

Schools, City, Senator Elections Are Slated

Voters Pass On School Matters Saturday; City, Senator Apr. 4

Floyd County residents, particularly those in the cities of Floydada and Lockney are in for a lot of voting between this date and Tuesday night. Saturday the entire county will vote on trustees for their respective school districts and in Precincts 1 and 2 they also will vote for county trustees. On Tuesday the county-wide vote will be in the 70-candidate U. S. Senatorial race, and in the cities in addition, a vote for municipal officials.

Election Code Governs

All voters are required to vote in the precinct of their residence. The polls will open at 8 o'clock and close at 7 o'clock in all boxes.

There are no tax matters to be voted upon so that all the citizens of the county having poll tax receipts or exemptions will be eligible to cast ballots.

School Candidates

In Floydada School District with two to elect, the candidates are four in number, namely: W. L. Davis, W. E. Garrett, Howard R. Gregory, and Edell R. Moore.

In Lockney School District, with two places to be filled on the school board there are four candidates, namely: Chas. Boedeker, C. L. Mooney, Walter Taack, and Chester Mitchell.

Also to be voted on in Lockney Independent School District is the matter of the abolition of the dual public school system. The names of the candidates and the propositions on the abolition of the dual system are on separate tickets.

In the county school trustee election only the names of the present incumbents have been indicated as candidates for election. They are:

In Precinct No. 1, Milton Evans, and in Precinct 2, H. E. Frizzell. Both names were petitioned on the ballots.

Voting places in the school trustee elections will be as follows: Floydada, at the county court room; Lockney, at the high school building; Providence, South Plains, Lakeview and Dougherty, in their respective school houses.

City Elections

The voting places in the city elections Tuesday will be at the city halls, respectively, in Floydada and Lockney.

At Floydada the ballot will have three candidates for mayor. They are:

Harmon W. Roberts, retired farmer and business man; and S. W. Ross, veteran lumber and appliance dealer; and W. Perry Smith, former police chief of the city.

For aldermen the city ticket offers Melvin Henry, manager of the Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Lon Davis Jr., grain dealer and farmer, and Aldine Williams, manager of the Floydada office of Production Credit Association.

At Lockney, the same as at Floydada, a mayor and two aldermen are to be named.

The mayor's race at Lockney is a three-cornered affair, with J. E. Cox, incumbent, seeking reelection, and G. M. (Bud) Brunner and O. C. Bailey challengers.

The councilmen's race has three candidates seeking two places. They are W. G. Hodel, Jimmie Stennett, and Austin Meriwether.

Stovall Hopeful Senate Will Back Home Growers

Richard F. Stovall, who returned Friday from Washington, D. C., where he went with a group from the Texas plains to work for a Sugar Law that would permit Texas-planted sugar beet acreage, to be included, said he felt all is not lost. At least the situation is not as hopeless as press reports indicate.

His delegation got to Washington in time to see the House of Representatives adopt an act that would extend the law from March 31, this year, for a period of 21 months. This represented a defeat for the domestic sugar growers. The Senate Finance Committee has been conducting hearings this week on the bill. Some sort of bill has to be passed there and sent to the house before the expiration of the present law on March 31.

Stovall said the Texas delegation is hopeful the law will not be extended more than nine months. This would be a victory for the domestic producers, he says.

Licensed By Supreme Court While he was in the capitol city Stovall was admitted to practice before the U. S. Supreme Court. In his appearance before the court he was presented by Representative George Mahon of the 19th District.

Incidentally, he said, Mahon is carrying a heavy load as chairman of the subcommittee on defense appropriations and is working long, hard hours.

Scholastics Number Above 3 Thousand

County Superintendent Clarence A. Guffee last weekend, completing his report to the State Education Agency on the scholastic census in Floyd County, showed 2,967 pupils enumerated in the six school districts that make up the county's school system.

In Floydada the scholastic population, he found, was 1,638, of which 213 are classified as colored.

At Lockney the total enrollment is 1,160, of which 121 are colored. South Plains is the third largest school in the county with 132 total enumerated, 12 of these Negroes.

At Lakeview the figures are 69 and 5 for a total of 74; at Dougherty 79 and 5 for a total of 84, and Providence 87 and 5 for a total of 92.

At this time the enrollment in the four areas which have been sliced off of Floyd County into other counties for school purposes, is not known here definitely.

Last year the figure was 90, and it is not thought the figure will vary largely from this number this year. Thus the total actual scholastic population of the county will run above 3,000.

These areas are adjacent and tied to Flomot Independent School District in Motley, Quiktae Independent School District in Briscoe County, Petersburg Independent School District in Hale County and Plainview Independent School District, none of which are under local supervision.

The figure supplied to the local superintendent's office on these areas come from the State Education Agency.

