I arrived in Floydada in August, 1919, with \$38.00 in my pocket looking for a job, and was given one as a mechanic for \$90.00 per month by O. P. Rutledge, who was then the International Harvester Dealer.

One of the first men I met was Homer Steen, who I believe operated the Hesperian in a small building back of Stewart's Cleaners where Mr. Rutledge's business was.

The Hesperian machinery was run by a little old 5 H. P. International engine that was very badly worn and Homer would get me to start it at times. Our friendship began to grow as time went by.

In 1925, The Hesperian and the International Harvester agency moved to our present quarters and good times as well as bad came. Homer and I would have our early morning talks about what crop conditions were as well as other items of interest that might make Floydada and Floyd County news more interesting.

I spent many years as a City Councilman and I told Homer that he was my Campaign Manager and he must have been a goo one, as I was never defeated. I just retired from old age.

To see Homer retire from the helm of the Hesperian is a great loss to me, both from a business point and from a weekly chat about conditions. I know I have bothered him many times by going in his office early in the morning while he was trying to concentrate on his editorials, but he would always stop and hear what I might have to say, and he never failed to print any news of interest that I might give him, especially where the City affairs were concerned.

So we at Martin and Company will miss many things he has done for us and we salute him for a job well done to the community which he served. We wish him and Mrs. Steen many happy years together in the future.
