Wilks Laundry Explosion Covers Area With Debris

A terrific explosion heard all over Floydada and surrounding area Thursday night resulted in complete loss of the W. J. Wilks Laundry, which is located on Third Street, between Missouri and California Sts., two blocks west of the town square. The building in the background is the Wilks garage at 400 West California. Property east and west of the explosion was damaged more than property north and south. (Staff photo made during a heavy overcast.)

Griffin Residence Damaged Heavy damage was reported from the Ed Griffins, 402 West California where only four windows remain intact in the home. Their back door was blown out and splintered in to three sections. Dishes were knocked from the upstairs attic.

Windows at the homes owned by Nell Swinson, Mrs. Jess Wood, Roy Patton, Leroy Burns, and Sam Thurman, Mrs. E. P. Nelson, Fred Battey, Dillon Patterson, Mrs. Mae Garrett, and Mrs. Arnold Schuppert were blown out. At the Alva Sparks home a large bay window was blown out which measured 40 by 44 inches. As were two smaller windows in the upstairs attic.

There was no boiler in the building but there was a big hot water heater, used to furnish water to the automatic washers. A thermostat governing the heater, as well as a safety valve both failed to function, according to one investigator. The building housed four large dryers and 20 automatic washers, besides other equipment and clothing of customers.

Time of blast was set at about 5 a. m. The clock in the W. J. Wilks home, adjacent to the laundry stopped at 5:05. Damage to the Wilks home was relatively light, compared to homes east and west.

All Escape Injury Mr. and Mrs. Robert Day of Winnemucca, Nev., here visiting the Wilks, were asleep in the north bedroom, receiving the most damage. Mrs. Day said shattered glass fell all over the bed but neither was cut or scratched. Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Norris and family, Carlsbad, N. Mex., were also visitors in the Wilks home but they too, as well as Mr. and Mrs. Wilks, escaped injury.

As far as could be determined there were no injuries from the explosion. However persons interviewed said they were plenty frightened. Some living a distance away thought the sound of the explosion was a sonic boom.

Reports From Home Owners Mrs. H. O. Pope, 328 W. Calif. St., lost some ten windows in her home. The frame of the house was shaken and a number of glass articles inside the home were broken or damaged. Debris was thrown up in trees like match sticks and across lawns. Mrs. Pope was in Dallas at the time of the explosion, possibly escaping injury. H. G. Parker at 321 W. Calif.

Dedication Of Catholic Church Dream Come True For Whitfills

The first Catholic church in Floyd County has fulfilled the dreams of many in this area. It was dedicated on December 17 in Floydada by Bishop John L. Morkovsky of Amarillo. One couple who saw the dream come true are Mr. and Mrs. Fess Whitfill who donated the five acre plot the new St. Mary Magdalen church was built on.

Shurbet Case Is Backed By Water Board

Trial of the water depletion income tax suit of Marvin and Mildred Shurbet, Allmon farm couple, against the federal government, went to trial Wednesday in federal district court for the Northern District of Texas at Lubbock.

The suit, filed in 1961, seeks refund of \$300 in income taxes paid in 1959. In it the couple claim that a water depletion allowance which they claimed should have been allowed, in their farming operations the Shurbets, like thousands of plainsmen, use water from the underground.

The contention is that underground water is a natural resource in the same sense as oil and gas, and that persons who "mine" it for the purpose of obtaining income should receive a depletion allowance, similar to the allowance made for petroleum producers.

High Plains Underground Water District No. 1 is sponsoring the suit. Shurbet formerly was president of this organization, resigning to accept appointment by Governor Daniel on the State Water Board. The case has been under study for seven years, Shurbet and officials of the water district point out.

Pre-trial meetings have been held to adjust procedural matters and technicalities which might result in failure to get a trial of the suit by its parties. Lawyers of the Department of Justice and an attorney of the Internal Revenue Service are representing the government in the law suit.

In the petition, it is contended that a user who can show an actual cost of underground water which is used productively to secure income should be entitled to deduct the cost of the water as it is used.

If the Shurbets win the case, it would affect the income tax status of about 20,000 farmers of the high plains, who are operating about 50 thousand irrigation wells.

The estimate is that about \$6 million in income taxes would be saved annually for the area.

