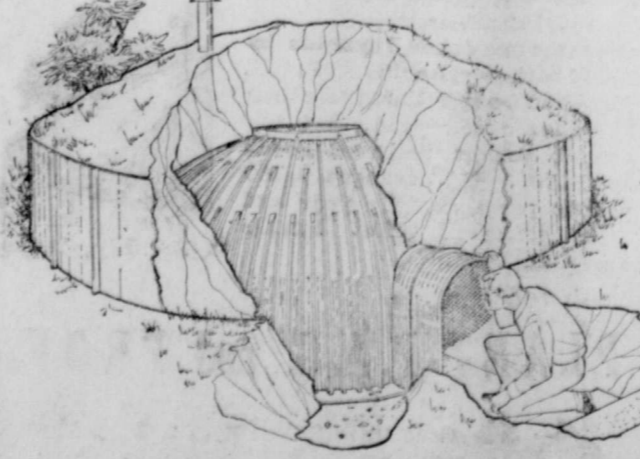

### Shelter Design Book Available

Those wishing to build their own home fallout shelters can now obtain the most up-to-date information through a handbook, "Family Shelter Designs," just distributed by the Department of Defense. The booklet, prepared by the Defense Department's Office of Civil Defense, provides designs and detailed construction data for eight fallout shelters of different types. They range in cost from \$75 to \$650. All would cut to at least 1/100th the amount of outside fallout radiation reaching occupants. These shelters, the booklet explains, are designed for "use by families who do not have access to community shelters or who prefer that their shelters be at their homes." The handbook may be obtained from local Civil Defense offices or by writing to Office of Civil Defense, Department of Defense, Battle Creek, Mich.



LEAN-TO SHELTER made of lumber would provide protection against fallout in homes with basements, costing less than \$75 on a self-built basis, would provide protection as some of the seven other designs in the Defense Department's booklet, "Family Shelter Designs." It combines simplicity of construction, availability of materials, and could be disassembled. Defense offices have the free booklet available now.



### Shelter Despite High-Water Table

ABOVE-GROUND SHELTER covered with earth for areas where basements or underground construction are not feasible would provide good fallout protection for up to 10 persons. The shelter, costing \$550 for materials, is one of the "Family Shelter Designs" booklets available from the Department of Defense, and available at no charge through civil defense offices.

### ASC Deadline Dates Noted

There are at least four deadlines the last of April and the first of May that will be of interest to Floyd County farm operators, in connection with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. They are:

**Dates to Remember**  
May 1 is the final date to dispose of excess wheat and report to the County office.

May 1 has been established as the final date to graze diverted acreage under the 1962 Wheat Stabilization Program and 1962 Feed Grain Program.

April 30 is the final date to file to expand the general releases for incentive payment under the Wool Program, that is wool or Lamapasas to Truth Or Consequences, New Mexico, due west, to the western New Mexico boundary.

April 30 is the last day to place dary. The screwworm inspection line has been moved from its original position so that it now runs along a line from Del Rio to Rocksprings to Junction to Fredricksburg to Springbranch to Luling to Gonzales and Bay City. The inspection line was moved because of increasing number of cases which began to appear north of the previously established line.

**Support on 1962 Wheat**  
The minimum National average price support price for 1962 crop wheat was set last August 9, 1961 at \$2.00 per bushel. This compares with \$1.79 per bushel in 1961 and is the only major price support commodity which did not receive a substantial increase in support level in 1961 over 1960.

Floyd County in 1961 was 1 cent above the National average, which should make our 1962 support at about \$2.00 for farm storage.

**Skip-row-planting**  
A wire was received this week changing previous information in regard to skip-row planting of grain sorghum and cotton for 1962. It reads as follows:

Strips of 4 normal rows or more in skip-row planting patterns will qualify as diverted acreage.

flies are being released where special problems arise. During the last week in March, a total of 180 screwworm cases were reported in Texas. Only two of these cases were outside the general release area just described.

