Few Changes in 1945 ACA Farm Payment Plans

Rates of pay for the 1945 agricultural conservation program have been cut, according to the announcement made this week from the Parmer County AAA Office; but for the most part payments will continue to be made for the same practices which have been in effect in the past.

Under the 1945 program, a maximum farm allowance of 60c an acre is made for cropland, as compared with the 75c allowance under the 1944 program. However, the allowance of \$1.00 per acre for land used in the production of commercial vegetables is the same as the 1944 allowance. The 1945 program also allows \$1.50 an acre for conservation practices on commercial orchard land and six cents an acre for non-crop pasture land.

A few new practices will draw payments under the 1945 program, according to spokesmen of the county AAA office, who lists the reorganization and improvement of irrigation systems (where machinery must be used to level or grade the land) as a new practice. Payment will be made at the rate of six cents per cubic yard, not to exceed a maximum allowance of \$5.00 per acre.

Deep plowing to prevent wind erosion will also draw a conservation payment this year. Plowing must be done to a depth of not less than ten inches and the rate will be \$1.50 an acre. Another practice of interest to ranchmen having 640 acres or more of grassland will be pipeline construction. Payment for the laying of new, one-inch pipe will be at the rate of ten cents a foot. Laying of pipe up to two-inch size will be paid for at the rate of 21 cents a foot.

Quite a lot of interest was manifested and some very worthwhile plans were discussed. The pastor at large left Tuesday morning to return to his home in Oklahoma City.

Closed Season Limits On Fishing Removed By State Legislature

The Texas Legislature has officially removed all closed season limits on freshwater fishing in the State—and if anglers can stand the weather it is now perfectly legal to take fresh water fish, by hook and line or with artificial lures, at any time.

Restrictions which remain prohibit the keeping of any large mouth black bass, small mouth black bass or spotted bass less than seven inches in length; and rules as to the maximum daily catch are also in effect. The maximum catch on various species of black and spotted bass is 15, of which not more than ten shall be of greater length than 11 inches; white bass, maximum catch, 25; blue cat, channel cat and yellow cat, singly or in aggregate, 25; crappie or white perch, 25.

Fines for violation of the new fishing act range from \$5 to 50.

Another change is in the payment for construction of dams and reservoirs, payment for dams under the 1945 program being made at the rate of ten cents per cubic yard as compared with 15 cents under last year's program. On damless tanks, the rate will be eight cents per cubic yard.

There will be no unlimited practices under the 1945 conservation program, according to Collier's announcement. All payments must come within the maximum farm allowance of 60 cents per acre for cropland; \$1.00 per acre for commercial vegetables and six cents an acre for range land.

Good Start On Dairy Improvement Program in County

Eighteen heifers and a bull, all registered Jerseys, have been purchased recently by the members of the Friona F. F. A. Chapter. This program was given a boost by Leo Potishman, of the Transit Grain Company of Fort Wylie and also owner of the Santa Fe Grain Company of Friona, who put up \$1,000.00 through the Santa Fe Grain Company.

Eight of these boys have bought their heifers outright, while the other ten have received help from this dairy fund, made available by Mr. Potishman.

These heifers were purchased from the following breeders: Red Ashley, Tullia; I. H. Turney, Tullia; J. M. Hill, Tullia; and H. C. Wells, Friona.

All of the heifers have nice backing in the way of productive ancestry, and we hope to have more good dairy cattle in the Friona community soon.

The grand dam of one of the heifers purchased holds the State of Texas record of 947 pounds of butter-fat in 360 days.

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ODT to Handle Deferment of Transport Workers

New occupational deferment procedures for employees of transportation and related industries were announced this week by N. F. Nelson of Lubbock, district manager of the Office of Defense Transportation.

Under the new set-up ODT has been named as the agency to certify for deferment men listed as indispensable to the successful operation of transportation systems. The ODT is asking transportation employers to submit lists of key workers in the order of their importance, placing those whose loss would be most serious first on the list.

The district manager explained that no man may be certified for deferment if he is not doing work classified as indispensable, if he can be replaced by another man now doing less essential work, if another recruit can be trained to do his work within three months or if he is doing work connected with postwar production.

In order to have employees certified by ODT for deferment, employers in the transportation industry must submit, in addition to lists of their employees under 30 years of age, two sets of selective service Form 42-A Special (revised) and a certification that the lists and forms are being submitted to only one certifying agency. A fixed percentage of those on the lists may then be sent by ODT to local selective service boards for deferment.

Other information to be submitted with the lists includes the total number of employees as of Jan. 1 1945 exclusive of part-time employees. Sample copies of the lists and further information of procedures may be ob-

I am very happy to inform you that I have been getting the Friona Star regularly for the past few months. I can't think of anything appropriate to say except, thanks a million. I am still in the Pacific somewhere, but not in Hawaii, nor close by. This island I am on is very hot and it rains an awful lot here. There are lots of natives all over the place, and people say there is a tribe of head hunters far back in the jungle. As yet, I have my first of them to see. On the island there are all kinds of wild animals, huge snakes, lizards, bats, etc., which makes the place more interesting. If you like such things. What do you think of the war situation? Frankly I think this war could end real soon say, sometime in 1947. After the Germans are licked we still have a hard and tough fight ahead of us. As you have no doubt heard, these Japs are no pushover. I personally can vouch for that. The Japs think it is an honor to die for their country. All I can say to that is, there's going to be a lot of honorable Japs pretty soon. That's about it for now, so keep the paper coming and we will keep the Japs going. Good luck to all.


