LAWBREAKING WAS PERSONAL

THE MILL MAN'S DILEMMA

Cotton growers and the Department of Agricullture may finally get around to considering the advice of the manufacturer of cotton goods. For long the mill man has been obliged to buy cotton, the quality of which is "not based on the manfacturing potential but on the grade and staple." This may be news to the cotton grower in Floyd County and if it is news, perhaps he should begin to inquire around among the millmen. They are the customers to whom staple from our fields will go. In every avenue of endeavor the big question is whether or not the product will suit the intended buyer-in all except the cotton producing business. The mill men claim that the position of the mill is either ignored or neglected in both cotton production planning and ginning practice. This is a serious indictment, it seems to us. The mill men have a great amount of experience which should be considered in any cotton program. Also think on this: The domestic mill buyer has to stand aside and watch while foreign competition picks up American cotton about 25 per cent cheaper than it is available to our mills.





To those who are lax in their tax payments, and those who ignore their light, water and sanitary bills, to those who protest and ignore the ordinance prohibiting the use of certain streets for the tra portation of heavy loads, we feel should have enou civic pride to cooperate and try to keep the g things we have instead of abusing them.

We do not have any desire to try to regulate one's activities, but we do pledge to all that we do our best to protect the interests of our City keeping within reasonable bounds and try to P tect the investments we have in all these facilit

We further pledge to you that we will give eve expenditure made for the City with your mone careful examination and try to get full value. every dollar we spend.

We may be a little slow in getting to some thin which need doing but the lack of funds will sim prohibit haste.


