May Is Planting Time for Irrigated Pasture Land

20,000 Acres On Slopes Is County's Need

Pasture planting time for irrigated land has arrived. This past week has seen several landowners start preparation for planting of Midland bermuda grass sprigs. It has been determined that as many as 20,000 acres of steeper slopes in the Floyd County Soil Conservation District need to be established to permanent grasses to protect the land from wind and water erosion. Also the steeper slopes in permanent grass are better able to utilize rainfall by holding the rain where

This year's diverted acreage program offers an excellent opportunity to get grasses estabished. Since the diverted acres are not to be grazed until Jan. 1st this will give the grasses an excellent opportunity to get es-

tablished before being stocked. During the last two years approximately 1,000 acres of irrigated pastures have been planted with some outstanding results being cited. Mr. J. S. Noland of Lockney who established 14 acres of Midland bermuda grass in 19-60 reports his management and stocking rates as follows:

From planting date until frost the first year he did not graze since he wanted the stand to be well established. After frost 90 cows were wintered for 6 weeks on the dorman grass and then put on silage. After prewatering in the spring of 1961 he started grazing in late April with 68 head of cows.

He continuted until frost on the 14 acres with this rate except for 6 weeks during the peak growth season when he stocked with 108 head of cows and 76 calves. Also during this period of time he was digging sprigs off of about 5 acres of land.

His management this spring includes 260 pounds of 32-0-0 ferlowed by prewatering. He started grazing about April 15th with 41 head of livestock and will in-

year.
Before each irrigating this year he plans to apply 60 to 80 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre. From all reseach information it appears that nitrogen in this amount is definitely needed if high sustained yields are to be realized.

Cost-share for establishing grassservation Program where a complete conservation plan is carried out is offered at the rate of 80 percent of the average cost for establishment except for Midland bermuda grass.

For Midland bermuda grass the cost-share for seedbed preparation, sprigging operation and sprig cost is \$10.80 per acre. If you are interested in grass plantings on your land this year contact the local Soil Conservation Service office for additional information and planning assistance.

Grass Needs Time For Root System

Several Floyd County farmers are establishing irrigated grasses for permanent pasture. Some will find this to be more profitable than others due to management

Farmers trying to establish grass should not plan on any grazing the first year. It is very important to let the grass es tablish a sound root system. This will pay off in increased yields

When the grass is well established begin grazing when the plants reach the early root stage. This is a critical stage. One should not try to get back all his expense at once. The farmer should adjust his grazing so that not more than 50 percent of the current growth is

Since the leaves of the plant are the manufacturing system of the plant, removing over onehalf of the growth has about the same effect as a damaging freeze. It takes time for recov ery after each grazing.

Temporary electric fences could be used to rotate cattle in small patches. The protein content of grass is the highest at about the early boot stage. This means that one could expect higher

at this time.

There is some merit in the statement "grow more grass to grow more roots to grow more grass." This has been proven by research and field trials.

With a combination of good practices and sound management it could be possible to produce as much as 2000 pounds es under the Great Plains Con- of beef per acre on irrigated grasses in Floyd County

> This has already been accomplished in the High Plains area of West Texas. One of the factors that should be considered with rotating cattle about every 12 days is time and frequency of irrigation.

Cattle should be off the grass after watering long enough to regain its strength. Plenty of clean cool water should be available at all times. Also good quality dry hay should be fed free choice and the farmer should ise good quality cattle to make
