



Gribble of Wellington, reports in The Wellington Leader, "was the nearest thing to a rlot" he had ever seen. "It was a plain disgrace," he told his hometown newsmen.

At voting time this convention was pretty well in hand, it would appear, because the convention was practically unanimous in all its actions. But by the time the immigrant, first-generation citizens, numbering 466 out of the total of 1331 delegates, and the Hollywood actors, who could not be kept out of the picture, got through their between-vote

antics it was a mob scene not a deliberative convention. In view of the world situation one views such things with

Of General Interest to Floyd County Democrats (and Republicans also) will be a report on the make-up of the conventions. We have no information on the Republican convention, its racial make-up, but Bob Considine, a reporter typed as a columnist, says the Demoeratic convention had 466 immigrant first-generation citizenship other than English-speaking background. These included 87 Italians, 74 Poles, 69 Jews, 58 Scandinavians, 38 Germans, 67 of Slavonic background, 31 Greeks and 42 others. All of which sounds like a mob to the usually quietly spoken Texan. No wonder every minority had a strong "plank" in the platform! Otherwise the convention hall might have been torn apart.

One Thing Sure. It is evident, after consideration of the two major parties conventions, the so-called conservatives of the country have their task cut out for them, assuming it is desirable for the republic to continue to have a responsible government. Radical minorities forced "planks" on both parties that, if followed through, will so burden the country with taxes people can't do business in the accustomed way. If the conservatives can't awaken the country to the perils of the new course the nation will have gone so far left within the decade there'll be no turning back. The prospect is that bad.

Problems Nearer Home. The conventions and national politics, important as they are, perhaps should not be given as much space in this column as they are. Problems nearer home crowd in for attention. The national political scene is far away and our information is second

The Local Problems include the need of the Floydada school district to get out its financial straight jacket. Pressures both from above and below are making it more difficult every month for the school board to contain their financial problems. But even more pressing are the city's financial problems. Fortunately the council has kept its debt service funds at a peak so that long term debtors can't complain. But operating expenses are another matter. We have only a vague idea how much the city has had to spend in excess of its expectations on street improvements. The cost will be reflected largely in the water and sewer deficit but the street program is the source. From every side has come pressure to spend more, not less, and our voice has been added to the hue and cry. The council will be And while it is their authority and their responsibility, all local citizens have a stake. The town must be kept "going" and it must meet its obligations.

Keeping Their Confidence. This city, like any other corporate body, must keep the confidence of the general public. And the best way to keep public confidence is to keep the public informed. The city's financial affairs should be aired in every possible way. The best money the city could spend at this juncture is for a complete statement of the paving program itself, a complete statement of the outlay incident to the paving program which has come out of or must come out of available funds not obtained through a bond issue.
