#### ECONOMIC INDEX STUDY

Patrons of school districts over the plains will be glad to know that a study is being made at least of the way the Economic Index works. Economic Index is a term used in Texas educational circles when financing schools is under discussion.

Eighty-ninth District Representative, H. G. Wells was appointed chairman recently of a House Committee to study the equity of the term used to determine local school district's share of financing the Foundation School Program. It is understood, also, that the State Board of Education, whomsoever that might be, also is

studying the problem.

#### HEAVY DRAIN ON FLOYDADA

Application of the economic index (a legal formula not generally understood) in recent years has been costing Foydada Independent School District and others in the state a great deal of money, resulting in an increased local tax burden.

Districts in this position keep scraping the bottom of the barrel in an effort to make their expenditures stay within their income. We do not have the figures at hand that the economic index has drained off of Floydada District alone but it has been a considerable sum of money and seems to get bigger with the passing years.

Where the money goes to-what districts get it—and whether it is equitable for them to do sois one of the matters local taxpayers would like to have enlightenment on.

#### THE ABANDONED PROPERTY LAW

The abandoned property law of Texas, as amended to have teeth, has several local firms looking for the rightful claimants for accounts, refund checks and the like. Most of these firms would be glad to have these accounts off their books. Checks for items as little as two and three cents, unclaimed by long missing customers, as well as other items for larger amounts are lying "dormant" on the books of these concerns. The business institutions must "do something about it" soon and report to the state what the disposition was. Finally the books will be cleared up by turning in the funds to the state if no claimants are

#### ONLY BANKS EXEMPTED

This law, known as the escheat law, is one which has been a part of the law of most all nations in one form or another, for centuries, back into antiquity, for that matter. The principle is that property which belongs to nobody, belongs to the state. In England it is spoken of as belonging

The new Texas enactment, which strengthened the escheat law that has been a part of the basic law all the time, was made to apply to all forms of business except the banks. Strong opposition from bankers representatives at Austin resulted in exempting banks from the provisions.

Bankers maintained the law did not offer them sufficient protection nor yet sufficient protection to the unknown owners of the funds which had been entrusted to their care.

### THE GOVERNOR IS A BULLDOG

governor has been impatient to get the socalled abandoned property bill through the legislature. It has been a top priority project with him for four years. It has not gotten "off the ground" yet, so far as banks are concerned.

But the governor is the bull dog type. He does not give up easily. He is putting on the pressure. When the "bugs" are ironed out of the proposals, when adequate protection is afforded, when proper safeguards for legal claims are set up, the bank people are likely to realize they do not have a leg to stand on. They clearly have no right to abandoned funds, and do not claim the funds, but they do have responsibilities to possible claimants for

### GOOD PUBLIC RELATIONS

Since banks are the only group that has carried on a persistent fight against turning over abandoned funds to the state it is likely to leave the public pretty cold. Pipeline, insurance and utility companies, as well as hundreds of membershipowned cooperatives, have made no outcry against the law, although it does create another legal nuisance for all of them.

So, when the point is cleared up on the "trust relationship" of a bank with its depositors, an ethical matter, they are likely to accede. This means they must divulge dormant and abandoned accounts, and that is going to be distasteful. But it is not going to be good politics to hold out too

### NEW YORK AN EXAMPLE

In New York State banks give notice of names of persons appearing as owners of "unclaimed property" in amounts of \$25 or more. The rule in that state is that notice be given by the bank in September, that the funds be held until October 31 and after that date, before November 10, the property be turned over to the State Comptroller and public notice given that the bank "shall thereupon cease to be liable therefor.'

This is not to suggest that because New York or any eastern state has a certain kind of law, Texas should follow suit. If there is any set rule we would suggest for Texas, it would be to see what has been done in New York State and do the opposite. But the example is proof that it is being done elsewhere.

## CARBON MONOXIDE IS A KILLER
