EMERGENCY BLANKET APPEAL

In our memory there has always been an emergency somewhere in the world in some far away land, where people were cold or hungry and needed succor desperately. Our first recollections in prereading days includes looking at pictures of little pot bellied, sad-eyed dark complected kids. They were Indians, we were told, on the other side of the world, where the sun had baked the dry earth, and people were dying in hovels, on the roadway and in the streets from lack of food.

ALWAYS HELPING OTHER PEOPLE

All of this, no doubt, was fact. We recall how we wished for some money to send the starving people. It wasn't money they needed. It was food, clothing, a means of keeping warm, but money could buy these.

We find people still that way in our country. Our people have not yet, since shortly after the Civil War, related lack of money to lack of something to eat-the danger of lacking food and cover. The widows hunt for their mites to send to a foreign land, along with the wealthy in the hope of alleviating hunger; cold, anguish. Emergency! Always an emergency!

DO NOT EXPECT REWARD

No less now than always, perhaps even more demanding are times. War victims, hurricane victims, refugees, earthquake victims, migrants, hospitals without medicine and equipment, the need is almost monotonous. And always the constant response, no questions asked of the worthiness of the agency which undertakes the task.

Right now Church World Service, Inc., is appealing for blankets (or quilts, comforts, afghans) for people in distress in 25 countries, a large per cent of whom are in lands where American prestige and influence is low.

The shivering refugees of the world await your help." a million pounds of blankets needed. And, should you help, remember not to expect appreciation of your country as the country of its origin. They may appreciate individuals but as soon as they get comfortable they're ready to rock the American flag, spit on emissaries of our country. Much of the population of the earth is like that, so that virtue must be its own reward.

EUROPEAN COMMON MARKET

After many centuries of going it alone-centuries of battles, economic as well as military, the European Common Market is emerging in Europe. This may be viewed as another one of those far away things to the average American, but the exact opposite is due to prove true. The European Common Market is going to make vast economic changes in our country. It is, in fact, already be-

TEAM WORK IS EMERGING

The change is coming about through the cooperation of the various nations affected, Germany, France, Italy, The Netherlands, and others we cannot name for the moment. And Britain, seeing the handwriting, is joining up, according to most re-

In a general business way the result will be a union of these countries so that their business people can trade as freely among themselves as two American states-Texas and New Mexico to illustrate-without tariff and other barriers.

The recent state of the union message of the president and the stirrings in Congress help to accent the importance of this new, enlightened selfhelp in Europe. It will be felt in Floydada and every other community, big and little, in our country.

THE JOB OF ADJUSTING

Adjusting to this new competition will be easier for agricultural communites than for the tightwound industrial communities. It will make, is already making. Big Steel look for its "hole card". Free trade is the tendency. We are far from it now, but the tariff walls will begin to be adjusted, for our industrial community to survive. As the arbitrary rules begin to disintegrate world trade will be easier. The prospect has great local possibilities.

SURVEY IS A GOOD IDEA

To look around to see what you can do, what you should do, and how you can do it, is a much better approach to any problem than to begin threshing around, spending time and energy, possibly wasting both, in hysteria.

This apropos the announcement of a survey of possible shelters against fall out the federal government is going to conduct nation-wide, beginning in the most vulnerable areas first.

An encouraging feature of the survey is that it is to be conducted by agencies of the government already in being. Results are more likely to be common sense. They will be based on what we think is fact, as far as it is possible for informed people to determine.

It is evident that the federal government is feeling the way in this first move, so much better approach than to stir up and enlarge on fear. Survival has a much better chance of becoming a reality in this manner.

BEGINNINGS ARE IMMINENT

The assumption of the nuclear theorists and the engineers is that the Roswell installation will be the target of any first round attack in this part of the country, and that the prevailing winds will bring fall out from explosions eastward.

The practical means we have, or if lacking, should begin to bring into being to make survival possible, is the problem. Surveys will begin immediately, if the word of a bureaucrat can be taken at face value. Two months to cover a 23-county area is about the time table. A "windshield" survey already has been made. If they tell us rightly this county will be checked by the end of next

Volume LXVIII. This week, according to the types, is the beginning number of the 68th volof the Hesperian, and if one didn't know better he'd think that is the way it is. The fact is. the newspaper does not begin its 68th year until the last week in March. The first issue of The Hesperian was dated March 27, 1896, by young Claude V. Hall, the stripling who dreamed of being a man of letters - and saw his dream come true but not as a newspaper man.

What happened? What made the volume beginning change from March to January? Was it the calendar? It was not the calendar. There were 52 weeks in the year in 1896, there were 52 weeks in 1961, and there will be 52 weeks in any other year from here on out unless and until the calendar is changed by world agreement. Since agreements are not in fashion among the powers at this time, there will be no change in the calendar in the foreseeable future.

Time Heals. The 11 weeks difference is due to carelessness or ignorance sometime back there. When we discovered what we or some one else had done several years ago, we recalled we once had a printer, a good old boy, who did not know what volume and number meant. He was changing the number every week-and the volume number as well. He had us clicking along pretty fast. We remember getting that one adjusted. But somebody else managed to goof — and we're not ruling out anybody - maybe more than one of us had a hand in it. Fortunately, time heals most mis-takes. We see no reason at this time to run back through all those issues, pinpoint the error, and try to fix it up at this late date. Would you?
