Arkansas is finding that the bed of roses created by the annual horse racing season is full of thorns. A Little Rock radio station is taking a stronger stand than is usually heard by a firm. This is a part of KLRA's editorial.

"The neglect of debts and other obligations has become a serious problem during the annual horse-race meet in Hot Springs. The racing season has been lengthened and the problem could now become even more serious.

"Betting on horse races is a matter of individual decision. KLRA neither condones nor condemns the race meet itself, but the practice of neglecting bills in order to bet on the horses draws our strongest condemnation. This is a practice which needs to stop. The problem has grown to alarming proportions."

We vote no to the referendum on legalizing race track gambling.

Against Racing

The record is written by legalized gambling. In states where gambling is legal it costs as much as five dollars for every dollar realized in taxes. Legalized gambling produces no wealth of any kind. It produces no food, no clothing, no housing, no education, no transportation, no wholesome recreation. What does it produce? Well, you ask the bank examiners, the credit associations, or the divorce court judge, or the probation officers, or the law enforcement officers. These records are written in the State of Texas.

Why should a small group of people with self-served and selfish motives seek to force Texas to go backward? What they seek was tried once before in Texas. It didn't work and the business men of Texas led the fight to get legal gambling removed from the books.

Meet The Issue

Basic to this whole matter is the simple and profound fact that legal gambling, just the illegal gambling, is immoral. Legal gambling simply results in an increase in illegal gambling. "The state of the ethical and moral values in our culture is perilous enough at the moment. Let the citizenship of this land face courageously the issues which would destroy the things we hold sacred. This is an issue which must be met squarely with courage and the power of the ballot in a free society."

A resounding "no" on this issue will do as much for the strength of Texas as a strong vote for the freedoms we take for granted.

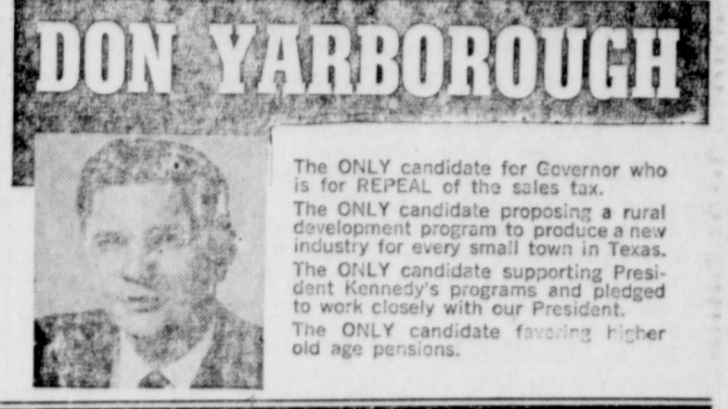

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — Whether voters take part in the democratic or republican primary elections Saturday, they'll face a mighty long list of decisions regarding national, state and county offices — plus the much-touted question of parimutuel betting on the horse races.

Democrats will attack the matter on two fronts: "FOR (or AGAINST) the Legislature to submit a constitutional amendment to legalize parimutuel wagering on horse races."

"FOR (or AGAINST) the Legislature to enact a law legalizing parimutuel wagering on horse races with the state and the track sharing 14 per cent of the pari-mutuel pool, the home county receiving two per cent of the total pool, and all other counties receiving one-half the net state share on the basis of population."

Democrats favored the issue after 200,000 voters petitioned the State Democratic Executive Committee to submit the proposal on the primary ballot to meet legal requirements for including specific legislation in the party platform.

Republicans added the issue to their ballot too, and phrased the following proposition: "FOR (or AGAINST) the State Legislature of Texas submitting for a vote of the people of Texas a constitutional amendment which would legalize parimutuel wagering in Texas, on a local county option basis."

Both parties will take a sampling of voter sentiment on the question of repealing the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting. Should the proposals carry on May 5, it probably would be two or more years before either issue is settled.

