

Harvest Passes 71,000 - Mark; 113,000 Bale Cotton Crop Forecast

Machines Race Thru County's Cotton Fields

Strong probability that Floyd County's 1960 cotton crop will exceed 113,000 bales this season, despite hail, wind and excessive rainfall during the growing season, is indicated in figures compiled this week by The Hesperian and The Lockney Beacon from reports and estimates of cotton ginners.

The figures compiled Tuesday afternoon, add up to 71,404 bales either ginned or on the cotton yards of the 22 gin plants in the county. More than 7,500 bales were setting in trailers on the gin yards when the count was made, but the gins are turning out about 3,500 bales per day.

Assuming fair weather and no high winds the gin plants have scheduled around the clock operation until the bulk of the crop is finished. This means another three weeks of high pressure operations.

The composite of the ginners' estimates puts the number of bales still in the fields to be harvested and ginned at 42,072 bales. They estimate 62 per cent of the crop is either ginned or on the gin yards.

Some ginners think their customers are 75 per cent through with the harvest. Other estimates run below this figure, as low as 50 per cent.

The estimates The Hesperian obtained are considered conservative. Compared with these actual figures on ginnings and the estimates of the bales to be ginned are the forecast of South Plains Cotton Growers which put the county's total at 120,000 bales and the forecast of Texas Employment Commission at 100,000 bales. From the areas hit most heavily by the hail, wind and rain during the summer the reports indicate better production than anticipated, with most of the fields yielding about a bale to the acre. The "turn out", however, is disappointing.

Some of the dry land fields are yielding up to a bale per acre and the late, late planted fields are yielding a half bale and better.

The early early cotton which escaped the attrition of the weather is producing more heavily than in recent history. An excellent field is reported at three bales per acre.

A big acreage of storm proof cotton was planted in the county this season, with the expectation that much of it would be harvested with strippers. Grades on this cotton are not disappointing for the most part.

The staple is good and most of the sample cards coming back from the classing office give good merchantable marks. As a practical fact, it appears to the cotton farm operators the classing office is "classing by the calendar."

MULESHOE SEEN AS STRONG 1961 FOOTBALL CONTENDER FHS, Hard Hit, Must Build Scoring Team

With the defeat of Olton by Denver City the teams of district 2AA now have put away all their football gear and turned all their attention to basketball. A quick look at the football programs of the 1960 season will give the fans some interesting items on which to speculate before another fall rolls round.

The Olton Mustangs, winners of the district crown and also of bi-district honors, will graduate 11 seniors from their team including eight starters. The Mustang roster listed 20 players so this means that Olton will have to rely on new boys for the most part in 1961 and will not start the season as one of the favorites.

Whirlwinds Hard Hit The Floydada Whirlwinds finished in the runner-up spot and they, too, are hard hit by loss of seniors. Fourteen members of the traveling team will be lost. Eleven of these seniors were regulars on either offense or defense.

The big Whirlwind football program can take those losses better than most of their opponents, however, and they will have some five offensive regulars and four of five defensive starters back in 1961.

Many fans feel that Floydada will field a stronger scoring team in 1961, but may suffer on the defensive unit. The Lockney Longhorns will return a big squad of boys and are looking with hope to the future. The Longhorns carried 30 players on their roster and will return some 22 of these next fall. The eight they lost were all seeing regular service and it is doubtful if they can field a stronger team in '61.

Nine voting places have been named for balloting in the cotton marketing quota referendum, date for which has been announced by A S C as Dec. 13, Tuesday week. The polling places will be the Consumers Station, Lone Star, Upton Grocery at South Plains, Paymaster Gin, Aiken, Beacon of Cedar Hill, Barwise Gin, Barwise, ASC Office, Floydada, McCoy Gin, McCoy and Powell and Olton, Dougherty.

Nothing will be under the general supervision of the local A S C committee, composed of H. W. Schacht, J. B. Robertson, and J. B. Sumtheman, with Thos. J. Hutchins as the office manager. Anyone engaged in the production of upland cotton in the county in the cotton year of 1960, will be eligible to vote in the referendum. Both husband and wife are eligible to vote.

EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENTARY

Nobody We Know in Texas would be willing to go along with crookedness in order to win a presidential election or an election to name a dog catcher for that matter.

Mr. Hutcheson finds some counties casting more ballots than they have poll tax payers of record. That statement is aired for newspaper reporters, who, in their ignorance, are unaware of the fact that any county in Texas has a voting strength of perhaps 20 per cent, at least 15 per cent, more than its poll tax receipts number, on account of over age exemptions.

A "Paper Ballot" County. If the Republican high command in Texas has its way all the voting boxes in the state's 238 "paper ballot" counties will be opened and re-counted.

There Is No Doubt that thousands of voters in Texas did not get their ballots counted but there is no evidence of fraud on the part of election officials, a fact which must be established before the voting boxes can be re-opened and a re-count made.

In Canvassing Results of an election, fortunately for the sake of the secret ballot, a Commissioners Court, charged with making the results official, cannot go behind the returns made by the election holders and the supporting tally sheets.

Part of The Logic we followed in a decision to vote the Democratic ticket, as had been our custom for many years, was Senator Kennedy's record in bat-

Santa's Bag Stuffed With Plentifuls

College Station.—Santa's bag of gifts this December will include a bountiful supply of farm-produced foods, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station.

Seven food items will be especially plentiful all month. These are cranberries, broiler-fryers, turkeys, onions, dates, peanuts and peanut products, and vegetable fats and oils.

Broilers and cranberries are the features of the December list.

Recent chick placements have been running 15 to 20 percent higher than a year ago, so it looks like marketings of live broilers will be unusually heavy in December. Fresh cranberries come from the 1960 record crop, which was a third above average.

The plentiful foods list is determined each month by the area food distribution division of the Agricultural Marketing Service. Items are eligible for listing, at the request of the food industry, when supplies exceed expected trade needs.

Consumers usually will find it profitable to watch for special sales on plentiful items at local stores, as the food industry cooperates with producers in attempts to move the abundance in normal trade channels.

Cool to lukewarm. In a small bowl, combine 1/2 teaspoon sugar and water (warm, not hot, for active dry yeast; lukewarm for compressed yeast).

Sprinkle or crumble in yeast, stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm popato mixture, then 2 cups of the flour. Cover.

Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until light and spongy, about 1 hour. Stir sponge dough. Stir in remaining 1 cup sugar, eggs, margarine, and lard, salt and remaining 7 cups flour. Dough should be soft and sticky enough to drop from a spoon.

Cover and let stand in a warm place overnight. (Dough will more than double in bulk.)

Next day divide dough equally among 4 greased 8 inch square or 9 inch round cake pans. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until double in bulk, about 1 hour.

For the topping, dot cakes with margarine or butter, pushing "dots" gently into the dough. Sprinkle with brown sugar, then with granulated sugar combined with cinnamon.

Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) from 30 to 35 minutes, until top is golden brown and springs back when touched lightly with a finger. Makes 4 cakes.

Note: These cakes freeze and reheat successfully without defrosting.

HOMEMAKING HINTS

Plan Holiday Expenses
Installment buying and borrowing reach a peak in December presumably the result of a splurge of gift buying. Now is the time to plan to stay out of debt for Christmas shopping - or at least to limit your spending.

Start by making a list of all persons included in the family gift giving. To the list add other Christmas expenditures such as cards, postage, donations and extra food for entertaining.

Set tentative cost limits of each item and total. Divide this sum by the number of pay periods before Christmas. If this sum can be set aside for Christmas buying without interfering with everyday living expenses you have a ready-made plan.

But, if the sum is high, determine now where you will trim expenditures in order to finish the year free of debts. Be honest with yourself in determining what you can and cannot afford to spend.

After the holidays, include a realistic gift allowance in the family's spending plan for the coming year.

