**District 2AA Grid Teams
Break Even In Eleven Games**

District 2 AA has not compiled an impressive football record to date as some 11 games have been played with outside competition. Of these two were with AAA clubs five with A teams and the remaining four with other AA outfits.

Of these 11 contests the district teams have broken exactly even having won 5, lost 5, and tied 1.

Early season ratings are still running almost true to form. District favorite Olton has won two while losing none and has the best offense scoring 56 points while allowing 28. This week the flying Mustangs travel to Springlake and will probably fatten their record even more.

Co-favorite with Olton is Floydada which is also undefeated though the 'Winds have played but one game, being open last week. Floydada still enjoys a top spot in the ratings with the district's best defense as they are unscored upon.

This week the 'Winds play host to the high scoring Jack Rabbits of Ralls who have run rough shod over two opponents to date.

Lockney's Longhorns are the other top division team in the district, by early predictions. The Longhorns have faltered but once as they fell before Dimmitt and Junior Coffey last Friday. The Longhorns had opened the season with a 20-0 win over Hale Center, then dropped the second cutting with the Castro County team 8-22. This week the Horns host tough Tulia.

Morton has met two single A clubs and broke even with them winning over Whiteface last week.

to Sudan 14 - 22. Friday night Morton will enjoy an open date. Muleshoe's Mules may be the dark horse of the district as they have played the roughest schedule. The Mules opened with a 22 - 22 tie with big Clovis, New Mexico, and then fell before triple A Littlefield by a 0 - 27 count. The Mules are also upon this week.

Abernathy is at present holding down the cellar spot in inter-sectional play but may be much stronger than rated as they have played two good teams. The Antelopes fell before Dimmitt 6 - 19 in their opener and lost 0 - 12 to Spur last week to remain without a single victory for the new season. This week Abernathy goes to Hale Center to play the Owls and may bring home their first scalp.

will not try to and factual" discussion of the national platform at the Sept. 20 meeting.

Governor Daniel said there are planks in the National Democratic platform to which he is definitely opposed. But he said he didn't feel there was enough difference between the Democratic and Republican platforms to justify criticizing one without applying the same criticisms to the other.

Governor Daniel said he was definitely opposed to freeing the Texas Democratic electors, as proposed by some, to vote for whom they please. He said he felt it was a matter of "simple integrity" for the Democratic electors to vote for the Democratic candidates if the party carries the state.

Since the Los Angeles convention, the governor's position has been to work for the Democratic ticket without endorsing the total platform.

SCHOOLS NOT PENALIZED—A ruling by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has provided a way out for Texas schools faced with conflicting state and federal orders regarding integration.

State law provides that a school system which integrates without approval of local voters loses state aid. Wilson ruled that this

does not apply if the school is complying with a federal court order to integrate.

However, the ruling did not knock down the state law in question. Wilson said that school districts are not under federal court order and integrate without approval in a local election would still lose state aid and accreditation.

Immediately affected were two large school systems — in Houston and Dallas — both of whom are under court order to begin gradual integration plans.

SALES TAX NEED SEEN — Next year's money needs will be staggering the Legislature will have to resort to sales tax, general or selective, to keep the boat afloat.

This prediction is made by Sen. William S. Fly of Victoria, chairman of the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy. Fly was defeated in his race for re-election last May but contends his tax stand had nothing to do with it.

Those who do come back, said Fly, may face the need to raise

as much as \$100,000,000 in new revenue. This is the estimated need if the Legislature enacts bills to raise teacher pay and provide medical aid for oldsters — both programs with wide popular support.

Latest report by the tax study group shows that Texas families are now paying less state taxes than the national average. Annual state tax bite on a theoretical "average" Texas family is \$115.89 a year. Nationally, the "average" family pays a state tax bill of \$235.51 a year.

MEDICAL AID URGED — Legislation to provide state-federal payments for medical care for Texans on old age assistance has near-top priority on his list, says Governor Daniel.

He noted that there are in state mental hospitals some 3,000 oldsters who are not really mentally ill, but who have no other place to go.

A medical aid program that would make possible the care of these people in nursing homes or their own homes would be "a great step forward," said the

governor.

Enactment of such a program, he told the statewide Conference on Aging, is "near the top of the list of unfinished business of this administration."

