OUR "TERRIBLE" TEXAS GOVERNMENT

Something terrible is always wrong with Texas and Texas people, our scolds tell us over and over again.

We avow our own belief, based to some extent on information, that this state is one of the top four or five in the nation as to good government, economical operation of its bureaus, commissions

Our state has, in addition to responsive and responsible authorities, more than one research organization, supported by private funds, which are doing a good job. The oft-maligned Texas Research League has done a magnificant job, throwing light on the various types of taxation and on ways and means of bettering the functions of the

We believe, furthermore, that for the most part we have a hard-working, conscientious legislature, and that most of them are enlightened citizens who want to do a good job. Right now the division principally is on "conservative" and "liberal" lines. Fringe publications on both right and left are doing a considerable bit of name-calling on these scores. The claims of both extremes can be discounted by the middle of the road citizen.

GOOD WORK BEING DONE

This is not to say that no selfishness nor selfseeking is in the legislature and in other parts of Texas government. It is also not to say that the people do not get pushed around to some extent by interests which know how to do this and not get caught at it. Nor would we try to leave the impression there are no "rotten spots" in our state.

But by and large, there are honesty and fair dealing, and economy in most places, high and low. And honest search for the best way to serve the most people the right way. We have in mind one commission which is doing a quite worthwhile study of property or ad valorem tax policies. They have been at work for two years. On January they had spent for postage and travel \$6,318 and nothing for salaries,

SHOULD WE BLAST THEM?

The Texas Observer, a weekly perodical with an interesting flair for being at outs with most everything, sometimes carrying the torch for off beat ideas, used a bit of its irony on Texas country newspaper people last week.

General Walker, the "censored" iconoclast of the army and Eddie Rickenbacker, he of auto racing and air service fame, were invited guests at a meeting of the newspaper people. Both made speeches. Both have positive ideas and minced no words in presenting them.

Since much of their philosophy, each in his own way, was contrary to generally held ideas in Texas. should they have been blasted by their hosts? We think not. The newspaper people—the Observer does not credit country newspaper people with being "newsmen"- wanted to see and hear the famous men, to see what makes the wheels go round in them, how they tick.

But The Observer wanted the newspaper people to have the guts to "identify them for what they are: one, a bad-mouthing military bully, the other a malicious rich man who has grown bitter toward this generation.'

We think it is pertinent to remark that a host doesn't blast guests, which is what these men were. for this writer was 45 seconds of banter with Mr. Rickenbacker at a hotel entrance. A man with a belly laugh like that one has, may be rich - we wouldn't know - but he is not malicious, nor has he grown bitter, the way we take quick judgment on people. Crusty? Yes, but who isn't these days? The "newsmen" who write for The Texas Ob-

server are not expected to understand.

News of our bailiwick comes first at The Hesperian Office, the same as it does to every other periodical that attempts to be a newspaper. On top of that comes other things which affect the welfare and the thinking of readers. Reams of it every week at any news desk and editorial writer's elbow. To mention a few this morning, adding up to to ten or fifteen columns in all, no doubt:

American Legion, Western Railroad Association, Life Line, American Medical Association, Department of the Army, Health Insurance Institute, Texas Tubercular Association, Texas Safety Association, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, Texas Farmers Union, High Plains Resarch Foundation, Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy, Texas Highway Department, all in one mail, not to mention two or three columns from men of repute offering for public office.

Far be it from us to complain. Usually everyone of them has an idea that is worth pursuing. Every missive represents an outlay of thought and energy. The postage bill alone, mailing to all of Texas, some of them to all of a whole region, is not to be maligned.

But a newspaper, big or little, can do all it can do and no more. That is why, perhaps, the waste paper basket yawns wide-mouthed.