Practical Knits
The vogue for knitting garments is gaining. Never before has the consumer been able to find such a wide assortment of knitted dresses, sweaters, suits and even coats.

In the past, sitting-out and bagging were definite problems in knitwear, but modern construction methods have banished these drawbacks. However, your knit wardrobe does deserve special care if it is to give you continued satisfaction.

To avoid snagging, do not use pins on knit garments either to hang them up or as a decorative accent. It's also a good idea to remove jewelry and eye glasses before pulling knitted garments over the head. If at any time you note a snag has developed in a knitted garment, use a crochet hook to pull the loop through to the wrong side.

Air knitted garments after wearing. To store them, fold and place them in a large drawer, instead of hanging them.

If you have a two-piece costume, shift and adjust the skirt in wear, if possible, to avoid sagging in the seat. Taffetta slips or half slips give added support to knit garments.

Plan for regular cleaning of all knits. When badly soiled, they are more difficult to clean, fit better when laundered and blocked at home. To do this, follow the washing instructions carefully, and at all times support the wet garment in both hands to avoid stretching.

If your knitted clothes are to be commercially cleaned and

blocked, take the original measurements and give them to your cleaner, or discuss any changes with him.

PLANTING SEED - It is time to think about cotton planting seed. Some growers have on hand good quality seed which they have carried over from the year before and which were harvested under favorable weather conditions.

Occasionally stored cottonseed becomes infested with stored grain pests. Insects are more likely to become a problem if a large percentage of the seed are cracked and if stored in bins which harbor insects at the time of storage.

Cottonseed should be stored only in bins that have been cleaned thoroughly of waste material such as old grain, trash, feed sacks and other seed or debris that furnish living quarters for insects.

Sometimes it is necessary to "sweep down" the ceiling and walls and clean the floor to remove hidden waste. It is a good practice to cover cracks with builders' molding to eliminate seed collecting in them. Waste grain, seed and other materials beneath and near the bins should be destroyed.

Spraying the walls and treating the seed can prevent stored grain insects from damaging the cotton planting seed.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — New efforts to change Texas' "scratch method" of voting are in prospect as a result of disagreements growing out of this year's close general election.

As the law now stands, voters using paper ballots are required to scratch out the names of all candidates for an office except the one for whom they are casting their vote.

In this year's election, thousands of voters scratched either the Republican or Democratic candidates but didn't notice or bother to scratch the small lists of candidates from the Prohibition and Constitution parties.

Some election judges threw out these ballots. Some went ahead and counted them. Republican leaders contend that they might have won Texas, instead of losing by a thin margin, if the same rule had been applied on all these carelessly marked ballots.

Further, the GOP chiefs charge, the scratch method was designed to encourage voters to vote a straight party ticket.

Actually, scratching is the old, traditional way of voting in Texas. For a time during the fifties the law was changed so that a voter could either scratch out the names he didn't want or put check marks by the ones he did want. But this either-or approach was even more confusing, both to the voters and ballot counters.

So the legislature changed back to the scratch-out method only. Republican leaders failed to convince either an Austin district court or the state canvassing board (Gov. Price Daniel, Sec'y of State Zolie Steakley and Atty. Gen. Wiley Wilson) that there was any evidence of fraud in the way ballots were counted this year. But since the Legislature hardly ever has a session without doing something to the election code, the GOP will have another inning.

LAND BOND SALE DISPUTED — House General Investigating Committee will study the merits of holding a veterans land bond sale Dec. 5.

Veterans Land Board has scheduled sale of \$12,500,000 in bonds for that date, but Jerry Sadler, director of the land commission Jan. 1, says the sale should wait until next year. Sadler said that, because of the upcoming change of federal administration, interest rates might be lower next year. This would enable the state to sell the bonds at a lower rate, paying less for the money it borrows.

Voters, by approving a constitutional amendment Nov. 8, authorized the Land Board to

pay up to 3.5 per cent interest on the bonds. Previous ceiling had been 3 per cent — too low to find takers in recent months.

