Announcement of a sales tax forum was made this week by Jno. W. Reue, of Floydada Chamber of Commerce, who said that Doyle Walls, chairman of the retail trades committee of the organization will be moderator.

Newell Burk, public accountant, and Kenneth Bain, Jr., and Frank Stovall, attorneys, have consented to serve as the panel for the evening's discussions and questions and answers.

"These three men have made extensive study of the new sales tax law and their advice and opinions will be worthwhile to anyone who has lingering problems in carrying out their duties under the new law," said Mr. Reue.

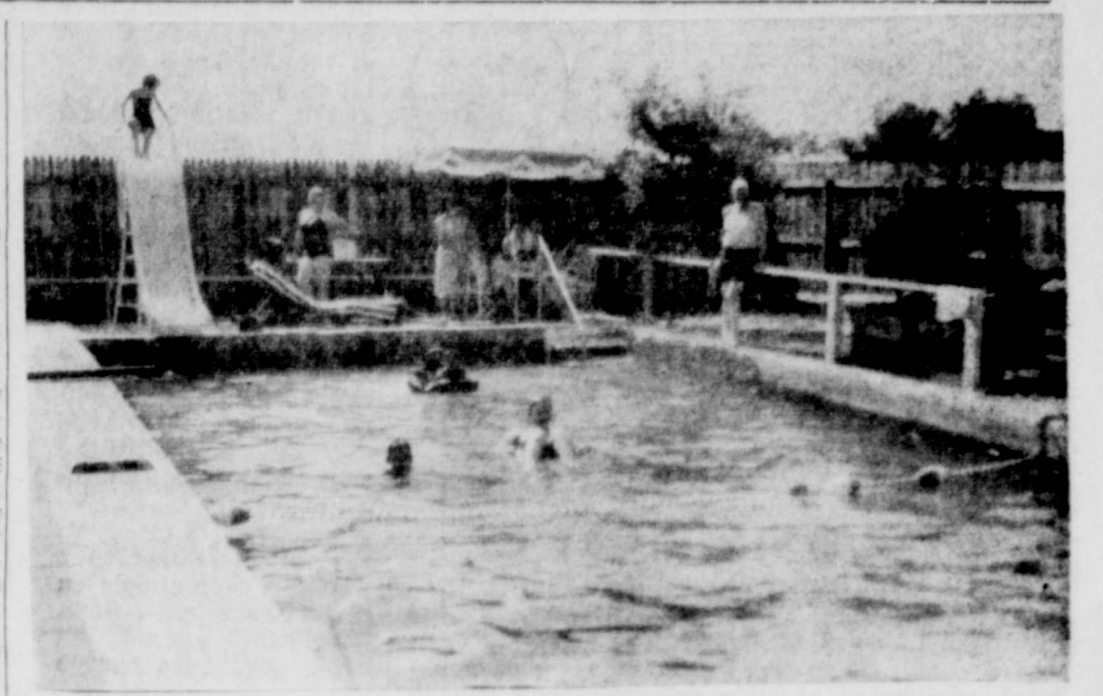

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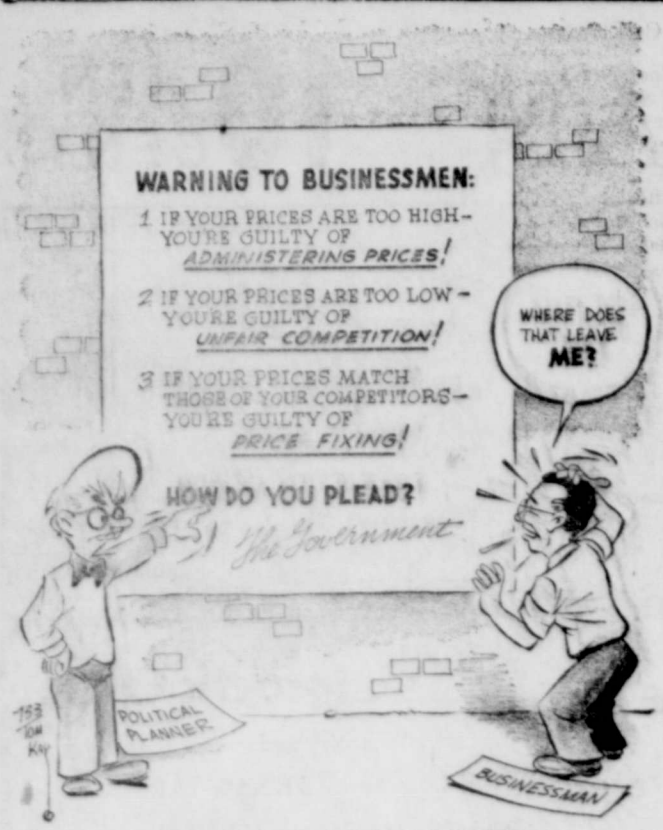

DOVE AND QUAIL RULES

The 1961 rules governing dove and duck open seasons and numbers permitted to be bagged would seem to indicate that while the past 12 months have been kind to doves the opposite has been true of ducks.

Dove bag limits have been made more liberal while the ducks are being protected with fewer permits to be taken.

It seems a good thing that the scientists have come to the aid of wildlife in the United States and Canada.

MAIN TOPIC OF INTEREST

As a consumer you may be only mildly interested in what is going to happen in Texas tomorrow. Irksome somewhat, you think in prospect of the new sales tax, and perhaps, rather expensive.

But no so the retailer who must begin collecting off of you and reporting it under penalty. Besides listening to your gripes and arguments he must get the money and he must get the transaction down on paper for you to see and for himself to figure out later on.

You can bet the retailers are not happy! Not only are they not happy. They are down-right worried. The law does not necessarily mean what it says, also it doesn't necessarily mean what the state comptroller says. Any transaction may be the bone of contention an da lot of worry a year hence or two years.

WHO LOBBIED THE BILL THROUGH?

Looking at the situation in Texas we have begun to doubt what we thought about who lobbied the sales tax bill through the legislature. A lot of highly paid lobbyists were on the ground, some of them with the \$25 thousand label. Arrogant and mean, they cowed many a country legislator before the end of the first called session.