From these seven, three young ladies will be selected to compete for the title "Miss Floydada". There will be also an alternate and second place winner.

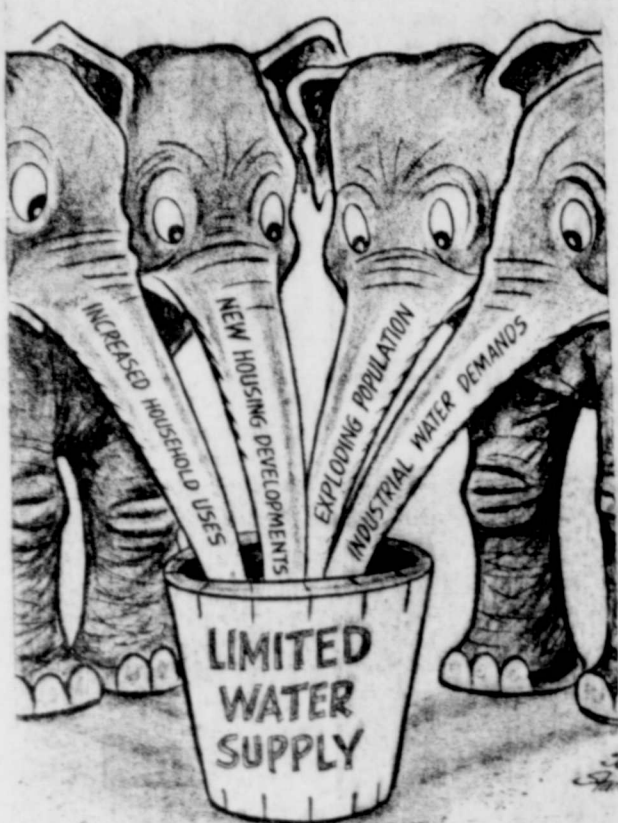

A Lot of Suction



The tremendous pull on water supplies—because of increased household uses, new housing developments, an exploding population and increased industrial demands—means many municipalities must increase their water facilities to meet today's and tomorrow's needs.

Another Cash Crop. Among the products of the farm which are not in some type of controlled production and marketing program guar beans have become popular in some parts of the state.

Demagoguery is Rampant. Although, as The Hesperian noted recently, pari-mutuel gambling on horse races in Texas is one of the most unlikely things that could happen, this has not prevented some demagogues from shouting alarm to the people of Texas as though such a measure were about to be adopted by the legislature.

Floyd County Down-Rated. Evidently lack of votes is the reason not a single candidate for U. S. Senator has made his appearance in the county, and none have solicited votes here except by long distance and through friends.

Different Out West. Transplanted Texans, moved to New Mexico and Arizona, find themselves in the midst of political activity. The number of votes to be had is relatively so much smaller a person finds himself hobnobbing with senators and representatives and governors before he realizes it.

Vote Nearer Home. More important to the local problems of the communities of Floyd County are the votes for city and school officials. In the school trustee elections Saturday is the day, in the cities it is Tuesday, same day on which the vote will be cast for senator.

State Health Department reports that 95 young Texans were struck down by diphtheria in the months of January and February. This seems incredible when measures for diphtheria control are so well-known and so effective.

Vote For Wright. There are two or three dozen names of good men out of the 70 on the ballot, who would make good senators, some of whom you do not even know. There are six men who have a mathematical chance to be on the run-off ballot. One of these is Jim Wright, the Weatherford man, who is presently serving the Fort Worth Congressional District in the House of Representatives.

Spoiling a Ballot. If you spoil a ballot — they speak of it as mutilating — through carelessness or otherwise, call your election judge and turn the ballot over to him to dispose of, at the same time asking for another ballot.

Senator Blakley: We have every respect for the present senator, Mr. Blakley, who aspires to succeed himself and possibly will be in the run-off. But the difference of 20 years or so in the ages of the two men—Blakley and Wright—makes the difference to us. Don't think for a minute that Gov. Daniel appointed Mr. Blakley to the post of interim senator without due consideration for the stature of the man.

Could Be. To us it is improbable that Mr. Maverick will be the high man, second only to Mr. Tower, and thus representing the Democrats in the run-off. Our logic is that the San Antonian's over-playing his support of the new president. It is to be taken for granted that a senator from Texas would give largely of his support to a Democratic president. But Texas would not like a rubber stamp senator, given a chance to do better. But with the vote split up like it is likely to be, he may nose out such men as Jim Wright. There are many, many votes in South Texas. Depends on how many of them he carries.

To Count. The job of counting and reporting the vote next Tuesday might not be as big as it seems. But just handling that many names would seem to be a considerable task. It is quite possible that as many as 50 of the candidates will not get any votes in this county. The Hesperian will report for the Texas Election Bureau, as has been our job for some time in the twenties.

