





Calcium Deficiencies Serious Lack of Most Adult Diets

We are all born calcium-poor, and calcium is one of the two nutrients in which American diets or food supplies most often fail to measure up to the "yardstick of good nutrition," says Dr. H. C. Sherman, until recently chief of the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The other element lacking in many diets is riboflavin, says Dr. Sherman.

Calcium deficiencies are much more frequent than physicians commonly realize, because there is no good way of detecting them. Undoubtedly childbirth is easier and safer because a new-born infant has soft, flexible bones. Once safely born, the child's body needs to catch up on calcium-and promptly. In life the baby starts etting calcium immediately. He gets it from the milk he

The need for calcium is more generally appreciated for children than for men and women, and many go through life with bodies poor in calcium and never realize it. When the supply of calcium in food is more liberal, there is better internal structure of bones, especially the porous ends of the long bones. This give a greatly increased surface of bone mineral in contact with the circulating blood, and helps the blood to recover rapidly from strains and drains affecting its supply of calcium.

Although milk is seven-eights water, and kale has still higher water content, both these foods supply in this natural wet state, more calcium, pound for pound, than do typical fruits, root vegetables, meats or breadstuffs. The importance of milk and green leaf vegetables for calcium and vitamin A led to their being called "protective" foods.



Care in Wrapping Stressed for Xmas Mailing to Armed Forces Overseas

"It is not pleasant to visit a see the numbers of Christmas cels from the opening of the parcels which will never reach mailing period. ervicemen and servicewomen,' Postmaster General Walker said in urging that all packages be securely wrapped.

Pointing out that gifts must travel far in crowded shipping space, the postmaster general emphasized that if gifts are to be protected they must be packed in boxes made of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong, doublefaced corrugated fiberboard reinforced with strong gummed paper tape or tied with strong twine. If both tape and strong twine are used, so much the better. If the outer layer is crushed-and this is likely to happen-the loss of contents may be prevented if fiberboard boxes are wrapped in heavy paper. The address of the sender and addressee should be written inside the package as well as outside.

Parcels must not exceed five pounds in weight, must not be more than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. It must be marked "Christmas Parcel" so that it may be given special attention to assure its arrival before Dec.

Not more than one package may be mailed in any one week to the same member of the armed forces by or in behalf of the

When combination packages are made up of such items as miscellaneous toilet articles, hard candies, soaps, etc., the contents should be tightly packed so that they will not loosen in transit and damage the contents or the cover.
