How To Farm. Fortunately for the country, especially that part of it where The Hesperian is predominant, this newspaper has good advice for all and sundry. For instance, how to farm in a year like this. Save a great deal of expense and trouble this spring. Mulch the ground with something, then streak it off and plant it. The hard pan is soft enough and will be even in the summer, that deep roots will penetrate it. One year they had a winter and spring somewhat like this and the men who spent the least money on their land had the most crop. They had so much maize and cotton they were still gathering it the next March. Quite

The fact is, there is not any particular mystery about voting and there is not anything wrong with the Texas way, so far as the voter is concerned. The judge of the election when you make your intentions "reasonably plain" is charged with the duty of counting your ballot, and that is what he will do. All the things that are wrong with the Texas Election Law are matters of administration, that is, jobs for the election committee and the party chairmen, county and state. A committee of half a dozen informed Democratic chairmen from over the state could re-write the law in a week, so that it could be followed. We mention Democratic committeemen for the reason they have had the experience trying to follow the law, every two years.

Sugar Beet News. The present law on sugar peet production expires March 31, which means that Congress will either take care of the producers in the southwest who want to get into the business soon, or that it will not. The pending bill is favored by the Department of Agriculture, the State Department and the House Committee on Agriculture. It provides for a 21-month extension on the present stop-gap law. This law contains no language that would enable new domestic growers to get into sugar production. It does not take advantage of the present situation in Cuba. Since this is March 23 mighty few days remain for southwesterners to muster their votes in Congress and see what can be done about the matter.

Congressman Mahon maintains that the new grower demands can be t without excluding Cuban growers from future consideration when relations with that country have improved.