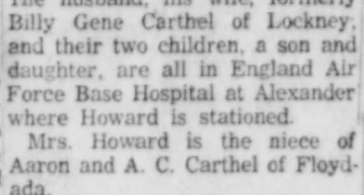

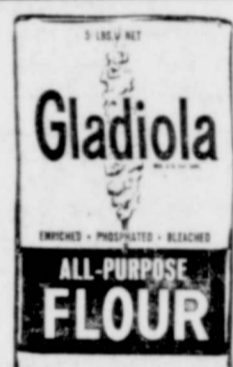

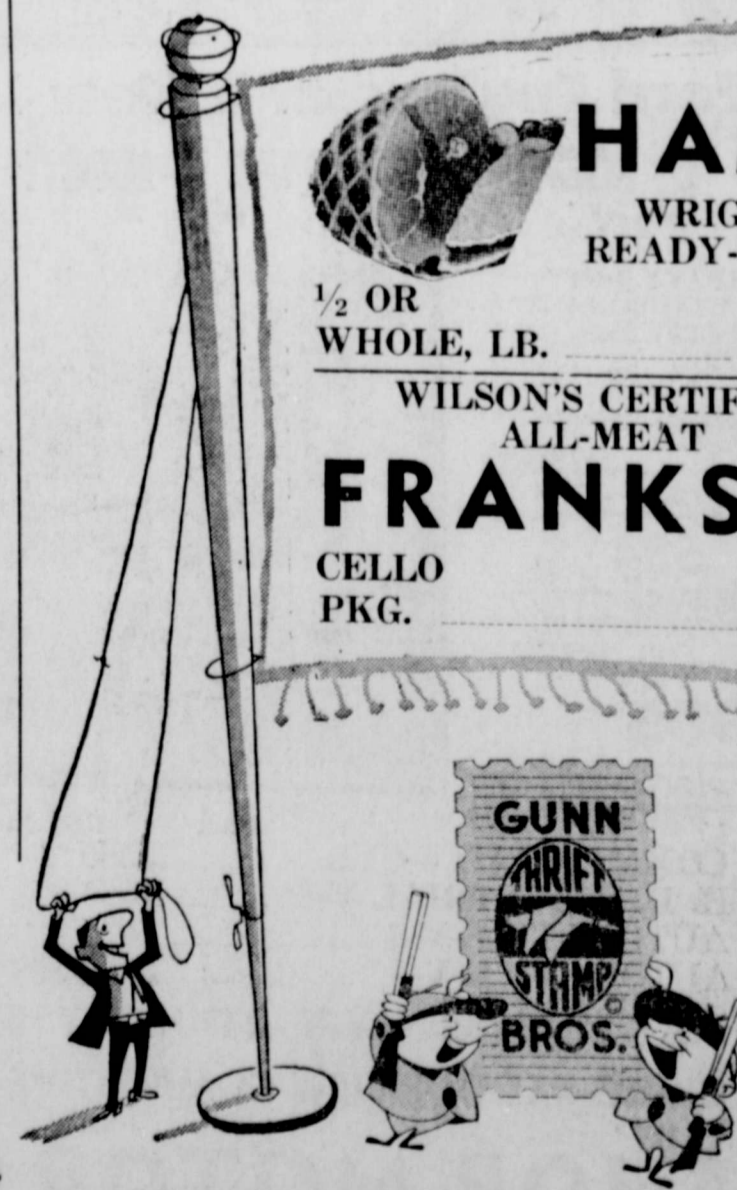

The vibrations in the sky they are that accompany the noise do worry a good many shake houses and it is not in the area, when they conceivable that damage to a sound barrier some- on as two or three the probabilities. Since the operations are considered a part of the national defense effort and are not done by commercial or private planes the question of what can be done about it legally resolves itself into one of whether the damage can be established beyond reasonable doubt. Investigations seem to indicate that, aside from the damage to edgy nerves, the explosions are usually harmless. When operations of the military actually result in loss or damage the Defense Department has been not reluctant to consider claims and to remunerate losers. Usually when a complaint is lodged, if the circumstances are explained, the complaint is shrugged off by the complainant and the matter is dropped there. An area about 400 miles long and about 50 miles wide through West Texas is in the "pattern" of the practice flights by the supersonic planes, it is said.

