


Cars, Food Head Spending List

(Special to the Hesperian) NEW YORK, Jan. 26 — Just how the average Floyd County family spent its retail dollar during the past fiscal year, trimming on some kinds of purchases and expanding on others, is revealed in the latest market data findings.

A breakdown shows that \$3,224,000 of that amount was spent for food locally. This is exclusive of expenditures made in restaurants.

The principal ones, as shown in the SRDS report, are: General merchandise stores, with a sales volume of \$737,000, apparel shops, \$579,000, home furnishings stores, \$633,000, and drug stores, \$537,000.



Rep. Wells Reports On Opening Days Of The 57th Legislature

(By Rep. H. G. Wells) AUSTIN, Jan. 30 — For the next few months your lives and those of your grandchildren will be molded to some extent by the 57th Legislature now convened in Austin.



After 21 days the House of Representatives is still in the process of organization. The fact that we have not as yet organized and come to grasp with the great issues which face us is due largely to the manner in which we select our Speaker of the House.

Q A & P Railway Co., has been classified as a Class 2 Carrier by the Interstate Commerce Commission since it was organized in 1907, but effective Jan. 1, 1961 it has been re-classified as a class 1 carrier along with 106 of the longer line haul carriers of this country.

Seek Fair Ideas At Dallas Meet

The fair association representatives attend the annual meeting to get recognition in state and county fair circles and to pick up any ideas that may be of value in promoting the annual Floyd County Fair.

For the years to come. For better or for worse, one thing is certain — your life will never again be exactly the same. During the weeks to come I hope you will follow carefully with me on the issues before this legislature.

Reforms in selecting our Speaker are badly needed. As with other political races in Texas, contributions should be required and accounted for publicly. The race should be concluded at a date early enough to allow time for organization of the House prior to the beginning of the session. These innovations would be complete on the day the session begins. There is a movement within the House to reform the method of our selection of a Speaker. It has my full support.

While the session is in progress, it will be my aim to inform you of the issues before us and to seek your thinking on them. In order to be available to you as much as possible, I will be in my district every possible weekend. I would be delighted to have you contact me at Austin or in Tulsa. Because of the powers of this office, the race for Speaker has become a lengthy, highly pressurized, financially extravagant political sideshow. Candidates enter the race as much as three or four years prior to the day of balloting. Frequently they campaign actively and full time for a full year prior to the secret ballot.

Pressure groups and their lobbyists are keenly interested in the race and take an active part in persuading members to give their written pledge of their support to the candidate most favorable to that particular group. Unlike other political races, contributions to the candidates for Speaker are not required to be reported.

Then Teddy Roosevelt was the president. We read of "Big Sticks", "The Rough Riders", the hunting trips. Then Taft came in as we were beginning our busy farm days. Woodrow Wilson and the First World War. The night we sat at a neighbor's house and had our ears to the first radio we had ever listened to and heard with extreme sadness, "Woodrow Wilson, the president is dead." As a Farm Woman Thinks

Looking back this January morning of 1961 to January of 1942 I find the following notations I made in a diary that I have kept off and on, mostly off, since 1941.

"Everything started this New Year but the car. It is a still and cold day with clouds. It is now 31 minutes past eight o'clock. Major Bowes Amature Hour is on. I enjoy it. War news looks bad."

Jan 5, 1941: Gathered turnips and greens in the garden. Did not go to church on account of the car not starting."

Entries in the diary skip to 1949—only three... 1953 about five... 1957, a few... 1958, a few more... and now on January 1961 I will begin again with the inauguration of a new president.

When I opened my eyes at Thompson's Nursery at Weatherford, Texas. Grover Cleveland was the president. President from 1885 - 1889. This I do not remember, of course. But he went out of office and in 1893 - 1907 he was in office again. Some of this I do remember.

Aunt Sadie papered a little hall with newspapers, must have been the Semi-Weekly News. I learned to read very early and I could spell out the headlines and I remember Grover Cleveland.

