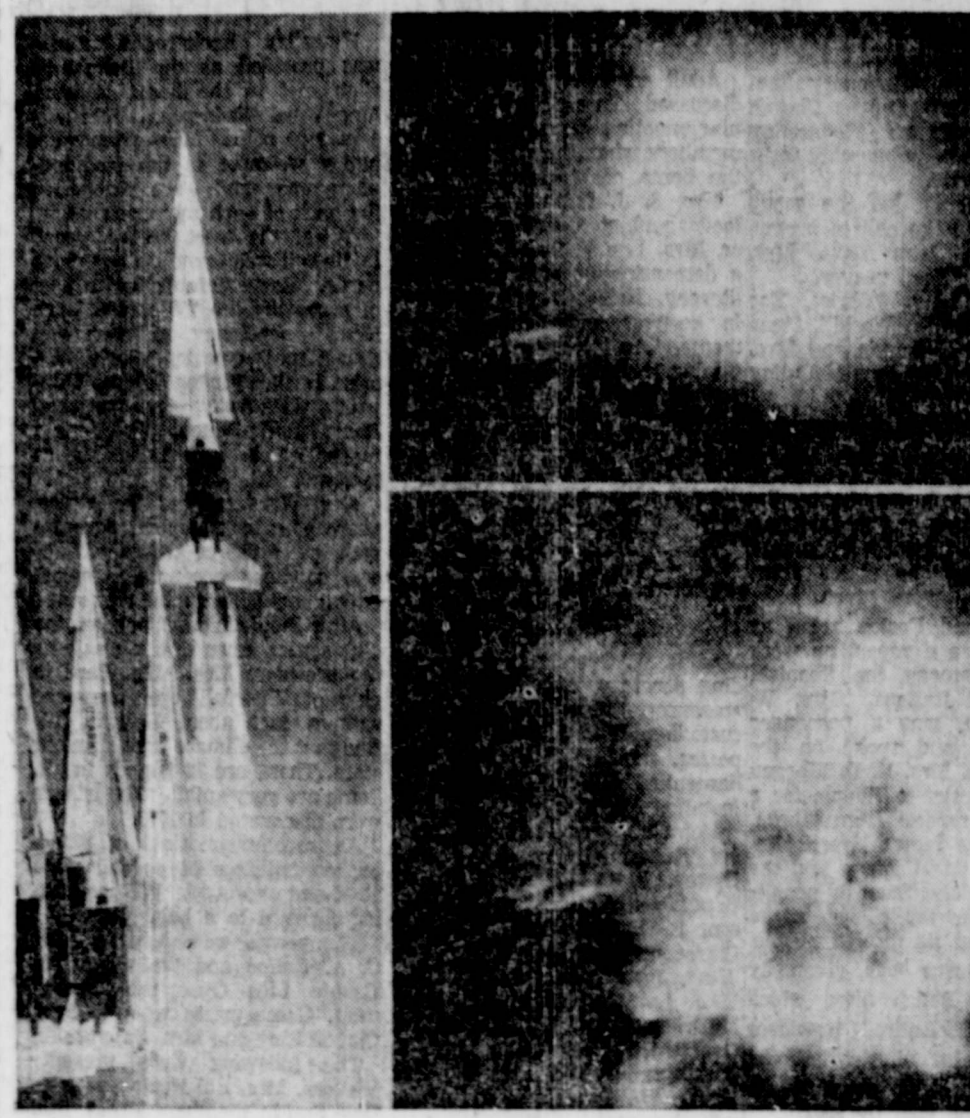

Do not be overdrawn on your soil account, your county Agent urges. Find out your soil fertility level by having a soil test made. Then you can correct any unbalanced fertility conditions by following through on the soil test fertilizer recommendations for profitable crop yields.

## HOMEMAKING HINTS

Retail food prices are expected to remain about the same as last year. A slight increase in food supplies which might lower prices will be offset by a corresponding increase in population.

Meat prices, especially beef, are expected to be lower. Poultry prices are expected to be lower. Lighter weights in fabrics are expected to be developed by use of lighter weight fibers, use of different weaves, fiber blends and fiber treatments. Necessary warmth is provided with less weight. Consumption of fluid milk per person will be less in spite of a greatly increased with lighter increase in the use of low-fat fabrics.
