in small amounts. Clean food thoroughly and keep all utensils and containers clean.

Aim for speed in preparation. "One hour from garden to can" is ideal.

Have food hot when sealed unless canning vegetables by the one-step cold-pack method.

Get a good seal. Do not over cook or under-

By Nancy Morckel More About Freezing Foods
Work out your own freezer pattern - plan it to meet your own specific need, taking into consideration your family's preferences and eating habits.
Select only high quality foods. Freezing does not improve food, it merely preserves quality and prevents spoilage.
Fruits, vegetables, meats, poultry, fish, game, dairy products, and baked goods are all excellent for freezing if properly prepared. Do not waste space, which is so valuable to all homemakers who use a food freezer, with old limp vegetables that have lost a lot of their food value before they are frozen, because they will come out of the freezer the same way.
If you would have the best - choose only fresh ripened fruits, young, tender vegetables and well-trimmed and properly aged meats and poultry.
Place packages in the freezer just as soon as they are prepared for freezing.
Do not put too much unfrozen food in the freezer at one time. Approximately 3 pounds of unfrozen food to each cubic foot of freezer capacity is recommended. If the freezer is overloaded the temperature will rise and the foods will freeze too slowly - losing quality and even in some instances they may spoil.
Be sure your freezer maintains a temperature of zero or below at all times.
If you have any doubt about the temperature in your freezer place a thermometer inside the freezer in order that you may be sure. Be sure everything you put into your freezer has been handled under high standards of cleanliness - utensils and freezer containers must be absolutely clean. Use only the best containers - to have quality products that moisture must stay in and that will stay out.
Label all packages. Check your instruction book carefully so you will know just exactly what is recommended for your particular freezer.
If possible leave a little space between packages for air circulation.
Freezing should be completed within 24 hours or less time.
Follow the rules carefully and you will find that your freezer holds the best things you "ever had".

EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENTARY

Vacationers, Be Alert. Remember that the roads are full of drivers who have mapped out too ambitious plans for the time they have. As a result they try to make up for the time by driving too fast, driving too far in a day, and occasionally disregarding traffic laws. The careful vacationist will be well rewarded for constant vigilance. One must drive, on occasion, not only for himself, but also for the driver behind him as well as for the man ahead. The road has a hypnotic effect on the overtired driver. Such a one may be in any car on the highway.

State budget balancing, ballyhooed as the major issue in the Texas legislature this year, is likely to have a competitor for the Number One spot in re-districting. Every census is supposed to be followed by re-aligning districts to fit the changes in population. Members from growth areas will go for more representation, extra representatives, state senators and congressmen, while the others will try to hold on to as much as they can, writes Vern Sanford in his "Highlights" column from Austin. One prediction is that at least 12 rural districts will be swallowed up in the changes.

Rural Communities find it particularly galling to be tied on as the tail of a kite to bigger and more populous communities adjacent. Since the legislature is required by the constitution to re-define districts after the census is taken and announced, something quite likely will be done about it. Should it fall at this first session a board takes over. Sanford concludes that the legislature will re-district — some way somehow, as it did it ten years ago.

The Democratic Ticket. Senator John F. Kennedy, of Massachusetts, who abetted National Democratic Chairman, Paul Butler, Chester Bowles, Walter Reuther and others in hammering out a platform that builds castles right on up into the air, is the standard bearer for the Democratic party, as is well-known by most everybody. And his running mate, whom Paul Butler and people of like minds wanted to demolish politically, will be Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, his candidate for vice president.

Many Texans Won't like the ticket on account of LBJ, many more because of the Massachusetts senator. But the in-betweeners seem to be either satisfied or mollified. More of them will be when Mr. Kennedy gets around to exercising the kind of charms he used to capture the fancy of West Virginians. He is a campaigner who likes it rough and tough, and he doesn't soft pedal the religious issue. How he manages is well illustrated by his last day convention management. Texans, who had been so mad they could hardly see over the manner in which they thought Mr. Butler studiously mistreated them in the convention, over the platform, and over the quick licking they got in the first ballot for the nomination, quickly reversed themselves and almost cried on his shoulder when they learned he had to have Senator Johnson for a running mate.

It Is Evident Now that Senator Johnson had had too many brushes with too many Democratic members of the senate to gain their affectionate interest in his selection as a standard bearer for the party. Also the labor hierarchy felt they could not claim him as their man.

And the illiberal liberals could not support him in any event. So it had to be somebody else, a Kennedy as it turned out.

Our side, fortunately, will not be caught short of funds to carry on a campaign. If the national committee cannot find the wherewith Mr. Kennedy could pick up the tab. Also our own Lyndon B could pay for an airplane flight or so.