He noted that a constitutional amendment to make such a program possible was approved by Texas voters nearly two years ago.

INVESTMENT EASING SOUGHT — State Board of Education will ask the next Legislature to pass a law allowing investment of some of the permanent school fund in corporate stocks and bonds.

Object would be to obtain higher earnings from the \$400,000,000 trust and provide a hedge against future inflation. Investment in corporate securities has already been allowed under the law for the University of Texas permanent fund, but the public school fund is limited to government bonds.

Board of Education also went on record as favoring salary raises for Texas teachers, noting that teachers trained here are being lured away by higher salaries in other states. No specific amount was suggested for the raise.

YOUTH COUNCIL HARMONIZES — With past differences smoothed over, the Texas Youth Council is now in accord over the executive director's purchase of government surplus buildings.

Earlier, Council Chairman W. C. Windsor Jr. of Dallas had declared that Dr. James Turman did not have authorization to purchase the two buildings for \$250,000. Other two Council members backed up Turman. Windsor called a special meeting to look into the matter.

After conferences, which Governor Daniel also attended, Windsor announced he was completely satisfied.

Truman said he had been offered \$25,000 for one of the buildings purchased for \$150 but that the contract with the government forbade such a re-sale.

One building is to be used to provide a classroom for Negroes at the Gatesville School for Boys and the other a lunchroom for the Gainesville School for Girls.

SHORT SNORTS — August collections for the state wine, liquor and cigarette taxes totaled \$9,311,005, reports State Treasurer Jesse James. This is an increase of \$2,473,188 over August collections a year ago which was before tax increases went into effect.

State general revenue fund ended the fiscal year last month with a deficit of \$4,572,407. Revenue for the year was \$1,232,298,961 — an all-time high, but not enough.

State Department of Agriculture has announced the beginning of a demonstration livestock auction market news program beginning Oct. 16. Two livestock auction reporters are now being trained under the direction of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Kennedy-Johnson Team. Visit of Mr. Kennedy and Mr. Johnson to the plains the first of the week on a campaigning tour has re-lighted interest in the national political matter. Particularly is it likely to liven the discussions locally. When the candidates are in some far state and one reads about it in the newspaper it has one shade. When it comes right up to the front door of where you live it takes another hue.

As For Senator Johnson, when he gets to Texas it seems he has more of a job explaining to the home folks why he is not at the head of the ticket than he does of expounding the politics which he and his partner are espousing. Explanations are always lame things. What most Texans had in mind was to win or lose the nomination for president with Johnson. Failing that they anticipated being out of the picture. Any candidate who is put in the position of explaining to the home folks somehow doesn't arouse a lot of enthusiasm.

As To Mr. Kennedy he needs to turn on the personality whether tired or not and he needs, most of all, to convince protestant Democrats that they can trust a Catholic to be president of the United States and not a minion of the papacy. Whether it is right to do so, whether it is a cruel attitude to take toward a man whose background of service to his country in time of peril is outstanding, the fact remains that enough protestants have misgivings to make the difference between carrying Texas and not carrying it. Mr. Kennedy knew he had this kind of a pattern cut out for himself. That is the sole job he has to do to carry this state.

The Party Platform. At the risk of saying more than we have any need of saying to have any value to our readers, we are at a loss to know why a Democrat should question one platform more than the other. Both promise everybody everything. Neither gives evidence of great statesmanship. Both outrage common sense.

Drainage Seems Good. Last week's refreshing rain was a good trial for the new streets in Floydada, whether they'd drain or not. For the most part they did drain well. The engineering seems to have been good. Little complaint heard. Considering the flat terrain on which the town is located it seems a wonder as good a job was done. At least, that's our point of view.

Limit On Interest Rates. Texas people will pass on a proposed constitutional amendment at the general election which would make a change in the legal interest rates. In our opinion the people are not likely to take kindly to the change. The present legal interest rate is six per cent, but 10 per cent is permitted where parties to a contract can agree on a rate as high. Once before the state tried turning the interest rate loose and the consequence was a flood of abuses. There is no doubt that "something should be done" about the usurers who are victimizing the poor, the ignorant and the bad managers. But raising the legal rate of interest is not deemed necessary or desirable by the more responsible lending agencies.