But the fellows who got the job done must have been cash register manufacturers. Orders that have piled up for cash registers with a "tax bank" in them will be weeks filling. The legislature couldn't have done a better job for anybody than was done for the people who make the cash registers one finds on counters everywhere. The new law makes any cash register one owned last week obsolete to all intents and purposes, with few exceptions.

BARGAINS IN CASH REGISTERS

September a good many cash registers in Floydada that were valuable pieces of property on the cashier's counters are worth about \$40 to turn in on a \$3,500 machine the retailer should have.

In Floydada between \$10,00 and \$25,000 has been contracted to be spent for the new machines. Several more \$3,500 models ought to be bought by rights but at the moment a good many firms are "just not going to do it." If they can hang on for 60 or 90 days they can buy one of the new ones for a thousand dollars less, probably.

Meanwhile the bill for cash registers runs into the millions and that is 30 days before the state treasury gets a cent.

THEY'LL NEVER FORGET

Any official or employee of the State Comptroller's Department will never forget their experiences of the past two weeks. Comptroller Calvert and his force made every effort to meet the demands but there was not enough manpower, not enough telephones—not enough of anything, including time. People wanted to know how to comply with the new sales tax law. Some of the more technical answers are not known yet.

AN IMPOSSIBLE TASK?

It is quite within the possibilities that the legislature has set a task in the new tax law for the comptroller's department that is impossible to accomplish. One rather well informed person said in his opinion authorities never will be able to administer and police the new tax. However, since no tax law ever was perfectly administered it may work better than now thought.

A simpler law would have been enacted no doubt, had the members of the legislature had more practical people advising them. No wonder it took the legislature eight long months to enact the law they passed on to the retailers to follow! It couldn't have been made that involved in less time!

