CHOKE EM SOME MORE

Another big strike is on in the nation's ports. The watchdogs of our national effort on the water front do not seek more money, they ask for the power to enforce union wages, fringe benefits, working hours and the like on American-owned ships regardless of the nation of their registry. That is the crux of the matter, if we are correctly informed. The strike, of course, is not against the shippers. It is against the public, seeking more power to push us around. The Labor Department is trying to "settle it." What this has been meaning for a good many years is that the Labor Department is crowding the employers to come across.

WE'D BEGIN WITH SNUFF

Sales tax proponents want a general sales tax so as to get the tax load on a broad base. But in any proposals to date it appears they would begin with a great many expensive exceptions.

The more ardent sales taxers point to the fact that multi-thousands of Texans never pay any taxes of any kind. They refer to the bottom third of the population, income-wise. It so happens that more than half of the cost of law enforcement, a big part of the cost of welfare, of highway accidents, and the spread of communicable disease, can be laid at the door of this lower income segment of the state's citizenship.

Few of them vote, pay any of the tax bill. They are freeloaders. Their plight is the concern of the commonwealth, and do they cause much concern! To reach them by way of taxes the legislature will have to put the sales tax on a basis not yet espoused by any legislator we know of.

Where they need to begin, if they begin at all, is way down on the scale. We'd begin with snuff, if we began at all, which we wouldn't.

STRING ALONG WITH THE GOVERNOR

It can be noted by reading the newspapers that the sales tax does not solve a state's fiscal problems. Getting the tax load broad based does not keep the state's government from wanting more and more money for more and more things.

In New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arizona, the spending has caught up with the "broad based tax". In those states the tax argument is not for a broader bite, it is for a deeper bite. In Arizona all the legislature had to do was just to raise the percentage of the sales tax.

Better in Texas just to string along with the governor, resist all you can, as long as you can. He's more cagey than he gets credit for being, a belief we have held since the days when he first began to fight the "arrogant lobbyists" as a young member of the House of Representatives. Several times we have thought him beaten when he was

JULY FOURTH COMING UP

Usual mental reaction to a reminder of the imminence of a holiday these days is one of dread to hear the reports of killed and maimed. Stories relate the accident statistics of previous holidays, the Department of Safety announces its determination to help reduce the slaughter, and driver cautions are seen or heard on every hand.

This year the Department of Public Safety has announced its July Fourth Operation Death Watch. Official record of all traffic and non-traffic accidental deaths will be made. The DPS is going to make its forecast of holiday deaths next Sunday. Only twice in four years has the traffic toll been below the official estimate despite heroic effort.

DRIVE WITH LIGHTS ON

The trucking industry is mounting up a Drive Lighted and Live campaign for the Fourth, One may expect to see many trucks driving with lights on during the day-time on July Fourth to remind other people on the road that they are driving safely and legally.

The number of traffic miles traveled by Texans has increased considerably due to the increased number of automobiles on the road. Last year there were four and a half million licensed drivers on the road, along with many thousand unlicensed drivers. Seventy-eight thousand vehicles were wrecked.

These facts and figures and reminders are recorded somewhat in the line of duty. Maybe some of us will heed and be helped by the reminders.

HIGHWAY SAFETY VS. AIR SAFETY

Virginia Traffic News says that an automobile driver makes more decisions on a 10-mile trip than an airplane pilot makes in a flight from New York to Los Angeles. And it adds that there is another difference between the two pilots. Whereas the airplane pilot is alert every moment and has a watchdog co-pilot at his side, the automobile pilot often drives with his mind in neutral and his car in
