

Date Set For Invitational Golf Tourney

The sixth annual Floydada Country Club Invitational Golf Tournament will be held this year August 17 through August 20, it was announced this week by Bobby Westfall, host professional.

Qualifying rounds of medal play will be held on August 17, champion flight will play 18 holes match play on Friday, and Saturday and semi-finalists are to contest in 27 holes of medal play on Aug. 20, Westfall announced.

All other flights will have four rounds of 18 holes match play, of which two are to be played on Aug. 19.

Ronnie Craig of Lubbock, is defending champion. Craig took the final match and title last year by beating out Frank Freer of Lamesa, three times winner, and Howard Axtell of Lubbock, who won the fourth tourney.

In the 1960 tourney more than 150 golfers were bracketed in ten 16-man flights.

Prizes in all flights will be awarded. The winner of the meet will be given a set of irons, the runner-up a set of woods and the consolation winner a golf bag from the club's pro shop.

In addition to the prime interest in golf, entertainment for the golf families also is being arranged.

Friday night a free barbecue for the contestants will be given to be followed by bingo at the club house, and a juke box dance is announced for Saturday night.

Swimming pool and club house privileges will be arranged for all contestants and their wives.

Westfall anticipates a capacity list of golfers for the event. Invitations are being mailed out to clubs throughout the area.

The club's nine-hole course is laid out in a pretty setting, and fairways and greens are in excellent condition.

A. H. Manning Passes After Long Illness

A. H. Manning, 92 year old retired farmer and real estate dealer of Floydada, died in St. Mary Hospital at Lubbock Monday night at 9:56 after a long illness. Mr. Manning had been in Peoples Hospital for several weeks until sustaining a broken hip in a fall at which time he was transferred to St. Mary's.

The deceased was born in De Queen, Ark., on March 16, 1869, coming to Floyd County in 1910. He was married to Fleeta Flora Cunningham and five children were born to the union. She died in 1915.

Several years later he and Lillie Cunningham were married. She is among survivors, and a patient in Peoples Hospital.

Funeral rites were conducted yesterday afternoon in the chapel of the First Baptist Church. Rev. Ed B. Bowles, pastor officiated, assisted by Rev. Joe Wilson. Masonic burial rites were held at graveside.

Burial in Floydada Cemetery was under the direction of Harmon Funeral Home.

In addition to the wife, survivors include a son Vincent Manning of Petersburg; four daughters, Mrs. G. C. Hillburn of Floydada, Mrs. J. R. McSpadden, Lubbock, Mrs. G. A. Cook, Phoenix, Ariz., and Mrs. Carl Huckabay of Austin; 14 grandchildren and several great grandchildren.

Participants in the show should get in touch with the head of this committee and those planning to enter should be whipping up their acts, what with less than two months left before the event. Persons in Floyd County and adjoining counties are invited to participate in all events.

Friday promises to be a big day for the ladies, with a program as last year under the big tent. Mrs. Charlie Boetker and Mrs. Harry Morckel who are on the committee, reported at the meeting that their department was well in order.

Friday night has been set aside for the Gospel Singing which has proved to be quite a success.

Saturday has a full schedule with an Old Time Fiddlers contest, the Quarter Horse Show, the Tractor Contest and other events still in the planning stage.

Mrs. Alton Noland reported that some 70 names were on the mailing list for invitations to fiddlers to participate in the event. Eliminations are planned for 2 o'clock with the finals that evening. Music by the fiddlers will be enjoyed throughout the day.

Special features for this year's Fair will be exhibits of the Cross Missile from Fort Sill, Okla. The feature will be interesting to the public and will be shown free of charge with no cost to the association other than the lodging of one officer and five enlisted men who oversee the project.

Another is the Crime-Mo-Bile which will be on display and other exhibits promised by the arm-c service.

Settlements Speed Up On Right-of-Way Tracts

Court Expects To Final Job By Year-End

Although the Commissioners Court of Floyd County has a long way to go to final their job of providing four-lane right-of-way for Highway 70 from Floydada to the Hale County line, the number of negotiations had begun to thin down considerably when the court was in session this week.

Judge J. D. McBrien expressed the belief that there is no likelihood the right-of-way will be cleared for the Highway Department before December, possibly the first of the year. The court had anticipated clearing the land ready for a letting in this year, he said.

