

Protect The Wild Life. In line with its avowed mission of protecting dumb animals from brutish treatment at the hands of mankind the national headquarters in New York City of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals once upon a time interposed its good offices to prevent a Jack-rabbit Roping Contest Scheduled to be held at Odessa. It called for quite a bit of ingenuity by the Chamber of Commerce to carry out appearances after the lurid publicity got the attention of the over-serious minded. Jackrabbits Milk. More recently a San Angelo man tells of efforts to promote jackrabbit milk for its high potency in vitamins. After the jackrabbit is milked the product is processed in a dairy at Seguin, Texas, some distance from the jackrabbit's habitat. Vitamins J, U, M, and P, are particularly noted as present in high percentages. No protest has been lodged by SPCA, so far as known, to milking the rabbits, since the animals would have to be treated humanely for higher milk production.

The whole sordid mess, Eichmann's mass extermination of the Jewish people—grandmas, grandpas, little boys and girls and all—is to be aired in all of its frightfulness, for all the world to hear.

The April Ballot. We have seen the ballot for the April election that will be used in Floyd County and will reproduce it before election day in the Hesperian. We guarantee you will be amazed at all the various kinds of names (meaning ethnic, we think, stock) which this ballot represents. The 71 names on the list range all the way from Eix, Bar-raco, Vela and Gallagher to Blewett. And every kind of occupation is represented, including a newspaper man. We note Mr. Faver (TV?) and Mr. Grandstaff, (father-in-law of Bing Crosby) in the list. We have not checked the list carefully enough to know whether the Jack Parr and the Ed Sullivan families have one or more representatives on the ballot. We assume you are going to have your mind made up who your man is going to be and what his initials are. If not you will leave the voting place wondering if the vote you cast is for the man you intended.

What We Mean. For instance, we imagine some of the people already have their minds made up to vote for a man named Wilson. Your ballot will have three Wilsons on it, Hugh, Hoyt and Will. One of them must be the man you want. If you have your mind made up to vote for a woman, you have a choice of a doctor, a preacher, a housewife. If your fancy runs to the Johnsons, since we have had such good luck with one of them, you can have your choice of three. And if you want to be sure to vote for a name that is different we suggest you run down the list and pick out Homer Hyrim Star-low, H. Springer Knoblauch, Steve Nemecek or Marcos Zertuche. They all are citizens of Texas, probably of good names in their home communities, and with at least \$50 they could spare to let it go down in history for the sake of their posterity that they ran for the United States Senate back in the early sixties.

Old Sam Houston, Texas' first president of the Republic and first governor of the state will have a better press in the north as centennial of the Civil War unfolds than the rest of our southern forebears. Old Sam couldn't see secession, although Texas entered the union with the express (documented) right to secede if its citizens didn't like what they found when they got tied up in it. He hated the guts of Abe Lincoln and Senator Calhoun with equal fervor. Rabble rousers, both, he saw them leading the country down the path of ruin—war, death, devastation, pestilence, poverty. The north and the south had no differences that could not be worked out if reason could be invoked, he thought. He was resisting the inevitable.

Federal Judges. The country is to have 73 new federal judges in the course of the next year. Texas is to be assigned four of them according to advance reports. The courts were overloaded eight years ago when President Eisenhower went into office. Political considerations have delayed the appointments, the Democrats wanting to wait until they had a president of the same political party as the congress. Mr. Eisenhower, trying to get action, as we recall it, offered once to name the judges, half one party, half the other, if the Democrats would agree. But action now is to be fast. A good many lawyers in Texas have their lightning rods heisted, hoping.

Suit Conscious. Seems everybody is suit conscious these days. Both public and private property owners are finding themselves the victims of lawsuits, some in quite unusual circumstances. News reports tell of a man who took a party of friends to a baseball or football game on the west coast. He is suing the stadium owners for a few thousand. He is suing the heating devices in the boxes his party occupied failed. He said his party all caught colds.

