Millions in money and thousands of hours in valuable time have been wasted at that critical base. Those charged with seeing that the experiments were carried on with dispatch have played footsie with the workers at a disgraceful rate, at the expense of the taxpayers, and the peril of the

### WE ARE PROVINCIAL, TOO

We cannot but concur with the attitude of the Texas American Legionnaires in their meeting Saturday when they adopted a resolution calling for action to bring about the removal of the Fidel Castro regime from Cuba. Action should have been taken many months ago, as is now quite clear to private citizens of the country, though apparently not to official Washington.

We also think, along with the Legionnaires that Communist successes are "due in no small part to the inept and floundering, stumbling and fumbling foreign policy of the United States." And the common citizen also will say amen to the declaration that "we are tired of losing wars through the stupidity of the diplomatic table.

### MAY NOT REACH AGREEMENT

At this distance from the state capitol it appears one of the possibilities that the legislature will not come up with a taxation measure by the end of this session. The stalemate seems to be forecast by the fact that at this time there are two strong camps, neither willing to compromise. However, we do not look on this as forecasting a dis-

Such heavy burdens of taxation as are proposed are not necessarily good for the common welfare. Faced with the changing times and the demands on the public treasury it is true we "must do something" but it will do no harm to take a second called session to let the seriousness of the move we are making, soak in a bit.

### TAXES ENOUGH FOR ALL

We do not assume that disagreement in the legislature necessarily means venality is rampant. It may, in fact, mean that some hard-headed curmudgeons either in the senate or the house, or both, have some facts in thier possession from which they are not going to be stampeded just to get along. The sales taxers have the advantage. Possibly the opposition will keep them from jumping off the deep end.

For one thing, whatever the final outcome of the tax fight, we can be sure there will be enough taxes for all. For another, it will not be bad for the common welfare for those who spend to realize that for them to spend somebody must dig up, and that digging up is not a pleasant pastime.

### LOOPHOLES ARE MANY AND VARIED

We think it is not amiss to mention that millions which could be collected without adding any more tax measures to the statutes are being missed by the state. Of these the legislators must be well

The session is too far gone to make an attempt to recoup those tax losses which escape through the net every year. But the legislators were aware of this situation before they ever went into session. We do not know how many million these loopholes allow to escape. To partially prove these statements one has only to mention vehicles owned by persons who have no real estate. Many of them in every community just do not pay any ad valorem tax of any kind.

### POSSIBLE MISSILE SITES EYED

In this issue of The Hesperian we are re-printing a report appearing in the July 27 issue of The Amarillo Daily News, on the missile site matter, which is large in the public eye on the south plains

The exhaustive run-down on the project was done by Mike Smith, a staff writer on The News

On the face of it it appears that Lubbock wants the missile sites because it will put 2,000 more men out at Reese Air Force Base, and Congressman Mahon wants them because Lubbock wants them.

People of this area, not used to things military, would be likely to find the underground missiles irksome neighbors and also the fine print of the easements and deeds to have provisions that would allow the military to push the land owners around in unsuspected ways.

### EVERY YEAR ITS OWN PATTERN

Fields of grain sorghum and cotton, which have had a maximum of moisture during all of the growing season, demand more of the same now that the cotton plants are fruiting heavily and the grain sorghums are booting or filling the heads.

Accordingly hundreds of wells were put to work supplying this need last week-end and hun-

dreds more this week. Proving that you can't go by the rules-that what is good practice in one year on the plains may not be good practice in another-several thousand acres of maize crops were planted early and have matured out a fine crop without the use of irrigation. These early crops will occasion a considerable bit of harvest work the latter part of this month of August and early September.

### MAY HEM CATTLEMEN IN

The Cattlemen's Assciation has to have the permission of the U.S. Department of Agriculture to carry on their cattle inspection operations at the various stockyards. Why we would not know, but the fact came to light in a recent report that the association's permission to make their inspections is to be revoked. So the cattlemen, after all, are going to Washington to ask for something, if only for a chance to handle their own affairs in their

Berlin Crisis. We have no idea just how much importance the people of this part of the world should attach to the threat of the Berlin crisis. However, it does not hurt to be prepared against even the unlikey. Some of the simple things one might do or not do for the protecton of one's family in case of nuclear fallout, should be common knowledge. Not everybody is going to be able to build a fallout shelter to specifications, and will have to do the next best thing, whatever that may be.

They Say No. The Russians are not going to make the mistake of starting a nuclear war. say German officials, who live under the threat of Soviet guns. The Germans know more than anybody about war. They've started a-plenty of them, and ought to be authority. They say the Russians will browbeat and threaten, start brush wars here and there, but know too well the first nuclear weapon that is fired spells doom for their regime.

What we are seeking is a good excuse to forecast late season for the benefit of late - planted June cotton. The broom weeds point a sort of a tattle tale finger.

Johnson Grass. Long ago The Hesperian offered a 'simple remedy" for killing off Johnson Grass on the premises, and repeat it here now for the benefit of our customers. In the dark of the moon in August is the time. This year the calendar says August 10 and 11. Johnson Grass, even, Bermuda, yields to the plow and the hoe. Since the sign is in the heart also on those dates 100 per cent kill is practically a cinch. Housewives with lazy husbands, take notice.
