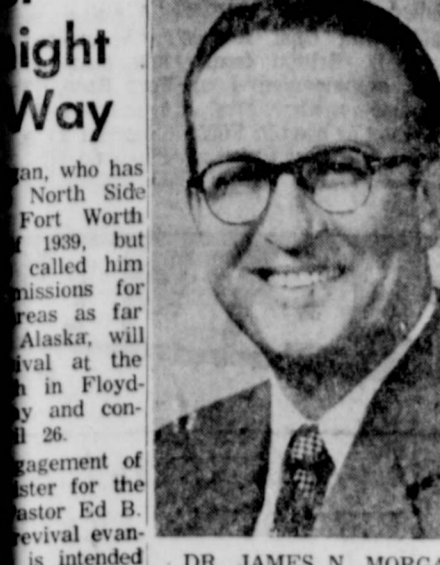

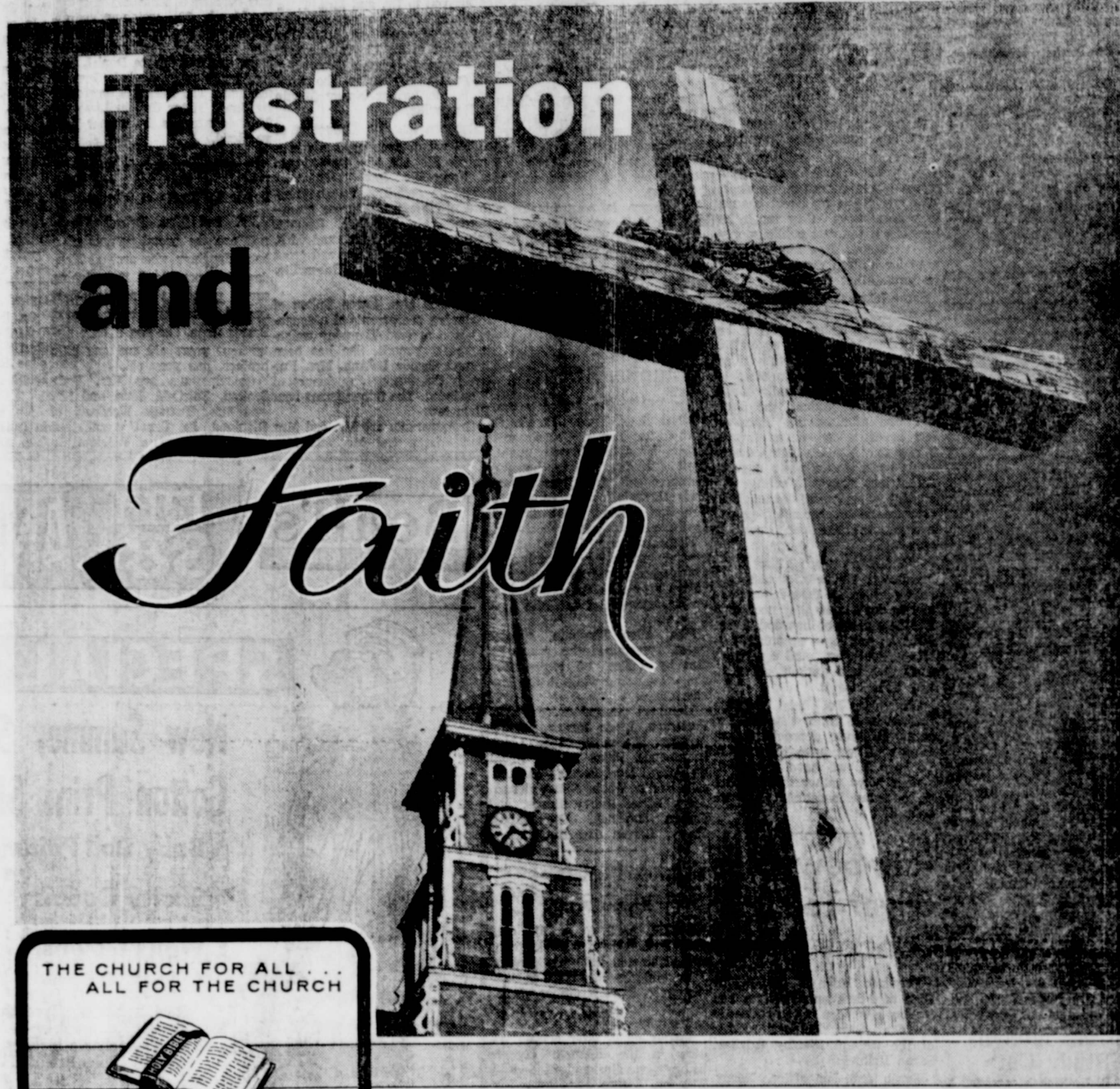

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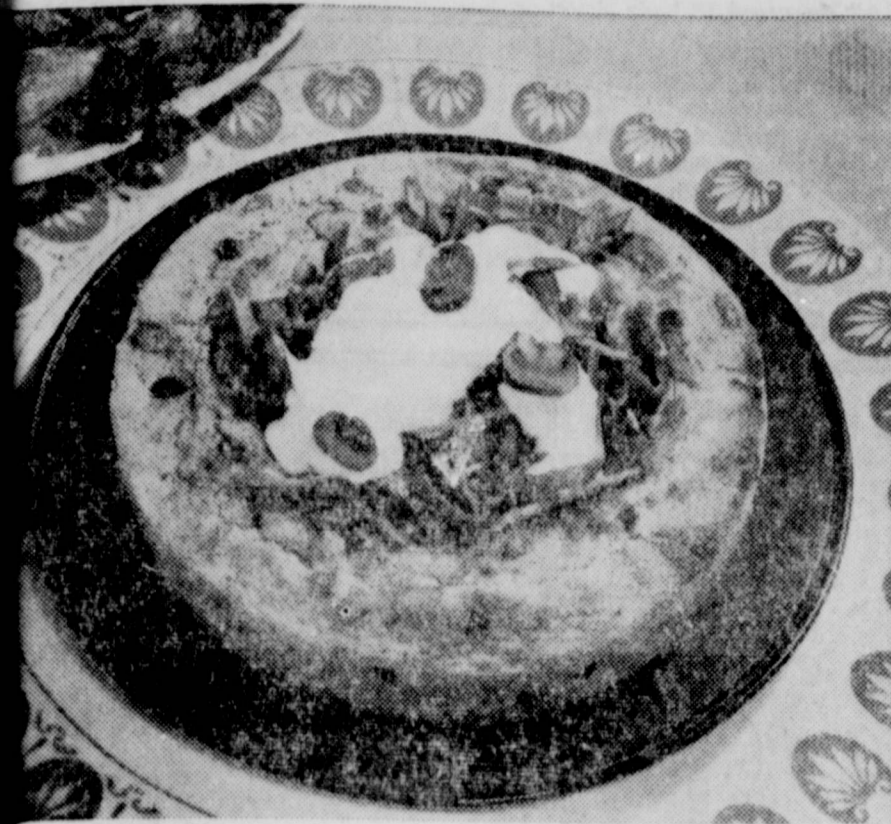

**Spring Garden
 Corn Bread Recipe**
 This recipe is a tasty, easily prepared corn bread with tempting appeal.
GLADIOLA
 "Spring Garden Dinner"
 Corn Bread
 3 tbs. minced onion
 3 tbs. chopped green pepper
 3 tbs. butter or margarine
 2 cups Gladiola Cornmeal
 3 tps. Gladiola Baking Powder
 1 tsp. sugar
 1 tsp. salt
 1 1/2 tsp. poultry seasoning (optional)
 2 tbs. chopped pimiento
 1 egg, well beaten
 1 1/2 cups milk
 Over medium heat, cook onion and green pepper in butter or margarine until transparent but not browned. Preheat oven to 450 degrees (hot). While combining ingredients, place well greased pan (see sizes below) in oven to heat. Sift together the cornmeal, baking powder, sugar, salt, and poultry seasoning. Stir in chopped pimiento. Combine milk and egg and add, stirring smooth. Last, add butter, cooked onion and green pepper. Spoon batter into sizzling hot pan and bake 20 to 25 minutes until done. Serve hot. Makes 8-10 servings.
 Suggested pan sizes: 8-or-9-inch ring mold; 8 x 8 x 2 - or 9 x 9 x 2-inch square pan; 10-inch skillet (if skillet is iron, bake bread about 15 minutes until set in center, then place under the broiler a moment or so to brown the top).
 For delicious variations, fill the center of a ring mold with creamed, garden-fresh vegetables or fill the mold with vegetables and top with cream or cheese sauce.

Election Code Needs Repair, Wells Writes

A letter from H. G. Wells to the people of the 19th District. In this day and time and in this area of the state the question of whether or not a person has the right to vote is certainly considered a closed issue, as the right to vote has been the privilege of citizenship that has been accorded ever since one of mature age, who is willing to pay a poll tax. However, there is a situation that exists in our state which has the effect of disenfranchising a large percentage of our qualified voters.

It may be surprising to you to learn, as it was to me, that in some precincts in Texas as many

as 63 per cent of those citizens who take the time and effort and expense to pay their poll taxes, go to the polls and cast their ballots, are not counted and are completely unaware of their disenfranchisement.

Many Ballots Not Counted

Statistics recently compiled show that in a large number of Texas counties an unbelievable large percentage of ballots were not counted because they were marked incorrectly. For example, in Colorado County, two precincts showed 29 per cent of the votes thrown out; another showed 27 per cent. Absentee voters, in this county, people intelligent and thoughtful enough to vote early in view of a planned absence on election day, lost 26 per cent of their votes — one out of every twenty-four who attempted to cast a ballot! Another precinct in that county failed to count 37 per cent of its votes. While an adjoining precinct showed less than 2 per cent of its voters disenfranchised. This is not an isolated instance.

