State Sales Tax Blitz. Look for the legislature to be bombarded with a demand that that body pass a general sales tax. Most everybody is assuming that something must be done to meet the recent deficit and the need for expansion of state agencies and services. Milions must be provided. The "run" for a sales tax has been organized by senatorial districts and the pressure will be terrific. Whether or not the legislature succumbs to the demand is the question. It is notable that in addition to the forces which demand the sales tax and the forces which want the taxes raised in some other manner, there is also a very considerable body of Texans who want no tax raise of any kind. Accordingly most anything could happen in this or a called session of the 57th.

There Are Complications. If all were agreed on what things to make first on the agenda for increased taxes the atmosphere would be considerably clearer than it is. in our book an adequate penal system and adequate eleemosynary provisions come first. Other things, even the teacher raise, could wait if it came to that. But all do not have the same point of view. The din as efforts are made to agree on what should and what should not be done will mount until the legislative halls will be as noisy as a boiler factory.

Out of Money, out of groceries, milk and medicine, also out of credit, tells the story in few words of several families in the county, whose sustenance depends on daily toil. Weather has compounded their problems while at the same time stopping their income. These people need attention and the milk of human kindness should be flowing their way. Presumably local welfare agencies, such as the Salvation Army, have scraped the bottom of the barrel, but there is plenty of wealth in the community to take care of the needy.

Also the bad weather has made the problems of the aged more acute. What is happening in a good many instances, we are told, is that the old folks are spending their money for medicine and are living, otherwise, on substandard basis. It is indeed, a wonderful thing that this generation of old people has been taken out of the category of begging or dying from malnutrition, but their lot remains a serious one and a "bit of a lift" for basic foods would be a great boon to some of them.

The Commissioners Court has been studying operations in some of the adjacent counties where surplus commodities are being provided from the largess of the federal government. Beans, rice, flour are among these items. There is the matter of expenses and the matter of getting tied up in a program with the federal government but want is want and suffering is suffering.

Envy Of the Community. Charles Matthews, superintendent of the public schools at Plainview, in a talk before Floydada Rotary Club last week, recalled the days of the depression in the central Texas community where he was reared. Teachers were about the only people who had money to spend. They were the envy of the town, with their cash or their warrants that could be translated into cash. The world has moved a long way since those times. Nowadays it is considered that a teacher drawing less than \$4,200 is being worked at substandard wages.

To Meet Competition for good help there seems no doubt that the schools must pay higher salaries. And higher salaries help out in a community because they add to the purchasing power of the teaching force. If raises for the teachers are put on the basis of fairness to staffers of the schools or on the basis

of meeting competitive conditions, we think discussions are in order, but we doubt seriously that the state which is Number One while Texas is Number 37 or even Number Fifty is getting or will get better teaching. More sopnisticated possibly but not more efficient. There are states in the union where the per capita outlay is far and away greater than in Texas but where the "climate" is such that attention to the needs of the youngsters is quite below that in our state. Fairness, need to meet competition, yes, but better instruction-we doubt.

Among the matters which will consume considerable time of the legislature and which will directly affect local people are re-districting and the insurance laws. The last-named hot potato was mentioned last week in this department. The point of view of those who favor opening the gates to competition instead of having a watchdog commission set rates and exercise control over got to do some research and study above and beyond the ken of the mine run of citizens and laymen. Terrific pressure is due to be applied. On one thing all are agreed, it seems, is that increased rates on automobile insurance is over-due and a rate increase will be granted Advance Plans sometime this year.