NEW LIFE — Congressman-at-Large took on new life with Internal Revenue's verification that Judge W. W. Bean of E. Paso, generally regarded as the leading candidate in that race, had not filed an income tax report since 1952.

One of his opponents, Phil Willis of Kaufman County, who calls himself "the middle-of-the-road democrat," immediately demanded that Bean "withdraw from the race and apologize to the people."

That afternoon he'll join Highway Commissioner Hal Woodward of Coleman in McCamey, where a Tourist Marker will be unveiled. Marker commemorates the site of Castle Gap — famous early pass for southwestern cattle and coach trails.

SCHOOL LANDS CALLED TAX-SAVERS — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler referred to Texas' 2,500,000 school children as his "special clients" when he gave a report on state lands Friday.

He said that public school land, which is administered by the Land Board, has produced nearly \$600,000,000 for the public schools. The college and university estate has rendered an additional \$400,000,000.

Sadler stated that the two school domains already have saved Texans a billion dollars in direct taxes. He predicted that his office — which also runs the Veterans Land Program — will do a land-slide business this year: buying and selling 3,500 farms; checking 9,000 oil and gas leases; and leasing 18,000,000 acres of land.

PINK BOLLWORMS UNDER CONTROL — Some 4,900 cotton planting permits have been issued in Cameron, Willacy, Hidalgo and Starr counties under the pink bollworm cotton escrow program. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said early surveys show good control of the pink bollworm so far.

Escrow program is a voluntary plan by Valley farmers in which they deposit \$7.50 for each bale ginned. Money is returned if their cotton fields are cleared of insect-protecting stalks by the plow-up deadline.

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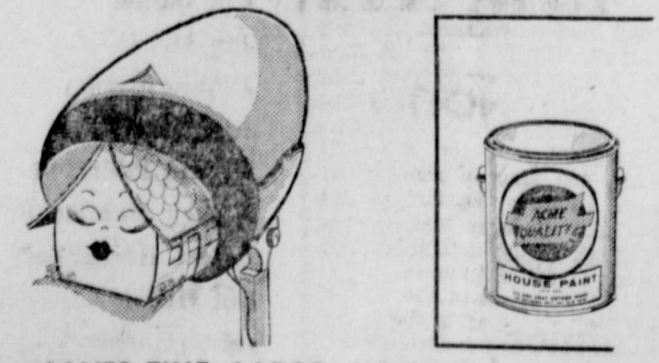

County Fund To Start For Screw Worm Problems
 A county-wide meeting for live stock producers of the county on screwworm control was held Tuesday night in the community room of the First National Bank.

The program was sponsored by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and presented to producers present encouraging them to check their animals often for screwworms.

Since hundreds of new screwworm cases have shown up in southern Texas livestock, owners are urged to spray animals with an approved insecticide to hold down the screwworm problem.

J. S. Hale Jr., was elected as chairman of a fund raising committee to encourage producers to contribute to the Health Foundation so they may continue their work of controlling screwworms.

Floyd County was broken down into communities and a chairman named for each. These men plan to start making a voluntary collection from livestock owners.

Cecil Lewis, County Agent, said the basis was set up for 50 cents a head on adult beef, two dairy cattle, steers and horses, and ten cents a head on adult swine and sheep. Those wishing Dale Clubb, Lakewood, Calif.; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Another unanimous vote was taken favoring Tyer for principal and after being notified of this he accepted the position.

Curry Also Promoted

Faced with the loss of their head coach the board then discussed this position with their Assistant Coach Bill Curry.

ry was brought up for first consideration by his retiring mentor who believed him well qualified as well as familiar with duties and responsibilities.

Curry was a Plainview boy finishing high school there. He was graduated from McMurry College at Abilene and is presently working on his master's degree during the summer months.

He served as junior high coach here in 1956 and then went to Brownfield where he was freshman coach. Curry returned here two years ago as assistant football coach under Charles Tyer. His teaching duties are in the science department.