Then McKinley was the president. I was in school at Emma. On Sept. 6, 1901 he was shot by an anarchist, L. Czolgosz. The president died Sept. 14. The news came quickly to our little inland town with no telephone service. The mail left Amarillo in the morning, to Canyon City, Plainview then to Clisby, where Will Reagan our mail carrier, picked up the mail for Emma and brought it into the little town late in the afternoon.





that they are willing to face the tax monkey off the legislators who d on a no-sales-tax platform has been one of the State Capital's hot spots.

Richard Morehead of the Austin bureau of the Dallas News suggests that legislators feel the public pulse by ordering a referendum on the April 4 ballot. Voters will be going to the polls anyway to vote for a new U. S. Senator.

Morehead's proposed referendum would point out the state's need for at least \$100,000,000 a year in new revenue. Each voter would be asked to check which of the three tax proposals he preferred: a payroll tax to be paid equally by employer and employee, a general sales tax, or an income tax.

Such a referendum would give the voters a voice in the tax program — an opportunity to express their own preference in the matter. And at the same time it would lift the problem off the shoulders of the legislators.

As Morehead points out, there are other ways to raise money but informed people generally agree that some variation or combination of the three methods outlined herein is going to be passed by the legislature. And by April 4 the voters will have heard many sides of all proposals.

OTHER TAX PLANS ADVOCATED — Lawmakers have proposed numerous methods for raising additional tax money.

Rep. W. W. Glass of Jacksonville suggests a constitutional amendment authorizing a one per cent levy on the gross income of all businesses. He estimated it would bring in \$100,000,000 a year.

A 10 per cent tax on the gross receipts of trading stamp firms was suggested by Rep. Henry A. Fletcher of Luling.

A graduated levy on gross income at the wholesale level and on income from personal services — for an estimated \$300,000,000 yearly — was put forward by Rep. Lloyd Guffey of El Campo.

Rep. Marshall O. Bell of San Antonio took the opposite approach by proposing a constitutional amendment that would prohibit either a state income or payroll tax.

Raciest suggestion came from Rep. V. E. (Red) Berry of San Antonio, who, as he promised in his campaign, introduced a bill to legalize horse racing and pari-mutuel betting and to levy a tax on the track proceeds.

As bills dropped into the hopper, State Treasurer Jesse James announced that the general revenue fund deficit has risen to \$95,381,122.

SAVINGS SOUGHT — Legislature is also considering proposals aimed at cutting expenses.

Texas Research League, reporting on a study made at the request of the Legislature, made 19 recommendations for reducing the cost of collecting taxes.

Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria has proposed a bill that would set up a commission to study the agencies of state government with a view to eliminating duplication and bringing about maximum economy and efficiency. It has been dubbed the "Little Hoover Commission."

LOAN CONTROLS URGED — Drive to enact loan company regulations got new push when the State Supreme Court made final its ruling that the "certificate plan" for loans is not legal.

Under this plan a borrower had to buy an investment certificate from the loan firm and pay for the certificate as well as pay off the loan.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson said it is up to the Legislature to set up a guide by which loan companies can operate legitimately. Several lawmakers have announced plans to sponsor such bills. One would allow for total charges (interest plus other charges) of 3 per cent per month on the unpaid balance of the loan.

SHORT SHORTS

Sen. Jarrard Secrest of Temple is back with his proposal for "flexible rating" of automobile insurance rates. It would allow individual companies to set up their own rating plans rather than following uniform rates set by the State Board of Insurance.

George Corse of Graham, who sought unsuccessfully last session to get his own job of county school superintendent abolished, is back for the same purpose. Corse says eliminating the county school superintendent in counties with no county schools would save the state \$711,000.

A bill to allow rural electric cooperatives to continue serving an area after it is annexed by a city has been introduced by Senators Culp Krueger and Charles Herring in the Senate and by Rep. Alonzo Jamison Jr. in the House.


