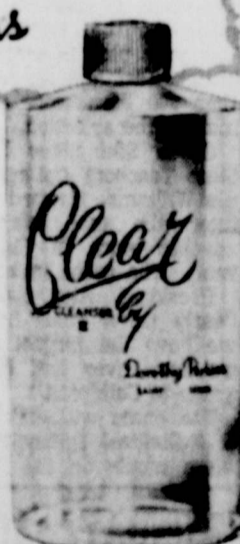

SEVEN-TENTHS OF A SECOND

There is a chilling report in Motor magazine on what happens in the first second when an auto speeding at 55 m. p. h. crashes into a tree. Researchers, particularly those at the University of California and Cornell, have been studying various types of auto collisions and the auto-free variety has produced findings that argue strongly for avoiding it.

Here they are. In the first tenth of the fatal second, the front bumper and grille collapse.

The second tenth finds the hood crumpling, rising and striking the windshield as the spinning rear wheels lift from the ground. Simultaneously, fenders begin wrapping themselves around the tree and, although the car's frame has been halted, the driver's body is still going 55 m. p. h. Instinct causes the driver to stiffen his legs against the crash and they snap as the knee joint.

During the third tenth of the second the driver's torso lurches from the seat, broken knees smashing into the dashboard. The steering wheel starts to disintegrate and the steering column aims for the driver's chest.

The fourth tenth of a second finds two feet of the car's front end wrecked while the rear end still moves at 35 m. p. h. and the driver's body still travels at 55.

In the fifth tenth the driver is impaled on the steering column and blood rushes into his lungs.

The sixth tenth finds impact built up to the extent that feet are ripped out of tightly laced shoes. The brake pedal breaks off; the car frame buckles in the middle; and the driver's head bangs into the windshield as the rear wheels, still spinning, fall back to earth.

In the seventh tenth, hinges rip loose, doors swing open and the

seat breaks free, striking the driver from behind. But he doesn't mind because he's already dead and the last three-tenths of the second mean nothing for him.

Homemaking Hints

TIME TO PICKLE PEACHES
Pickled peaches are colorful and tasty, especially as a relish. They are easy to prepare, so why not make the most of peaches while they are available?

For making 6 pints you will need 8 pounds of small or medium sized peaches without blemish, ripe but firm enough to hold their shape in cooking, 2 lbs. whole cloves, 8 two inch pieces of stick cinnamon, 2 lb. sugar and 1 qt. vinegar.
First, make the sirup mixture by cooking together the sugar, vinegar, and spices for 10 minutes. (Have the spices tied loosely in a clean, thin, white cloth so they can easily be removed later.) Wash and pare the peaches, add to the sirup and cook slowly until tender but not broken. Let stand overnight.

The next morning, remove the bag of spices. Drain the sirup from the peaches and boil rapidly until thickened. Pack the peaches in clean, hot, sterile jars. Pour hot sirup over the peaches, fill the jars to the top. Seal tightly. Keep in a cool place for several weeks before serving. To blend the flavors.

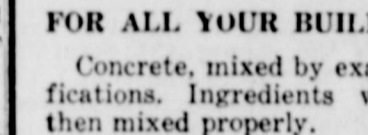

EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENTARY

First Cotton Estimate for 1960 production in plains counties issued August 5 forecasts Floyd County to produce 115,000 bales. This compares with 123,564 actually produced in 1959. Hot, dry summer weather in July gave the crop a chance to catch up. The crop, the forecast statement says, is perhaps a bit late but still in good shape. With another shower in late August the dry-land crop will be (quotes) "the best in 10 or 20 years." The figures are those of Plains Cotton Growers.

More than \$350 million was paid out in Texas alone in 1959 to beneficiaries in old-age, survivors and disability insurance through the various avenues of the Social Security act. Commenting on the status of Social Security in the nation on the Silver Anniversary of the passage of the Social Security Act by the congress (the bill was signed into law August 14, 1935) the district manager, John G. Hutton, says number of beneficiaries under the law at the end of the first year totaled about 200,000. In contrast the number has increased to 13 and a half million and the amount paid out was at the rate of above \$10 billion. While this has been going on the worker's load has more than tripled and, as the congress continues to broaden the eligibility list, the forecast is for even higher withholdings from the pay envelope. In fact the forecast is up to 7 per cent in even the most conservative quarters. In Floyd County, at the end of 1959, 741 persons were being paid at the rate of \$40,591 a month, Mr. Hutton states.