Of 23 tracts with which the court had to deal when they met in June five had been negotiated for this week, eight had been given notice of final offer, seven are negotiating with prospect of settlement, and a special commission had reported on one tract.

This leaves three tracts on which no offer has been made. Of these one is for right-of-way needed to be taken from the Santa Fe Railway in south Lockney and another is the bite to be taken from the National Alfalfa Mill Company's mill site, also in Lockney. On these two tracts the state appraiser's report was received only last week by the Commissioners Court. Both a state appraiser and an independent appraiser reported values on these two tracts.

Of the eight owners given final notice, all have 10 days in which to accept. After that time elapses the Commissioners Court will name a set of three special commissioners for each tract to make appraisal and report their findings to the court and the property owners.

Only such special commission so far appointed has valued a parcel of 12,311 acres needed for the Hattie A. McCleskey land immediately northwest of Floydada. This special commission was composed of Fred Battey, Arel Rainer and Sammy Hale.

The value they arrived at was \$7,386.60, or about \$600 per acre. The state appraiser estimated the value at \$4,310.00. The commission was appointed on June 2 and made their report July 6.

Cook has been teacher in the vocational agriculture department of the Floydada school for several years and had been re-elected to his post by the board of education.

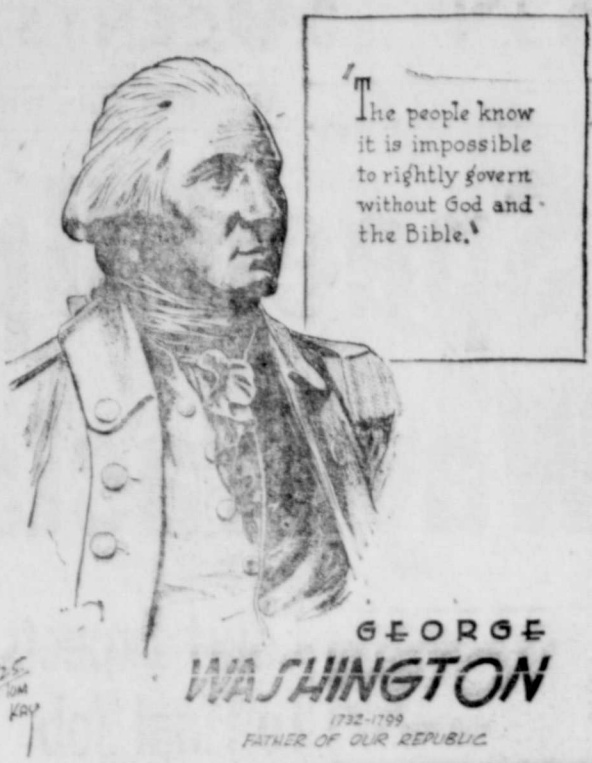
This week the school board had named Gerald Thompson of Pilot Point to fill the vacancy in the ag department but had not replaced Mrs. Cook at the Ward school.

SEEKING MORE AUTHORITY

One thing that practically all agencies in Washington have in common is a push for greater appropriations and greater power.

So one is not surprised that the U.S. Office of Education is calling for a five-fold increase in the personnel of the Office of Education.

NOT A FEDERAL PROBLEM

In a 56-page brochure is contained this blue print, although officially denied, as said above.

Since we are utterly opposed to centralization of authority over the education of the youth of the land, we consider the continued bombardment a threat to the welfare of the country.

SHOULD DO IT OURSELVES

No doubt the educational facilities of the country should be bettered. In Texas, although we have come a long way and are now spending several times as much for public education as we spent two decades ago, the educational facilities and teaching force needs to be augmented greatly.

The fact that facilities are lacking and teaching force is in short supply does not mean that we need to go to Washington to get somebody to do it for us.

A PRACTICAL SIDE, TOO

We have sympathy for the point of view of the dedicated teacher, who needs to be better paid. Some of these are so desperate they have ceased to care where the money comes from just so it is provided.

As a practical fact, in doing it ourselves we can deduct the tax we pay for education from our income taxes, whereas the other way round it is added to our taxes.

As has been said there is not much difference between more federal money for education and more money for federal education.

