

## Sugar Beet Outlook Brightens

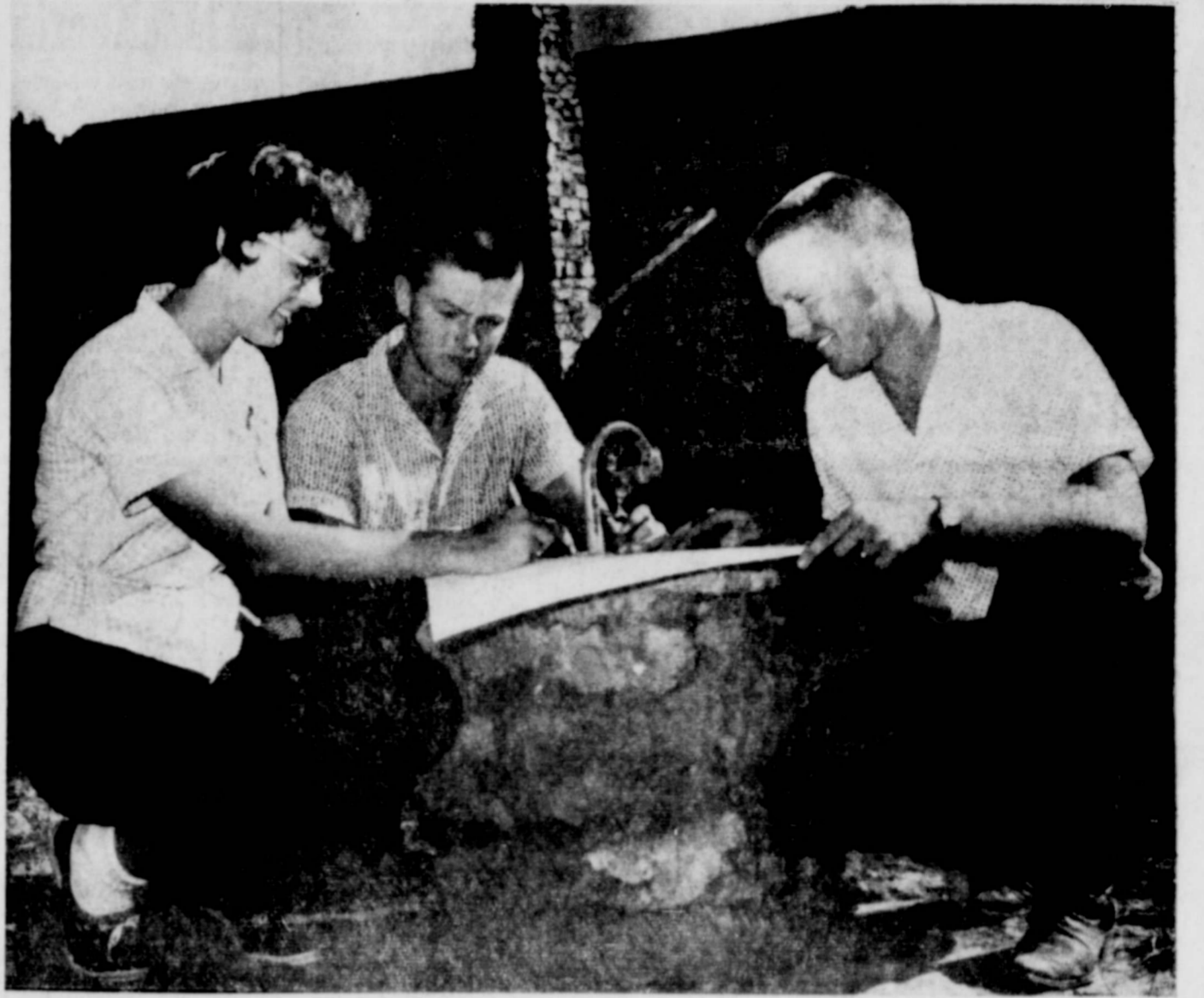
Enough beet acreage to warrant the construction of a processing plant, according to the estimate of some of the promoters close to the movement.