News For Mr. Kennedy. If democratic presidential nominee Senator Kennedy thought the problem of Texas was solved by getting Senator Johnson as his running mate, that news from Pecos last week-end no doubt will cause him to change his mind. Leastwise, it will give him pause. West Texas newsmen and publishers, assembled at Pecos for a week-end of fraternizing and shop talk, made it plain the Democratic ticket, as things now stand, cannot expect to carry this section of Texas. Not only did they say their communities would not go for the ticket, a majority of them indicated that they would not support the ticket themselves.

Thirty-Four publishers at the Pecos meeting expressed the opinion that the Kennedy-Johnson ticket would not carry their home towns. Fourteen others predicted the Kennedy-Johnson ticket would win majorities in their home towns. Twenty of those casting ballots said their newspapers would not support the Democratic candidates, while five said they were undecided on the stand their papers would take. Thirteen stated their newspapers would back Republican nominee Richard M. Nixon and eight declared support for Kennedy. The view that religion would be the major campaign issue in their

towns was expressed by 32 publishers. Sixteen said it would not.

From Rock-Ribbed Democratic territory like West Texas that is undoubtedly a shocking report for Democratic headquarters. And, if Mr. Kennedy is made of the material we think he is he will be down in Texas telling the folks in person about himself, his religion, the platform he is running on, and what he thinks about church and state. In West Virginia he faced the church issue head on and he convinced them. Perhaps he can do as much in West Texas. His platform reads about half of the conservatives out of his party and his ties with the Catholic Church run off a good half of the liberals, who apparently think the platform is okay.

Dyed in the wool Democrats, who were amazed to see Al Smith beaten in Texas in 1928 on account of his religion and went on into the Hoover regime to their great distress, were not impressed by the naming of Mr. Johnson as the vice-presidential nominee. They expect Mr. Johnson to be a Senator in January, not a vice president. Unless—Mr. Kennedy himself can convince the voters. We take it Kennedy is resourceful. He will undertake the job, we are sure, and he may get it done. At this moment, though, he doesn't have a chance in West Texas.

Not in Disparagement of Senator Johnson is anything above said. The senator has his political enemies, of course, but so far as Texas and the southwest is concerned no better selection for vice presidential nominee could have been made. It is simply a matter that Texas protestants believe that Roman Catholics believe that the pope should rule, and interpret this to mean what it says. Nobody but Mr. Kennedy can convince these Democrats otherwise. It is a job that only he can do.

For our part, we went along with the Democratic nominee in 1928 and have no reason at this point to doubt that we will do the same in 1960. Al Smith would have made the country a great president. But he did not feel called upon to meet the religious issue head on. In fact, he did not know his religious faith was the burden it turned out to be. Since Mr. Kennedy is fully aware of the situation and his friends are also, they will face the situation in a forthright manner, we have no doubt.

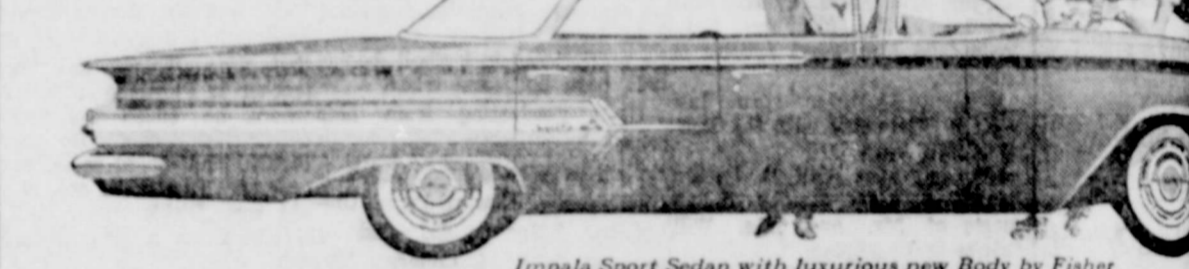

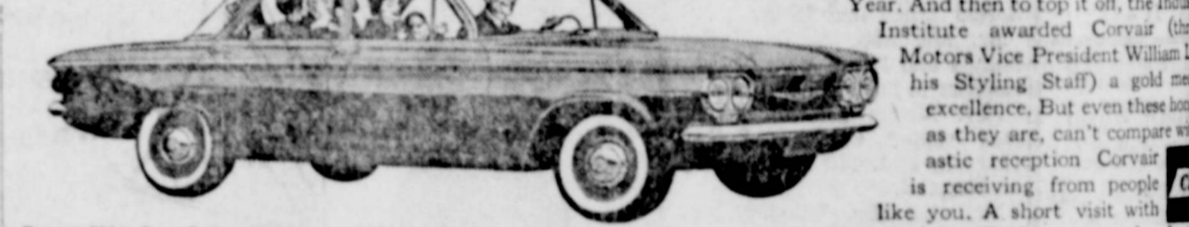

Urges Litter Cover Planted This Fall

By Truman Gregory
Farmers who are planning to seed grass next year should be planting a dead litter cover crop now to get enough growth before frost to protect grass to be seeded early next spring.