It is noticeable that the general sales tax people have not concluded when to "run" with their bill or bills. As a matter of strategy presumably they plan to wait until the legislature has tired itself down, or mired itself down, in vain efforts at agreement, then the big pitch. It is our guess the general sales tax proponents have the governor and the anti-sales tax crowd behind the eight ball, and before the year is over the opposition to a sales tax will have given up in sheer exhaustion. This is a prophecy. Only a matter of strategy when the sales taxers will call up their bills from the committee rooms.

Mother Killed In Rio Grande Valley Crash

Two separate car accidents, one occurring in Floydada and the other in South Texas involved members of the same family this week. The local wreck slightly injured two youths and the one downstate took the life of the grandmother of one of the Floydada boys.

The death victim was Mrs. A. C. Broyles of Mission, mother of Mrs. Grady Walker, who was killed in a two-car collision near Edinburg in the early hours Tuesday.

Information received here by the family said Mrs. Broyles was enroute to her home accompanying a group of other persons. It was believed all had been out of town to attend a church function in a near-by city.

Mrs. Grady Walker received the news here about 8:30 a. m. from a sister at Mission, who related she had just learned the unidentified person in the wreck was their mother.

Survivors in addition to Mrs. Walker are three other daughters, Mrs. E. E. Marburger of Edinburg, Mrs. C. C. Jones, Mission and Mrs. Wilson Palmer, McAllen; two sons, Norman Broyles of Mercedes and the other name not available here, of McAllen. Also several grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Walker were due to arrive in Mission Tuesday night. Funeral rites were still pending yesterday.

Mr. and Mrs. Walker left for Mission upon receiving the death message.

Cars Hit at Intersection. The accident here took place about 7 o'clock Monday evening at the intersection of West Tennessee and Tree Streets and involved Ray Walker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Grady Walker, and Robert Overstreet, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Overstreet.

According to Alton May, acting Police Chief, Walker was driving a 1954 Ford, traveling west on Tennessee and Overstreet, driving a 1960 Chevrolet, was headed north on Tree Street. Neither boy saw the other in time to avoid the collision. Force of the impact slammed one of the vehicles into a tree and sheered the bark off the trunk, spilling keeping it in the car from traveling into the A. C. Carthel home.

The Overstreet youth was enroute to the Walker home to visit Ray when the accident took place. Both sustained similar injuries. Robert received five stitches over the left eye to close a cut; left knee injury, bruises and lacerations, but he was able to return to school Tuesday.

Ray had six stitches to close a similar cut, and numerous lacerations and bruises. He remained in Peoples Hospital overnight under observation while Overstreet was released following medical attention at a physician's office.

Both vehicles were extensively damaged.