The expansion of the sugar beet acreage is built on a formula unfamiliar to the average person. "Normal expansion" of the sugar beet acreage is based on the population increase in the United States. It is figured on the assumption that about 100 pounds additional sugar is needed for persons born or immigrated into this country.

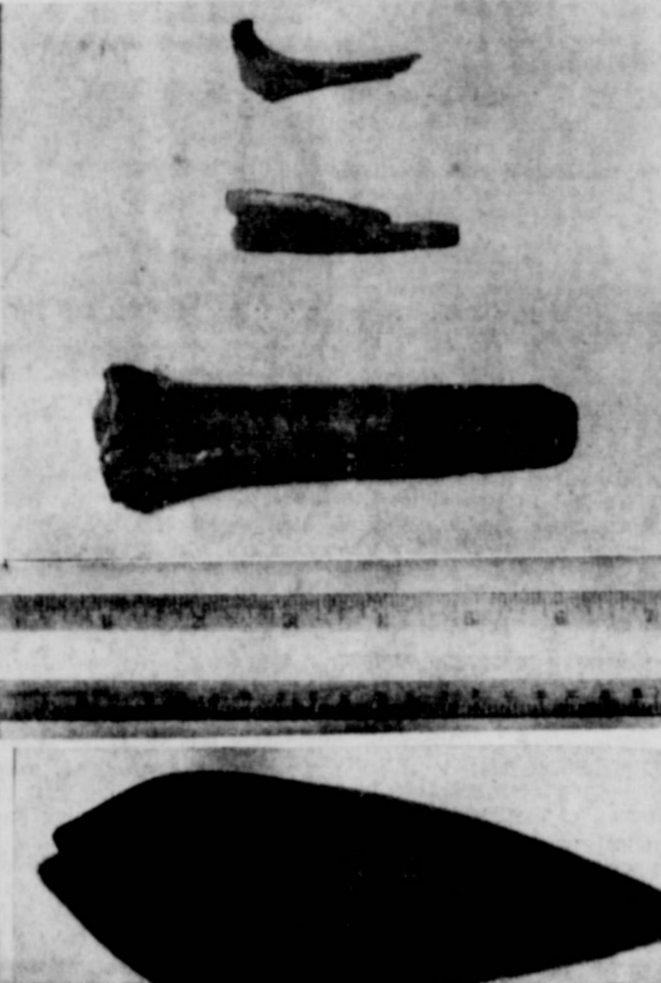

## Floydada Country Club Grounds Found Rich Source of Artifacts

James H. Word, who operates the Floydada Real Estate & Insurance Agency in Floydada, is a busy man but he finds time not only to enjoy life but to serve his fellow man in a number of ways.

Word has been active in civic, church, and Scout work here for many years. He serves on the school board and has devoted much time to sports. He has been a player and an official at local ball games.

One thing he enjoys when he can tear himself away from every day chores and other activities is the gathering of artifacts and the cataloguing of these findings.

His pet place for digging and searching for this historical lore is at Floydada Country Club and from this location alone Word has an interesting collection of items that tell of civilizations reaching back into time more than 8,000 years ago. Word says the club grounds around Cochran's Peak have been a favorite camping spot for inhabitants of West Texas since the dawn of time.

## Announce Wheat Referendum Aug. 24 For 1962 Crop Quotas

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman set August 24 as the date on which wheat producers will choose whether or not to support a referendum on the 1962 wheat marketing quotas. The referendum will be held on August 24, 1961, at 7:00 p. m. at the county seat of each county.

If farmers choose to favor the present level of \$1.79 per bushel, which is 75 percent of parity (wheat parity is now \$2.37 per bushel) and would be available to those farmers who plant within their acreage allotments. Before quotas can be put into effect, at least two-thirds of the producers voting in the referendum must approve.

Referendum ballots will be cast at the following places: ASC Office, Floydada; Cedar Hill Store; Dougherty Grain Co., Lockney; and the Lockney Beacon Office.