COURT BACK TRACKS — In a rare turnaround, the State Supreme Court reversed its previous decision on an insurance case that construed shock from watching a fire to be "accidental death."

In the case, an accountant died from a blood clot on the brain about a month after having watched fire destroy his office records. Two lower courts held that the beneficiaries of the accountant's insurance policies were entitled to the double indemnity provided for accidental death.

Several months ago the Supreme Court issued a 5-to-4 decision upholding the lower courts. On motion for re-hearing, it reversed this and held, again 5-to-4, that the case was not "accidental death."

INSURANCE BOND VACANCY — More than usual interest will center on Governor Daniel's appointment of a new chairman of the conflict-torn State Board of Insurance.

Motorists will lose an outspoken friend on the Board when Penn J. Jackson leaves to return to his old post as district judge in Cleburne.

Jackson has resigned the insurance post effective Jan. 1. He has been in open disagreement during the past few months with the other two board members over the so-called merit rating plan for auto insurance.

He favors scrapping the present controversial plan and letting companies set up their own basis. Board Members Robert W. Strain and Ned Price want to continue the controversial plan, at least for a time.

Public indignation over the new program has been high. It ups auto insurance rates about 30 per cent on drivers who must pay the high penalty for receiving traffic tickets, regardless of their accident records. Only other recourse is to do without insurance.

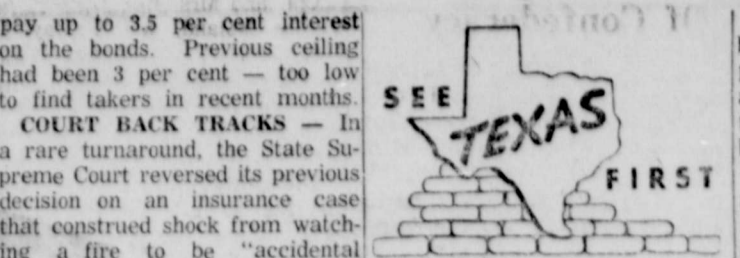
Jackson's resignation means there will be two insurance board appointments to be confirmed by the Senate next session. Price was appointed last spring and has not yet come up for Senate approval.

Merit rating has stirred up strong feelings, pro and con, among legislators and undoubtedly will be a factor in the behind-closed-doors discussion of Board appointees.

PAYROLL TAX PROPOSED — State Finance Advisory Committee will recommend a payroll tax, borne equally by employers and employees, to bolster the state's sagging treasury.

Commission plan calls for a 1 per cent tax, half to be taken from the employer's wages, half to be paid by the employer.

It would raise an estimated \$100,000,000 to \$110,000,000 a year.



Buffalo Tracks at Colorado

"Seven Wells" was the last watering hole for the buffalo and their tracks still are imprinted in the sandstone rock. This old watering hole is known for its scenic beauty and its seven natural unfailing fresh water wells. It used to be an old Indian camp but now is a popular picnic ground.

The "Seven Wells" are located 7 miles Southeast of Colorado in North West Texas' Mitchell County.

Even this would not cover all the state's new money needs if the legislature attempts to meet demands for school improvements and medical care for the aged.

Payroll tax, actually an income tax or both businesses and individuals, is certain to meet the objection that it is not graduated according to ability to pay.

TUITION HIKE ASKED — Another money-raising proposal that is already stirring up sand is a proposed \$50 a year raise in tuition for state colleges.

Commission on Higher Education voted to recommend this increase to the Legislature, saying it would bring in an additional \$5,000,000 a year for college support.

It would mean the tuition for a nine-months term would go up from \$100 to \$150.

Tuition increases, when they have come before the Legislature before, have set off hot debates. Opponents charge that it "keeps the poor boys out of college."

Commission also voted to ask the Legislature to admit the University of Houston to the state college system — provided, among other things, that it will not cut down on support of existing state colleges.