Native grasses can be established under extreme weather conditions when they are seeded in a dead cover. A dead cover should be established to protect the young seedlings from wind erosion that occurs in March and April. It will also prevent the soil from crusting and act as a shade to keep the top of the soil moist. Grass seeds are planted as near the top of the soil as possible with a grass drill.

Sorghums and other similar crops drilled with a regular grain

drill will make an ideal cover if not allowed to produce seed. The cover crop should receive no other tillage operation before the grass is planted.

Weeds should be controlled by shredding or chemicals the first two years. The grass should not be grazed the first year to allow the root system to develop. For further information contact the local SCS office in Floydada.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1950.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 29 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto new Sections to be known as Sections 4, 5, and 6, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain stated limitations, providing that any such Act shall be subject to certain limitations of their anticipatory character, providing for an election prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding the following Sections which shall read as follows:

"Section 4. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (\$0.75) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

"Section 5. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

"Section 6. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 29 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing the same and one-half percent (1 1/2%) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans Land Board providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Determining Time Of Irrigation

Farmers in the Floyd County Soil Conservation District are faced with a critical problem in applying water to crops. When to apply water to various crops to receive the largest possible gain is a problem that is as old as irrigation itself. There are many factors that need to be considered, such as till, amount of water available, soils, stage of growth and time.

It is a known fact, for example, that cotton will use about 27 inch of moisture daily after blooms appear. Since the heavy type clay soils in the district can absorb approximately 3.75 inches per irrigation and the plants can only extract water down to the 35 percent level, thus only 12 days of available water can be stored during peak use in the average soil. Methods have been developed to determine when to irrigate on a scientific basis. The average farmer can use these same principles with good results by the "hand-feel" method.

To use this method, one should dig 12 to 18 inches into the soil for a soil sample. He then estimates the percent of available moisture remaining in the soil. A soil that has no remaining moisture is hard, baked, and cracked. A soil with 50 percent or less moisture is somewhat pliable and will form a ball when a handful of soil is squeezed very firm with the fingers. A soil that has 50 to 75 percent moisture forms a ball and will ribbon out between the thumb and forefinger. A soil with 75 to 100 percent moisture easily ribbons out and has a slick feeling. These characteristics hold true for tight, heavy soils such as the Pullman soils found in this area.

Results from Experiment Stations, SCS and other indicate that around the 50 percent level of moisture is the best time to irrigate. The farmer should remember the time factor and start his water early enough to cover the field before the crop begins to suffer.

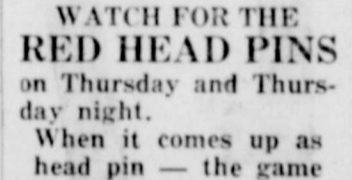

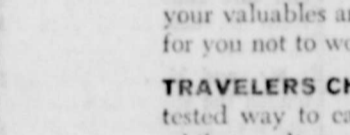

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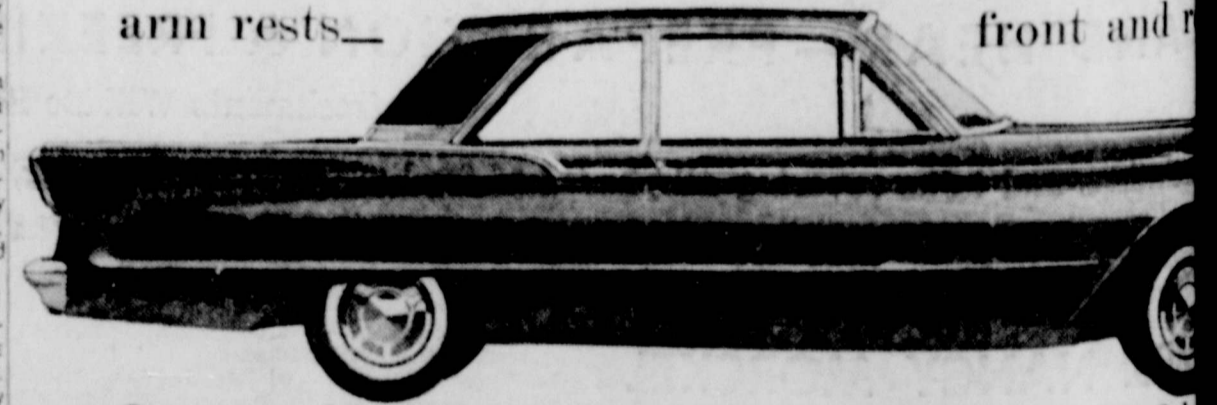