CHANGES IN THE HIGH COMMAND

If one will reflect it is not entirely out of the range of possibilities that the beneficent educators in Washington now in command can be succeeded in the bureau by some not so beneficent.

If we must make some mistakes in public education let us make them out where the children are being reared. Our greatest mistake would be to heed the men in Washington who are riding the trend with spurs set deep.

MUST WE SPOON FEED IT?

"All the world craves freedom" bellows the propagandist. "All the world needs education," says another. Each of them would lead us to believe that some way or other it is our job to go see about these people who crave freedom, these people who need education bolstered by a sizeable federal appropriation.

The fact is that millions of people like the ways they have and are going to be more unhappy after we begin tinkering with them than if we had left them alone. People must emerge from their relative states as their own urging leads them to do.

Dry and dusty. Many counties in eastern Montana and western North Dakota, as well as great stretches of the wheat growing provinces of Canada — Saskatchewan and Alberta — have been so dry this summer their 50-bushel wheat crop has withered away.

Report Has it, the dry weather also has affected the hatch of ducks and geese in the northern grounds and that the crop of wild water fowl has been adversely affected.

Excess Cotton Penalty Rates Announced

Marketing quota penalty rate on the 1961 crops of "excess" cotton have been set at 19.5 cents per pound on upland cotton and 40.9 cents per pound on extra long staple cotton.

Growers approved marketing quotas for this year's crop of upland and extra long staple cotton in referendums last Dec. 13.

The Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, directs the marketing quota penalty rate for upland cotton be 50 per cent of the parity price per pound of cotton effective June 15 of the calendar year in which the crop is produced. Parity price for upland cotton June 15 was 38.96 cents per pound.

The act also provides that the penalty rate on extra long staple cotton be higher than 50 per cent of the parity price or 50 per cent of the support price for this type cotton. June 15. Parity price for extra long staple cotton June 15 was 81.8 cents per pound.

A farmer who does not comply with the cotton acreage allotment established for the kind of cotton grown on his farm is subject to a penalty on his farm marketing excess.

The cotton crop from the farm is also ineligible for price support under Commodity Credit Corporation programs.

Each type of cotton is treated independently. Upland cotton can not be substituted for extra long staple cotton or vice versa.

County Agent News

County Agent . . . (John Schlittler in the absence of Cecil Lewis)

Over the past months that Floyd County has been entered in the 4-Point Soil Fertility Program, there have been studies in soil testing, proper fertilization and variety selection. At this time of year, another very important point in the 4 Point Program is crop and water management.

Farmers in making plans for summer cotton irrigation will want to keep in mind that cotton uses very little moisture, only about .1 of an inch per day until it begins blooming.

Most of the cotton in Floyd County has had from adequate to surplus moisture from planting to the present time. To water track and field events will be held at the Monterrey High school track starting at 1:00 p. m.

Among those already entered are Rodney Teague, high and low hurdles and broad jump; Tommy Watts 100 and 200 yard dash; Charles Christian 100 and 200 yard dash. The last during a hot dry August because three named will try and pick the roots will not be deep enough up one more sprinter and also to extract deep moisture, making it necessary to water more frequently than usual or suffer a loss in yield.

In the intermediate division Cotton reaches its maximum at 4 inch per day. Peak bloom in cotton is normally reached when it is from 90 to 100 days old. Many of our more profitable yields are made in this county on two summer irrigations. Once when the cotton starts blooming good and again at peak bloom.

Irrigating Late Cotton

Farmers with June planted or hail damaged cotton should watch their irrigation very carefully. The young or hail damaged cotton will probably need only one summer irrigation or none at all, if it receives one good timely August rain. Remember with younger hail damaged cotton you are fighting a short growing season. Excessive watering would only shorten the cotton producing a good quality yield.

Floydada Independent School District Board of Education met on Tuesday night in regular session (postponed from first Tuesday which was July 4). President Ralph Johnston called the meeting to order and members E. L. Thomas, Greer Christian, W. L. Davis, Jack Stansell, Jim Word and Howard Gregory were all present.

Secretary Bennie Liebfried read the minutes of previous meeting and they were approved. Monthly bills of \$1681.90 were read, examined and voted to be paid.