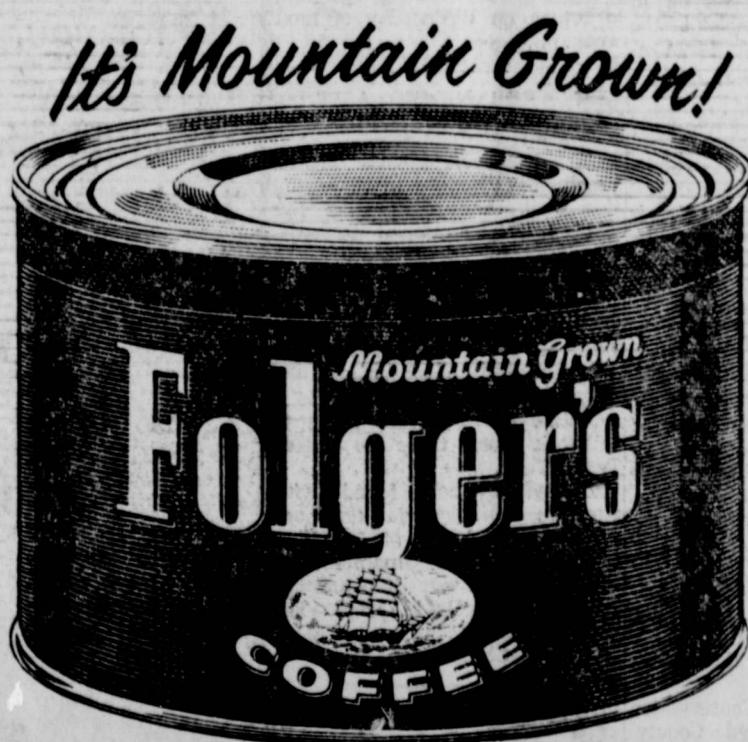

## Complete Tax Rolls Of 1961 Floyd County

Floyd County tax rolls for 1961, approved last weekend by the Commissioners Court and forwarded by Assessor-Collector T. T. Hamilton to the state comptroller's office, represent a total value for taxes of \$16,644,760, and the total taxes levied on the rolls is \$363,302.76.

Of the total valuations listed land represents \$7,321,303, city property \$2,684,115, personal property \$4,903,990, railroad beds \$1,032,300, rolling stocks \$129,370, banks \$74,000, and intangibles (of railroads and pipelines) \$499,670.

Of the taxes represented on the rolls, if 100 per cent collections were made, the state's part would be \$57,368.79, the county would receive \$133,138.08, and \$58,255.72 would go into the road bond fund. The special road fund is set up to receive \$24,989.03, the court house bond fund \$16,644.76, the water district \$7,688.16, the weed control district \$18,969.37, and the county's four common school districts \$46,348.85.

The taxpaying year begins Oct. 1.

## Few Owners Pay Trailer Taxes

Tax Assessor-Collector T. T. Hamilton reports that something less than a hundred of the county's 3,000 to 5,000 farm trailers covered under the new license law, have been registered.

Farm trailers are due to pay \$5 under the new licensing law. Hamilton fears that a long line will queue up in the latter part of the collecting period unless trailer owners take advantage of the relatively quiet period this summer and early fall.

## Mrs. Bob Henry Has Lived In County Almost 50 Years

Mrs. Bob Henry, in an interview Saturday, vividly recalled memories of her arrival to this part of Texas in 1915.

Although celebrating her 80th birthday Sunday the Floydada woman is surprisingly alert, looking back to her early childhood and giving dates of numerous occurrences.

She tapped out a tune on her piano that came to this county shortly after her arrival which still had its sparkle and looks as if it were new, a piano that she

has used to teach many young lessons.

Mrs. Henry was honored with an informal gathering Sunday at her home by her only child, a daughter, Mrs. A. M. Dorsey and her husband, who also reside in Floydada. Numerous friends in this area and relatives and friends from Lubbock and Vernon called in the afternoon to enjoy birthday cake and punch with Mrs. Henry and to extend their greetings.

