

#### CITY OF FLOYDADA AFFAIRS

The City of Floydada is a grown up with everything that goes with a big operation, except a budget and a good bookkeeping system.

The city is in the water and sewer service business, spends more than \$2,000 a month for sanitation alone, has an expanding light and power business, collects more than \$50,000 in taxes, and has income from a score of small services and excises.

The city's gross income in the year ending June 30, 1961, was \$308,000, nearly \$309,000. It also has a heavy indebtedness occasioned by the effort of the municipality to keep up with the progress of a growing community. With these big incomes and big expenditures its authorities need to know all the time where they are fiscally. This information they can have only after an audit and a revealing set of books, and incidentally a budget, have been
