# May Be Ready For Contract **Bids In Week**





## EDITORIAL

#### FIRST SATURDAY IN MAY

Whether they are ready for it or not the voters of Texas will go to their respective primaries on Saturday, May 5, which is only a week and two days hence.

From long habit Texas politics has been lukewarm the first of the year, simmered along through April and May, thrown off some steam in June and boiled furiously in July and August.

But that is no more. Whether the voter has made up his mind or not he goes to the polls next week-end or he doesn't go so far as the party nominations are concerned.

#### WE MUST THINK HARDER

The late lamented George Sessions Perry, gifted Texan who could box words around like ten pins, in his life-time told of a Negro woman of his acquaintance who could wish so hard she could "wish a hole in a plank." He was illustrating the thought that what a person or a community thinks is the way the individual or the community will turn. As you think, so are you, in other words.

If that be a truism than Floydada should have some kind of development not too long hence that would bring more traffic across the threshholds of local business houses. There has been some such development in the past 12 months but we need for this occurrance to double or quadruple now and again 12 months hence.

#### GOOD SIGN FOR FLOYDADA

One of the arrows that point to better city government in Floydada, is the news that the bookkeeping system of the municipality is to be overhauled, is in fact in process of being overhauled.

City fathers hope to have the new set of books functioning within a month or so.

The new way of accounting will be a safeguard, also, to employes of the city who handle the quite considerable funds. Better also for the city's debtors and creditors. Better for the property owners and their tax bills. Just better.



all the worms that get in little calves' navels, in wire cuts and such, are not necessarily screwworms, we are floored for sure.

A cattleman returning from the pasture where he has been doctoring cattle for screwworms all morning will be amazed, we think, to learn that the maggots he found may not have been screwworms at all. He has to send the maggots somewhere to find out for sure.

One can say for the maggots of this area, if they are not screwworms they at least do a good job of eating a calf up and the cattleman better not wait to hear what their scientific name is before he does something about it. -0-