### Born In Log Cabin

Born Lillie Dickey in a log cabin on August 6, 1881, in Springfield, Mo., she was an only child of George W. and Alice Dickey. They moved to Texas by train in 1883 and settled in Taylor, Tex., where Mr. Dickey was foreman on a ranch for seven years.

Mrs. Henry received her schooling in Georgetown where she met and married J. C. Wooten on May 24, 1903. Their daughter was born four years later and in 1915, they along with Mrs. Henry's parents moved to the Mt. Blanco community in Floyd County. Mr. Wooten died in January, 1918. Five months later Mr. Dickey died.

Left with a young child to rear and the care of her mother, Mrs. Henry started teaching piano. He also worked for a number of years for the late Dr. Wilson Simble. Mrs. Henry said the old two-story house northeast of the city where she and her family lived in early times still stands.

The daughter is Mrs. I. D. Roberts, Silam Springs, Ark. Melvin lives in Floydada and George lives at Wellington. Mrs. Henry lost her second husband in December of 1944 and three years later her mother succumbed.

### Active in Church Work

Mrs. Henry devotes most of her time to church work in which she has been active since she was converted at the age of 11.

When she moved to Floydada she recalls members of the Methodist Church met in the old court house. She served as superintendent of the Junior, Primary and Cradle Roll departments in the early years.

Mrs. Henry is a member of the Wesley Girls Sunday School class, member of the Women's Missionary Society and of the Order of Eastern Star.

Just recently Mrs. Henry underwent surgery. She has completely recovered. Living a modest life through her 80 years, she said church and friends are the better things in life for her.