However, in the last two weeks additional screwworm cases have been reported from Terrell, Val

Verde, Sutton, Edwards and Brazoria counties. In these instances, spot fly releases have been made. Where spot fly releases are made, 72,000 flies are released in a circle 10 miles in diameter around the location where the screwworm infestation was found.

This means that spot releases have been made in Terrell, Val Verde, Sutton, Edwards and Brazoria counties, to combat screwworms in these areas. In addition, screwworm sterile males are being released in appropriate river valleys.

Last week 14 million flies were released and it is anticipated that in the very near future, production will be 20 million at the Kerrville facilities. When this magnitude is reached, plans are to expand the general releases

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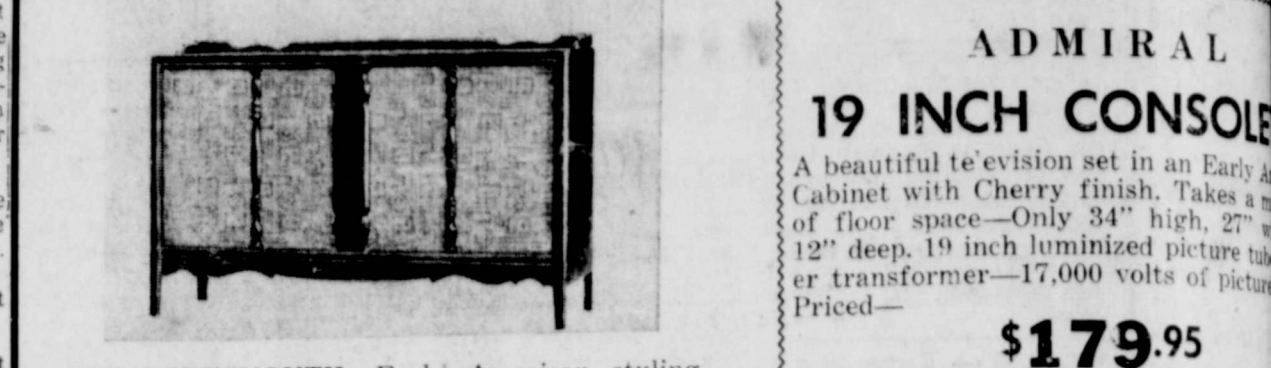

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Next week some 2,500,000 Texans will make up their minds whom to cast their ballots for among a huge list of candidates for local, district, state and federal offices.

## CLIFFORD HELMS MAKES APPEAL

hoping to replace Gov. Price Daniel. The governor is working hard to see that they don't. Down the list, to the office of precinct chairman, there are more candidates than in many years. This is due primarily to the "open races" for the major state offices — namely those of attorney general and lieutenant governor. These openings have allowed those down the line to try to move up while at the same time leaving lesser offices open.

Also on May 5, the two parties will hold precinct conventions. They will name delegates to county conventions. County delegates, in turn, will name delegates to state conventions to be held in September. This is where party platforms will be written. Big side-bar issues on May 5 will be the referendums on horse race betting and poll tax repeal. These will appear on both the republican and the democratic ballots. Also on the GOP ballot is the question whether Padre Island should be developed as a state park. Results of the balloting on these referendums are not binding. But they provide a public opinion poll and legislators are likely to follow the mandates set out by the voters.

**DANIEL BACKS IMPORTS LIMIT** — Governor Daniel sent telegrams to the governors of the other 31 oil-producing states, and asked them to join him in supporting an oil imports limitation amendment. U. S. Congressman Tom Steed of Oklahoma introduced the proposal. It would require oil imports to be cut to the 1956 ratio with U. S. production.

At the 1957 Governors' Conference, Daniel was successful in getting 32 gubernatorial signatures on a petition to Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower, urging mandatory import controls. But he feels that nothing has been done to prevent imports from supplanting domestic production. Daniel said that the recent schedule of eight-day allowables in Texas has resulted in a loss of more than \$100,000,000 in tax revenue for the State. May will be another eight-day producing month.