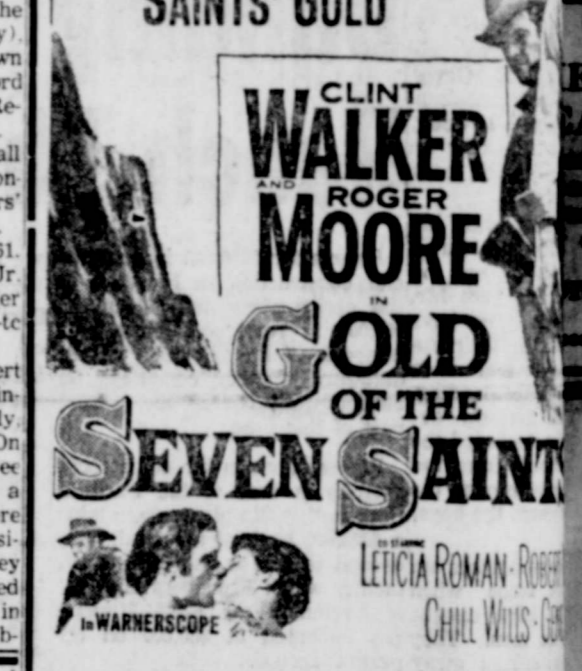

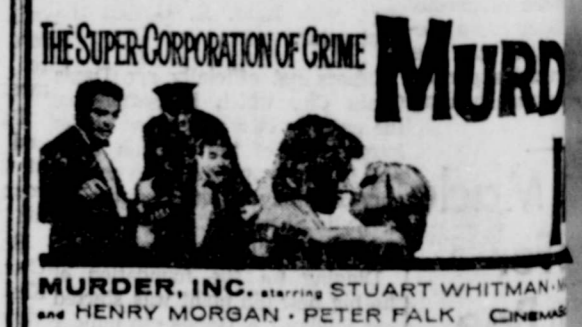



Local Girl Scouts Celebrate 49th Birthday Of Organization

Local members of Brownie and Intermediate Girl Scout Troops have joined in with their sister Scouts all over the United States this week to celebrate the forty-ninth year of scouting in this country.

Girl Scout Week is March 12 through 18. During the week two cookies and nut sales. One troop held a Mother-Daughter Tea. All five troops attended church together in uniform on March 12.

The founder of the Girl Scouts USA was Mrs. Juliette Gordon Low of Savannah, Ga. Mrs. Low started the first troop on March 12, 1912, three years after Lord Robert Baden-Powell organized a similar girls' group in England. Now it is an international organization whose purpose it is to teach citizenship, responsibility, and group co-operation, and to develop a sense of honesty, integrity, and loyalty.

Girls begin in the second grade as Brownie Scouts, proceed to Intermediate Scouts in the fifth grade through Junior High School, and advance to Senior Scouting upon reaching Senior High School. This year the National Council voted to re-divide Girl Scouting into five groups, thus adding a Scouting level for college-age girls.

Local History

Through the years Floydada has had Brownie and Intermediate Girl Scout Troops. The leaders were volunteer mothers of the girls. The troops were not organized into a local council, consequently formation of new troops and recruitment of new leaders were left to the ingenuity and interest of mothers of second grade

girls. In the spring of 1960 through the efforts of Mesdames Fred Martin, Tom Snead, Ralph Thayer, and Bill Thomas a quasi-council was formed.

The purpose of the council was to strengthen girl scouting by sharing knowledge and equipment. At this time a building was loaned to the scouts to use as a meeting place. Monthly meetings were held by leaders of the then existing four troops to plan for the addition of future troops, and to discuss building improvements and buy equipment.