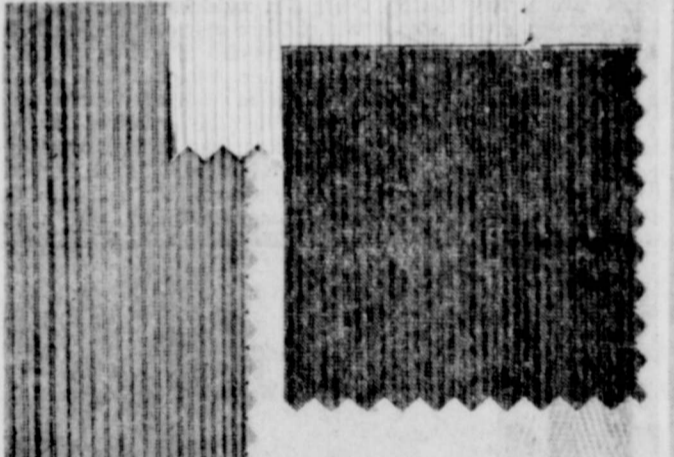

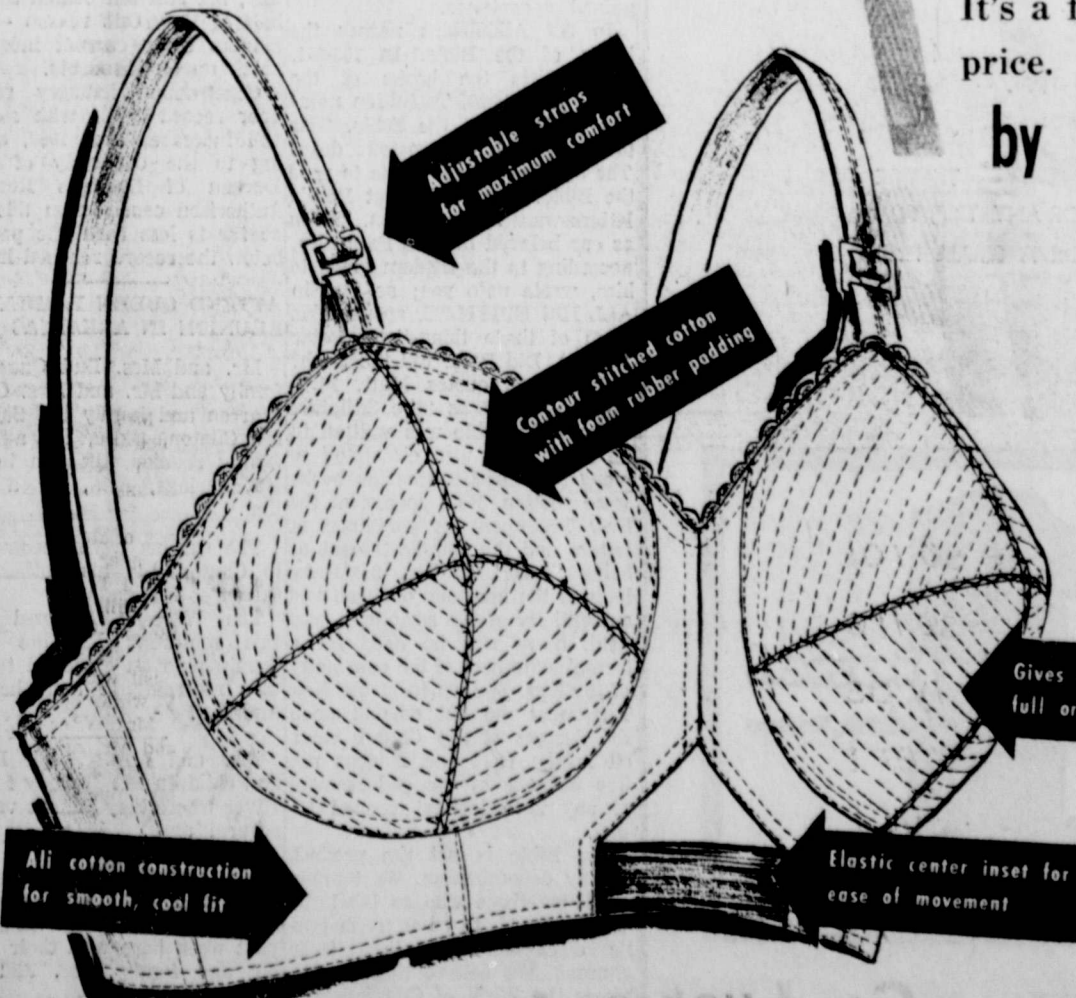

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

**AUSTIN** — Amid the sound and fury of the tax battle in the Legislature, Texas — new to the idea of far-reaching sales taxes — could be heard trying to get jewelry to the bottom of things by calculating their effect upon such things as baby's diapers.

The key to many discussions, both in the Legislative chambers and in the Capitol corridors, was the term "outer wearing apparel," to be exempt from sales taxes.

It seemed simple enough at first when the proposal was exempt such articles costing less than \$10, the intention being to exempt work clothes. But many a question popped up when tax writers went into details and spelled out that this exemption

work clothes. The exemption was confined to those made of cotton, wool, poplin, denim, and chambray. Suppose, somebody questioned, a man ran across a pair of blue denims with nylon knees? And why, a white collar work trousers be exempt, too, since he works in them?

During the Sales Tax debate, Senator Wardlow Lane of Center quipped, "I'm personally not for any kind of tax... just like I'm not for pneumonia, death or anything else bad."

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULING** — An Attorney General's opinion holds that the state's admission tax does not apply to tickets to baseball, football and basketball games, but is applicable to horse races, auto races, motorcycle races, night clubs, skating rinks, and any and all like places of amusements, contests, and exhibitions.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, who asked for the ruling, was advised that horse races are specifically mentioned in the tax law, while baseball, football and basketball games are not.

**REFERENDUM ON HORSE RACE BETTING SOUGHT** — Rep. V. E. (Red) Berry of San Antonio, who got nowhere with his bill to legalize horse race gambling in Texas and another calling for a statewide referendum on the question, doesn't plan to give up.