In Waller County, 25 per cent of the votes were thrown out; in Edwards County, 20 per cent of the votes; and in one precinct in Anderson County, an unbelievably high 63 per cent were thrown out.

— almost two out of every three voters failed in their attempt to help elect a President.

The above statistics were compiled after the November general election and show a rather surprising picture, but actually this is not the worst of the story. From the results of the counties such as the ones mentioned above, it is rather evident that, in general, improperly marked votes were not counted. Yet, in a number of counties, the returns showed that as few as two votes out of every 100 were thrown out. This seems to lend credence to the view that judges in different counties count the votes differently and interpret our election laws differently.

Election Code At Fault

Actually, the election judges should not be criticized for this situation. Unfortunately, our election Code is responsible for this condition. Our Election Code is a maze of difficult-to-understand, contradictory, and conflicting provisions. Article 3.21 of the Election Code states that ballots on which the candidates of more than one party are left unscratched cannot be counted. Article 6.66 apparently allows such ballots to be counted if, in the opinion of the election judge, the intent of the voter is clear. In other words, if a judge relies on Article 8.21, certainly a larger percentage of the votes will be discarded than if he relies on Article 6.66.

This has caused a great discrepancy in the manner in which the votes are counted in different counties throughout the State. For instance, as already mentioned, in one precinct in Anderson County more than 63 per cent of the ballots were not counted, yet in the same county, one precinct had no votes thrown out.

While the exact total of votes not counted in the past election will never be known, because certified reports from only 215 counties are available.

Four bills have been introduced this session which are aimed at correcting this situation. They would simplify the method of voting by eliminating the present "scratch" method in favor of the "check" method used in the majority of the states today. They would further eliminate the contradictory provisions as to when a ballot can be counted so as to allow uniform enforcement of election laws throughout the state. What actually is needed and what has been called for for some time is a complete revision of our Election Code. In the meantime, these bills will go a long way toward insuring every citizen's priceless privilege to have a voice in his government.

With the situation that exists presently, every citizen of this state stands to lose his vote, either by the actual disqualification of his ballot or by cancellation of his vote by the counting of others' improperly marked ballots. None of us need be reminded that too many people in this world are denied the privilege of voting. We certainly should correct our present situation so that a voting citizen can be assured that his vote will count for something and so that a voter in District 89 can be assured that his ballot will have the same chance of being counted as a ballot that is cast in any of the other counties or precincts or districts of the State of Texas.

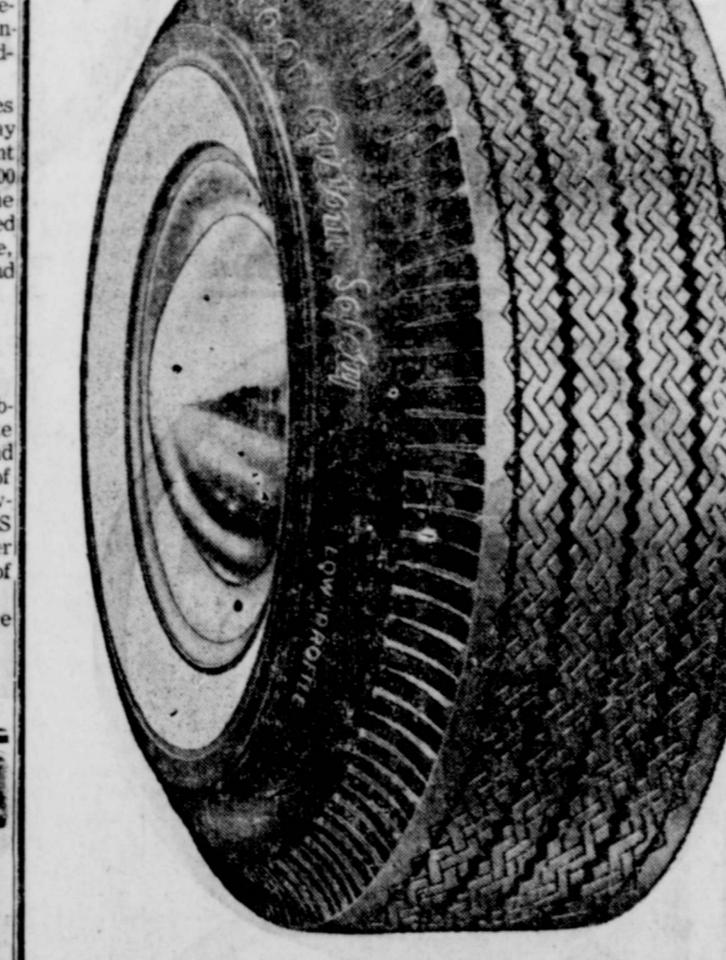
