A BETTER STATE OF MIND

The state of mind of the people of the nation, it seems to us, is much better as the first day of 1962 approaches than it was a year ago at the same time. 
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

welfare of the people of the plains country is the income tax suit which is due to begin its journey through the courts next Wednesday. The suit to which we refer is that brought by High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in the name of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Shurbet . against Internal Revenue Service.

The background for the suit has a simple and direct fact at stake: If, as is claimed by geologists and authorities, a land owner is "mining" his underground water to carry on his farming operations then he is entitled to a depletion allowance on income the same as any other mine operator. His problem, if the principle can be established, then remains to determine what his land was worth before he began applying water to it, then find what the water added to the value, then determine a rate at which the water is being depleted.

STAKES ARE HIGH

The "principle" seems to be pretty well established in the minds of all concerned but everybody wants the depletion claim put to the test in the courts. The Internal Revenue Service is unwilling to take it upon itself to admit the validity of a claim for depletion credit.

The case has been months in the making, since all directly concerned want all the facts, both pro and con, completely advanced, so as to be sure all angles are considered. The assumption is that the case will go at least as far as a Circuit Judges" court, possibly to the Supreme Court.

Of the drilling of irrigation wells in the high plains district there is no end. Eighty-three permits were issued in the month of November in the High Plains Water District, seven of them in Floyd County. In this county all seven wells were drilled and put to use.

SCREWWORMS ARE EXPENSIVE

The success of the Florida cattlemen in eradicating the screwworm in their area fired up cattle people of the southwest two or three years ago to try the same in this area.

But the couthwestern cattle kingdom is so large (covering four states and parts of another or two, and in addition extending into Old Mexico) ability to "swing" the deal has been doubted. State Securities Commission issued permits to sell more than \$49,000,000 worth of securities during November.