BLAZES CATCH IN WEED AND WASTE COTTON TRASH

Floydada Fire boys had two calls Saturday one shortly after 12 noon and the other at 2:30 p.m. The first was a run to Davis Gin where nearby burning trash caught waste cotton on the gin yard fire. No damage was reported.

The afternoon blaze was at Lakeview Gin where sparks caught several acres of weeds and grass afire. No reports of damage were received from this blaze.

Fallout Shelter Survey Foreseen

H. N. Tower, Civil Defense City Co-ordinator of Lubbock has met with the architectural engineering firm of Parish, Smith and Cooper, who have contracted with the Federal government to make a survey of buildings in Lubbock and surrounding counties for possible fallout shelters.

On January 3 these engineers met in Albuquerque to report their findings. On January 10 they will meet again in Lubbock and will start a physical survey of all the fallout shelters in the district. A windshield survey has already been completed.

Owners contacted are asked to cooperate if their buildings are assigned as fallout shelters. The federal government will stockpile the buildings with food and water.

The federal government will not make any modifications to buildings appropriated or furnished improvements but will just stockpile the shelters with food and water.

"The reason why our program has not gone any faster is that the Civil Defense has been waiting for the district, state and federal government to offer a master plan," said county defense coordinator Bob Miller this week. Civil Defense has hesitated to appoint people for positions that would cause unnecessary work, he said.

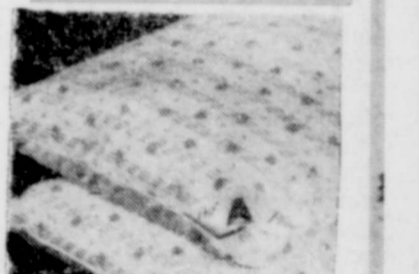

The December 20th issue of FOOD AND HOME NOTES, published by the United States Washington, D. C. contained the following article on

PECAN PIE

"A holiday favorite with many U. S. Department of Agriculture employees is pecan pie—made by the same recipe for over 25 years in the cafeteria bake shop.

This popular southern specialty is served every Friday in the Department's cafeterias in Washington, D. C.; and many people take pecan pies home regularly from the bakery sales room. Around holiday time, the bakers really have to hustle to fill all the orders. Now, when pecans are so plentiful and prices are down, you may want to try this family-size version of the USDA pecan pie formula for your holiday entertaining. This recipe makes just enough filling for a 10-inch pie or two 7-inch pies.

The head baker, Mrs. Sophia Douglas, has found that using shallow pans of these sizes is just about right. A deep filling makes the pie too rich for most people. If you have to use a 9-inch pie pan, pour in a shallow layer of filling and use the rest for a couple of tarts.

PECAN PIE 4 eggs 1 cup granulated sugar pinch of salt 2 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon melted butter 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 - 1/2 cups dark corn syrup 1 cup pecan halves or pieces unbaked pastry shell, one 10-inch or two 7-inch or one 9-inch and tarts

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Beat eggs just until blended but not frothy. Add sugar, salt, and corn syrup.

Last add cooled melted butter and vanilla. Mix just enough to blend. Spread nuts in bottom of pie shell. Pour in filling. Place filled pies in oven. Then turn temperatures setting back to 325 degrees F and bake 50 to 60 minutes until set. USDA cafeteria bakers use shallow pans for her special pecan pies. She spreads the nuts in unbaked shells, then adds the filling."