It seems to us probable that Texas will be one of the battle grounds. We have indicated the belief that it is doubtful whether a Catholic can carry the state under any circumstances. This belief is based on the 1928 debacle when Al Smith was beaten by Herbert Hoover in this state. Our flat-footed surprise on the Wednesday morning of that fateful fall came on the heels of a campaign, in which the religious issue was not publicly raised. Democrats just quietly went fishing or scratched the party's candidate. This year there will be open opposition unless we are mistaken. For that reason we expect to see Mr. Kennedy become a well-known personality in Texas before the first Tuesday in November. He will be charming Texas people into the belief that he, not the pope, will be the president.

Because both parties are likely to be committed to the welfare state, also to the well-developed idea that any majority should have its nose rubbed by some minority, it seems to us that the people will decide between Republicans and Democrats on the basis of our foreign relations. Which, if either, can get our country out of a groveling attitude before the world. As D. E. Scott has his short-suffering neighbor saying recently: "He is tired of the craven image the world has got of Americans, who safely can be insulted, shot at, robbed and hornswoggled." Our own well-being, indeed, is tied up in what means we can devise to meet this problem successfully.

Meanwhile, enough water in recent weeks has gone under the Canadian bridges to water the towns of the plains for a decade or so, a long dry spell. And the same thing has happened in scores of other areas of West Texas during the tremendous rain and storm period. Uncle Sam, through the congress and the executive department have paid off (and pledged the future) to enough yapping minority groups in the past six months, to have built a dam on every rivulet in the country. Water, they say, is the nation's first problem. But they don't vote that way nor get the wheels greased to do anything. They vote to appease at home and appease abroad.

Infectious Hepatitis. Yellow jaundice is a disease of the liver, says the Texas State Department of Health. The wave of this infection is being felt strongly in Texas, the department reports. Gamma globulin is being used to forestall further increase in the number of cases. The infection is caused by a virus, which is usually transmitted through close contact with infected persons and through contaminated milk, food and water. The number of cases in the state has doubled since the spring of last year. Yellow jaundice is a stubborn disease. A victim generally loses weeks, even months of time from work or the usual pursuits while combating it.

For seven years he worked with the Pima Indians in Arizona, near Casa Grande before receiving an assignment with the U. S. T. C. M.

Kneirim, former Floyd County residents. AUSTIN — Although budget balancing is the most discussed of the problems facing the next Legislature, many lawmakers expect redistricting wrangles may rise more blood pressures.

Legislature is required by the Constitution to re-define legislative districts after each federal census. It used to put off this troublesome task, but a 1948 law provides that if it fails to act in the first session after a census a Legislature Redistricting Board shall take over.

This insures, as it did in 1951, that the Legislature will redistrict — somehow, some way.

Battle will be between big city incumbents who will demand more representation in line with their swelling populations and rural members who will try to hold on to as much as they can.

In their election campaigns many representatives promised their constituents they'd be there pitching for the home area. Members from growth areas said they'd go after extra representatives, state senators and congressmen.

A rural legislator told his people, "At least twelve rural districts will disappear in the next redistricting. I certainly do not want this district included in that twelve."

Incumbents cited their experience as an asset. Personal feeling

Texas Commission on Higher Education will ask the next Legislature for an appropriation of \$3,082,483 for the 1961-63 biennium.

Bulk of the increase asked is for meeting expected enrollment increases in the 18 state-supported colleges and universities.

In a discussion with members of the State Finance Advisory Committee, the Commission considered recommending an increase in the state college tuition charges — now \$100 for a nine-month term. Dr. Ralph Green suggested raising this by \$50. It would bring the state an extra \$5,000,000 a year in new revenue, he said.

PRISON NEEDS CITED — Texas Board of Corrections also wants more money — a \$2,664,044 increase over their present allocation for the next two years.

"If the amount is granted, Texas prisoners will cost the state \$1.89 per day per man," said State Prison Director O. B. Ellis. "This is just a little more than half the national average."

Ellis and Corrections Board members regard prison needs as critical. Board Chairman H. H. Coffield of Rockdale reported that "the prison population trends indicate it will keep on multiplying."

WILSON HONORED — Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has been named by the National Association of Attorneys General as the recipient of that association's award for outstanding service in 1960. He was cited as being the most outstanding Attorney General in the nation when he received the Wynian Award at the Annual Meeting of the National Association of Attorneys General recently in San Francisco.

Award is given to the Attorney General who "has done the most to advance the objectives of the association to help make the United States a better place in which to live for all."

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
