

A TIME TO COMMEMORATE-NOT COMMISERATE



TO COMMEMORATE - NOT COMMISERATE

Memorial Day is set aside to commemorate the dead of allwars-not a time to commiserate with the families of those who may die in traffic deaths during the up-coming holiday weekend.

Originally called Decoration Day when it was begun in 1868-to commemorate those who died for the Union during the Civil War-the day is now set aside to honor the dead of all wars, as well as a day of family commemoration.

For many, unfortunately, it is becoming a day to honor those loved ones killed on the highway. Last Memorial Day weekend-when it fell on a Monday -the traffic death toll reached 367, a total close to the 442 persons who died on the identical length Fourth of July weekend.

With spring in the air, and the winter time slush forgotten, remember that driving is a fulltime occupaton that can be as hazardous in clear weather as it was on winter's icy roads.

Follow these hints when you drive the four-day Memorial Day weekend:

1. Hold speed to 60 or below on the open road, and obey posted speed limits.

2. Put time of arrival at your destination last in importance, and your safe arrival first.

Stay away from the wheel if you've been drinking.

4. Keep your mind on driving - your car can't think for you.

5. Don't worry about personal problems-your full concentration should be on the road ahead.

Remember, commemorate the dead-but don't join them.

Michigan is another state where their "ideal" tax raising system was due to furnish an ever-ample supply of funds for schools and welfare, but where there has been recent serious stress and strain.

The longeared habitat of the lone prairie, once a major threat to spring-time farming operations of the early-day residents, in late years has become somewhat of a rarity. Once upon a time if one had nothing else to do a jackrabbit hunt was a natural. The hunter went out after jackrabbits knowing he was going to find them. When quarters began to be cramped disease and natural enemes made inroads on the rabbit population.

Comeback, if that is what it turns out to be, can be attributed to the Soil Bank and other lay-out programs that give the mule ears natural hiding places and room to multiply.

It is also noted that quail have become somewhat more plentiful, what with more natural cover and a chance to multiply in the weeds and grass of the lay out lands.