Curry was given the same hundred percent backing as the board afforded Baker and Tyer and he accepted the position with the new school year.

Facing a big agenda of business at their regular first Tuesday meeting the Board of Education Independent School District was held until mid-night clearing the table before adjournment.

Monthly bills totaling some \$4,290.47 were studied and then voted to be paid.

John Parkey and J. L. Wilson appeared before the group and

requested approval of a tax sheltered annuity plan for teachers that is available under federal law. No action was taken on the matter at the time but will be brought up for action soon.

Principal Farris Wilson of the Della Plains School appeared and recommended a faculty for the coming year. After study with Graves and the board the names of Miss Mary Ann Allen, Mrs. Josie Mae Harper, Alvin R. Johnson, Calvin H. Stripling, Mrs. Annie M. Taylor, Miss Laura Faye Yonner, Mrs. Farris Wilson, Mrs. Odessa Harris were approved. Lee Gusta Williams was okayed for janitor at the school for the coming year also. Principal Wilson had his contract extended at a previous meeting of the board. The same tuition deal was approved to handle colored high school students from Motley County attending Della Plains.

Some improved cafeteria policies and practices that were introduced at last months meeting were approved. They are expected to give better service at all of the school cafeterias.

Campus caretakers for the summer months were approved and duties outlined.

Five new typewriters will be purchased for typing classes and school use, three for high school and two for Della Plains.

Graves reported the possibility that the district might get some financial relief under the economic index set up. Under school law 2922, section 16, there is provision for adjustment where the local assignment from the state is equal to more than the school tax would be under county tax valuations and rate. This would amount to nearly \$25,000 for last year.

Graves has applied for the refund but no word has been received as yet. Approval of this application would open the door for similar action for the present school year. If these adjustments are granted it could bring relief to most school districts in the county.

School Makes High Mark

Superintendent Graves reported the present senior class at high school received a rating of 96 percent from the Iowa Test of Educational Development. This is an approved testing agency by the Texas Education Service and reflects credit on the student body, faculty, and entire school system.