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

How much income will a retiree receive during the retirement period? A Statewide Advisory Commission on Aging sought to find out through a survey on the needs and wishes of Texas' older citizens.

Some 4,000 persons took part in the grass-roots, county-by-county survey. Recommendations growing out of their findings will be discussed at a conference in Austin on September 7 and 8. Out of this will come the Texas contribution to the White House Conference on Aging next January.

SURPRISE! — Amid all the upped budget requests they have received lately, state officials were happily stunned when University of Texas officials asked approval to spend a comparatively picayune sum for a president's home.

UT asked to spend \$40,000 to build a home for its president Harry H. Ransom.

Last year legislative tempers blew over the \$100,000-plus presidents' homes built by two smaller state colleges. Officials responsible for the expenditures were called on the carpet.

This time the scene was played in reverse. "Do you really think this will be enough?" worried the Legislative Budget Board Plenty said UT officials.

They said they'll use a site the University already owns, clear it with University equipment and cut material costs by using "historic" bricks from UT buildings that have been torn down.

DRIVER CURBS STUDIED — Ways to clip the wings of irresponsible drivers who carry no insurance are being studied by a committee of the Texas Legislative Council.

Spokesmen for the casualty insurance industry told the panel they were opposed to a compulsory insurance law. They suggested that pressure could be exerted by such measures as requiring uninsured drivers involved in accidents to put up a money deposit, revoking licenses, impounding cars, etc.

Committee also heard Department of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison Jr. urge a system of traffic courts for Texas. County courts are completely bogged down by the appeals from traffic cases, said Garrison.

HIGHWAY LEASE PROSPECTS DIM — Chances of the state's earning money by leasing mineral rights along state roadways are not encouraging, a legislative committee found.

Committee learned from a national survey that only two of and gas producing states get income from leasing along highway rights of way. One reported earnings of \$5,763.

An Attorney General's opinion recently held that the state owned mineral rights along the roadways. But State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer reported there's not much demand for highway leases.

SCHOOL "HOSPITALITY" HIT — Texas School for the Deaf has been serving free meals under circumstances not authorized by law, reported State Auditor C. H. Cavness.

During the past two years, said Cavness, the school has served 3,325 free meals. Most were for pre-school-age deaf and blind children and their parents here for special summer courses for parents.

School is authorized by the State Board of Education to hold the summer courses, Cavness observed, but it is not directed either by law or the board to serve free meals to participants.

Cavness' audit showed the school has an average of 503 pupils at a cost of \$192 a month per pupil.

CREDIT CARD LIQUOR SALES — Diners Club, Inc., won a court order allowing it to continue — at least temporarily — collecting for package liquor store purchases made with a credit card.

An Austin district court granted a temporary injunction halting enforcement of the Texas Liquor Control Board order prohibiting such sales.

Liquor Board contends that by becoming the collection agent for liquor store purchases, the Diner Club is, in effect, selling liquor without a license.

Diners Club says it simply buys up the accounts of its card holders from the liquor dealers and takes responsibility for collecting. Club has contacts with package stores in nine Texas cities.

SHORT SHORTS — Texas Highway Commission has announced a policy of using only materials manufactured in the United States for construction of roads and bridges in the state's highway system. Policy is to be reconsidered if shortages or sharp price increases develop in U. S. -made materials.

Texas ranks well below most states in the percentage of personal income paid in state taxes. Governor's State Finance Advisory Commission found that Texas pay 3.9 per cent of their per capita income in taxes, compared to a national average of 4.2 per cent.

Employment in Texas hit an all-time high during June, with wage earners totaling 3,522,900. This was an increase of 45,700 from May, according to the Texas Employment Commission.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert has requested that his office be given a two-year appropriation of \$7,915,386. Present appropriation is for \$5,739,683. Calvert also said his department was operating in inadequate quarters scattered over three buildings and asked that the Legislature consider a state building for the department.