Cards of Thanks. For years, probably for more than a quarter of a century, The Hesperian has made no charge for cards of thanks. One day a would-be customer walked out of the office in tears. She didn't have 65 cents to pay for a card of thanks. Times were a bit tough in those days and it was not unusual for most anybody not to have 65 cents.

Now it's Different. Since that day until this month we made no charge for a card of thanks. We couldn't tell who had the money and who didn't and we couldn't take any more tears. To head them off we followed the same policy to one and all—no charge. Nowadays people have the money to pay for the things they want—even people on the welfare rolls. So a new leaf is started. All cards of thanks charge at \$1.

Texas' Sales Tax is a two-fold thing. It is a sales tax on the purchaser; also it is a receipts tax on the seller. We collect from you and the state collects from us.

Advertising Exempt. Advertising is a part of the newspaper, a finished product, and will not be subject to the sales tax. Also, double barreled reason, it is a service and outside the scope of the act. The comptroller does not say so, but other competent authorities agree that that is correct.

Subscriptions Taxed. However, most everything else the newspaper will have to sell, including subscriptions, are taxable. When we sell a \$3 subscription here at home we will have to collect and remit 6 cents in addition. A \$4 subscription in the state calls for 8 cents tax to be collected. Subscriptions sold outside the state are not taxable. We are sure the newspapers are in for trouble trying to collect the extra cents.

Frost Date. The signs have got all the old timers we know guessing about when the first frost will fall or the killing freeze will occur. Some of the signs could be interpreted, they say, to indicate that Christmas will be stepping on the heels of the first frosty day. But others, like a less than 50-degree reading Tuesday, point to a frost that will catch all the late cotton with its little plants down. For our part we are strong for the late planter whose crop took so much punishment during the spring and early summer. Accordingly we may come out for a December frost or freeze, risking our record as the state's most able frost prognosticator.

Floyd County Said Ideal Place for Manhunt

(Special to the Hesperian) NEW YORK — Would-be brides, sit up and take note. Floyd County has a surplus of eligible bachelors on hand. Details of the over-supply are contained in a report just released by the U. S. Census Bureau. It is based on the latest material statistics, gathered in conjunction with last year's population count.

Numerically, not counting widowed or divorced people, there are 917 single men and boys locally and only 588 single women and girls, making the county a good place for a manhunt.

That it is such a good place has already been discovered by the fair sex. The figures show that they have been making appropriate use of the romantic opportunities.

The overall picture in Floyd County, taking into account both men and women of marriageable age, reveals that 73.9 percent of the total are now married.

That is a relatively large proportion. Elsewhere in the United States, the Census Bureau shows, the ratio is 67.5 percent. In the State of Texas it is 69.0 percent.

Yet, there remains a preponderance of bachelors locally. The chief reason for it according to the report, is that men wait much longer than women before getting married.

As a result, men in the United States are approximately 2½ years older than women when they first marry.

At the present time, the median age is 22.8 years for men and 20.3 years for women. Back in 1900 it was 25.9 for men and 21.9 for women.

The figures have been getting lower and lower in line with changing social and economic conditions that have been making it possible for young people to marry earlier. A principal one is the increased tendency of girls to continue working after marriage, at least for a year or two.

Where a person lives also seems to have an effect on his marital status. One of the striking facts brought out by the census is that a considerably larger proportion of farm men, compared with urban men, stay single. Among farm women, however, the reverse is true.

Reported also, for each community, is the number of ex-married residents. The Floyd County figures show for men: 106 widowed and 58 divorced and, for women, 438 widowed and 64 divorced.

