Do our hands really reveal something of our future? Both palmists and doctors say yes, they

ABOUT FALL OUT SHELTERS

The way mass psychology is pointing we could have a hysteria of building bomb and fall out shelters in this country most any time. Civil Defense authorities have had an easy time of it ever since Civil Defense was set up. Sending out a few broadsides and brochures on occasion, fixing up some "releases" for the newspaper, answering desultory mail, make an occasional speech, has been about the extent of the demands on the Executive Department's Civil Defense organization.

Some time the public may begin taking the stories and the proclamations seriously. Since most of the public has really learned nothing about what to do and how, the panic button could be touched off if the people began really to be scared.

COMMUNICATIONS SATELLITE SQUABBLE

Precious time is being lost by the congress and in the communications agencies of the government quarreling over who is to operate a satellite system for world-wide communication, how it will be organized and who will control it. Several interests, at least eight, are seeking to have a part in the set-up. Already the yak, yak, and yow yow have been going on for months. From what can be learned the government is no nearer giving a green signal to the plan than it was months ago.

All of which, to us, is illogical. A T & T is ready to do the job, can do the job, and will do the job, if the federal authorities will let them.

American Telephone & Telegraph is in the business. They know what needs to be done and how to do it. Most of the others just want to be in because it is something that ought to be good and they see a chance to make some money if they can horn in on the deal.

We recommend this line of thought to our Texas Congressmen and Senators. Russia put a satellite in orbit while we quarreled and quibbled. It is now known we had the know how to do this in our country as long ago at 1954. Why let Russia trump another of our aces?

LOOKING FOR MISSILE SITES

The Air Force has had crews of men making this part of the country getting easements (permission) to move on to farms and survey for possible missile sites, with the understanding that a site might be chosen on some part of the farm being surveyed. There is little general understanding of what the authorities have in mind. Hundreds of farms have been visited in a wide area, among them probably two or three dozen in Floyd County. A "missile site" may be a piece of ground of two and a half acres or more. The actual locations are said to be chosen after corings are taken. New experience. May be something really necessary and desirable is being planned. On the other hand, w have seen a good many billions wasted. This may be just some more of the same.

MANY CITIZENS SKEPTICAL

The Congress, as well as the executive department, may be aware mine run of citizens have become skeptical, almost cynical, concerning the grandiose plans of the government to do this and do that "for the defense of the country." Enough money has been wasted - totally - to arm the National Guard and put it into the field for battle. The regulars do the talking and spending. The reserves do the fighting.

RETIRE OR NOT TO RETIRE

If you have reached or are about to reach, the age of 62, you may be wondering whether to take retirement pay under the new law, which allows a 62-year-old to get on to the rolls three years earlier but at a reduced monthly income. When you reach 65 you will draw less than those who wait until they are 65 to get on the rolls. However, you will be "ahead of the game" in total payments from the Social Security fund until you attain the age of 77. The state of one's health and the prospect for gainful occupation probably would be the deciding fac-

The Tax Session. There is no particular reason for the average citizen to take the chance of being confused by trying to keep up with the work of the legislative mill at Austin as it moves toward final passage of some sort of a moneyraising bill. Those who have special interest of some sort may be able to unravel the skein of amendments, substitutes for substitutes and changes in the percentage points, but what is fact today may be tossed out the window tomorrow. What will be the final outcome is anybody's guess. At the moment the senate has the House measure up for consideration and are working it over. Then will come the joint conference and finally will emerge what will be the law. Circumstances probably will force the governor to sign whatever compromise is finally reached.

The Senate is acting more swiftly and seems to have more of a working plan than does the House. The latter is split down the middle on some of the vital provisions. The senate is taking advantage of this cleavage to force some of their ideas on the House, it is likely to be shown in the final days of the session. So, unless you like to watch the battle as it progresses, or unless you have a particular interest in some part of the law, just lean back and wait for the smoke to clear away.

Hail In July. We were told, and passed the word along, that when the crops get past Juneteenth they are pretty well sure of being safe from hail. It just so hap-pens that July hails pecked around on the cotton crops here and there so much that it has hurt our forecaster's standing in the community. Hail is really not in our line and we should not have gone out so far on that

Have Care. It is refreshing to note that some of the members of the New York Stock Exchange have helped to squelch the boom in stock market securities and also pointed out the dangers in promiscuous over the counter buying on tips and hunches. There are real values on the Stock Market and there's nothing wrong in a business way or otherwise, in buying on "the market" or buying "over the counter." One needs to buy stocks and bonds the same way he would buy a cow. And by the same token, be ready to take a loss as often happens on any other market.

Quick Response. For a time there in the early part of the year, it appeared the market was going to get out of hand. A lot of trash was being offered the public and it was being snapped up by the gullible. Playing the market was ready to get out of hand. People seemed to respond quickly to the warning to have

While there are no exact figures, reasonably close approximations can now be made on the basis of stock ownership counts and surveys conducted in 1959 and 1960 by the University of Michigan and others. The results are shown for each state. The number of private ca-pitalists in Floyd County, ac-

cording to a breakdown of these findings, comes to 484. The total has been rising, year by year. How much of an increase the new number represents is apparent from a glance at the 1956 figure.

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


