However, scientists say that the common cold is occasioned by any number of different viruses. They are not certain how many. So no cold vaccine could be more than partially successful because all the viruses have not been tracked down and catalogued as yet, much less a vaccine found that includes all of them. And fad cures might as well be forgotten. Plenty of rest and sleep are best.

ONCE IT WAS SIMPLER

While we thus are seen to agree with the modern medical and scientific savants, we would like for it to be known that we would be on the other side, were we living in another, now past, generation.

Time there was when children were protected from the raw, wintry weather diseases, usually respiratory, in a simple manner.

The child, when he was sewn into his winter underwear, had a little sack of asafoetida tied to the end of a strong string around his neck. From reports, we understand, it was quite effective, the smell helping to kill off all but the most virulent germs.

A YEAR OF CONTROVERSY

Appearances now indcate that the year of 1962 may turn out to be one of more than the usual controversy between disagreeing elements on the domestic scene.

The new farm program, now in the planning. and fall out shelters, whether to provide or not to provide, on the individual or the community-wide basis, are due to come in for a great deal of consideration. Also there is due to continue the controversy over the state of the rural electric cooperatives, which the power producing industry considers a continuing threat to private enterprise.

COOPERATIVES ON THE DEFENSIVE

The electric companies feel the cooperatives should move out of the way as territories fill up. They have a point but it is a fine one and one that should be worked out between them and the cooperatives. The latter, having gone into the territories when they were thinly populated and having made their financial commitments do not ieal they are getting a fair shake when they are asked to abandon an area that has become sufficiently lucrative for the private companies to want to move





THEY VIEW WITH ALARM

Without attempting to present the fors and againsts, sufficient to say that WT C of C is supported by interests which view the electric cooperatives as a part of the movement to get the government deeper into the power industry and eventually for public power to take over furnishing electric energy for the nation.

There are giants on both sides of the controversy, and the cooperatives just happen to be squeezed in between the two.

For our part, since all hands will be cornered into taking a stand, we want neither the cooperatives nor the private operatives to be put out of business. The cooperatives have a place in the scheme of things and the power companies have also. Accordingly, like most middle of the roaders, we'll wind up being called a straddler.

RELIGIOUS CONTROVERSY


Other controversies which will rage and continue to get more sensitive in this year include religion in schools and the support of private schools with public funds.

Some of these are issues which cannot be made to adjust themselves through compromise.


THIS IS "ELECTION YEAR"



has a psychological angle. A nuclear blast is one of those things that can't happen but might. And where does one go from there?