Mr. Donahue representing builders of the new school building for the North Ward was invited to present questions to the board as to colors and materials for finishing that building.

The board selected "corn blue" for the sculptured panels and mist grey for the plain panels on the outside walls. The gym floor is to be covered with blue asphalt 1-8 inch tile with basketball court markings in tapistry and the volleyball marking in black. Blue and grey will be the wall colors in the gymnasium also.

In the school wing Sahara beige and April green will be among the colors used for walls with mist green floors in the rest rooms and carousel colored tile in the homemaking department.

The board also voted to have the contractor construct additional sidewalk area not included in the original contract.

Moving of the North Ward teacherage was approved and Supt. Graves was appointed to carry out this project. The house is to be located across the street south of the new school building in better position to oversee this building and campus.

Della Plain is School Name
The school board voted to name the new school that replaces North Ward, Della Plain School was the name chosen. The name has historical significance. The county's first town was named Della Plain.

J. E. Elza and Dan Whitaker appeared before the board and presented the high school band uniforms for eight new twirler uniforms. Mr. Whitaker recommended the same uniform now in vogue, tuxedo with tails, shorts and long trousers, for different type

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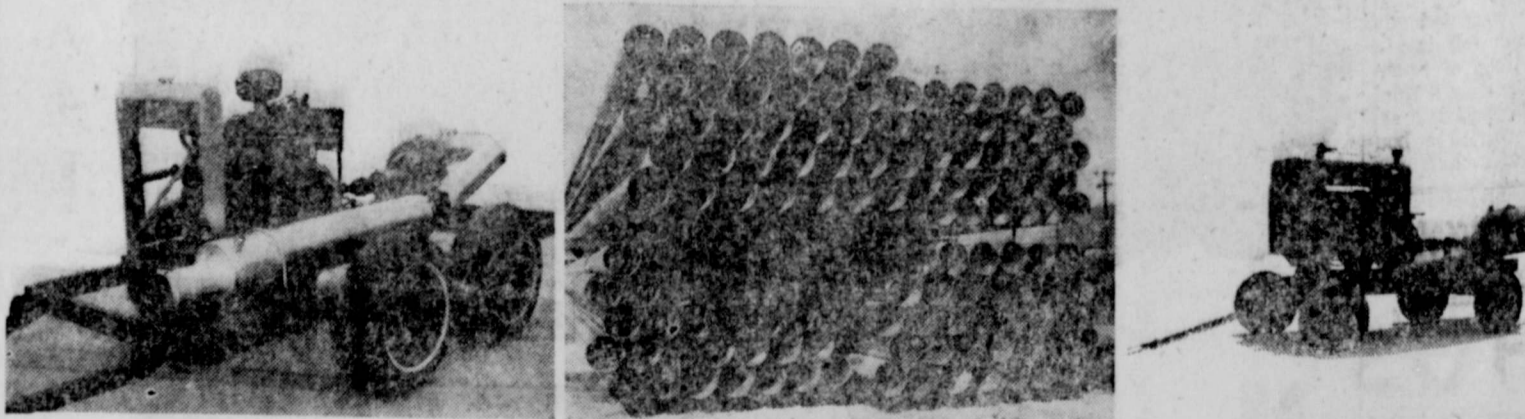

NEW STATE TELEPHONE LAWS
I thought it would be interesting to you to know of 3 new Telephone laws passed in the last session of the Texas Legislature.

People who damage or destroy telephone facilities, obtain telephone service through fraud, or refuse to give up a party line for an emergency call have been branded law-breakers, subject to fine and imprisonment.

Most stringent of the bills is House Bill 921 which makes it a felony punishable by two to five years in the penitentiary or a fine of \$100 to \$2,500 for damaging telephone facilities.

OFFENSE EXPLAINED
Punishable under this law is anyone who intentionally breaks, cuts, pulls or tears down or injures any telephone, telegraph or electrical transmission wire, post, or machinery, or who interferes with transmission of messages or electricity.

Obtaining telecommunications service by fraudulent means is made a misdemeanor by Senate Bill 309. Punishment provided is up to one year in jail or a fine of up to \$1,000, or both.

FALSE CHARGING
There are several ways to run foul of this law. It can be done by charging service to a telephone number or a credit card number without the authority of the subscriber or holder of the card.