Representative Berry said petitions are being circulated by members of the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders Association asking support of a Democratic party referendum from 10 per cent of the qualified voters in Texas. He estimated 155,000 signatures will be necessary to cause the State Democratic Executive Committee

to submit the proposition to the voters in the first Democratic primary election next May.

The petition, he said, calls for submission of a constitutional amendment to the electorate.

**HISTORIC DOCUMENT ON WATER PROBLEM** — "If Texas cannot change the weather, they can at least, through sound, far-sighted planning, conserve and develop water resources to supply their needs."

So said the State Board of Water Engineers as it turned in to Gov. Price Daniel the state's first comprehensive, projected plan for meeting the industrial, municipal and other water needs in 1960.

Governor Daniel termed the 200-page document, which envisions the construction of 45 new reservoirs over the state, "one of the great things in the life of our state."

The board made the observation that the people of Texas have not yet been "aroused to the dire consequences of inaction or to the consequences of building projects which at best provide for only small increases in water needs... in relation to long term future needs in many areas, water is the least abundant of Texas' important natural resources; certainly it is the most indispensable."

The board said that through proper development, Texas has adequate water to meet its municipal and industrial needs in 1960 and sustain agriculture and other uses. A significant statement in the report was to the effect that such a program as outlined "appears to be within the financial capability of the state and local interests, with federal participation in projects containing flood control."

In short, the so-called "Master Plan" for development of the state's water resources is at least an outline of what can be done, and might be done, to meet one of the state's most crucial problems.

**ATTACK ON "SOFTNESS" LAUNCHED** — Physical education teachers from over the state at a meeting in Austin have come up with a plan to turn talk into action and do something about physical fitness in the schools.

The plan includes 15 minutes of strenuous body exercise in physical education periods; teaching the right way to walk, sit, climb, pull, push and all the other ways the body obeys the laws of physics; teaching games and sports people can use throughout their life including tennis, golf and swimming and other popular sports; teaching the history of games; fitting activities such as folk dancing into social studies; emphasizing sportsmanship as part of social behavior; accomplishing social control through release of tension in athletics; and promoting a favorable attitude toward physical activity both as children and as adults.

**BUS RATES GO UP** — Bus travel in Texas is costing the operators more and so it will be costing the passengers more. No one objected at a hearing which resulted in a general hike of five per cent in bus fare rates approved by the State Railroad Commission.

Operators testified expenses increased 8.9 per cent in 1960 over 1959, against a revenue increase of only 4.6 per cent. The last time bus fares were increased was in 1958.

The increases will be in effect no later than September 1. There were some exceptions to the general five per cent increase, such as an approved boost of 10 per cent for Texas bus lines operating between Galveston-Beaumont and Port Arthur-High Island, and a 10 per cent increase for Texas Electric Bus Lines.

**GOVERNOR FOR A DAY** — One of the nice traditions in Texas politics is that which permits the man who is third in line to the Governorship officially to take over the reins of state government for a day.

By custom, the Governor and Lieutenant Governor absent themselves from the state for a 24-hour period so that the Senator who has been elected by his colleagues as President Pro Tempore of the Senate can step into the Governor's chair.

The honor went to easy-going, well-liked Senator Preston Smith of Lubbock last week. He signed proclamations, as Acting Governor, got in little plugs for his area of the state, and was feted at a banquet which rounded out the festivities in the evening last Friday.

**SHORT SNORTS** — Moonshining still goes on... The Texas Liquor Control Board reports seven illicit stills were taken by inspectors during the month of June with a capacity of 710 gallons. Inspectors seized 590 gallons of mash and made nine arrests. The stills were located in Lamar, Bowie, Marion and San Jacinto Counties.

Texas Business Review reports retail sales in Texas for the first six months of 1961 increased steadily, but still fell behind the first half of 1960. One reason — consumers using current income to catch up on old debts.

Construction industry reached near record levels with substantial increases over 1960, according to the University of Texas, Bureau of Business Research. Authorized construction this year so far is less than one per cent below the record reached in 1959.