When you add this product to your rinse water, it gives softness or fluffiness to all washable fabrics. It will reduce wrinkling and make ironing easier. Often used on infant's garments. Brightener. A product which clings to fabrics like a dye to produce greater whiteness or brightness. Brighteners are included in most washing products, but are also available separately. Rinse conditioner. To be used in your first rinse to prevent minerals in hard water from forming a curd. It will also redissolve detergent residue from previous washes. Water softener. There are two types: One "locks up" minerals in hard water to prevent them from forming curd or film. The other combines with the minerals in hard water and forms insoluble particles that settle to the bottom. 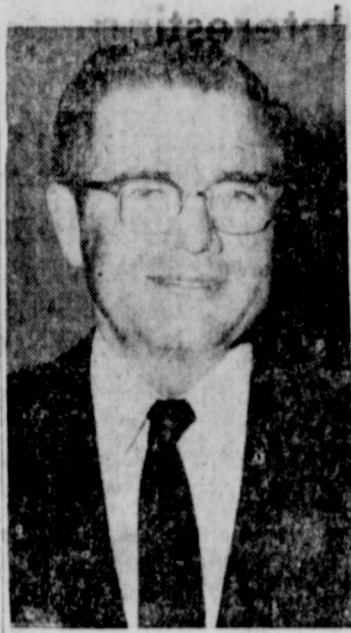

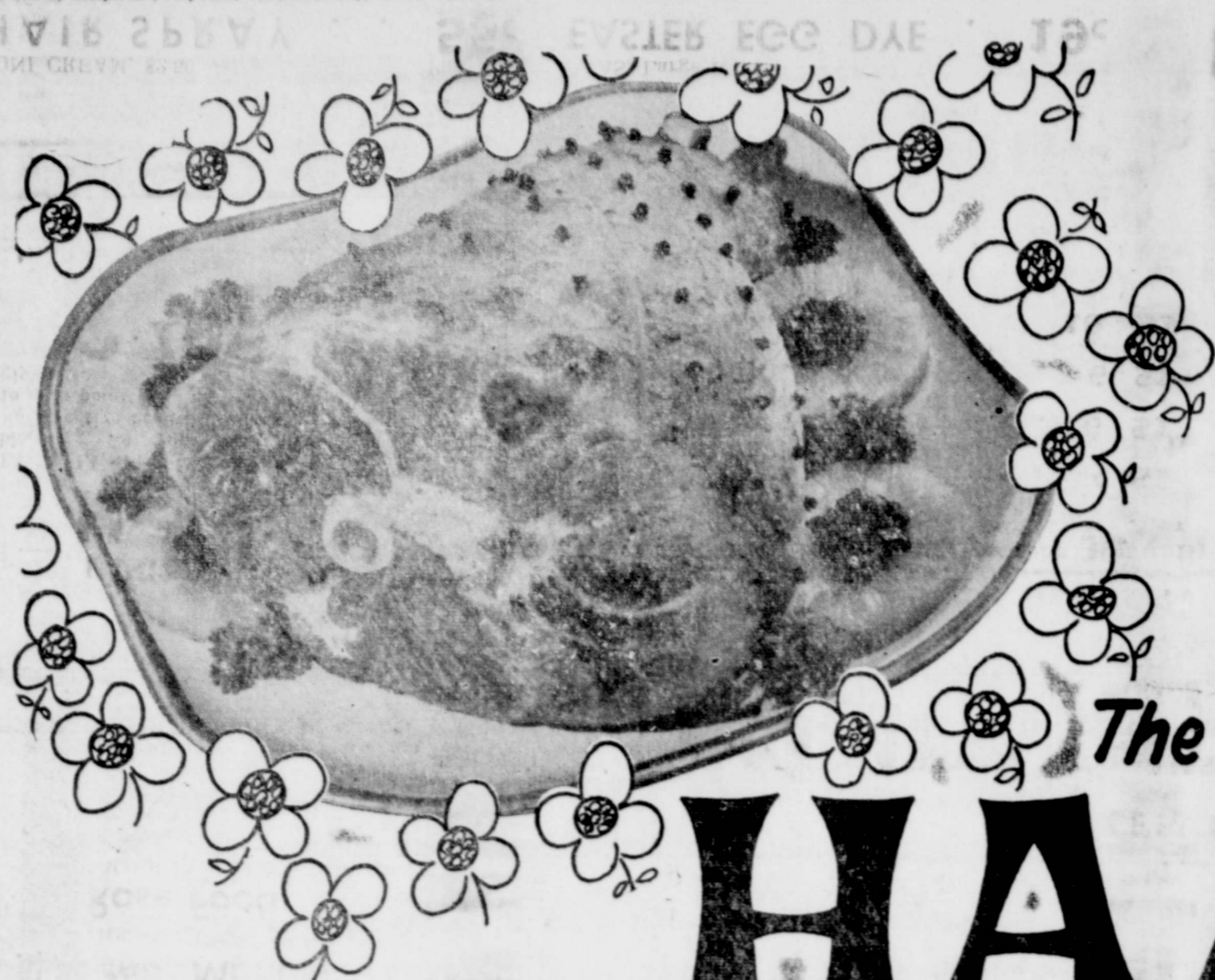