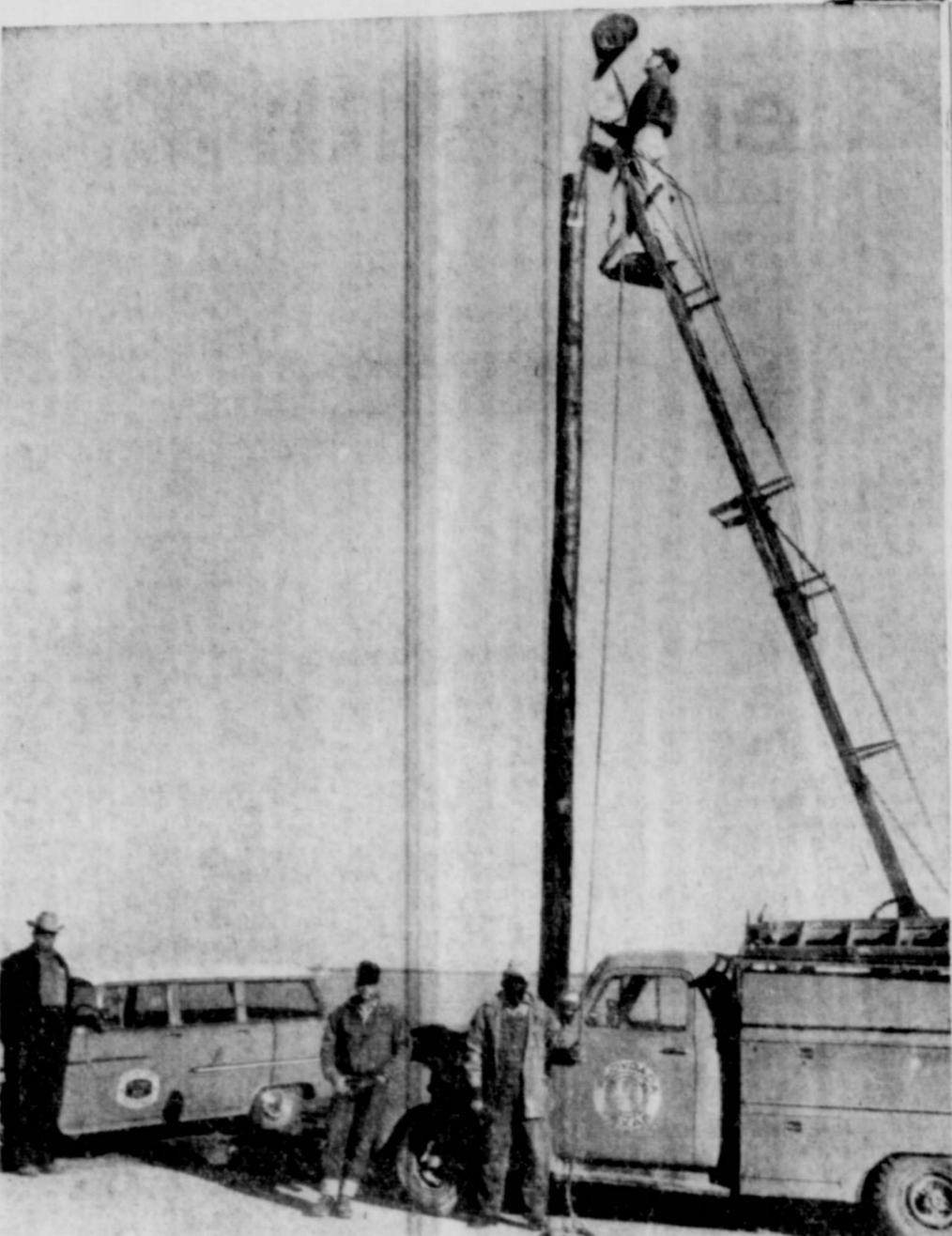

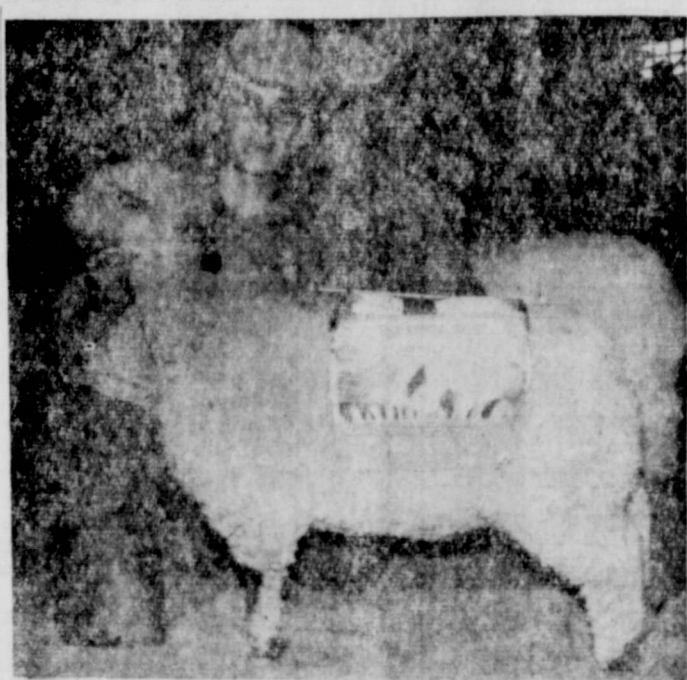

sources has been adopted which is the maximum set by the Texas State Department of Welfare: One person — \$300.00 Two persons — \$450.00 Add \$50.00 for each additional person up to \$600.00.