Another way is to charge service to a non-existent, false, fictitious or counterfeited telephone number or credit card number, or to a suspended, terminated, expired, cancelled or revoked telephone number or credit card.

Use of a code, prearranged scheme or other similar stratagem, or obtaining service by any other trick, impersonation, false pretense, statement or representation also is made illegal.

Senate Bill 366 makes it a misdemeanor to refuse to relinquish a party line for an emergency call to a fire or police department, or medical aid or ambulance service.

Persons falsely stating that a party line is needed for an emergency call also come under this law, which provides for a fine of \$25 to \$500, or one month in jail, or both.

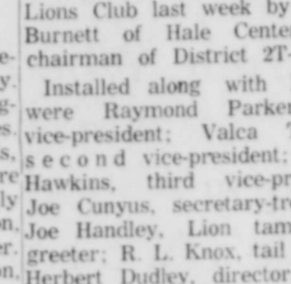

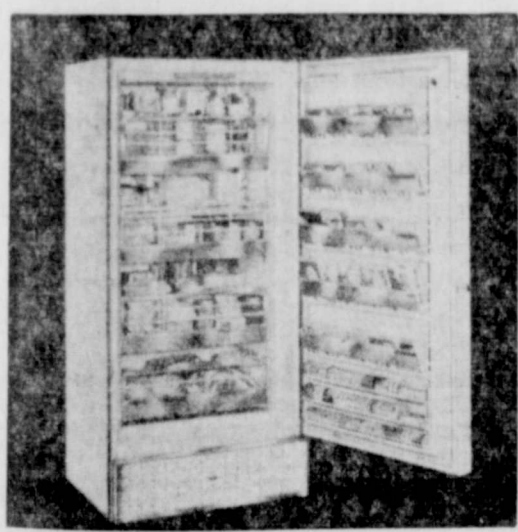

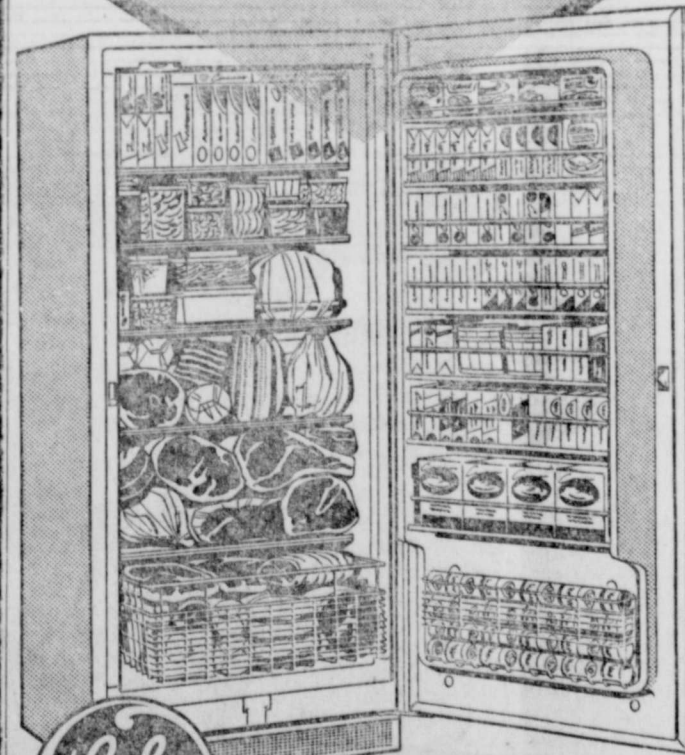

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

by Vera Sanford

AUSTIN. — Texas legislators are not like students who failed to complete their work in the long term and have to come back to summer school, return to Austin this week to "get it over with."

Goal is the passage of a two-year appropriations bill expected to run around \$2,600,000,000. To let's plan for additional selective pay for it, they will need to find some \$350,000,000 more in tax money than now provided on the law books.

But if money is short, advice

is a third committee, appointed by the Governor, avoided a single, specific recommendation but pinpointed some sort of retail sales tax as the most likely source for the amount of money needed. This committee is composed mainly of the chairmen of governing boards of state welfare and educational agencies.

