S. W. Ross was elected mayor of Floydada Tuesday in a relatively quiet election, which also saw Lon Davis Jr., and Aldine Williams chosen for places on the city council.

The unofficial count gave Ross for mayor 272, H. W. Roberts 198 and W. Perry Smith 57. And for councilmen, Davis 348, Williams 308, and Melvin Henry 236.

Ninety-three write-in votes were cast for M. S. Robertson, retiring councilman, 26 for M. H. Martin, also retiring, two for T. L. Holland and one for Sam Hale.

Total vote cast in the mayor's contest was 527. None of the candidates were active in their own behalf.

In a different setting, in another state, another period in history, or under other circumstances, several of these men would have been top contenders for the senatorial honor. Among them is a retired army man with a string of medals, another is an educator of outstanding qualifications, beloved of his classes. Even Davy Crockett had a descendant in the race. He is a grandson six generations removed. And so on.

Which is one of many reasons why Texas should have been divided into fewer states, of greater geographical oneness. As it is now in practically every issue there is a conflict of interest between the various parts of the state. And to run for office in Texas! One must have a million or know where he can get it.

Italy, Texas. Blown apart by the winds of mischance last week, the town of Italy, Texas, Ellis County, blackland community, was hard hit. A storm of cyclonic nature, whipped right through the principal street of the little city. Offered classification as a disaster community and offered federal aid, the citizens' first reaction was "No." The federal government needs the money worse than they do, they told their congressman. Whatever amount was intended for Italy, Texas, please apply to the national debt!

Green Bugs. We will be the last to know of it, probably, since we get out so little, but if there is any greenbug infestation in this county the report has not come to our attention. There are areas, in the panhandle where the terrific crop is threatened, according to report. Wichita Falls, Vernon, Childress and north of the Canadian River give spotted reports of aphids.

Primary Roads. We don't go along with the new president (not the one we had for eight years before) on the need to raise more money for the Primary Road System. That thing needs to go into a coma for awhile. The people who have set their traps to snare a \$40 billion windfall on this deal need to see their profits wither on the vine. Stopping the (emergency) 1-cent federal tax will be one way to help. Washington bureaucrats have a way of persuading your congressmen they know more about what you need than you know. In fact they often have a way of making your congressman feel impotent when he does not do their bidding. But, anyway, write him. Tell him to vote against keeping the federal one-cent gasoline tax. There'll be plenty of money left to do the things the public really needs to have done.

Abashed Admission. Is our own federal government getting in the bad graces of the people who pay the taxes? We have suspected as much. Federal budgets seem no more to reflect the current wishes or judgments of the people. But ours has by nature been the position that the authorities are entitled to our support in their efforts to serve the country. Recently, before Kennedy, we had begun to have doubts. Now, evidently our doubts are shared, and in a way we'd have blushed to say. To pinpoint what we mean, a slogan going the rounds says: "Pay your income tax early — Help some promoter with a government contract." This means all that it says — and a lot more. We worry for fear this type of thinking is growing in the country and that our Congressmen, with their heads in the clouds, do not realize it.

"The history of liberty is the history of the limitations upon the power of the government. When we resist the accumulation and the concentration of governmental power, we are resisting the process of death, because accumulation and concentration of governmental powers always precedes the death of human liberty." — Woodrow Wilson.

The Sugar Law. The Congress finally passed and sent to the president a Sugar Law that extends the present arrangement for a period of 15 months. Southwesterners appearing before the Senate and House committees had asked an extension of less time, but the 15 months arrangement, probably a compromise, is looked upon as a favorable outcome, especially since the congress promises to begin hearings on the subject at once. American producers want to get their viewpoint before a congress that is playing favorites against their own people. Things are not always what they seem, but it does not seem unreasonable to ask: Who has a vested interest in seeing that our sugar is not grown in the United States?

We definitely are for letting the special federal one-cent gasoline tax expire on June 1. We intend to write our congressman and our senator as much in so many words. We suggest you do the same. We don't want to compromise. We want to win this point. We want to see just one federal tax of some kind come down instead of going up.