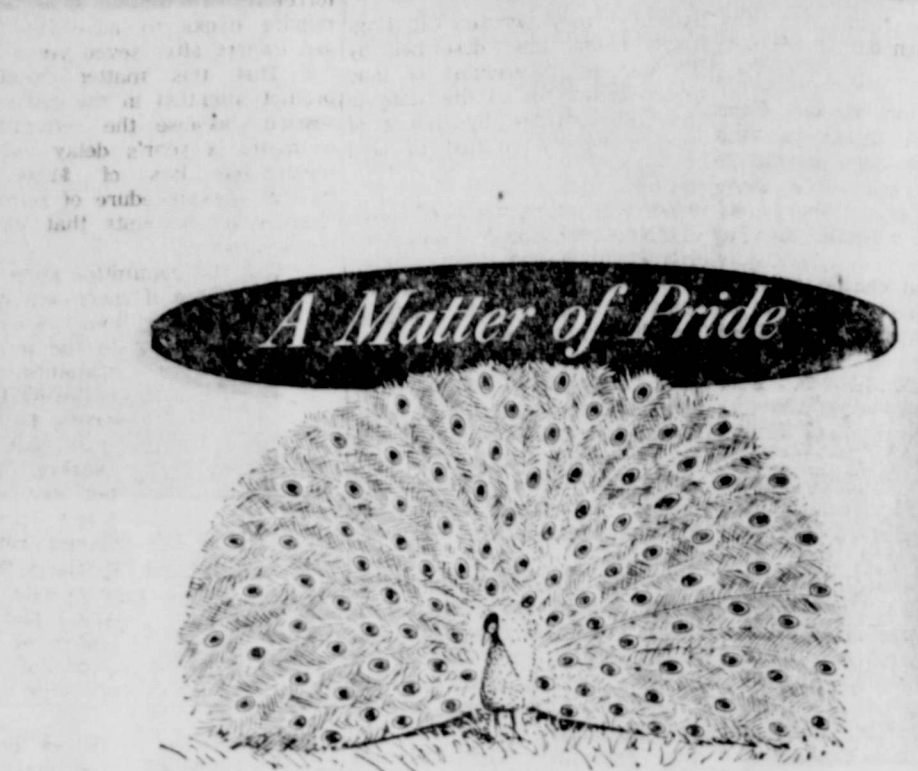

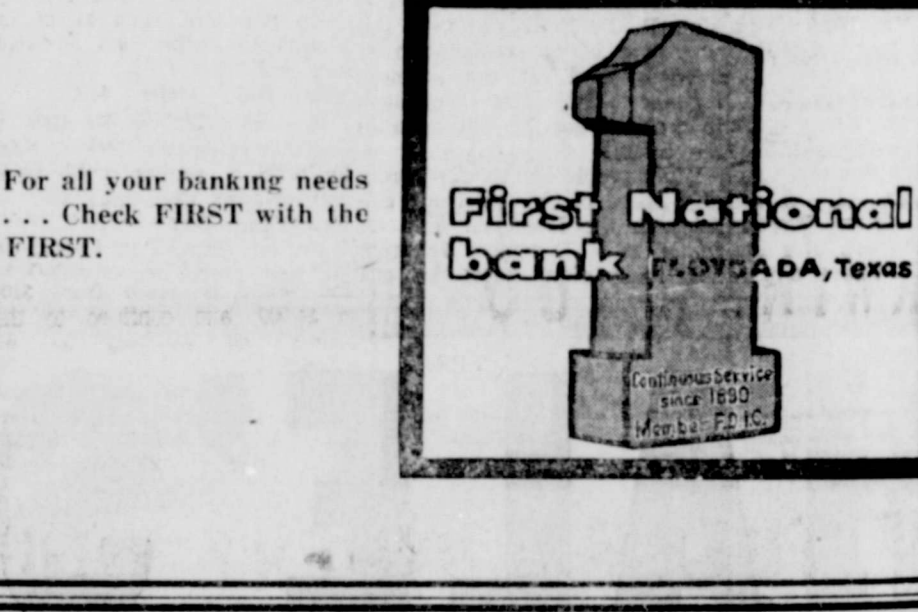

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

"Escheat" is a word from Roman history; written Old English during the next century under the name of Webster as, "Reversion of land to the crown, or to the state in the United States, by failure of persons legally entitled to hold the same."

Escheat provisions were incorporated in the constitution of the Republic of Texas, and enacted as a state statute in 1835. Texas law always has stated that when anybody dies without heirs, or disappears and can't be found, his property shall be turned over to the state, after seven years. But the law has lacked a provision by which persons or institutions holding property of missing persons were required to report it.

Governor Daniel started pushing for a provision three years ago, and last summer the Legislature finally passed a reporting provision. But the bankers have fought long and successfully. They are still exempt from the reporting law, although all other businesses and public agencies most comply.