Committee suggested that either the retail sales tax passed by the Senate last session (a "general" sales tax with exemptions for food, farm supplies, medicine) or a "Pennsylvania-type" tax which affects only the items listed in the bill or a combination

of the two might be the answer. All of which leaves the Legislature just about where it was—with at least some support, and some opposition, for any course it might take.

AUTO INSURANCE RAISED.—Beginning August 1, Texas motorists will pay higher premiums for automobile insurance.

How high the premium goes will depend on the county in which the motorist lives and its accident record. In general the big city counties have higher accident rates and insurance premiums than rural counties. In Travis County (Austin), the increase on a typical policy would be 15 per cent; in Dallas County, about 17 per cent.

This is the first increase in the base rate for auto insurance ordered by the State Board of Insurance since 1958. Reductions or increases for traffic accidents and violations under the Safe Driving Plan will continue as before.

Reasons given for the rate raise include:

1. More people than expected qualified for the 20 per cent premium cut allowed under the Safe Driving Plan for drivers with no accidents or violations. This caused a decline in premium income.
2. Higher cost of repairing today's wrap-around windshield, wrap-around fender cars.
3. Generous jury awards for injury and damage claims.
4. Drop in the number of new cars sold last year.
5. Apparent dropping of insurance by some motorists who had previously carried it.

HIGHWAY COSTS UP.—Cost of having good roads, the State Highway Department frankly admits, is going up.

Highway Commission has announced a highway maintenance budget for the next fiscal year (Sept. 1, 1961 to Aug. 31, 1962) of \$51,300,000—which is up \$2,100,000 from the previous year.

Reasons given for the increase: Texas had more than 1,100 new

highway miles to care for and it costs more per mile to care for them. But proper upkeep, says the Commission, "stretches the taxpayer's dollar by increasing the life of the road."

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Only Alto Site Remains
Texas expelled the Neches Indians from the state in 1839. The site of one of their old villages is just five miles southwest of Alto, in Cherokee County, in the central portion of East Texas, near Rusk.

This village was active in the lives of the Neches at the beginning of the 18th Century.

The Neches River was named for these Indians, as was a nearby mission established by the Cherokee Indians, the Mission San Francisco de los Neches.

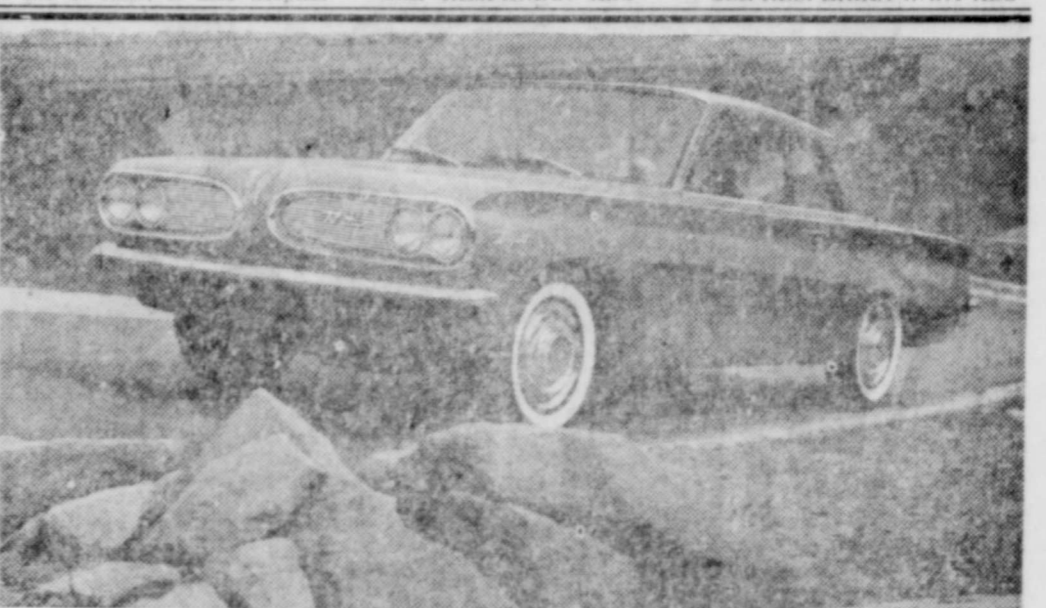