**AGRICULTURAL WAR ON** — About 40,000 bushels of sweet potatoes worth \$100,000 are in danger of being ruined by the sweet potato weevil, according to State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. Some 1,200 growers in 19 counties plan to join the state in a two-month battle against the pest.

About \$15,000 will be spent to dust sweet potato crops and some 100 storage houses in Anderson, Cherokee, Houston, Leon, Madison, Nacogdoches, Rusk, San Augustine, Shelby and Trinity counties.

White says the war against the Kaphra beetle, which devours grain, has been won at a cost of \$100,000. But every precaution is being taken to prevent another invasion from out-of-state. On the positive side of the planting problems, the agriculture commissioner said South Texas cotton farmers have been given a 10-day extension — to midnight April 30 — to plant or replant where seeds failed to germinate because of unusually dry weather.

**NO SECRETS ALLOWED IN SCHOOLS** — A Texas law that says that public school authorities can suspend or expel a student who solicits members for a fraternity, or other secret society, also prohibits other organizations from doing so. Attorney General Will Wilson has so ruled. The law allows the formation in schools of Boy Scouts, Hi-Y, Girl Scouts, DeMolay, Rainbows, Girls, Pan-American clubs, scholarship societies, and other "kindred education organizations sponsored by state or national education authorities." But any "public welfare" group which isn't on the list of specifics is forbidden.

**BOAT TRAFFIC BIG PROBLEM** — As warm weather in spurs the owners of 177,082 motor boats to launch their crafts on Texas' lakes and streams, the problem of boat safety comes to the fore. The boat safety committee of the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas plans to study the matter with Rep. Ben Atwell on April 27.

Corps of Engineers' plans which relate to impoundments on drainage systems in the State.

**NEW HIGHWAY MARKERS** — The 57th Legislature failed to appropriate funds for advertising Texas' tourist attractions out of the state. But the Texas Highway Commission has come up with a dazzling device for pointing out places of interest to travelers once they get in the State. Historic sites and other spots of unusual interest will be pointed out by big cast-aluminum markers, such as those used in Virginia. These markers will be erected at roadside parks and turnoffs, so drivers can pull over and read the legends at leisure. Markers are three feet wide and four feet, 10 inches, high and look like they're made of Swedish steel. They'll be mounted on six-foot aluminum poles.

Two already have been erected at a cost of \$1,000 each. One, placed two miles northeast of Tyler, marks the site of the largest Confederate Army prisoner of war camp west of the Mississippi. It was paid for by the grandson of a Union soldier who spent some time there. The other was purchased by the Odessa Chamber of Commerce to point to the famous Meteor Crater near Odessa. On May 4, a third plaque will be set up at McCamey. It will mark Castle Gap — the old Butterfield Stage pass.

Attorney general ruled that such markers are necessary for maximum use of modern highways, and thus okayed the expenditure of state funds for future plaques. Cost of plaques can be reduced to \$700 each in mass lots. A committee headed by George W. Hill of the State Historical Survey Committee and composed of representatives from the Highway Department, the Parks Board and the Game and Fish Commission screens all recommended sites. About 100 spots are being considered right now.

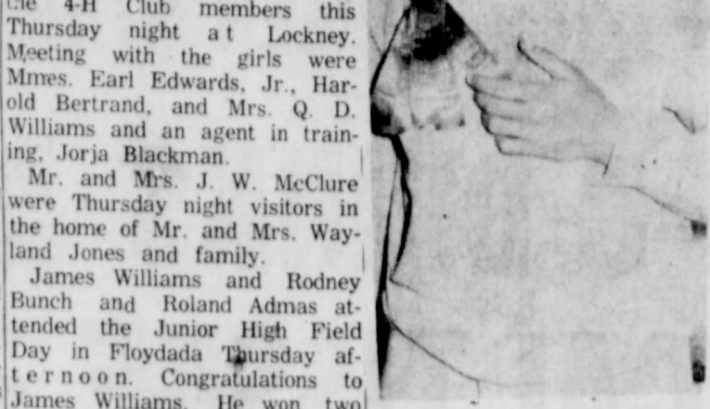