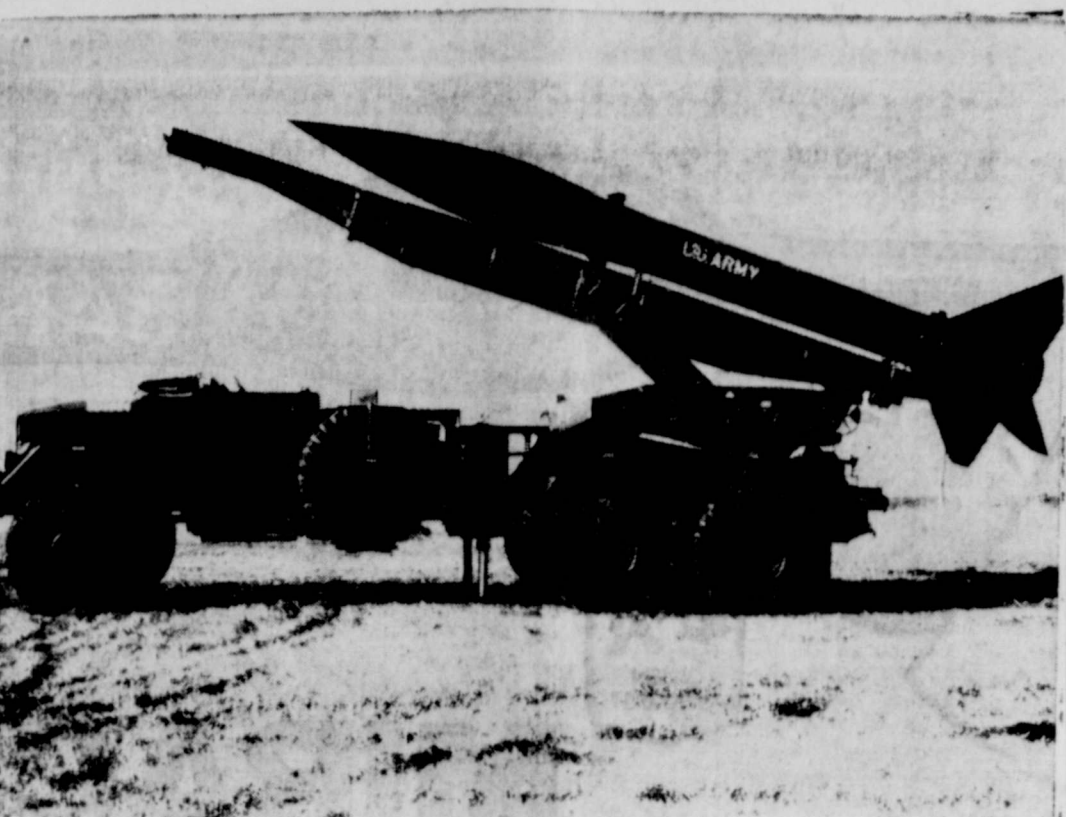

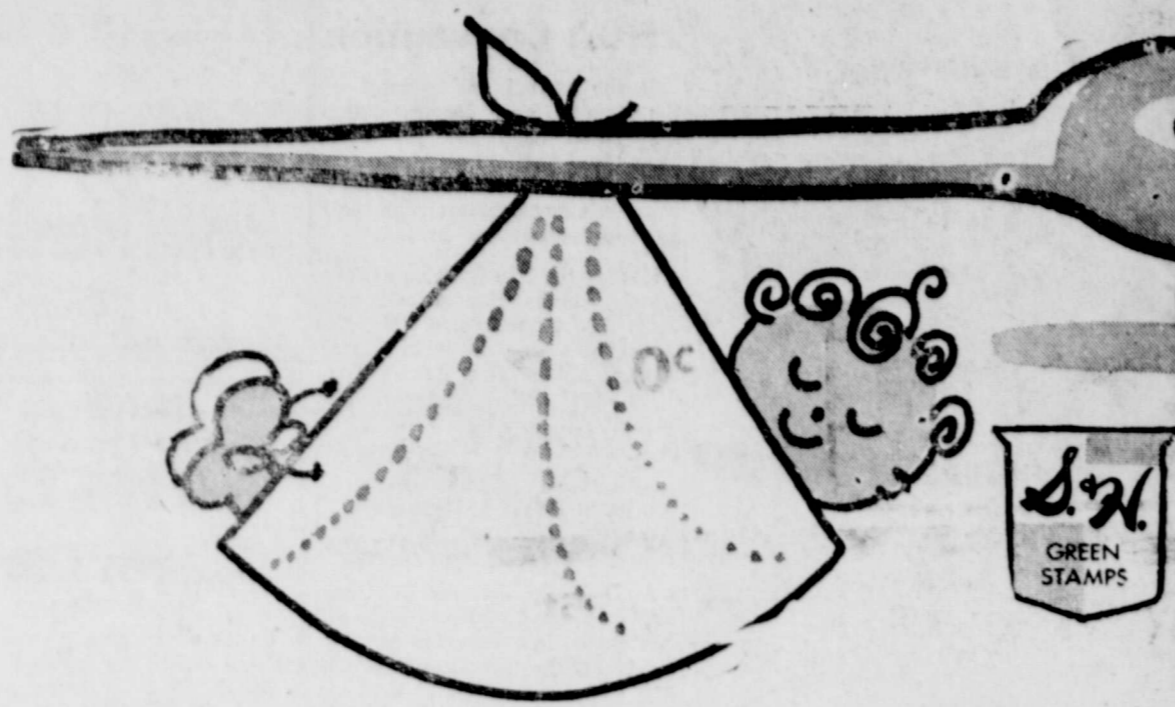
He was 91 years old and had been a resident of Albuquerque since 1897. He was a religious educator.