Texas is a tremendously rich state and has not anywhere near tapped all its tax resources. We are of this opinion. We believe there is no need for a sales tax nor an income tax. We admit some are over-burdened already but many also are not carrying a fair share of the tax load. Note we mention income tax in the same breath with sales tax. In every state where there is a sales tax there is also an income tax, or if not, the income tax is the next thing on the docket. Oklahoma once "solved all their tax problems" with a sales tax and Arizona did also. But they have fiscal problems now just the same as Texas does. In Oklahoma this is true even though they also have the income tax, too, now.

Texans get more for their tax dollar than do the citizens of any other state in the union. An authoritative research organization, privately financed, records this fact. As we mention this proudly, we point to the fact, as noted by Senator Andy Rogers that no large, growing, prosperous state even approaches our economy or low per capita ratio of taxes. But because this is true why take it as a reflection on Texas? Why be ashamed? Why isn't it all right to be the fiftieth state down the ladder? If we can be rid of the deficit in the state general fund, can give our teachers the raise they deserve, provide for the afflicted in our institutions, why not ask the legislature to do that and no more?

Nay, Nay, Not So. This column must be hipped on federal hijinks. Things that occur to us to write about the federal government also seem to have a critical or sarcastic twist. Perhaps it is not the government people who need a purgative but the writer needs a dose of old-fashioned paregoric. What we started to discuss was advertising paid for by the government for private government contractors. A senator charged in a speech the other day that the defense department was picking up the tab for half a billion dollars worth of advertisements, asking for various kinds of help for contractors and sub-contractors. That, we thought, was another canard. The senator ought to be ashamed. And so it turned out. The government is not spending a half a billion, it is only spending a lousy \$20 million! This probably makes sense in Washington but "way out yonder" where we are, it seems bad, very bad.

He Needs The Job. People of Texas, from the time of Sam Houston, Dr. Lamar, and their compatriots, have been prone to vote for the man who needs the job. People now do not know it, and can hardly realize that for three generations Texas people were so poor they "stunk," as the current slang would have it. And we still, in times of plenty, vote for the "man who needs the job." All unintentionally we overheard such a conversation the other day. It was in connection with the mayor's race. Our eavesdropping ears, since we were interested, heard the two agree to vote for Mr. So and So, because he needed the job worst.

Now Any Man, in a town the size of Floydada needs the job of mayor about as bad as he needs a hole in the head. The Mayor's job doesn't pay. It costs. Even in big Texas cities, it doesn't pay, it costs. So, if you feel friendly toward a candidate for mayor next voting time, remember you'll do him a financial favor to help defeat him.

Spring Weather. Although it is well known that such weather prognosticators as The Hesperian long since came out flatly for no more severe weather, the careful and cautious note that the meaquites still refuse to make leaves. Following advice of this column one would have had early gardens in the ground and everything. But the wheat men still feel squeamish. Wheat is "awful tall," and this is only April 6.

HOOMEMAKING HINTS

Eat Vegetables — For Daily Protection

In grandmother's day there were sulphur and molasses, saffron tea, and "store bought" tonic to "tone up" the blood each spring. Today this is done the year around by including a variety of vegetables in the diet. Green vegetables are important in the diet, mainly because of their vitamin A and C content. The intensity of the vegetable's green color and the part of the plant from which it comes are clues to its food value. In general, the greener the vegetable, the richer it is in minerals and vitamins. The dark green leaves may carry several times as much of some nutrients as green stalks. The fresher the green vegetables, the better. Flavor and crispness, and perhaps some food value, are lost when vegetables wilt or are stored.

If vegetables must be held for two or three days before using, refrigerate them. Keep them moist in the vegetable crisper, covered container, or in a plastic bag. Be careful not to bruise leafy vegetables in storing. Store peas and beans in the pod, if possible, to keep them fresh.

