ARE COMMUNISTS HERE?

A Baptist minister, who beat it out of Cuba barely ahead of the gendarmes, told a group of newsmen the other day at Quanah that we may not be laying enough stress on our battle with communism, that is, not making the issue more clearly

We have arrived at the point where preserving our nation from the communists may be even for a greater cause than just preserving the American way of life, as so many of us think. The fact, is, he said, we may be at the point where the issue is saving the country for Christ.

His experience in Cuba-he was a native who did not want to leave-had taught him, he said, that no one knows who is a communist. There may be communists in this very room, he said. Which gave his listeners a creepy feeling. Are there actually any Communists in West Texas?

DEMOS WIN SPECIAL ELECTIONS

To date the Democrats have lost no contests to fill vacancies in state and national offices. Noisiest of these was at San Antonio in the congressional special election. Culmination of the next Congressional campaign comes on Dec. 16 when a successor to Frank Ikard of the Wichita Falls district is to be named.

Deaths and resignations also are causing special elections in the State Senate and House of Representatives. Resignations of the San Antonio and the Wichita Falls representatives were, in each instance, to take important political appointments made possible by the Democratic victory in November a year ago.

REPUBLICAN GETS BIG VOTE

Although acclaimed as an important victory for the Democrats it was, to us, significant that the Republican candidate polled 45 per cent of the big

While San Antonio district years ago sent a Republican to congress, no such thing had transpired in the recent political history of that dis-

Many Democrats in Texas are saying they have cast off the Democratic party and are voting Republican henceforth. From our point of view the thing for a Democrat to do is to stay in the party and put up the fight inside the organization. Texas has not done so badly as a Democratic state. The fact is that Texas is one of the best managed states in the nation. This is notably not true of many states where the Republicans and Democrats see saw back and forth in power.

TWO PARTY STATE

The hue and cry, the sound and fury, is raised for a two-party state for the sake of better administration of the state's affairs. This idea that a two-party state will have healthier conditions in public affairs than a one-party state is a myth that is easily exploded by research.

If one wants to vote Republican - or Democratic-because he leans that way, well and good. But not in the expectation that changing over from a preponderant Democratic state to a state of mixed political power will be of value. Study Illinois, New Jersey, New Hampshire and Vermont

STATE SALES TAX COLLECTIONS

Last week about 90 thousand of the estimated 130 or 140 thousand retailers in the state had made reports and remitted for September sales tax collections. The possible receipts were not sufficiently complete to give a clear indication that the income would be sufficient to overcome the state's deficit and meet the "growing needs" talked of so freely during the legislative session.

The comptroller is now faced with the job of shelling the woods for the little fish who are not yet "numbered" and haven't sent in their widows'

The "growing needs" of the state are likely to call for more and more collections by the retailers. We note that Pennsylvania's much admired "system" now is up to four cents. "Growing needs" has an ingrown hormone.

THE PUBLIC PAYS CHEERFULLY

But while the retailers moan and the newspapers gripe about the state's new sales tax the public seems to be taking it with good grace, cheerfully paying off. We've yet to hear of the first complaint by a consumer. Evidently the public mind had been conditioned to the added costs and are going along because they think it is probably the best way out. Many think it is good because it entails contributions by a good many people who have not helped out on public expense heretofore.

WASHINGTONIA-A WASTEFUL DISEASE

Waste again in Washington attaches to the vast pile of marble or masonry which is being built for the members of the United States Senate, and for the House of Representatives.

Those of us who deplored that vast waste which is called the Supreme Court Building and decried the house of the Chambered Nautilus, that pile of corridors and offices and hide aways called the Pentagon, can now huff and puff about the new office chambers of our senators and congressmen -and see how little good it will do.

We are being asked by many ginners and producer customers what kind of cotton we think they should put into our POOL and what we think they should sell on the open market. They are also asking at what prices we think they should stop selling on the open market and place into the pool. Of course we cannot give a positive answer but we feel reasonably sure we can make our customers money if they follow the table of grades and prices outlined below on most of this cotton.

We recommend your putting into the pool any of the following cotton that will not bring more than the prices shown on the open mar-

bring at least 225 points over the loan. All straight spots, greys and tinges, etc., should bring quite a little more over the loan than the figures shown for the comparative light spotted. The big demand is now, and will be next Spring and Summer, for the SLM-Mid Lt Spots and lower grades.

Our reasoning in arriving at the above figures is that over one half the crop we will produce in the Plains area will find its way into the loan and the price will be more or less governed by this fact and also depends to a great extent on the amount of cotton placed with our organization or one of the others of such a nature available to the producers. Another important factor is that some 300,000 acres, more or less, have been contracted in the fields and will not be for sale on the open market. The above, plus the fact that we have a small carry over of cotton compared with past years, and with no increase in acres for the next crop, we feel will lead to higher prices next Spring and Summer than are now being paid.

We are very happy with the reception our organization has been receiving all over the area and we wish to apologize to those of you who have called and sent word for us to come meet with you and to date we have not been able to get around. We will manage to get around within the next few days, however, as we are visiting with some group most every