Public Assistance: Recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled or financial aid from a city or county welfare program, and their normal dependents will be eligible to receive commodities without reference to income or other need factors up on the approval of the Floyd County Field Worker of the Texas State Department of Public Welfare.

Continuing Eligibility: All "Commodity Only" cases will be reviewed once each six months to determine continuing eligibility. Should any individual or family fail to call for commodities two months in succession, such cases will be officially closed.

To re-open a case, rules set by the Texas State Department of Public Welfare will be followed.

Watson Named to Post

Olin M. Watson Jr., has been named by the Commissioners Court as their representative in the conduct of the distribution of surplus commodities.

Watson said this week that approval of the county's set-up by the State Welfare Commission will come after it has been put into operation, after which the distribution of commodities is indicated to begin. He was not sure just when, after March 22, this distribution would be started.

The March 22 registration of applicants will be used to determine how much of what commodities are to be provided to be distributed, he said.

At the present the list of commodities which will be distributed, when the set-up is completed, includes dry beans, print butter, process cheese, nonfat dry milk, shortening, milled rice, flour, and corn meal.

The Matador newsmen not only had complete news and picture coverage for his own newspaper Thursday morning but in the all-night vigil he and his staff gave complete and accurate news of the event to all the regional newspapers and afforded Associated and other press services with all the information desired.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — After hours of fierce debate, the House voted by a surprising 149-101 to attack the state's fiscal problems by driving objects and parts, utilities, watches, construction materials, soft drinks, beer, wine, liquor, restaurant meals.

The approach advocated by Gov. Price Daniel and Speaker of the House James Turman has submitted an omnibus tax measure which he says will bring in \$283,000,000 over a two-year period. It is backed by Governor...

Hinson's bill includes levies on natural gas pipelines, power, stock transfers, jewelry and construction materials. The bill would provide revenue for an \$800 a year teacher pay raise and other spending but not aimed at wiping out the deficit.

Rep. John Allen of Longview and Forrest A. Harding of San Angelo are proposing an even bigger one. It is a 2 per cent general sales tax to raise an estimated \$317,000,000.

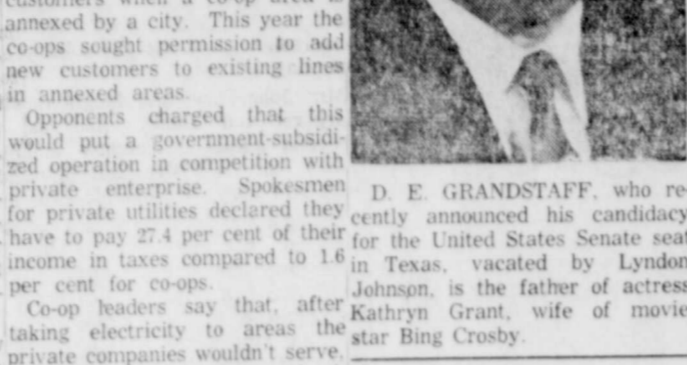

ANNEXXING CURB PASSED — No longer would Texas cities be able to reach out and annex "all about doors" under a bill passed 128-103 by the House.

It provides that cities would be encircled by a zone in which they would have control of building and sanitation codes, but would not have taxing powers. A portion of this zone could be annexed each year.

Also, cities would be required to get city utilities to an annexed area within three years.

LOAN LAW SOUGHT — House Banking Committee is engaged in one of the sessions' toughest and most difficult tasks — hammering out new regulations for the small loan industry.