For best quality, cook green vegetables quickly. Use a cover on the pan to speed the process. Cook until the vegetables are tender but slightly crisp. Long cooking makes the vegetables limp and changes color and flavor and usually causes a loss of food value.

Flame Cultivation

If you are planning to try flame cultivation on your farm this year, there are some plans you must make now for proper working conditions. Planting in hole makes it impossible to use flame cultivation successfully. Planting flat or on a raised bed is the best way to follow through with the use of flame cultivation. The good practice of rotary hoe and cultivation should not be overlooked for they are still the cheapest and most successful way of controlling small weeds in young cotton.

4-H Club

4-H members are busy preparing demonstrations on crop production, Safety, Electricity, Soil and Water Conservation, Tractor Maintenance and many other topics for County and District demonstrations. By working on these demonstrations the 4-H boys and girls learn approved practices as well as public speaking. Seedling Disease Of Cotton

Good quality planting seed, soil temperature and seed treatment are the best means to control the seedling disease. Always plant the best seed available with a high germination. Soil Temperature at 60 degrees for 10 days will cut down on the incidence of these diseases.

Meanwhile, the House Revenue and Taxation Committee still has a lot of other tax bills in the mill. Three sales tax bills were sent to subcommittee, as well as a hotly debated proposal to levy a 10 percent tax on trading stamps.

A trading company spokesman said there is only a three percent profit on the operation and that a 10 percent tax would put them out of business.

On the other hand, stamps were attacked as a "counterfeit money" and an unnecessary burden on both merchant and consumer.

STRIKE THREE — Texas Supreme Court made short work of a 1959-passed tax law that many lawmakers had hoped would be a potent future revenue raiser.

Without issuing an opinion, the high court agreed with the trial court and civil appeals court that the severance beneficiary tax on gas is unconstitutional.

Although three state courts have turned thumbs down on the gas tax, the last chapter remains to be written by the U. S. Supreme Court. As passed in 1959, the gas tax was low (1 1/2 per cent of market value), but supporters had indicated that if the law survived its court battles, the rate would be raised to bring in more money.

LADIES SCORE IN HOUSE — House has passed and sent to the Senate a proposed constitutional amendment that would automatically erase all statutes that treat women differently from men.

Rep. Ben Atwell's very brief amendment states that "equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex." It passed the House 135-to-10.

Senators have misgivings about causing such sweeping changes in the law. Some 44 statutes would be affected.

LOAN FIGHT SHAPES UP — House members are coming to grips with one of the session's touchiest issues — regulation of small loan companies.

House Committee on Banks and Banking reported to the floor a bill authored by Rep. Criss Cole of Houston. It is being subjected to widespread criticism, but Cole, long-time veteran of the loan regulation effort, declared that no bill was going to satisfy all the interested factions.

Cole's bill sets up a sliding scale that would allow interest rates of just under 40 per cent on loans of \$100 and dropping gradually to about 11 per cent on a \$3,000 loan. It also allows for "reasonable insurance charges," at rates set by the State Board of Insurance.

Abner McCall of Waco, spokesman of a statewide committee for sound loan laws, said the interest rates were too high and that the limit on credit insurance charges should be clearly defined.

BREWERIES (PRO & CON) — Legal restrictions on breweries and the desirability of having breweries at all came up for spirited discussion before the Senate State Affairs Committee.

Rep. Don Kennard of Fort Worth is author of the House-passed bill that would give brewers of ale the privilege, as beer makers, to continue their operations in a territory after it is voted dry. It would also increase from one year to three years the time allowed a brewery to begin production after it got its license.

Walter J. Hicks Dies At Matador

Walter J. Hicks, 77 year old retired farmer of the Matador area, died Friday in his home. Funeral services were conducted Monday in the First Baptist Church in Matador with burial in the Matador Cemetery. The deceased was an uncle of Mrs. Wayne Billington of the Sand Hill community.

Mr. Hicks had farmed near Matador since moving there in 1925. He retired in 1933 and moved into Matador.