NEW CLUB RULES ISSUED — Beginning Jan. 1, private clubs in Texas can operate only if they meet the following requirements set by the Liquor Control Board:

(1) Provide food service. (2) Meet basic operating expenses from dues and fees rather than from liquor sales. (3) Be managed by officers elected by the membership. Rules are designed to prevent operation of open saloons under the guise of private clubs.

Jackson Builds on Long Record Keen High School Athletics

Leo Jackson is now a proud exemplar of the Irving high school team in his own right. He was born in Temple, Oklahoma, and moved to Irving in 1938. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Jackson, were unable to attend his graduation from Irving High School in 1956.

Was School Day Leader
Jackson's leadership abilities earned him the honor of captain of the high school team in his senior year at Floydada, and he attained the same honor at West Texas State College at Canyon during his third year on the team.

Other athletics enjoyed by Jackson while in college were wrestling and boxing. He was undefeated in Varsity competition as he won the college heavy weight wrestling title for three successive years. He represented Amarillo in the Golden Gloves boxing tournament held in Fort Worth in 1933.

Education-wise, Jackson started work on his Masters degree in 1947 at Baylor University and transferred to East Texas State Teachers College in 1950 where he completed his course in 1951.

In 1937 Leo began his coaching career. As a football mentor he recorded 149 wins as opposed to 30 losses and seven ties. His track teams won the district title twelve times, placing second in regional twice, and were defeated in the State meet by Highland Park in 1939. The Scotties won by only two points over Jackson's Tahoka High School team.

Recalls A Heart Breaker
Most coaches in their time have lost heart breaking games and

Jackson is no different. The most vivid in his memory occurred while he was tutor at Greenville High School in 1951. His team led a rival Gainesville 25-20 with three seconds left in the game. The Gainesville quarter-back dropped back to pass as the clock ran out. He fired a shot to his half-back in the end zone and Greenville lost 27-25.

Jackson's wounds are not as deep as they were however. Since the rival quarter-back was Chuck Curtis who later became T. C. U.'s all conference quarter-back and later the hall-back won fame as an outstanding signal caller for Texas A&M. His name, Roddy Osborne.

After completing 21 years of coaching Jackson moved to the Irving Public Schools in the capacity of director of Athletics in January, 1958. In the 30 years as player, coach, and his present position, he has only missed one football game.

Has Numerous Responsibilities
He is married and has one daughter, Mrs. Jesse Kirk III, who is a senior student at East Texas State Teachers College.

Mr. and Mrs. Jackson reside at 2814, Lawrence Street. They are members of the First Baptist Church at Irving and he is on the board of directors of the Irving Rotary Club. Mr. Jackson is also a member of the Masonic Lodge, member of the State Board of Texas State Baseball and has served as a board member for the Texas High School Coaches Association, the largest organization of its kind in the world.

Among honors received by Jackson is a plaque he received while coaching at Yoe High School in Cameron. He was chosen Coach of the Week when his team upset Taylor 14-6 in 1955.

Diversion Of Highway User Taxes Scored

NEW YORK — A nationally known automotive writer says the practice of spending motor vehicle tax money for nonhighway purposes must be halted in order to put the nation's interstate highway system on a sound fiscal footing.

"As it now stands," writes Joseph C. Ingraham in the current issue of *Petroleum Today*, "an average of \$1.7 billion in federal automotive excise taxes goes into the general fund (set up specifically to finance the interstate system) languages."

Ingraham, automobile editor of the *New York Times*, says the "fiscal cure" for the project is a "big dose of presently collected highway user taxes now being diverted to other-than-highway purposes."

He says the time has come for "some sanity and sense of perspective on an issue that affects virtually every citizen in the nation."

The magazine published by the American Petroleum Institute, traces the history of the program which began in 1956 as a \$27.6 billion project.

During its first four years the cost estimate jumped to \$40 billion. More than 20 percent of the \$30,000 million system is now in use. The Ingraham article says military requirements have added heavily to the cost.

