





NO PLACEMENT OFFICE

Determined that no action of theirs would give the appearance of willingness for the Federal government to get its "foot in the door" in connection with farm management and labor relations, farmers here last Friday gave evidence they were not for Texas Employment Commission to locate a placement representative in the county.

Texas Employment Commission has been assigned the job of making a weekly survey of wages paid in this county and making a report to a central agency, which takes their report as a basis of fact and issue a ruling on "prevailing" wages that must be paid braceros. This is the relation with labor, which, no doubt, predicated objection to spread of its activity to the local area.

The farmers referred to are those of a group who told the Commissioners Court in a public hearing Friday that they were opposed to the move. If sentiment had been indicated as favorable the county would have supplied office room for the TEC man at taxpayer expense.

REPRESENTATION IS SMALL

Representation at the hearing was small because others were preoccupied by the demands of their business or harvest. There was no doubt that any larger number of farm people would have given the court the same answer.

Only town people present thought the idea was a good one and favored the establishment of a local office. (1) because it would add another family to the population, and (2) because it would get the Commission closer to those who had business with it (the unemployed through no fault of their own). A claimant must make a weekly trip to the nearest office of TEC in order to collect unemployment compensation. Also, it is embarrassing not to be able to send a job seeker to somebody who could answer his questions intelligently.

PROTEST AT LOCAL LEVEL

Perhaps these considerations are of no consequence but regional offices of the Texas Employment Commission are in such large cities as Lubbock and Amarillo without evidence of protest, and district offices in such cities as Plainview. Concern over possible location of a local office in Floydada is, therefore, not understandable to us.

Fortunately the Chamber of Commerce kept its nose clean in this regard. It sought for and got a hearing in which unmistakable objection was indicated, and graciously bows to the will of the majority, which it is intended to serve in the first

RESISTS FEDERAL PRESSURES

Texas Employment Commission is a state agency, which was fought for by the state authorities at the time the current plan was in the formative perior. It is about the only agency (possibly the only one) that Texas authorities were able to keep on the state's rights basis. All the others that we know about have local people in direct relation with the federal government without regard to state

Through the establishment of the agency on a basis the most of the millions that are col- turn out a 500-pound lected (farmers do not pay any of it) stay in the state and state administration of its affairs, (including the distribution of moneys) is kept in Texas. A three-man commission, one of whom represents the worker, the employer and the public, respectively, operates it. To date they have been able to resist pressures from the federal bureaucracy and the labor over lords.

IS HARD WEATHER DUE?

Has the wather cycle reached the point where Boreas is going to trigger some cold weather for the plains of Texas? No telling, of course, but it might be-and a good thing, too, should it come. Floyd County fields need some assistance in ridding the ground of insect pests. They need for winter to make a foray at the boll weevil. With several moderate winters, some of them extremely so, the weevil has moved westward. There were some signs of weevils in Floyd County in the 1961 crop.

Boll weevils put the black lands out of the running as a major cotton producing area in the early part of this century. The weevil has never been a threat in this part of the cotton producing country and presumably will not be again, because of the severity of winters. Which is one reason why we need a February of severe cold. There are other insect pests which a cold winter would not exactly encourage.

A NEW KIND OF GIN?

Although many improvements have been made to result in the modern gin plant, the basic model that grew out of Eli Whitney's inventive mind is still being used.

The gin stand with its saws and ribs to sep-· arate the fibre from the seed is the gin. The other things are needed to make the gin complete, the cleaners, dryers, presses, et cetera, et cetera. An investor can spend about as much money as he has on improvements for his gin plant, and sometimes he does, it seems. But it is all built around the whirling saw that carries the lint through the "ribs", tears it apart from the seed and drops the seed in a bin while the lint is blown into a receptacle, pressed and sent out to clothe the world.

All this only to say that there should be some kind of a break through to get cotton processed faster and without such a tremendous investment in plants. Even a mobile gin plant can be imagined.

No Answer Yet. The damage such as was done last week to the distribution systems of telephone and power lines requres a peculiar combination of weather. There must be the right kind of moisture falling in the right temperature and a wind to go along with them. When the three conditions get "right" the serviceman knows to expect a call out into the weather to see what he can do. There has been no mechanical answer found yet. Experiments are still going on but the force is practically irresistable and it may be a long time before an adequate remedy is found this side of burying the lines in the ground.


Millions Wasted. Because many people are overweight and need to reduce, foods, pills, vitamin supplements, drugs for weight control are legion. On these and such gadgets as vibrators, electric belts and mechanical exercises health authorities estimate that millions are wasted_annually. Actually no trick or miracle foods are needed. Generally the weight reducer needs re-educating to the amount of food needed per day, stressing variety in the daily diet. Taken thus we are told the average person can lose weight on 1,500 calories per day, provided some moderate exercise is also taken daily.

Weather. The Floyd County cotton crop lost quite a bit of tonnage after October 1 due to weather, in addition to the attrition of hail and rainstorms that pestered some areas in the spring and summer. This cotton loss was occasioned by wetness and green cotton. Probably eight thousand bales were lost in this manner, in the field and at the gin. Usually 2,000 pounds of pulled seed cotton will bale. Many farmers hauled 2,600 pounds to get the same amount of weight this year.

Sesame Seed. A trucker enroute to Muleshoe this week told us he had 600 thousand pounds of sesame seed to haul from that point to a California destination and would haul dried fruit on the back haul. Muleshoe farm operators are also having some luck with early-planted corn according to report from High Plains Research Station.

Governor Winning. The called session of the legislature is due to pass the escheat bill wanted by the governor, which will be watered down to some extent, however, as possibly it should be. Also the plan to put farm to market road maintenance on an assured basis. Whatever is or is not done about the loan shark mess will not be satisfactory to many people. We, frankly, wouldn't have a good idea on how to cope with this situation in Texas. We doubt if the governor or the legislature

Cotton Mechanized. Probably three - fourths of the cotton crop in Floyd County was harvested the past season by mechanical means. It follows there is no reason to expect next year's crop to be less so. Producers are "running" from an arbitrary federal Labor Department which has been given a free hand in many ways. The average farmer speaks of the Bracero program as pretty well scuttled, and he realizes that the number of cap-able, efficient laborers worth the money is limited. He has to do something, he thinks.