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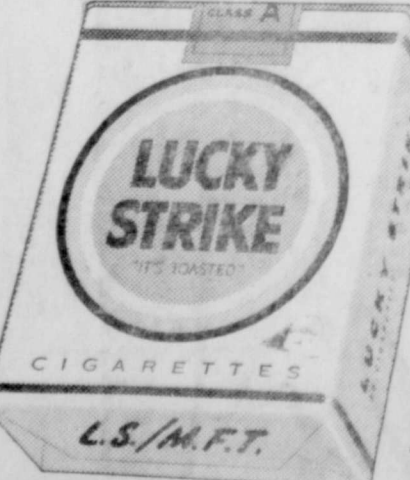

SHOULD WE PRAY TO MARY?

One came to Jesus and said, "Behold, thy mother and thy brethren stand without seeking to speak to thee. But he answered and said unto him that told him, Who is my mother? and who are my brethren? And he stretched forth his hand towards his disciples, and said, Behold my mother and my brethren! For whosoever shall do the will of my Father who is in Heaven, is my brother, and sister, and mother" (Matt. 12:47-50. See also Mark 3:31-35 and Luke 8:19-21. This same great truth is taught also in Luke 11:27-28).

In this teaching Jesus did not fail to honor His mother, but He elevated to equal honor all those faithful Christians who do God's will. He stressed that flesh-and-blood relationship, even to His mother, was not more important to Him than the close relationship of obedient followers.

Since Jesus did not place His mother on a pedestal above other godly women, let us consider whether we should pray to Mary or through her name. We are told that there is only one mediator between God and man, and that is Christ (1 Tim. 2:5).

Should we bow down to Mary? There is no account in the Bible of anyone ever bowing down before her. It was not considered pleasing to God for one to kneel in adoration before anyone but God. Peter would not allow others to bow down to him (Acts 10:25 - 26). When John bowed down before the angel, he was rebuked, "See thou do it not... worship God" (Rev. 19:10). Christians do not bow down to Peter or angels, or Mary. They worship God. Christians pray to God through Christ, not through Mary.

If we will have the same attitude toward Mary that Jesus did, we will honor Mary and honor in the same way all godly women.

Mr. and Mrs. Dilbone were taken to their home, where he asked them to see his wife. When she was brought to his bedside she fell back dead after looking at her lifeless form and face. Mr. and Mrs. Dilbone's coffins were made from lumber and were buried in one grave in the Southeast corner of the farm now owned by Luther Patterson and one-half mile west of Fletcher, Ohio on the Urbane Pike.

Henry and Barbara Dilbone Mrs. Dilbone's maiden name was Millhouse.

The Indians

The Indians who were found on this continent east of the Mississippi River did not exceed 200,000 in number. In Mexico, Peru and the Indis, there was an immense population. They were the successors of the Mound Builders.

The Indians built no cities, no ships, no school houses or no churches. They erected only temporary bark wigwams and canoes. As far as education is concerned, the Indians had none. The hunting grounds, the battle field, embraced everything of real honor or value to them. So the young warrior was educated to throw the tomahawk, shoot the arrow and catch fish. He knew nothing of books, writing or history.

The Indian had neither cow nor beast of burden. They thought work was degrading and fit only for women. So the squaw built the wigwam, cut the wood and carried his burdens while he journeyed.

While the Indians were fishing and hunting, the squaw would clear the ground for his corn by scratching it with a crooked stick or dig it with a calm shell. She would also dress skins for his clothing and cook his food by dropping ht sthite in g.s. 6i

After the Indians had left this part of the country, they slipped back o kill Mr. Garret but by mistake they came upon Mr. and Mrs. Dilbone who were in the field gathering flax with their children, John, Margaret or Peggie as she was called, Priscilla and Will.

Dryland seeding of native grasses on cropland diverted from cultivation has been very successful with many Floyd County farmers. One of these is Fess Whitfill of Floydada who seeded a 50-acre field in the spring of 1959 to Side Oats Grama. He now has a perfect stand of native grass that seems to be very drought resistant and completely adapted to the deep clay soils of Floyd County under dryland conditions.

Whitfill's only care that he has given his grass besides deferring it since it is in the Conservation Reserve, has been to shred the field once in 1959, twice in 1960 and once in 1961 to control weeds while the grass was getting established.