In this connection, Ingraham says, some highway economists have noted that "a good case can be made for asking the military to pay part of the interstate road cost" since the idea was originally sold to Congress, to an important degree, as necessary for defense.

The magazine stated that the federal gasoline tax, which is financing 80 per cent of the cost, is scheduled to return to 3 cents a gallon effective next July 1 in accordance with provisions made by Congress when it "temporarily" upped the levy to 4 cents last year.

At the same time and under the same legislation, which has already been approved, a portion of the now-diverted funds is scheduled to go to the interstate system. These funds will exceed the amount collected through the temporary increase in the gasoline tax and make more money available for the interstate system.

Most of the families here plan to work during Thanksgiving day, gathering cotton while the good clear weather holds. And that's something to be thankful for, isn't it?

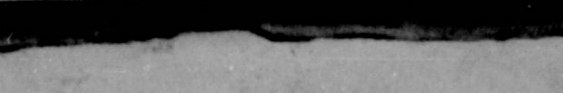

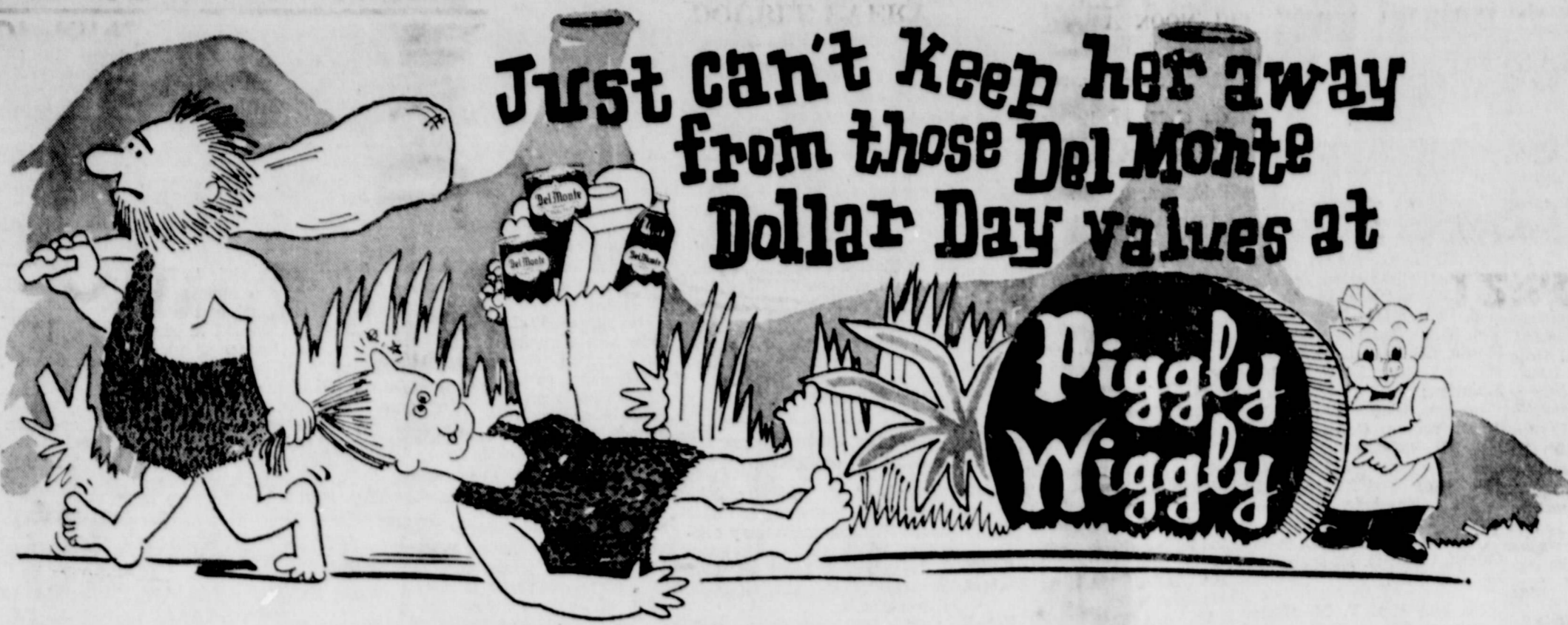

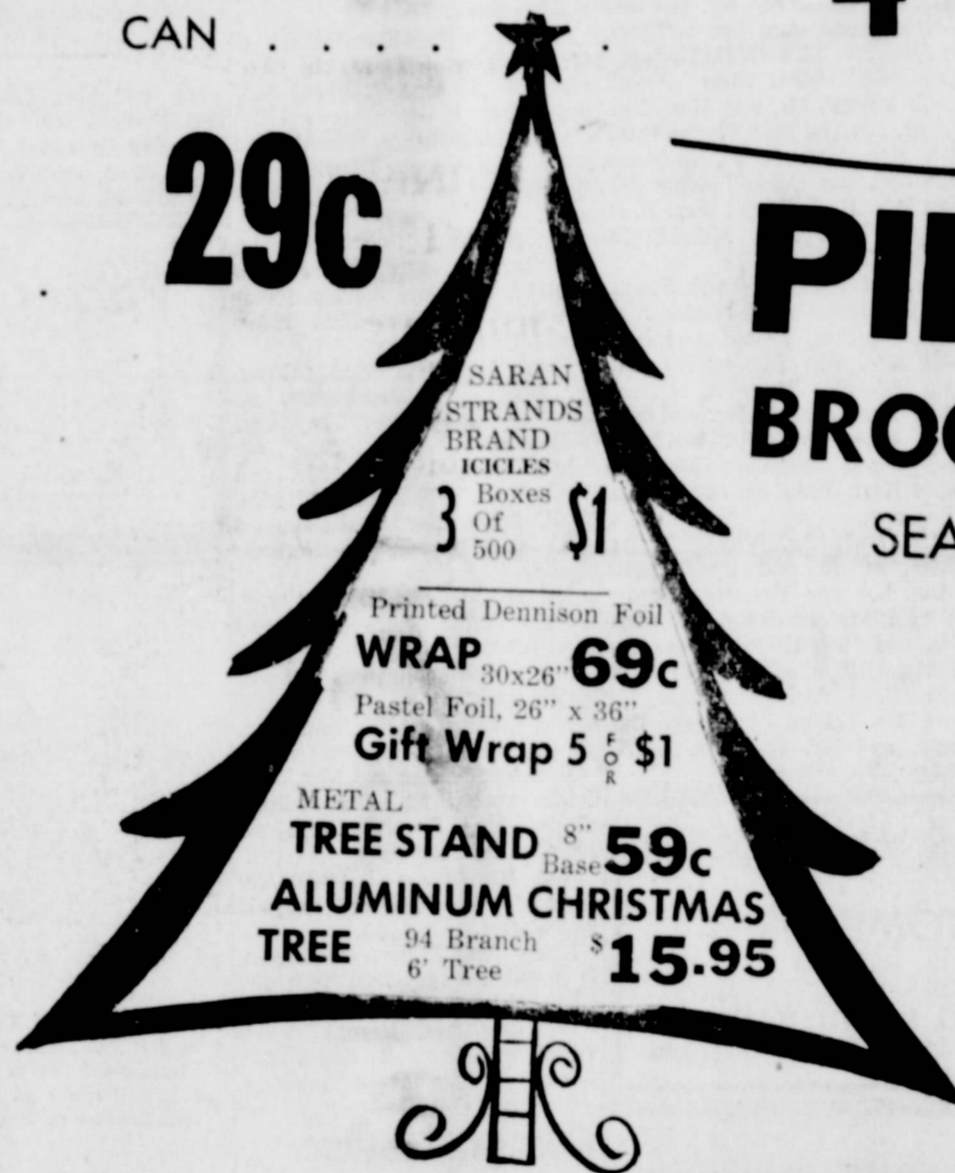