A constitutional amendment voted by the people last November removed the blanket prohibition against interest of more than 10 per cent and gave the Legislature authority to set interest rates and regulate the loan industry.

Five bills are under study. In general, they provide for a maximum charge of 3 per cent per month on loans under \$100, less for larger loans. Whether credit insurance should be included in maximum charges allowed is one of the questions at issue.

NEW INSURANCE RATE BILL — As a new approach to auto insurance rates, Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo has introduced a bill to require legislative approval of State Board of Insurance orders.

LAST-MINUTE FLOOD — Passage of the 60-day mid-point in this session ended the period when bills may be introduced without special consent. A flood of new bills came in under the wire. Among them are measures that would allow voters to put an "X" by the name of the person they wish to vote for instead of scratching all others on the ballot; provide for a 10 per cent merit pay raise for teachers to be awarded by local districts and financed 50-50 by state and districts; provide penalties for law enforcement officers who come out of "ambush" to arrest motorists; require children entering the first grade in public schools to have polo shots; increase workmen's compensation insurance benefits to a maximum of \$30 per week.

Another Bonus For Light Plant Assured City

The Superior engine installed by White Diesel Motor Co., under contract with the city in 1958, continues to be a show piece, considerably to the city's advantage.

White has had several Texas prospects here to show off the engine every month or so and has flown in officials from as far away as Louisiana and Arizona communities to see the machine in operation.

The city's advantage comes in by the continued application of advanced engineering, for which the company appears to be sparing no cost.

In 1959 they spent, they estimated, \$28,000 on the engine to re-do it into a new model. They are to spend another \$6,000 in this month while the city's pay load is light, of which the city is to be billed for \$672, to make it over into a 1961 model engine.

The big unit was bought by the city on a re-bid at a figure \$60,000 less than the original bid. Councilman Martin and the light department have been impressed with the performance of the unit.

Electric Ranges Make Easier For The Homemaker

Electric range "built-in" ranges, counter-top surface units are complimented by built-in ovens, placed at convenient height to avoid stooping. In a large household you can have two oven units if you wish, instead of just one — or two surface unit sections that will take care of as many as 8 utensils at one time.

Two Things At Once

In the conventional electric ranges, there are models where all in one oven — you can do two things at once — that is, bake and broil, roast and broil, or bake and roast. Each section has its own controls. In other words, you can roast a turkey and bake a cake at the same time, in the same oven — and have each come out perfectly.

Regardless of the model, with an electric range cooking is clean, so the kitchen stays clean longer, too, and comfortably cool. And with it the bride can cook meals far better than Grandma used to make.

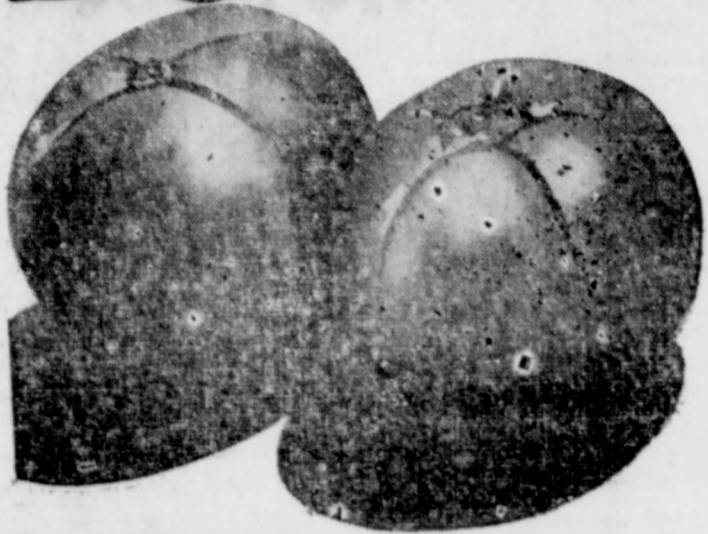