Soil Conservation Service technicians estimated he now has over 6,000 pounds of forage per acre produced from his grass. Besides being used as part of a needed land use adjustment of converting cropland to permanent grassland it is an excellent soil builder and could be used as a cover for acreage diverted under the grain sorghum program.

The Great Plains Conservation Program administered by the Soil Conservation Service through local offices offers cost-sharing

Wilson said that since August, 1960, there has been a decline of some six cents per pound in the price paid broiler producers in Texas, to a low of 12 cents or less. He pointed out that 14 to 16 cents per pound is the usual cost of raising broilers.

The Attorney General is invoking a court-of-inquiry to investigate the possibility of anti-trust violations.

DRIVERS SLOW DOWN—State Highway Department survey indicates a continued slow-down in average speed on Texas highways. This year the study indicated an average of 53.3 miles per hour for passenger cars clocked by hidden radar at 25 locations over the state. This compares with 55.9 MPH in 1960, and 56.2 MPH in 1959. Average speed for trucks was 50.1 MPH, compared with 51.2 MPH last year. Buses slowed down slightly from 60.7 MPH last year to 60.5 MPH in the recent survey.

LIETUNANT GOVERNOR'S RACE SHAPING—Many eyes of Texans are beginning to look in the direction of the Lieutenant Governor's office, vacated by Ben Ramsey's appointment as Railroad Commissioner.

One candidate, Republican O. W. Hayes of Temple, has announced he definitely will be in the race. Other definite possibilities include House Speaker James A. Turman of Gober, Sen. 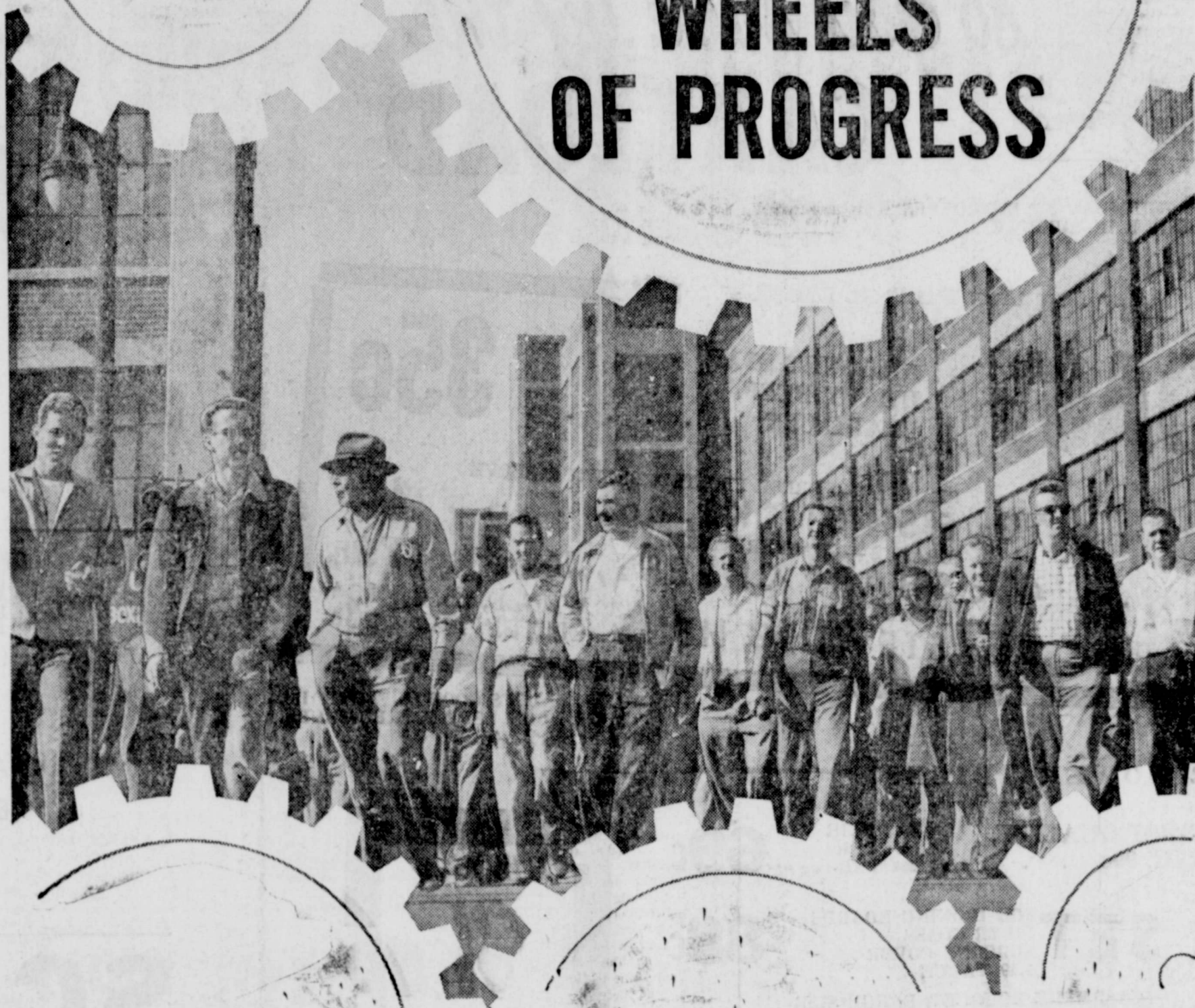