Survivors include a daughter, two sons; one brother; eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

A large out-of-state manufacturer of ale is planning to build a \$20,000,000 plant in Tarrant County. Any change would, of course, affect the whole state.

Supporters of the bill emphasized the new jobs and payroll it would create. Opponents, mostly ministers and church leaders, declared it would contribute to the problems of alcoholism.

PHONE RATES STUDIED — House State Affairs Committee is studying a bill by Rep. Dan Struve of Campbellton that would place regulation of telephone service, within the state's borders, in the hands of the Texas Railroad Commission.

Representative Struve says Texas is one of two states that do not have this sort of regulation and that other states have lower rates.

Other witnesses testified that a long distance call within Texas borders costs more than one of the same distance that crosses the state line.

PRE-PAID FUNERALS DEBATED — Funeral directors and cemetery operators clashed before both House and Senate committees over a bill to restrict pre-paid funeral arrangements.

Funeral directors declared that their only desire was to protect the public by requiring that money paid in advance for funeral expenses be put in a trust fund. Cemetery and mortuary operators retorted that the funeral directors wanted to discourage pre-paying of funeral expenses. They contended that families who make funeral arrangements at the time of bereavement spend more money than if arrangements are made in advance.

SHORT SNORTS — A test vote in the Senate indicated that Sen. Dorsey Hardeman's proposal to abolish the Court of Criminal Appeals and transfer its duties to the State Supreme Court, is short of enough support for passage.

Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston says he will introduce a bill to allow nurses registered in other states to practice in Texas, thus to help alleviate the shortage of registered nurses.

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S. Simmons Instructs in Study of Heavens

Walter S. Simmons, son of Mrs. J. T. Huckabay, since being stationed at the engineering school he has been training in map and aerial photography interpretation, mathematics and drafting. These assist in providing ground control data for military photogrammetric mapping and artillery purposes.

After completing the course he has been named an instructor at the base.

The base newspaper, reports the activities of these instructors and the students who star gaze in this manner:

Although the stars may commonly be thought of as the scientific domain of astronomers, navigators, and spacemen, the surveyor—with his feet planted firmly on the ground—also uses the stars as an aid in establishing accurate dimensions, or azimuths. To train its surveyors—who cannot schedule their classes for cloudless nights—the Survey Branch, Department of Topography, USAES, operates the only Army planetarium in the metropolitan area.

Constructed at a cost of \$18,000, the planetarium has been in use since 1950 on the second floor of Bagley Hall, where a hemisphere twenty feet in diameter extends far up into the steel superstructure of the building.

Entering through double-door vestibules with their black walls, a visitor feels as though he has stepped into an over-sized ping-pong ball as he beholds the white interior of the fiberglass dome that forms both wall and ceiling. By use of a projector located in the center of the room, the planetarium instructor—Sp4 Paul Walter Simmons and Sp4 Paul F. Brodersen—can duplicate the appearance of thousands of stars as they would appear from any particular place on the earth's surface at any hour of the year.

The projection device consists of a twelve-sided geometric box with a single light inside. By use of pin holes drilled in the box, points of light are projected on the dome to represent stars.

For major stars and planets, small lenses are added to the pinholes to project the planet in its proper brilliance and color. Additional parts of the projector will show the moon, or superimpose a grid system or triangulation system on the dome to aid the students in their work.

Nor has the space age, with its satellites roaming the heavens, been neglected by the planetarium: a special auxiliary projector recently installed, can trace any of the satellites in its trip in outer space.

Actual control of the projector is maintained at the large console control panel located in the center of the fifty-seat room. Manipulation of the various switches and dials on the panel must be accomplished in total darkness since any light would seriously distract the students.

Two engineer school courses—Topographical Surveying and Topographical Computing—regularly use the planetarium. Students of certain other courses receive brief orientations in the planetarium, as do VIP's visiting Fort Belvoir. For these briefings, tape-recorded commentaries are used.