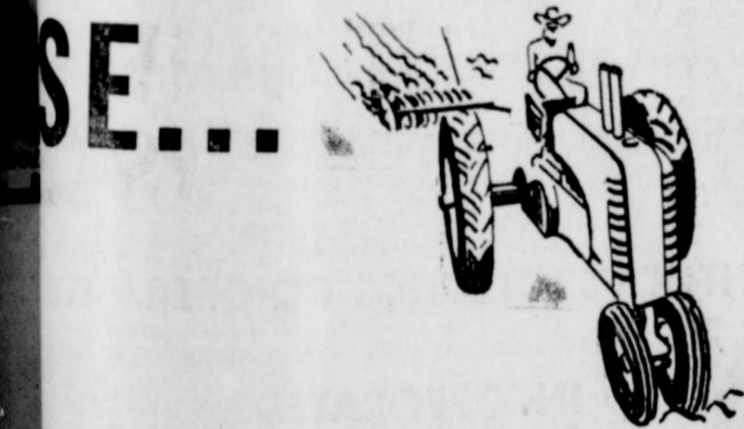

**LOAN SHARK LEGISLATION**  
—Although the Governor hasn't said he'll introduce loan legislation at the special session, it's considered a safe bet that the uproar over "loan shark" practices of sky-high interest rates will prompt him to place this issue on the January agenda.

The Legislative Council had a heated debate, and voted 92 to commend a loan bill backed by Representative Criss Cole of Houston.

Cole's bill sets a 10 per cent ceiling on interest to be charged on loans.  
A lender would be able to charge more than 10 per cent on loans under \$1,500 only if he got a state license, paying \$200 for investigation and \$200 a year license fee. To get the license, he'd have to hold \$15,000 in liquid assets for each loan office, and post a \$20,000 surety bond, plus \$5,000 for each branch, plus the \$200 annual fee for each office.

Cole's bill calls for creation of a Consumer Finance Commission which would examine each lender's books annually, at the expense of the lender.  
Interest charges would be limited to 10 per cent per annum on the amount of cash advanced; plus a "service and availability charge" of 3-4th of one per cent per month for each \$1 of the first \$400 of the loan on loans over \$100.  
On loans under \$100, the charge would be \$1 for each \$5 borrowed, with at least 15 days to be allowed to repay each \$5 of the loan.  
If excessive charges are made, the lender would have no right to collect principal or charges, and would be fined from \$100 to \$1,000, and confined to the county jail as long as six months.

Guidebook outlines procedures and requirements for obtaining building loans from seven federal agencies, some of which are virtually unknown to the average citizen or organization.  
Response has been so great that the original order of 3,000 copies is just about depleted. Committee Chairman Senator Crawford C. Martin has ordered a second printing.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has asked the Attorney General to take "all necessary steps" to stop dredging of a deep water channel in Calhoun County until that county's navigation district returns 20,639 acres of unused underwater land to the state.  
Agriculture Commissioner John C. White says he will run for re-election. He's been defeated since he first won the post in 1950.  
Senator Ralph W. Yarborough announces that preliminary design work has started on a special commemorative stamp honoring the late Sam Rayburn.  
Brigadier General Everett S. Simpson is encouraging Texas men to enlist in the Texas National Guard's 36th Infantry Division. The six-months active duty training program will be reinstated this month.

## Who Must File 1961 Tax Return

All citizens or residents of the United States, including minor children, who had gross incomes of \$600 or more in 1961, must file a federal income tax return. Elton W. Davidson, Administrative Officer, Internal Revenue Service, Plainview, says:  
If the taxpayer is 65 or over as of December 31, 1961, he or she is not required to file unless his or her gross income for 1961 was at least \$1,200.

The IRS representative added that even though a taxpayer is not required to file under these rules, he or she must file to obtain a refund, if any income tax was withheld from his or her pay. He said there is one exception to the general rule. Self-employed persons such as sole proprietors, partners, and independent contractors, must file an income tax return and pay a self-employment tax, if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

The filing deadline this year is Monday, April 16.

Also on the list of plentiful foods for January are broiler-fryers, apples, Irish potatoes, pecans, frozen and canned cherries and dry beans.

The Agricultural Marketing Service, in cooperation with growers and the food trade, selected these items as being in supply that exceeds normal needs. There's a different list each month.