### WHO GAVE US THE BIBLE?

The Bible is the Word of God. This is admitted by both Catholics and Protestants alike. The Bible was written by men inspired, moved by the Holy Spirit and while the Bible was being written, INSPIRATION was in the MEN who wrote the Bible. After the Bible was written the inspiration is in the BOOK and not in the man. Shall we trust the leadership of the inspired BOOK or shall we place our confidence in uninspired men?

Who gave us the Bible? It is a historical fact, supported by both sacred and secular history that the Bible was written, read, and circulated before the birth of the Roman Catholic Church or any Protestant denomination. The first Catholic Pope was Boniface III, who was proclaimed Pope in the year 606. His immediate predecessor as Bishop of Rome, Gregory, argued that no man should ever claim to be universal bishop!

The Bible came to us by ancient manuscripts and translations. The early Church writers quoted the Bible so much in their writings that we can produce the Bible from their work. One early author quoted the New Testament 17,922 times in his known writings. All this before the birth of either Catholicism or Protestantism. Our best known manuscripts are: SINAITIC, dating back to 340-367; ALEXANDIAN, dating back to the 5th century and now kept in the British museum; VATICAN, dating back to the 4th century. This latter manuscript is in the possession of the Catholic Church but is open to scholars of the world. The New Testament was translated into Syriac and Old Latin by 150 A. D. and into about a dozen languages by 250 A. D. How then can any informed person claim that the Bible is now or has ever been the possession of any denomination?

In 397 the Council of Carthage met and agreed to accept the books that already were being read and circulated. They did not DECLARE the books inspired. They merely ratified the books that had already providentially gained acceptance.

In 367 Athanasius names the books of the Bible. In 185-254, Origen lists the books of the Bible. In 195-220, Tertullian names the books of the Bible. This takes us back to Apostolic days. The apostles urged people to read the Bible. Peter said that Paul's letters were in circulation. "Even as our beloved brother Paul also, according to the wisdom given to him, wrote unto you; as also in ALL HIS EPISTLES, speaking in them of these things" (2 Peter 3:15-16). Did Peter tell the truth? 1 Tim. 5:18 quotes Matt. 10:10 and Luke 10:7 as "the Scripture saith." The Bible was written to be read and was circulated among the Christians as the books were written. Paul speaks of the New Testament as contained in letters and the Old Testament as being "read" (2 Cor. 3:14). As long as the apostolic doctrine and authenticity of the scriptures was held, there was no need for a formal statement of the canonicity of the text. The canon of the New Testament did not depend upon the decrees of any Church council in the past and it does not live because of the endorsement of any ecclesiastical council today.

The Bible is not the product of any denomination. We humbly challenge those who so label the Word of God, to meet us in public discussion to affirm their charges. We believe that the Bible is the Word of God independent of any church.

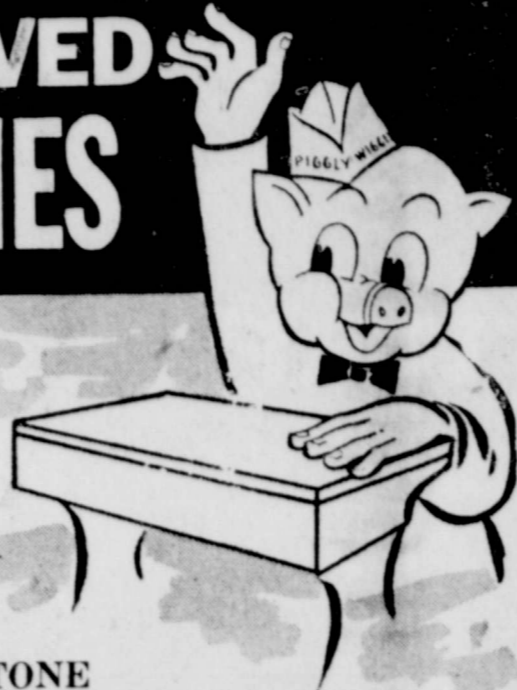
