## Ready Radio Relay System

Super high frequencies carrying network television program will soon be beamed through space near Floydada on a \$1 million radio relay system being readied for service next month.

J. C. Oakley, Manager, of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company said a 100-mile communications skyway extends the Lamesa Lubbock route to Amarillo. Five new stations similar to the building and 235-foot tower eighteen miles southwest of town have been built by the Long Lines Department of American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

The route is of the type that can carry both TV programs and hundreds of long distance calls simultaneously.

"Since the radio relay route's frequency range is substantially higher than the range picked up by home television sets, residents in this area will not be able to tune in the super high frequencies carrying the programs," Oakley said. "Actually, the programs are delivered to the local television stations for broadcasting in their service areas," he concluded.

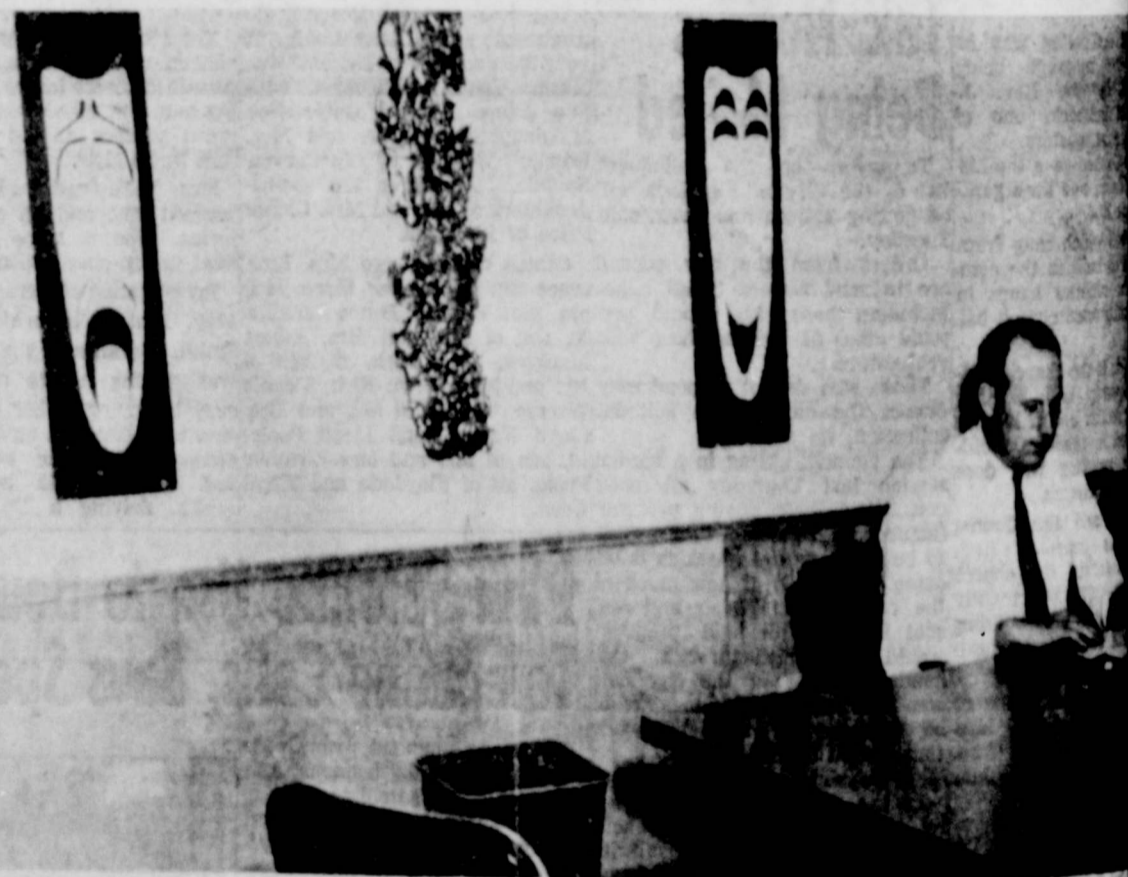

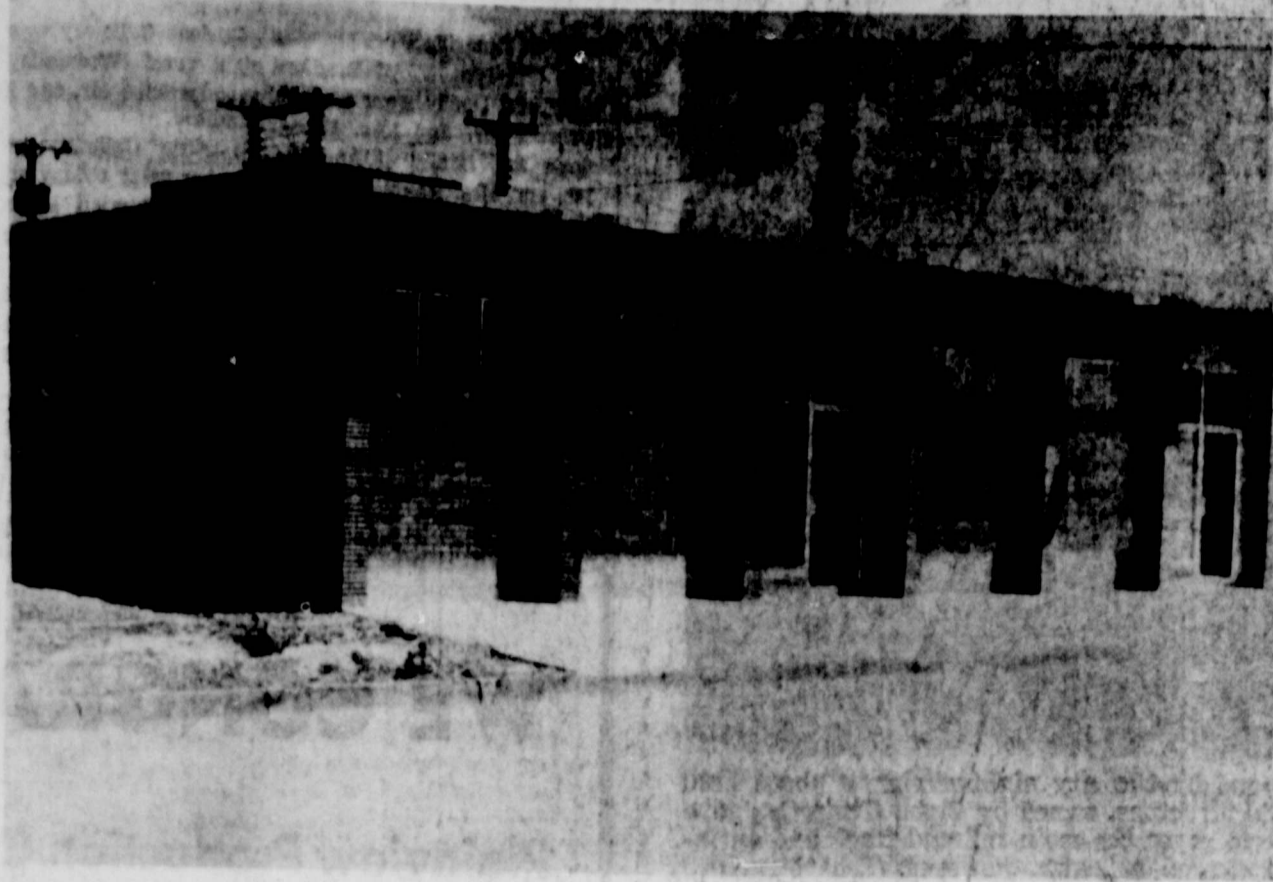

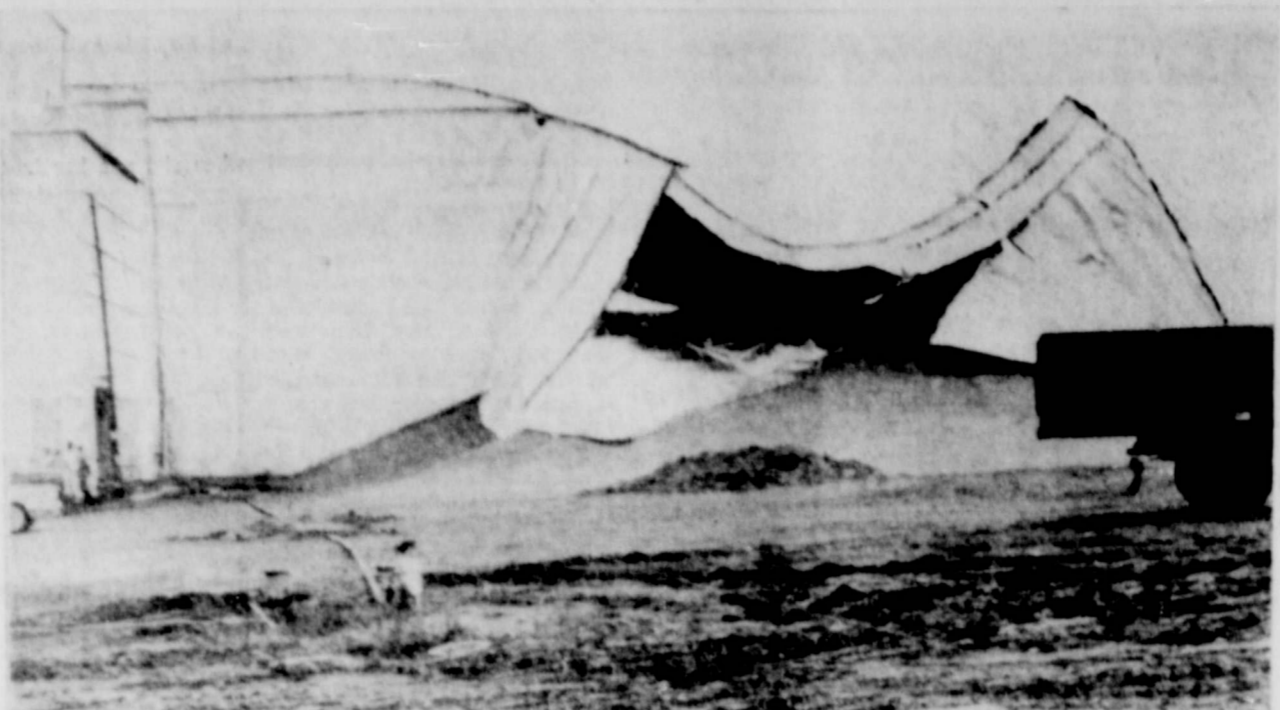

**September List of Plentiful Foods Has Wide Variety**

COLLEGE STATION, August—Grocery shoppers will find a lot of broiler-fryers available in Texas as food markets this September. They are featured among the items listed as plentiful for the month, reports the Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M College.

Turkeys are another poultry plentiful. Lamb, melons, peanut butter, and a wide array of late-summer vegetables complete the list.

These foods were selected by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for special emphasis in this area because the supply of each is expected to exceed normal demand. Homemakers can take advantage of the abundance by serving these foods often.

September broiler-fryer marketings are expected to run about 5 percent more than a year ago. Look for meaty, tender, flavorful young chickens, from 2 to 3½ pounds.

The number of turkeys expected to be marketed in September is about the same as a year ago, but total weight may be higher because there will be more of the turkey breeds. Both chicken and turkey provide ideal fall-weather entrees for family fare.

There'll be lots of lamb for National Lamb Week, September 15-29. Slaughter has been averaging about 6 percent more than a year ago.

Plentiful melons include watermelons, cantaloups, honeydews, Cranshaws and Casabas. The late summer vegetables will vary in different localities but good supplies of onions, carrots, squash, cabbage, eggplant, potatoes sweet corn and many others will be available.

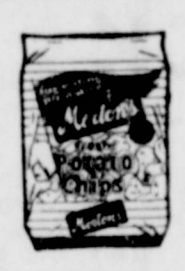