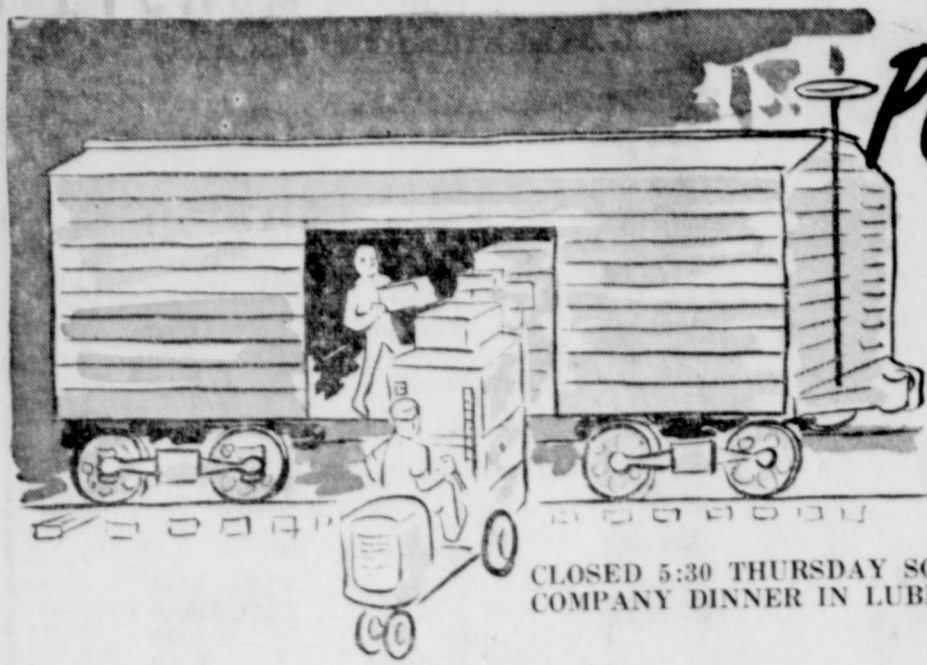

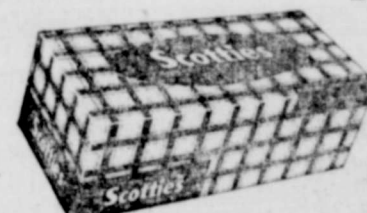
